

case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes."

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order as it is hereby ordered that the vicarage of Hawburgh situate in the county and diocese of Lincoln and the vicarage of Immingham situate in the same county and diocese shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the ninth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, Yeadon situate within the limits of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Yeadon in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, Yeadon, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Yeadon which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Andrew Yeadon situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Yeadon.'

"And with the like consent of the said William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Andrew Yeadon situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such

banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew Yeadon being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Yeadon in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon which is bounded upon the south-east by the parochial chapelry of Rawdon, upon the east by the new parish of Woodside upon the north-east and upon the north-west by the parish of Guiseley, all which cures are in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining side, that is to say upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Guiseley from the new parish of Yeadon aforesaid at the point where the stream called Nun Royd Beck is crossed by the footpath which leads from Guiseley to Yeadon, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of thirty-five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction on the eastern side of the house called or known as Number One Manor-terrace with the road which leads into Haworth-lane, and extending thence first southward and then eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of three chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with Haworth-lane aforesaid and with Chapel-lane and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Town-street and High-street and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to a point on the north side of Town Hall-square opposite to the middle of the north-western end of South View-road and extending thence south-eastward and in a straight line across the said square for a distance of one chain and a-half or thereabouts to the said north-western end of the South View-road aforesaid and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the same road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the western side of the Yeadon Town Hall) to the present south-eastern end of such road at its junction with the footpath or roadway which leads past the houses called or known as Roydfield into Green-lane and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath or roadway for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the western side of the last-named houses) to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Yeadon from the parochial chapelry of Rawdon aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when
