"Her Majesty the Queen may, on being satisfied that the Legislature of any British Possession has made adequate provision for the recognition in that Possession of Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom, direct by Order in Council that this Act shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications specified in the Order, apply to that Possession, and thereupon, while the Order is in force, this Act shall apply accordingly."

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Legislature of the British Possession hereinafter mentioned has made adequate provision for the recognition in that Possession of Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Act in Her Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

"The Colonial Probates Act, 1892," shall apply to the British Possession hereunder mentioned :—

The Colony of the Leeward Islands.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS, by an Order in Council made on the fifteenth August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, Her Majesty was pleased to make certain Regulations in order to secure greater uniformity in the rules governing officers of higher rank than the Second Division in the several Departments of the Civil Service :

And whereas it is expedient that similar Regulations, so far as circumstances admit, should be made with respect to pensionable officers in the Consular Service of Her Majesty :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order shall apply to all such Consular officers and other persons employed in or in connection with the Consular Service as are entitled to receive superannuation allowances under the Superannuation Acts, 1834 to 1892, and any Acts amending those Acts.

2. Except in the case of officers appointed by Commission from Her Majesty, every person hereafter certificated by the Civil Service Commissioners for appointment to the Consular Service shall be subject to a strict probation for a period of two years, during which his conduct and capacity in the transaction of business shall be subject to such tests as may be determined by the Secretary of State, and he shall not be finally appointed to the Consular Service unless his probation shall furnish to the Secretary of State satisfactory proof of his fitness to be permanently employed in the Consular Service.

3. Promotion of officers in the Consular Service shall be strictly according to merit, and shall take place subject to the following conditions :—

(1.) That there is a vacancy which, under the arrangements sanctioned for the time being by the Commissioners of the Treasury, it is competent for the Secretary of State to fill up ;

(2.) That the work of the Consular Service requires such vacancy to be filled up ;

(3.) That the officer proposed for promotion appears to the Secretary of State to be fit to discharge the duties of the higher office.

4. Every officer hereafter appointed to the Consular Service shall be required to retire at the age of sixty-five on such pension as by the length of his service he is qualified to receive.

Officers heretofore appointed to the Consular Service shall be required to retire at the age of seventy.

If in any special case the Secretary of State is satisfied that the retirement of an officer would be detrimental to the interests of the public service, he may, with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Treasury, from time to time extend that officer's employment for such period or periods, not exceeding five years, as he may determine.

Nothing in this Article shall affect any existing power of the Secretary of State to require any officer to retire from the Consular Service if he has ceased, from whatever cause, to be fully competent for the performance of his duties.

5. The Consular Service shall be governed by such instructions as may from time to time be issued by a Secretary of State with the approval, in so far as such instructions may affect the expenditure of public funds or the receipt and application of fees, of the Commissioners of the Treasury.

6. This Order may be cited as "The Consular Service Order in Council, 1896."

WHEREAS under and by virtue of an Order in Council dated the eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, and the New Consolidated Tables of Duties referred to in and approved by an Order in Council dated the twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, it is provided that there shall be paid for every ship, whether British or Foreign, entering or departing from the Port of London from or to the southward, if on a voyage to or from ports in the Bay of Biscay, ports south of Cape Finisterre, Gibraltar, and ports within the Straits, America and the West Indies, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every ship for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the light-vessels known as the "Edinburgh Channel" and the "Black Deep" at the entrance to the river Thames.

And whereas by virtue of section six hundred and forty-five of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," Her Majesty may by Order in Council increase, vary or reduce any light dues payable in respect of any lighthouse, buoy or beacon for the time being under the management of a general lighthouse authority.

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been complied with.

And whereas it is fit and proper that the Light Duties payable in respect of the said "Edinburgh Channel" and "Black Deep" Lights should be varied in manner hereinafter mentioned:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth by this Order in Council order and direct that, after the date of this Order, there shall be paid for every ship, whether British or Foreign, entering or departing from the Port of London from or to the southward, if on a voyage to or from ports in the Bay of Biscay, ports south of Cape Finisterre, Gibraltar, and ports within the Straits, America, and West Indies, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such ship in respect of each of the said lights known as the "Edinburgh Channel" and the "Black Deep," for every time of passing each of the said lights. Save and except that such Light Duties shall be payable once only in respect of the same voyage, if such voyage commences or terminates at a port within the following limits, that is to say, the coast of the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man, and the Continent of Europe between the River Elbe and Brest inclusive.

Save as hereinbefore mentioned, the said tolls shall be levied subject to the regulations, exemptions, and abatements or discounts contained or referred to in the said New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties, or to such other regulations, exemptions, and abatements or discounts as may from time to time be duly sanctioned.

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the eighth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Salisbury as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Hilfield and the vicarage of Hermitage both in the county of Dorset having represented unto Us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed two hundred and forty-eight persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice We inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to Us that such union might be usefully made and that the Reverend Henry Russell Joynt Clerk Vicar of the vicarage and parish church of Sydling Saint

Nicholas in the county of Dorset being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefice of Hilfield and the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley Baron Halsbury Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefice of Hermitage respectively consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council We caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to Us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury, Our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And We do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes."

West Hoathly aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Worth of the said parish of Ardingley of the said parish of West Hoathly and of the said new parish of All Saints Crawley Down which are described in the Schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Leonard Turner's Hill situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Leonard Turner's Hill.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Leonard Turner's Hill comprising:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the parish of Saint John Hampstead, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, and partly out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Emmanuel, West End, Hampstead in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint John Hampstead and of the said new parish of Emmanuel West End, Hampstead which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas Ann Dudin Brown of Bailey's Hotel, South Kensington S.W. in the said county of Middlesex Spinster, Sarah Benedict Brown of No. 18 Grosvenor-gardens S.W. in the same county, Widow, and the Reverend Frederic Edward Wigram of Oak Hill House Hampstead N.W. in the same county, Clerk in Holy Orders, have together contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of five thousand pounds sterling as and for the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and (so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, then) of the said new parish and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the said Act the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said sum of five thousand pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish

and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the said Ann Dudin Brown Sarah Benedict Brown and Frederic Edward Wigram have nominated to us as the persons in whom they desire that the whole right of patronage and nomination as aforesaid shall be vested, the said Ann Dudin Brown, the said Sarah Benedict Brown, Sir John Henry Kennaway of Escot in the county of Devon Baronet and a Member of the Commons House of Parliament, the said Frederic Edward Wigram and the Reverend William Hagger Barlow Doctor of Divinity of the Vicarage, Upper-street Islington, in the said county of Middlesex Clerk in Holy Orders.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Saint John Hampstead and of the said new parish of Emmanuel West End Hampstead which are described in the schedule hereunder written (all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed) shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Luke, West Hampstead.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and (when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then) of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the said Ann Dudin Brown, the said Sarah Benedict Brown the said Sir John Henry Kennaway the said Frederic Edward Wigram and the said William Hagger Barlow, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Luke, West Hampstead comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Saint John, Hampstead, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded upon the south-west by the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Emmanuel, West End, Hampstead (including the hereinafter described portion thereof) in the said county and diocese upon the north-west by the new parish of All Saints, Child's Hill, Hendon, in the same county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of

All Saints, Child's Hill, Hendon from the parish of Saint John, Hampstead aforesaid at a point on the north-western side of Platt's-lane opposite to its junction with the public footpath which leads into Kidderpore-avenue the said point being about two chains to the south-west of Child's Hill-lane, and extending thence south-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Redington-road distant fourteen chains or thereabouts (measured along such road) to the south-west of the point where such road joins West Heath-road, and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of Redington-road aforesaid for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as West Hampstead-avenue and extending thence first south-westward and then southward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Finchley-road upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John, Hampstead from the new parish of Emmanuel, West End, Hampstead aforesaid.

"Whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-sixth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and published in the London Gazette on the fifth day of April following there were effected certain re-arrangements of the areas of the said Archdeaconry of Cleveland and of some of the rural deaneries therein.

"And whereas by another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the fifteenth day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-seventh day of the same month there were effected certain further re-arrangements of the areas of the three said Archdeacons of York or the West Riding of the East Riding and of Cleveland and of the rural deaneries within such three Archdeacons and within the remaining Archdeaconry of the said diocese of York to wit the Archdeaconry of Sheffield.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple Archbishop of York that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said three Archdeacons of York or the West Riding of the

East Riding and of Cleveland and to some of the rural deaneries within such Archdeacons are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

"And whereas the said arrangements involve Firstly the formation of a new rural deanery to be called 'The Rural Deanery of Escrick' to comprise certain parishes or cures to be taken out of the Rural Deanery of Bulmer within the said Archdeaconry of Cleveland together with the parish or cure of Naburn to be taken out of the Rural Deanery of Bishopthorpe within the said Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding and a transfer of the said new Rural Deanery to the Archdeaconry of the East Riding and Secondly the transfer of the said Rural Deanery of Bulmer from the said Archdeaconry of Cleveland to the Archdeaconry of the East Riding aforesaid. Thirdly, the transfer of the parish or cure of Fulford from the said Rural Deanery of Bishopthorpe within the Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding as aforesaid, to the Rural Deanery of the city of York within the same Archdeaconry, and Fourthly the abolition of the aforesaid Rural Deanery of Bishopthorpe and the transfer of the parishes or cures or churches heretofore situate therein (with the exception of the parishes or cures of Naburn, and Fulford, mentioned above) to the Rural Deanery of Ainsty within the said Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Dalrymple Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and Archiepiscopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order a new rural deanery shall be formed partly out of the said Rural Deanery of Bulmer and partly out of the said Rural Deanery of Bishopthorpe, and shall be called the Rural Deanery of Escrick and that the same rural deanery shall be included in and form part of the Archdeaconry of the East Riding aforesaid and also that the said Rural Deanery of Bulmer shall be transferred from the said Archdeaconry of Cleveland and shall be included in and form part of the said Archdeaconry of the East Riding and also that the parish or cure of Fulford shall be transferred from the said Rural Deanery of Bishopthorpe and shall be and become part of the Rural Deanery of the city of York aforesaid and also that the said Rural Deanery of Bishopthorpe shall be abolished and that the parishes or cures or churches heretofore situate therein (except the two parishes or cures of Naburn and Fulford above-mentioned) shall be transferred to and be included within the Rural Deanery of Ainsty aforesaid and that the said Rural Deanery of Escrick, the said Rural Deanery of the city of York, the said Rural Deanery of Ainsty, and the said Rural Deanery of Bulmer, shall respectively comprise and consist of the parishes cures and churches the names of which are set down in numbered order under the name of such rural deaneries respectively in the Schedule to this scheme annexed and each of the said parishes or cures or churches shall belong to and be and form part of the rural deanery and Archdeaconry under the names of which it is set down as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the Rural Deanery and of the Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry under which it is so set down as aforesaid and shall not belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or Arch-

deacons nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean or Archdeacon. recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late

Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the fifth year of Her Majesty (session two) chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the fifth year of Your Majesty (session two) chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain further alterations and improvements at the Episcopal residence belonging to the See of Chichester which is situate in the city of Chichester.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Roland, now Bishop of the diocese of Chichester, is desirous that certain permanent alterations and improvements should be made at the said Episcopal residence at Chichester and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed alterations and improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed alterations and improvements a sum of two thousand pounds (being a sum which together with the two sums of

one thousand pounds each already borrowed upon the same security by the Bishop of Chichester under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by borrowing the same by way of further mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments or endowments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Chichester.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne and that the said Governors be empowered to lend, under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, any further sum not exceeding two thousand pounds and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty-five years or until the said sum of two thousand pounds, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following that is to say during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period thereafter, pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one twentieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall, at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid and if and when it shall happen that the principal and interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and shall bind as well the said Ernest Roland, now Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, further recommend and propose that the said sum of two thousand pounds shall be paid to us and that the receipt of our joint treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum of two thousand pounds the whole

or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed alterations and improvements at the Episcopal residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of the diocese of Chichester for the time being, shall at his personal charge and expense insure and keep insured the episcopal house of residence aforesaid from loss or damage by fire in one of the public offices of assurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us in a sum of not less than seven thousand pounds and that such Bishop shall within fourteen days after any premium for such assurance shall have become due and payable deliver to us the receipt for the same and that in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said house and every sum of money receivable under such insurance shall become and be payable and be paid to and deposited with us in trust to be applied and the same together with any interest and accumulations thereof shall be applied by us towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating of the said house or of any part thereof which may have so suffered loss or damage in such manner as shall be determined on by us with the concurrence of the Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say;

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors, and the new

parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Luke Halliwell, all the portions of such new parishes so to be comprised within the said proposed district being within the original limits of the parish of Bolton-le-Moors in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors and of the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas in pursuance of the power and authority given by an Order and Decree of Your Majesty's High Court of Chancery bearing date the fourth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight approving a scheme for the regulation and management of the 'Bolton Lectureship Charity Estate' and of certain Orders of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales bearing date respectively the ninth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one and the twelfth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, amending the said Order and Decree of the fourth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, a clear annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds has been provided out of the revenues of the said estate and is available for and towards the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and for and towards the maintenance of the minister thereof so soon as such minister shall have been appointed and licensed thereto and of his successors ministers of the same district, and when the same district shall have become a new parish then to the minister or incumbent of such new parish.

"And whereas the said annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds is available as aforesaid and has been so provided upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the right of patronage of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and of the nomination of the minister thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Trustees of the said Bolton Lectureship Charity Estate, have nominated to us as the persons to whom they the said trustees desire that the right of patronage of the said proposed district should be assigned, the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever for the first and each and every alternate turn of appointment and themselves the said Trustees and their successors for the second and each and every alternate turn of appointment.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors and of the said new parish of Saint Luke Halliwell, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written and which are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publi-

cation in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Barnabas, Bolton-le-Moors.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and the right of nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof for the first and thereafter every alternate turn of presentation or nomination shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever, and that such patronage and right of nomination aforesaid shall for the second and every subsequent alternate turn of presentation or nomination be in like manner assigned to and be absolutely vested in and be from time to time exercised by the said Trustees of the Bolton Lectureship Charity Estate aforesaid for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act or Acts of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The district of Saint Barnabas Bolton-le-Moors, being:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded upon part of the east upon the south and upon the south-west by the new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors in the said county and diocese, upon the north-west partly by the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Luke, Halliwell (including the hereinafter described portion thereof) and partly by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Matthew, Bolton-le-Moors both which new parishes are situate in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north-east by the last-named new parish, and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the remaining part of the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors from the new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) aforesaid at the junction of Mere Hall-street with Vernon-street and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with Saint George's-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Dawson-lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) from the new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors which is bounded upon the north-west partly by the new parish of Saint Thomas Halliwell in the county and diocese aforesaid and

partly by the new parish of Saint Luke Halliwell aforesaid upon the south-west by the last-named new parish (including the hereinafter described portion thereof) upon the south-east by the above described portion of the new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) from the new parish of Saint Matthew, Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid at the junction of Gaskell-street with Mere Hall-street aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Tindall-street, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors from the new parish of Saint Thomas Halliwell aforesaid.

"III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Luke Halliwell which is bounded upon the north-east by the above described portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Bolton-le-Moors upon the south-east and upon part of the south-west by the above described portion of the new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) and upon all other sides that is to say upon the remaining part of the south-west and upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) from the new parish of Saint Luke Halliwell aforesaid, at the junction at Park-street with Chorley Old-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to a point near to its junction with Mortfield-lane upon the boundary which divides the civil parish of Little Bolton from the civil parish of Halliwell and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell from the above described portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew, Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the following modifications, viz.:—

ISLEHAM, CAMBRIDGE.—Forthwith and entirely—

(1.) In the Parish Church of Isleham, in the county of Cambridge; and also in the churchyard except as follows:—

In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(2.) In the General Baptist Chapel, Isleham; and also in the chapel-yard except as follows:—

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the chapel-yard, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the chapel-yard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

ANTONY, CORNWALL.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Antony, in the county of Cornwall; and also in the churchyard except as follows:—

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, viz., widows, widowers and parents, as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and which, when opened, are free from water, burials may be allowed of such persons to whom they may be allotted, as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-first day of April next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of,

or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-first day of April.
