Turin, June 6.

**T**HE French Troops are come within 3 Leagues of this place, and have burnt the Duke of Savoy's Palace at Rivoli, and several Villages thereabouts. Upon which his Royal Highness has thought fit, that the Dutchess should remove with the Court to Verceil, and all things are put into a posture for a vigorous defence of this place, in case the Enemy make any attempt upon it. The Duke will leave here a Garison of 10000 men; Prince Eugene of Savoy is to command in the Town, and the Marquis de Parelle in the Castle, and his Royal Highness will keep the Field with his Cavalry and Dragoons; In the mean time the Assurances we have, that the Succors are actually on their march from Germany, give all people here a mighty Encouragement.

**Vienna, June 14.** Their Imperial Majesties, and the King of the Romans, returned hither on Tuesday last from the Review of the Brandenburg Troops on the Frontiers of Hungary. On Monday arrived here three Deputies from Transylvania with a noble Equipage. Count Staremberg's Regiment (which is the last that comes out of the Empire) has lately passed by here on its march to Hungary; where the Imperial Forces will now be very quickly at the General Rendezvous; And Prince Louis of Baden, who is to command them, sets out from hence the next week. Our advices from the Frontiers tell us, of the kind and honourable Reception which Sir William Hussy, Ambassador from Their Majesties of Great-Britain, has had every where from the Turks, not only in respect to his Character, but on account likewise of the welcome Errand he comes to them upon, for mediating a Peace.

**Hydelberg, June 19.** The Elector of Saxony is still at Hailbron, where General Caprara has been to confer with him. His Troops advance to the Neckar, and on the 21st or 22d of this month will joyn the Confederate Army, which will then decamp from Wisfelocke and pass the Rhine, a Bridge being made for that purpose at Manbeym.

**Cologne, June 22.** The Brandenburg Troops that were quartered at Nuys, Huls, Kempen, and other places in this Diocesis, are marched towards Brabant. The French continue still in the Neighbourhood of Meniz; And the Hussars in Garison there have had several Skirmishes with them, and killed and taken divers of them.

**Paris, June 19.** We are assured, that Orders are sent to the French Men of War that lay at Belle Isle, to return forthwith to Brest, for that they are not thought safe there. From Murat's of the 11th they write, that the Count d'Estree was come back on that Coast with 12 Men of War

and 20 Gallies, but that he designed to go out again very suddenly. His Lord, that an Express is arrived here from Monsieur Citinat, with an account of his having taken Carmagnole; And that he had sent a Detachement to invest Quercy. Here is a report, that the little Town of Ordel in Catalonia was surrendered to the French on the 12th instant.

**From His Majesties Camp at Opprebais near Maleure, June 25.** On the 22d instant the Troops of Leige, being about 4000 Foot, and 3000 Horse and Dragoons, commanded by Count de chies de Tilly, joyned us at Beauvichin; The next day we decamped and marched two Leagues and a half to this place, where we received a farther Reinforcement of 2 Regiments from Namur, 2 from Charleroy, and 2 English Regiments. Yesterday the Landgrave of Hesse, at the Head of 9600 men, arrived within 4 hours march of our Camp, and sent to the King to know, where His Majesty would be pleased he should joyn the Army, whereupon His Majesty dispatched Monsieur Gudermaest, one of the Grooms of his Bedchamber, to his Highness; This day 6000 Brandenburg Horse, besides some Foot and Dragoons, came into the Camp. Tomorrow we shall march again, towards the Troops of Hesse, and when they have joyned us, our Army will consist of between 80 and 90000 men. The Marquis de Boufflers lyes near Dinant with 10000 men, having sent the rest of his Troops to joyn the Duke of Luxemburg, who is still encamped about Braine le Comte. There are 10 Regiments in Brussels.

**Hague, June 26.** The King approaches with the Confederate Army towards the Samere. On the 24th they were encamped near Maleure, and his Lord, they march this day to Gemblors; His Majesties design is kept very secret. The Duke of Luxemburg lyes all this while about Braine le Comte, and the Marquis de Boufflers near Dinant. From Germany they confirm the march of the Imperial and Bavarian Forces towards Piedmont; and that the Saxons would on the 22d instant pass the Neckar near Hailbron.

**Cashell, June 10.** This day two Irish Officers, who deserted, came hither with their Arms; They say, their French General is gone with all the Forces he can get together towards Athlone, but that not above half of them are tolerably clothed, that Provisions are very scarce, and the Irish in general mightily dissatisfied.

**Baltimore, June 11.** Though you have already had an account of the taking of this Place, yet it may not be unacceptable to publish the following Relation, which will more particularly inform you of what has passed since our coming hither.

On the 6th instant we marched from Mullingar with the Army under the command of Lieutenant-General Ginckell, consisting of 15 Battalions of Foot, and about 3000 Horse; On the 7th we came before this place, situated upon a Tongue of Earth jutting out into a Lake, being in circumference about a small mile, ending on the two sides with Bogs that are unaccessable, on which are set severall
