

assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Mary Cowpen situate at Blyth as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Blyth.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edgar Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Mary Cowpen situate at Blyth as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mary Blyth, being:—

"All that part of the parochial chapelry of Horton, in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle which is bounded upon the north-west, and upon the north east by the new parish of Cambois, in the said county and diocese, upon the east and upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint Cuthbert Blyth in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west, and upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Cuthbert Blyth from the parochial chapelry of Horton aforesaid at a point in the middle of the line of the Blyth and Tyne Railway opposite to the mile post indicating a distance of one mile and a quarter from Blyth, and extending thence north-westward and in a straight line for a distance of fifty two chains and a half or thereabouts to the junction of the footpath leading from Malvin's Close to Cowpen with the footpath leading from Red House into the road leading from Newcastle to Blyth, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts to its junction with the said road leading from Newcastle to Blyth and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where it is joined by the footpath leading to the Old Alkali Works and to Bucks Hill upon the south bank of the river Blyth and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction upon the south bank of the said river with the footpath leading to Cowpen, and extending thence due north-westward and in a straight line for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the said river which divides the said parochial chapelry of Horton from the new parish of Cambois aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her

said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for consolidating into one benefice to be held by one incumbent the office or place of preacher in the parish of Bunbury in the county and diocese of Chester and the vicarage or office of curate of the same parish.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Francis John Bishop of the said diocese of Chester acting under and in pursuance of the Acts hereinbefore mentioned has submitted to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England a plan bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six for consolidating into one benefice the said office or place of preacher in the said parish of Bunbury and the said vicarage or office of curate of the same parish in the manner in the said plan appearing and for making certain other arrangements which are likely in the opinion of the said Bishop and in our opinion to promote the efficient discharge of the pastoral duties in the said parish of Bunbury.

"And whereas the said plan (as by the same appears) has the consent of the Master and four Wardens of the Art and Mystery of Haberdashers in the city of London the patrons of the office or place of preacher in the said parish of Bunbury and also of the vicarage or office of the same parish and of the Reverend William Alfred Edwards, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present vicar or curate of the said parish of Bunbury.

"And whereas the office or place of preacher in the said parish of Bunbury is now vacant.

"And whereas the said plan is in the words and figures following that is to say:—
