Foreign Office, December 7, 1896.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs received, on the 26th ultimo, from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Costarican Republic a note, dated the 4th ultimo, denouncing Articles V, VI, and VII of the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation between Great Britain and the Republic of Costarica concluded on the 27th of November, 1849.

This notice of denunciation, which is in conformity with the provisions of Article XV of that Treaty, has been accepted by Her Majesty's Government, and Articles V, VI, and VII of the Treaty will cease and determine accordingly on the 26th of November, 1897.

All the other Articles of the Treaty will remain in force.

FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1896.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

CHAPTER 1.-PROHIBITION.

Prohibited Countries.

1. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, it shall not be lawful to land any animal brought from any of the countries or parts of countries mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order, which countries and parts of countries are hereinafter referred to as scheduled countries.

CHAPTER 2 .- FOREIGN ANIMALS SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER.

Conditions of Landing.

2.-(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf is hereby made subject to the following conditions :

- That the vessel in which they are im-First. ported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any scheduled
- country. Second. That the vessel has not within twentyone days before taking on board the animals imported or at any time since taking them on board, entered or been in any port or place in any scheduled country.
- Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any scheduled country.

(2.) Animals shall not be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until the master of and lairage men and the Superintendent of the No. 26801. B.

the vessel in which they are imported has on the occasion of such importation delivered to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly im-ported according to the provisions of this Article.

Charge of Animals on Landing.

3.--(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, when landed, be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board ; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to move any animals so long as they remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs or of an Inspector of the Board except with the permission of the Commissioners or of the Inspector, as the case may be.

Disposal of Animals on Landing.

4. Animals when landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be driven by lairage-men to the nearest available reception-lair or lairs within the limits of the Wharf, there to await the examination of an Inspector of the Board, and, until so examined, shall not be allowed to come in contact with any animals other than those forming part of the same cargo.

Examination of Animals.

5.-(1.) The animals shall be examined in a reception-lair by an Inspector of the Board during daylight.

(2.) If on such examination all the animals are found free from disease, the Inspector of the Board may permit the animals to be retained in such lair, which shall thereupon cease to be a reception-lair, or he may permit them to be moved out of such lair and into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of the Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board shall direct or permit.

Restrictions on Access to Foreign Animals Wharf.

6.-(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs

Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Board, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by an Inspector of the Board, shall during the time of the landing of the animals be admitted to the landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf at which the animals are landed, and no person except as aforesaid shall at any time be admitted to any part of the Wharf which is being used as a reception-lair.

(2.) The owner or occupier of a Foreign Animals Wharf shall give notice of the provisions. of this Article by placards, which shall be kept affixed at or near the entrance of any landingstage. pier, quay, reception-lair, or other part of the Wharf to which access is for the time being restricted by this Article.

. Disinfection of Persons leaving Foreign Anima's Wharf &c.

7. All persons before leaving a landing-stage, pier, quay, reception-lair, or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease by washing and disinfecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as an Inspector of the Board may direct or require.

Provision of Overall Clothes.

8. The owner or occupier of a Foreign Animals Wharf shall at all times provide to the satisfaction of the Byard proper and suitable suits of overall clothes for the use of larage-high and other persons entering the Wharf, to be worn at such times as an Inspector of the Board may direct.

Regulations in case of Detection of Disease in Foreign Animals Wharf.

9. If it appears to an Inspector of the Board that disease exists of has lately existed in a feception-lair, or in any particular building, slaughter-house, or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf, all the animals that are then within such reception-lair; building; släughterhouse, or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be there detained by the Inspector of the Board or shall be moved to such other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf as he shall direct or permit, and the same shall be dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Inspector of the Board.

Food and Water.

Food and Water. 10.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the occupiers of the Wharf or the person in charge thereof will a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be defrayed by the owners or considinees of the animals; and may be owners or consignees of the animals; and may be recovered by such occupiers or person from the ownérs or consignees in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(2.) The animals shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consighees; be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water.

(3:) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contra-vention of the provisions of this Article, the occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the unimal, shall; each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed

guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Time for Slaughter.

11.-(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing.

(2.) The slaughter of the animals may be commenced at any time after the landing thereof with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) The slaughter of the animals shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as an Inspector of the Board in any case may direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Movement of Carcases, Manure &c.

12.-(1.) No carcase, offal, fodder, litter, dung or manure shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) All dung and manure shall, before being so removed, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) If an Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such carcase or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in facordance with instructions given by the Board.

Removal of Fittings &c. from Foreign Animals Wharf.

13.-(1:) Fittings, pëns, hurdles, or utensils that have been used for or about animals and have been landed from a ressel at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be removed from such Wharf until they have been cleansed and disinfected in manner provided by paragraph (v.) of Article 20 of this Order, and except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be desifoyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Disinfection of Foreign Animals Wharf.

14. An Inspector of the Board may give notice in writing to the owner; of occupier, or Superin-tendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf requiring the cleansing and disinfection of any portion of the Wharf by such owner or occupier, and when such notice shall have been given, that portion of the Wharf shall not be used for animals unless and until it has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Foreign Animals Wharf.

15.-(1.) No animals other than foreign animals shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Wharf.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the provisions of this Order relating to the Wharf shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896 or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in relation thereto;

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CHAPTER 3.—LANDING, DISINFECTION, AND DIS-POSAL OF DUNG, FODDER, LITTER, FITTINGS, AND OTHER THINGS.

Landing subject to Customs Regulations.

16. All dung of foreign animals, and all fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about foreign animals, and all other dung, fodder, or litter brought in the same vessel with foreign animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

Regulations as to Landing of Dung, Fodder &c. of Foreign Animals.

17.—(1.) Dung of foreign animals, and partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall not be landed at any place without the previous consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate.

(2.) All other fodder and litter brought in the same vessel with foreign animals may be landed without the previous consent of the Local Authority, but shall, when landed, remain under the charge of an Officer of Customs, and such fodder and litter shall not be removed from the place of landing except with the permission in writing of an Officer of Customs.

(3.) Fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about foreign animals shall not be landed at any place without the prévious consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate unless they have been cleansed and disinfected in manner provided by paragraph (v.) of Article 20 of this Order previous to the landing thereof. If landed with such consent without having been so previously cleansed and disinfected they shall be forthwith cleansed and disinfected in the manner aforesaid by and at the expense of the owner, and shall not be removed or permitted to come in contact with any animals until so cleansed and disinfected.

(4.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to any such dung, fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

Disinfection of Dung, Fodder &c. of Foreign Animals.

18.—(1.) All dung of foreign animals, and all partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and all litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall, when landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to any such dung, fodder, or litter landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

Application of this Chapter.

19. This Chapter shall not apply in relation to foreign animals that have not been and are not intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Whart.

CHAPTER 4.—DISINFECTION OF VESSELS, MOVE-ABLE GANGWAYS, AND OTHER APPARATUS USED FOR FOREIGN ANIMALS.

Vessels.

20.—(1.) Each compartment of a vessel shall, after the landing of foreign animals therefrom, and before any animal or cargo is placed in that compartment, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

(i.) All parts of the compartment with which

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any animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept: then

- (ii.) The same parts shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then
- (iii.) The same parts shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash : except that
- (iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards' such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.
- (v.) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about animals shall, if not removed from the vessel, be scraped, and then shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and then shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) Each part of the vessel with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact, and all fittings, pens, hurdles, and utensils, used for or about animals, shall be cleansed and disinfected in accordance with the provisions of this Article before any other animal or any cargo is allowed to come in contact therewith.

(3.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

21.—(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading of foreign animals on or from a vessel, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of foreign animals, shall, so soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

- (i.) The same shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : then
- (ii.) The same shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then

(iii.) The same shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, litter, and other matter so removed shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Application of this Chapter.

22. This Chapter shall not apply in relation to foreign animals that have not been and are not intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

CHAPTER 5.—DISINFECTION OF VESSELS, MOVE-ABLE GANGWAYS, AND OTHER APPARATUS USED FOR HORSES, Asses, or Mules.

23.—(1.) The provisions of Article 20 of the preceding Chapter shall, subject as hereinafter provided, apply to a vessel from which foreign horses, asses, or mules are landed, in all respects as if horses, asses, and mules were animals within the meaning of that Chapter.

(2.) Provided that in the case of a horse, ass, or mule being carried in a horse-box, it shall be sufficient if such horse-box be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

- (a.) The floor of the horse-box and all other parts thereof with which the droppings of the horse, ass, or mule have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, fodder, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : and
- (b.) The sides of the horse-box and all other parts thereof with which the head or any discharge from the mouth or nostrils of the horse, ass, or mule has come in contact shall be thoroughly washed with water by means of a sponge, brush, or other instrument.

CHAPTER 6. - PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

Provisions as to Vessels carrying Foreign Animals. 24. The provisions of this Chapter shall apply in the case of every vessel in or on which foreign animals intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf are carried to a port or place in Great Britain.

(Parts of Vessel to be used.)

(i.) Animals shall not be carried on more than three decks.

(ii.) Animals shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other animals are carried.

(iii.) Animals shall not be carried in any part of the vessel where, in ordinary course of navigation, they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or with the efficient working of the boats.

(Pens and Fittings of Vessels.)

(iv.) The animals shall be carried in pens.

(v.) No pen shall exceed ten feet in length and nine feet in breadth, and the stanchions of each pen shall be securely fastened to the deck by means of iron sockets or otherwise, and the materials used in the construction of the pens shall be of a substantial character, and of sufficient strength to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the animals thrown against them.

(vi.) Ship's fittings likely to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to animals shall be properly and securely fenced off.

(vii.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be fitted with suitable battens or. other proper footholds which shall be securely fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise, and shall be strewn with a proper quantity of sand or other suitable substance.

(viii.) Animals while on board a vessel shall be protected against injury or unnecessary suffering from undue exposure to the weather.

(Space for Animals.)

(ix.) Sufficient space shall be allotted in every pen to enable the animals therein to properly feed and rest during the voyage.

(Overcrowding.)

(x.) The vessel shall not be overcrowded in any part or pen so as to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to the animals therein.

(Passage-Ways.)

(xi.) Between every two rows of animals, and in front of every single row of animals, there shall be a passage-way of a minimum width of one foot and six inches, which passage-way shall be kept free of obstruction.

(Ventilation.)

(xii.) All parts of the vessel on which animals are carried shall be sufficiently and suitably ventilated. All such parts if below deck shall, in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways, be provided with sufficient and suitable ventilators for the removal of foul air and for the admission of a proper supply of fresh air to all the animals carried.

(Light.)

(xiii.) Arrangements shall be made for the provision at all times of adequate light for the proper tending of the animals.

(Food and Water.)

(xiv.) When animals are carried on a vessel for a voyage which on an average takes more than eighteen hours, they shall be provided while on board with a sufficient amount of food and water, and proper accommodation shall be provided on board for the stowage of food so that the same shall not be unduly exposed to the weather at sea.

(Securing of Cattle.)

(xv.) All cattle while being carried on a vessel shall be securely tied by the head and so as to stand athwartships.

(Approaches, Gangways, and other Apparatus.)

(xvi.) Approaches, gangways, passage-ways, cages, and other apparatus used for the landing of animals from a vessel shall be so constructed that injury or unnecessary suffering shall not be caused to the animals.

(Attendance.)

(xvii.) The vessel shall, in addition to the ordinary crew, carry a sufficient number of qualified attendants to properly tend the animals; and every consignment of cattle shall be in charge of a responsible foreman, who shall have under him competent assistants numbering with himself one for every twenty-five head of cattle; and proper and suitable accommodation for all these persons shall be provided.

(Injured Animals.)

(xviii.) If any animal on board a vessel has a limb broken or is otherwise seriously injured, the master of the vessel shall forthwith cause that animal to be slaughtered unless he is satisfied that it can be kept alive and led away without cruelty.

(Shorn Sheep.)

(xix.) From each first day of November to the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive), shorn sheep shall not be carried on deck, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

Slaughter of Injured Animals when landed.

25. Where any maimed or injured foreign animal is landed from a vessel the owner, consignee, or other person in charge thereof shall, if directed by an Inspector of the Board, or may, if he thinks fit, at any time slaughter that animal.

CHAPTER 7.---MISCELLANEOUS.

Carcases of Animals Dying on Voyage.

26.-(1.) If a vessel arriving at a port has on board the carcase of a foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule which was taken on board for the purpose of importation, but has died on the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival at the place of discharge, report the fact to the proper Officer of Customs there.

(2.) The carcase shall not be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission in writing of the Officer.

Power to exclude Persons.

27.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof or of any building therein a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person who enters or goes into, on, or over such premises without that permission shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit such Wharf, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person who fails to quit such premises

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on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of an offence against the Act of 1894. of which,—and the owner and the lessee and the

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

28.-(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering such Wharf will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof, or of any building therein a notice to the effect that persons before leaving such Wharf or building will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

General Power of Detention.

29. If it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule, or with respect to any foreign carcase, fodder, litter, dung, or other thing, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the delivery thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof,) as they think fit.

Duties of Local Authority and Police.

30. The Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the inspector of the Board to carry into effect and enforce this Order, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

Offences.

31.-(1.) If the slaughter of animals is not commenced at the time directed by this Order, or completed in accordance with the provisions of this Order, the person failing to cause such slaughter to be so commenced or completed shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any animal, or any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, or other thing shall be landed or moved in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such animal, dung, or other thing is landed or moved, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the landing or movement, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894. (3.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,—and the owner of the gaugway or

passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Foreign Animals Wharf in which, —and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,— (as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If anything is done or omitted to be done with respect to any vessel or any animals thereon in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation of Orders.

32. The Orders described in the Second Schedule to this Order are hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked; but this revocation shall not—

- (a.) revive any Order or part of any Order revoked by, or otherwise affect the past operation of, any of those Orders;
- (b.) affect the validity or invalidity of anything done or suffered, or any licence or authority granted, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued thereunder, before the commencement of this Order;
- (c.) interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against or the recovery or imposition of any penalty or forfeiture or punishment incurred under any of the Orders hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Interpretation.

33. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,—

- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture : "The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 :
- "Cattle" means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves:
- "Animals" means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine :
- "Foreign," applied to animals, horses, asses, mules, and things, means brought to the United Kingdom from any country out of the United Kingdom:
- "Foreign Animals Wharf" means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals subject to slaughter at the port of landing:
- "Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf" includes a foreman or wharfinger or other person at the time being in charge of a Foreign Animals Wharf:
- "Reception-lair" means a lair adjacent or near to the place of landing which is set apart for the reception of any animals immediately after landing for the purposes of their examination :
- "Lairage-men" means men specially appointed by the occupiers of a Foreign Animals Wharf for the purpose of landing animals at such Wharf and feeding and watering and tending them in a reception-lair : "Disease" means cattle-plague (that is to say,
- "Disease" means cattle-plague (that is to say, rinderpest, or the disease commonly called cattle-plague), contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, or swine-fever (that is to say, the disease known as typhoid fever of swine,

soldier, purples, red disease, hog cholera, or swine-plague);

- "Carcase" means the carcase of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, and part of a carcase, and
- the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal, horse,
- ass, or mule, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof : "Fodder" means hay or other substance com-
- monly used for food of animals : "Litter" means straw or other substance com-monly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals :
- "Master" includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel :
- Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Extent.

34. This Order does not extend to Ireland.

Commencement.

85. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

Short Title.

36. This Order may be cited as the FOREIGN Animals Order of 1896.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

CHAPTER 1.-LANDING OF CHANNEL ISLANDS ANIMALS IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Landing-Places for Channel Islands Animals.

1.-(1.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from the Channel Islands to Great Britain (in this Order called Channel Islands animals) may, subject to the provisions of this Order, be landed at any part of a port that may be for the time being defined by Special

Order of the Board as a Landing-Place for Channel Islands animals, without being subject to slaughter or quarantine.

(2.) The animals shall be lunded in such manner, at such times, subject to such supervision and control, and under such Regulations, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

(3.) When landed they shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Conditions of Landing.

2.-(1.) The landing of Channel Islands animals at a Landing-Place under this Order is hereby made subject to the following conditions :

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man.

- Second. That the vessel has not, within twentyone days before taking on board the animals imported, or at any time since taking them on board, entered or been in any port or place in any country other than the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, or , the Isle of Man.
- Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man.

(2.) The animals imported shall not be landed unless and until—

- (a.) the owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in Great Britain, has entered into a bond to Her Mejesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions; and
- (b.) the master for the vessel has satisfied the Commissioners of Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Twelve Hours Detention.

3: Animals landed under this Order shall be detained in the Landing-Place for at least twelve hours reckoned from the time of the landing of the last animal of the cargo, whether the whole cargo is landed continuously without intermission at one place or part discord is landed at one place and part at another place, or parts thereof are landed at different times at the same place.

Examination and Consequences.

4.---(1.) Animals landed under this Order shall not, libtil they have been examined by an Inspector of the Board, be moved from the Landing-Place, or be allowed to come in contact with any animals other than those forming part of the same cargo.

(2.) The animals shall be examined by an Inspector of the Board during daylight, and such examination shall take place after the expiration of the twelve hours detention mentioned in the last preceding Article.

(3.) If on such examination all the animals huided from the same vessel are found free from disease, they may be moved with the permission of an Inspector of the Board from the Landing-Place and shall thereupon cease to be deemed foreign animals (except for the purpose of sub-section seven of section twenty of the Act of 1894).

(4.) If on such examination any animal landed from a vessel is found to be affected with cattleplague or foot-and-mouth disease, the Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are within the Landing-Place and shall immediately transmit information thereof by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board. The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals within the Landing-Place so detained to be slaughtered.

(5.) If on such examination any animal landed from a vessel is found to be affected with any disease other than cattle-plague and foot-andmouth disease, the Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals of the same kind as the diseased animal which were brought in the same vessel with the diseased animal and shall immediately transmit information thereof by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board, The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals of the particular kind so detained to be slaughtered.

(6.) The slaughter of the animals under paragraphs (4) and (5) of this Article shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Inspector of the Board in any case directs, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Continuance of One Cargo.

5.—(1.) For the purposes of this Order all animals brought at the same time in the same vessel shall be deemed to continue and be one cargo during the time of the twelve hours or other period of detention, whether they are all landed continuously without intermission at one place, or some of them are landed at one place and some at another place, or some of them are landed at one time and some at another time at the same place.

(2.) Where an animal forming part of one cargo of animals lauded under the provisions of this Order has not been kept separate from an animal forming part of another cargo of animals, all the animals forming those two cargoes shall be dealt with as if they formed one cargo.

Detention of Suspected Animale.

6. An Inspector of the Board may detain; for any period that he thinks necessary or proper any animal landed under this Order which he has' reason to suspect is diseased or may introduce disease.

Food and Water.

7.--(1.) Animals landed under this Order at a Landing-Place shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the occupiers of the Landing-Place or the person in charge thereof with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be defrayed by the owners or consignees of the animals, and may be recovered by such occupiers or person from the owners or consignees in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(2.) The animals shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water.

(3.) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contravention of the provisions of this Article, the occupiers of the Länding-Place, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Movement of Animals, Carcases, Munure &c.

8.—(1.) No animal, carcase, fodder, litter, dung or manure shall be moved from a Landing-Place, or from any lair or other place therein, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If an Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such animal or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall, be slaughtered, destroyed, or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Removal of Fittings &c. from Landing-Place.

9.—(1.) Fittings, pens, hardles, or utensils that have been used for or about animals and have been landed from a vessel at a Landing-Place shall not be removed from such Landing-Place until they have been cleansed and disinfected in manner provided by paragraph (v.) of Article 15 of this Order, and except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Disinfection of Landing-Place.

10. An Inspector of the Board may give notice to the owner, or occupier, or Superintendent of a Landing-Place requiring the cleansing and disinfection of any portion of the Landing-Place by such owner or occupier, and when such notice shall have been given, that portion of the Landing-Place shall not be used for animals unless and until it has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Landing-Place.

11.—(1.) No animals other than animals landed under this Order shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Landing-Place.

(2.) Any animal being in a Landing-Place shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a Channel Islands animal, and the provisions of this Order relating to the Landing-Place shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Landing-Place shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896 or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in relation thereto.

Lunding of Channel Islands Animals at Foreign Animals Wharf.

12. Nothing in this Order shall prevent the landing of any Channel Islands animal at a Foreign Animals Wharf if the owner of the animal or his agent in Great Britain, or the consignee thereof, so desires.

CHAPTER 2.—LANDING, DISINFECTION, AND DIS-POSAL OF DUNG, FODDER, LITTER, FITTINGS, AND OTHER THINGS.

Landing subject to Customs Regulations.

13. All dung of animals that have been or are intended to be landed under this Order, and all fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about such animals, and all other dung, fodder, or litter brought in the same vessel with such animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs direct, but no such fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils shall be landed except at a Landing-Place.

Disinfection of Dung, Fodder &c.

14.—(1.) All dung of animals that have been or are intended to be landed under this Order, and all partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and all litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall, when landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to any such dung, fodder, or litter landed at a Landing-Place.

CHAPTER 3. — DISINFECTION OF VESSELS, MOVEABLE GANGWAYS, AND OTHER APPA-RATUS.

Vessels.

15.-(1.) Each compartment of a vessel shall, after the landing therefrom of any animals brought from the Channel Islands, and before any animal or cargo is placed in that compartment, be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

- (i.) All parts of the compartment with which any animal, or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept : then
- (ii.) The same parts shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then
- (iii.) The same parts shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash: except that
- (iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.
- (v.) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about animals, shall, if not removed from the vessel, be scraped, and then shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and then shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) Each part of the vessel with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact, and all fittings, pens, hurdles, and utensils used for or about animals shall be cleansed and disinfected in accordance with the provisions of this Article before any other animal or any cargo is allowed to come in contact therewith.

(3.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

16.—(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading of Channel Islands animals on or from a vessel, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of such animals, shall, so soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

- (i.) The same shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom: then
- (ii.) The same shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then
- (iii.) The same shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, litter, and other matter so removed shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

CHAPTER 4.-PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

Provisions as to Vessels carrying Channel Islands Animals to Great Britain.

17. The provisions of this Article shall apply in the case of every vessel in or on which Channel Islands animals are carried to a port or place in Great Britain.

(Parts of Vessel to be used.)

(i.) Animals shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other animals are carried.

(ii.) Animals shall not be carried in any part of the vessel, where, in ordinary course of navigation, they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or with the efficient working of the boats.

(Pens and Fittings of Vessels.)

(iii.) The animals shall be carried in pens.

(iv.) No pen shall exceed ten feet in length and nine feet in breadth, and the stanchions of each pen shall be securely fastened to the deck by means of iron sockets or otherwise, and the materials used in the construction of the pens shall be of a substantial character, and of sufficient strength to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the animals thrown against them.

(v.) Ship's fittings likely to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to animals shall be properly and securely fenced off.

(vi.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be fitted with suitable battens or other proper footholds which shall be securely fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise and shall be strewn with a proper quantity of sand or other suitable substance.

(vii.) Animals while on board a vessel shall be protected against injury or unnecessary suffering from undue exposure to the weather.

(Space for Animals.)

(viii.) Sufficient space shall be allotted in every pen to enable the animals therein to properly feed and rest during the voyage.

(Overcrowding.)

(ix.) The vessel shall not be overcrowded in any part or pen so as to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to the animals therein.

(Passage-Ways.)

(x.) Between every two rows of animals, and in front of every single row of animals, there shall be a passage-way of a minimum width of one foot and six inches, which passage-way shall be kept free of obstruction.

(Ventilation.)

(xi.) All parts of the vessel on which animals are carried shall be sufficiently and suitably ventilated. All such parts if below deck shall, in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways, be provided with sufficient and suitable ventilators for the removal of foul air and for the admission of a proper supply of fresh air to all the animals carried.

(Light.)

(xii.) Arrangements shall be made for the provision at all times of adequate light for the proper tending of the animals.

(Securing of Cattle.)

(xiii.) All cattle while being carried on a vessel shall be securely tied by the head and so as to stand athwartships.

(Approaches, Gangways, and other Apparatus.)

(xiv.) Approaches, gangways, passage-ways, cages, and other apparatus used for the landing of animals from a vessel shall be so constructed that injury or unnecessary suffering shall not be caused to the animals.

(Attendance.)

(xv.) The vessel shall, in addition to the ordinary crew, carry a sufficient number of qualified attendants to properly tend the animals ; and every consignment of cattle shall be in charge of a responsible foreman, who shall have under him competent assistants numbering with himself one for every twenty-five head of cattle.

(Injured Animals.)

(xvi.) If any animal on board a vessel has a limb broken or is otherwise seriously injured, the master of the vessel shall forthwith cause that animal to be slaughtered unless he is satisfied that it can be kept alive and led away without cruelty. С

(Shorn Sheep.)

(xvii.) From each first day of November to the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive), shorn sheep shall not be carried on deck, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

Slaughter of Injured Animals when landed.

18. Where any maimed or injured animal is landed from a vessel under this Order the owner, consignee, or other person in charge thereof shall, if directed by an Inspector of the Board, or may, if he thinks fit, at any time slaughter that animal.

CHAPTER 5.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Carcases of Animals Dying on Voyage.

19.—(1.) If a vessel arriving at a port has on board the carcase of an animal, horse, ass, or mule brought from the Channel Islands and taken on board for the purpose of importation, but which has died on the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival at the place of discharge, report the fact to the proper Officer of Customs there.

(2.) The carcase shall not be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission in writing of the Officer.

Power to exclude Persons.

20.-(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Landing-Place is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof or of any building therein a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person who enters or goes into, on, or over such premises without that permission shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Landing-Place is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit such Landing-Place, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier; quay, or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person who fails to quit such premises on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

21.-(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Landing-Place is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering such Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Landing-Place is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof or of any building therein a notice to the effect that persons before leaving such Landing-Place or building will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

General Power of Detention.

22. If it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any animal, horse; ass, or mule brought from the Channel Islands, or with respect to any carcase, fodder, litter, dung, or other thing brought therefrom, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the delivery thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof.) as they think fit.

Duties of Local Authority and Police.

23. The Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspector of the Board to carry into effect and enforce this Order, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

Offences.

24.-(1.) If any animal, or any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, or other thing shall be landed or moved in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such animal, dung, or other thing is landed or moved, and the person causing directing or permitting the landing or movement, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the véssel from which the same is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,—and the owner of the gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Landing-Place in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,—(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If anything is done or omitted to be done with respect to any vessel or any animals thereon in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

25. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,-

- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture: "The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of
- Animals Act, 1894: "Cattle" means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and
- calves :
- "Animals" means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine:
- "Foreign Animals Wharf" means a part of a port defined by Special Order of. the Board for the landing of foreign animals subject to slaughter at the port of landing:
- slaughter at the port of landing: "Landing-Place" means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board: for the landing of Channel Islands animals:
- "Superintendent of a Landing-Place" includes: a. foreman or wharfinger or other person at the time being in charge of a Landing-Place:
- "Disease" means cattle-plague (that is to:say, rinderpest, or the disease commonly called eattle-plague), contagious: pleuro-pneumonia. of. cattle, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox,

- sheep-scab, or swine-fever (that is to say, the disease known as typhoid fever of swine, soldier, purples, red disease, hog cholera, or swine-plague):
- "Carcase" means the carcase of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, and part of a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof:
- "Fodder" means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals :
- "Litter" means straw or other substance com--monly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals:
- "Master" includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel:
- Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Commencement.

26. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

Short Title.

27. This Order may be cited as the CHANNEL ISLANDS, ANIMALS ORDER OF 1896.

ISLE OF MAN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1896.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

CHAPTER 1.—Animals from Isle of Man admitted into Great Britain.

1. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from the Isle of Man may be landed in Great Britain without being subject to slaughter or to quarantine.

CHAPTER 2.—DISINFECTION. Vessels.

2.--(1.) A vessel shall, after the landing therefrom of animals brought from the Isle of Man, and before the taking on board of any other animal or other cargo, be cleansed and disinfected as follows: (i.) All parts of the vessel with which any

- (i.) All parts of the vessel with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept : then
- (ii.) The same parts of the vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scenebled, or scened with water: then
- (iii:) The same parts of the vessel shall have applied to them a coating of limewash:: except that

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- (iv.) The application of limewash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.
- (v.) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about animals shall, if not removed from the vessel, be scraped, and then shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and then shall have applied to them a coating of limewash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

Fodder and Litter.

3. All partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to animals brought from the Isle of Man, and all litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall, when landed, be for thwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus

4.-(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading on or from a vessel of animals brought from the Isle of Man, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of such animals, shall, so soon as practicable after being -so used, be cleansed as follows :

- (i.) The same shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : then
- (ii.) The same shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, litter, and other matter so removed shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

CHAPTER 3 .-- PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

Provisions as to Vessels carrying Animals from the Isle of Man to Great Britain.

5. The provisions of this Article shall apply in the case of every vessel in or on which animals are carried from the Isle of Man to a port or place in Great Britain.

Parts of Vessel to be used.)

(i.) Animals shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other animals are carried.

(ii.) Animals shall not be carried in any part of the vessel, where, in ordinary course of navigation, they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or with the efficient working of the boats.

(Pens and Fittings of Vessels.)

(iii.) The animals shall be carried in pens.

(iv.) No pen shall exceed ten feet in length and nine feet in breadth, and the stanchions of each pen shall be securely fastened to the deck by means of 'iron sockets or otherwise, and the materials used in the construction of the pens shall be of a substantial character, and of sufficient strength to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the animals thrown against them.

(v.) Ship's fittings likely to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to animals shall be properly and securely fenced off.

(vi.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be fitted with suitable battens or other proper footholds which shall be securely fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise and shall be strewn with a proper quantity of sand or other suitable substance.

(vii.) Animals while on board a vessel shall be

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protected against injury or unnecessary suffering from undue exposure to the weather.

(Passage-Ways.)

(viii.) In all inclosed portions of the vessel in which animals are carried there shall be a passageway of a minimum width of one foot six inches from the hatchway to the most distant pen, which passage-way shall be kept free of obstruction.

(ix.) Where sheep are carried on deck, proper gangways or passage-ways shall be provided either between or above the pens in which they are carried.

(Ventilation.)

(x.) All parts of the vessel on which animals are carried shall be sufficiently and suitably ventilated. All such parts if below deck shall, in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways, be provided with sufficient and suitable ventilators for the removal of foul air and for the admission of a proper supply of fresh air to all the animals carried.

(Light.) (xi.) All parts of the vessel over which the animals pass or in which they are penned shall be properly lighted, and arrangements shall be made for the provision at all times of adequate light for the proper tending of the animals.

(Overcrowding.)

(xii.) The vessel shall not be overcrowded in any part or pen so as to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to the animals therein.

(Securing of Cattle.)

(xiii.) All fat cattle while being carried on a vessel shall be securely tied by the head.

(Approaches, Gangways, and other Apparatus.)

(xiv.) Approaches, gangways, passage-ways, cages, and other apparatus used for the loading or unloading of animals on or from a vessel, shall be so constructed that injury or unnecessary suffering shall not be caused to the animals.

(Attendance.)

(xv.) The vessel shall, in addition to the ordinary crew, carry a sufficient number of qualified attendants to properly tend the animals.

(Injured Animals.)

(xvi.) If any animal has a limb broken or is otherwise seriously injured during the voyage, the master of the vessel shall forthwith cause that animal to be slaughtered unless he is satisfied that it can be kept alive and led away without cruelty.

(Returns as to Casualties.)

(xvii.) The owner or charterer of any vessel on which animals are carried, shall keep a record of all animals which have died or have been killed or seriously injured while on such vessel, and shall at the end of every month send a copy of such record to the Board.

(Shorn Sheep.)

(xviii.) From each first day of November to the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive), shorn sheep shall not be carried on deck, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

Detention.

6. Animals landed from a vessel shall, on a certificate of an Inspector of the Board, certifying to the effect that the provisions of this Chapter, or any of them, have not been observed in the vessel, be detained, at the place of landing, or in lairs adjacent thereto, until the Board otherwise direct.

CHAPTER 4 .--- FOOD AND WATER.

Food and Water during Detention.

7. An Inspector, officer, or constable detaining an animal, horse, ass, or mule under the Act of 1894 or this Order shall cause it to be supplied with requisite food and water during its detention ; and the expenses incurred by him in respect thereof may be recovered summarily from the person having charge of the animal, horse, ass, or mule, or from its owner.

Water at Place of Landing.

'8. At every place where animals are landed under this Order, provision shall be made, to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board, for a supply of water for animals; and water shall be 'supplied there gratuitously on request of any person having charge of any animal.

Food at Place of Landing.

9. At every place where animals are landed under this Order provision shall be made, to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board, for the speedy and convenient landing of animals, and for a supply of food for them ; and food shall be supplied there, on request of any person having charge of any animal, at such price as the Board approve.

CHAPTER 5.—MISCELLANEOUS.

General Power of Detention. 10. If it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any animal, horse, ass, or -mule brought from the Isle of Man, or with respect to any carcase, fodder, litter, dung, or other thing brought therefrom, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the delivery thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof,) as they think fit.

Offences.

11.—(1.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,-and the owner of the gangway or passageway, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which, - and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,-(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If anything is done or omitted to be done with respect to any vessel or any animals thereon in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

12. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Interpretation.

13. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,

- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture: "The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:
- " Cattle " means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves:

- "Animals" means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine :
- "Fodder" means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals :
- "Litter" means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals :
- "Master" includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Commencement.

14. This Order shall come into operation on thefirst day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

Short Title.

15. This Order may be cited as the ISLE OF MAN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1896.

FOREIGN ANIMALS (QUARANTINE) ORDER OF 1896.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and im exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

CHAPTER 1.-CONDITIONS OF LANDING OF FOREIGN ANIMALS SUBJECT TO QUARANTINE.

Purposes for which Animals may be landed.

1. Foreign animals may be landed at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station to be defined by Special Order of the Board if intended for reshipment to a foreign country, or for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes, provided that the proposed landing has been in each case approved by the Board on special application through the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Reshipment to a Foreign. Country.

2. The landing at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station of a foreign animal intended for reshipment to a foreign country is hereby madesubject to the following conditions :

- First. The animal must be accompanied by a declaration of its owner or consignee orhis agent declaring that it is intended for reshipment to a foreign country.
- Second. The animal must be accompanied by a declaration of its owner or consignee or his agent declaring that to the hest of his knowledge and belief it is free from disease.
- Third. The animal shall not be moved alive out of the Station except into a vessel for exportation to a foreign country, and until-

reshipped shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Purposes of Exhibition, or for other Exceptional Purposes (other than Reshipment).

3.-(1.) The landing at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station of a foreign animal intended for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes (other than reshipment) is hereby made subject to the following conditions :

- First. The animal must be accompanied by a declaration of its owner or consignee or his agent declaring the purposes for which it is intended.
- Second. The animal must be accompanied by a declaration of its owner or consignee or his agent declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief it is free from disease.
- Third. The animal when landed shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board ; and, until his arrival, it shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.
- Fourth, The animal when landed shall be detained in the Station for such period as the Board in each case according to the circumstances direct.
- Fifth. When moved out of the Station the animal shall be accompanied by
- (a.) a Certificate of an Inspector of the Board certifying that it is free from disease ; and
- (b.) a Licence of an Inspector of the Board specifying the place of destination to which and the person to whom it is to be taken.

(2.) The Inspector of the Board may in accordance with instructions given by the Board impose any conditions as to the subsequent movement of the animal or otherwise, and any such conditions shall be specified in the Licence.

(3.) Any person moving the animal or doing any other act in contravention of any condition so specified shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Movement of Carcases.

4.-(1.) No carcase shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, except with the permission of an In-pector of the Board.

(2.) If an Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any carcase in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Disinfection of Dung and Manure.

5. Dung and manure shall, before being re-oved from a Foreign Animals Quarantine moved from a Foreign Animals Station, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

Disin/ection of Quarantine Station.

6. An Inspector of the Board may give notice to the owner, or occupier, or Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station requiring the cleansing and disinfection of any portion of the Station by such owner or occupier, and when such noti e shall have been given, that portion of the Station shall not be used for animals unless and until it has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Quarantine Station. 7.--(1.) No animals other than for foreign animals landed under this Order, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall, without prejudice to tion or the further detention thereof or for the

the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the provisions of this Order relating to the Station shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896 or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in relation thereto.

CHAPTER 2.-LANDING OF DUNG, FODDER, LITTER, FITTINGS, AND OTHER THINGS.

Landing subject to Customs Regulations.

8. All dung of foreign animals that have eenb or are intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, and all fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about such animals, and all other dung, fodder, or litter brought in the same vessel with such animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

CHAPTER 3 .- MISCELLANEOUS.

Power to exclude Persons.

9.-(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof or of any building therein a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person who enters or goes into, on, or over such premises without that permission shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit such Station, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person who fails to quit such premises on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

10.-(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering such Station will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof or of any building therein a notice to the effect that persons before leaving such Station or building will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

General Power of Detention.

11. If it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule, or with respect to any foreign carcase, fodder, litter, dung, or other thing, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruc-

delivery thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof,) as they think fit.

Duties of Local Authority and Police.

12. The Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspector of the Board to carry into effect and enforce this Order, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

Offences.

13.-(1.) If any animal, or any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, · or other thing shall be landed or moved in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such animal, dung, or other thing is landed or moved, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the landing or movement, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, shall, 'each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence ägainst the Act of 1894.

(3.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in con-travention of this Order, the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Foreign Animals Quarantine Station in which,-and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,-(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

14. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,-

Thames Conservancy.

TOTICE is hereby given that the Conservators of the River Thames propose to make the following Bye-laws :-

BYE-LAWS for the Regulation of the River Thames ,and the Navigation thereof, and for other purposes.

The Conservators of the River Thames in exercise of the powers and authority vested in them by "The Thames Conservancy Act 1894" do make the following Bye-laws that is to sny :-

Former Bye-laws repealed.

1. All Bye-laws rules and orders for the regulation management and improvement of the River Thames and the navigation thereof and of the lands appertaining thereto and for the government good order regulation and registration of vessels in or upon the said river and of persons navigating the same or using the towing-paths piers landing-places or any of the locks thereof except the Bye-laws of the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three for the protection preservation and regulation of the fisheries and the Tower Bridge Navigation Bye-laws for the time being in force shall after these present Byelaws have been confirmed by the Board of Trade be and the same are hereby repealed.

Short Tille and commencement of operation of Bye-laws.

2. These Bye-laws may be cited as "The Thames Bye-laws 1896" and shall come into operation the day after the same are confirmed by the Board of Trade.

Application of Bye-laws. 3. These Bye-laws shall be applicable to the whole river and to the several rivers streams and watercourses within the flow and reflow of the tides of the river and to the shores thereof and to all towing-paths piers landing-places locks and banks thereof and to all land of the Conservators except where the same or any of them are expressly limited to any particular part or parts of the river or place.

Interpretation Clause.

4. In these Bye-laws the words and expressions hereinafter mentioned shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them respectively unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction viz. :-

The expression "the Thames" or "river" means and includes, so much of the Rivers Thames and Isis respectively as are between the town of Cricklade in the county of Wilts and an imaginary straight line drawn from the entrance to Yantlet Creek in the county of Kent to the City Stone opposite to Canvey Island in the county of Essex and so much of the River Kennet as is between ۰. the common landing-place at Reading in the county of Berks and the River Thames and so much of the River Lee and Bow Creek respectively as are below the south boundary stones in "The Lee C nservancy Act 1868" mentioned and all locks cuts and works within the said portions of rivers and creeks provided that no dock lock canal or cut existing at the passing of "The Thames Con-servancy Act 1894" and constructed under the authority of Parliament and belonging to any body corporate established under such authority and no bridge over the River Thames or the River Kennet belonging to or vested in any county council or municipal authority or to or in any railway company shall be deemed to form part of the Thames.

The word "person" includes a corporation whether aggregate or sole.

The word " horse " includes all draught animals.

- The word "vessel" includes any ship lighter keel barge launch houseboat pleasure or other boat randan wherry skiff dingey shallop punt canoe yacht raft float of timber or craft whatever whether navigated by steam or otherwise.
- The word "lighter" includes any barge or other like craft for carrying goods.
- The expression "steam launch" includes any vessel propelled by steam electricity or other mechanical power not being used solely as a tug or for the carriage of goods and not being certified by the Board of Trade as a passenger steamer to carry 200 or more passengers.
- The expression "pleasure boat" includes any ship launch houseboat boat randan wherry skiff dingey shallop punt canoe or yacht whether navigated by steam or otherwise not being used solely as a tug or for the carriage of goods and not being certified by the Board of Trade as a passenger steamer to carry 200 or more passengers whether private or for hire.
- The expression " pleasure boat for hire " means any pleasure boat let for hire or used or intended to be used for any purpose of profit except such pleasure boats as are let for hire for a period of not less than four weeks continuously to one and the same person.
- The expression "private pleasure boat" means any pleasure boat other than a boat for hire and includes such as are let for a period of not less than four weeks continuously to one and the same person.
- The expression "steam whistle" includes any efficient sound signal approved by the Conservators.
- The word "master" when used in relation to any vessel means any porson whether the owner master or other person lawfully or wrongfully having or taking the command charge or management of the vessel for the
- time being. The word "harbour-master" means and shall apply to each of the harbour-masters and the deputy harbour-masters and to any person authorized by the Conservators to assist them or to perform the duties of a harbourmaster.
- The expression "permission of the Conservators" or "consent of the Conservators' means permission or consent of the Conserva-
- tors in writing signed by the Secretary. The words "in writing" applied to any document include documents wholly printed or wholly written or partly printed and partly written.
- The word "visible" when applied to lights means visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.
- The word "Secretary" means the person for the time being acting as Secretary to the Conservators.
- The expression "due notice" means a notice in writing given by the Conservators or by any person duly authorized in writing by them to act in their behalf.

- The word "certificate" means certificate in writing signed by the Secretary. The word ' officer " means any officer of the
- Conservators or any person employed by them to carry out the provisions of these bye-laws.
- The words "the register" mean the register kept by the Conservators in pursuance of sections 138 139 and 140 of "The Thames Conservancy Act 1894."
- Words importing the masculine gender only shall include females and words importing the singular only shall include the plural.

Navigable Passage for Vessels between London Bridge and the Tower Bridge.

5. There shall be maintained as far as practicable between London Bridge and the Tower Bridge a navigable passage not less than 200 feet wide for vessels passing up and down the river.

Width of Passage between the Tower Bridge and Barking Creek.

6. There shall be maintained as far as practicable between the Tower Bridge and Barking Creek a navigable passage not less than 300 feet wide for vessels passing up and down the river and where the navigable passage shall be between a tier of vessels and the shore the space for such passage shall be reckoned from the vessel in the tier nearest to the shore to low water mark and in all parts of the river where the navigable passage shall be in the stream between tiers of vessels the space for the navigable passage shall be reckoned from the vessel in each of the said tiers nearest to the other or opposite tier.

As to Floats or Rafts of Timber.

7. No float or floats or raft or rufts of timber either singly or together exceeding 60 feet in length (excepting timber in one length) and 20 feet in width shall be permitted to go into or pass along any part of the river nor shall any following float or raft of timber go within the distance of 300 yards of any other such float or raft.

Course of Vessels navigating Gravesend Reach.

S. All vessels navigating Gravesend Reach are to keep to the northward of a line defined by a skeleton beacon crected upon the India Arms Wharf on with the high chimney at the Cement Works at Northfleet and all vessels intending to anchor in the Reach are to bring up to the southward of that line. A lantern is placed on the above beacon which shows (at night) a bright light to the northward of the same line and a red light to the southward of it over the anchorage ground. All vessels so anchoring and remaining beyond a period of 24 hours are to be moored.

Left Anchors to be Buoyed.

9. Any vessel slipping or parting from her anchor shall leave a buoy to mark the position of such anchor.

As to Anchors in the Stream.

10. No anchor shall be allowed to lie or remain in the river outside of the line of the tiers and if any anchor of any vessel shall be so allowed to lie or remain in the river outside of the line of any of the tiers the harbour-master may deliver or cause to be delivered on board the vessel from which such anchor is put out a notice in writing signed by him requiring the master of such vessel forthwith to remove such anchor and if the same be not so removed after the delivery of such notice the harbour-master may remove or cause to be removed such anchor and the expenses of such removal shall be recoverable from the owner or owners or the master of the said vessel to the use of the Conservators as provided by the Thames Conservancy Act 1894.

Anchors a cock bill or hanging up by the Cable.

11. No vessel shall navigate or lie in the river with its anchor or anchors a cock bill nor with its anchor or anchors hanging by the cable perpendicularly from the hawse unless the ring shall be awash except during such time as may be necessary for fishing or catting such anchor or anchors or for getting such vessel under way or for bringing up.

S'eam Vessels not to be narigated or moored near Woolwich Arsenal or Victualling Yard,

Deptford.

12. No steam yessel shall be worked navigated or placed upon or anchored or moored in theriv er within 360 feet of Her Majesty's dock-yard or arsenal at Woolwich or of Her Majesty's victualling-yard at Deptford except steam vessels belonging to or employed in the service of Her Majesty her heirs or successors.

No Steam Vessel while attached to Mooring to have Engines in motion.

13. The engine or engines of any steam vessel shall not be set in motion during the time such steam vessel is moored in the river.

Muster of Steam Vessel to be on Paddle-Box or Bridge.

14. The master of every steam vessel navigating the river shall be on one of the paddle-boxes or on the bridge of such steam vessel and shall cause a proper look-out to be kept from the bows of the said steam vessel during the whole of the time it is under way and shall remove or cause to be removed any person other than the crew who shall be on the paddle-boxes or bridge of such steam vessel.

Precautions in Taking in or Discharging Ballast. 15. No master of any vessel shall take in or discharge ballast unless canvas or tarpauling be affixed below the ballast port and extend down inside the lighter so as to prevent the ballast falling into the river.

Lighters to have 15 inches Freeboard. 16. No lighter shall be navigated on the river below Battersea Bridge without having a freeboard of at least 15 inches to be measured from the water's edge to the top of the coamings of the hatches and if there be no coamings from the water's edge to the top of the gunwale.

Penalties for Intoxication and use of Abusive. or Indecent Language, &c.

17. Any person engaged in navigating or employed on or using or being in upon or about the river or the banks or towing paths thereof or any land of the Conservators who shall be intoxicated or make use of obscene scandalous abusive indecent or improper language to any officer of the Conservators whilst employed in the performance of the duties of his office or to the annoyance of any person who shall be in upon or about the river or the banks or towing-paths thereof or any land of the Conservators or who shall obstruct any officer of the Conservators in the execution of his duty shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these Bye-laws and be liable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

As to payment of Tonnage Dues on Vessels not entered at the Customs.

18. The master or owner of any vessel entering or leaving the Thames subject to the payment of , duties of tonnage and which has not been entered at the office of Her Majesty's Customs and on which the duties of tonnage have not been paid to the receiver there shall furnish the Conservators for the purpose of registration with full particulars of the name tonnage and owner of such vessel

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and the port to which she belongs and shall send a return once in every month of the arrival and departure of such vessel during the preceding month to the office of the Conservators and shall pay to the Conservators the duties of tonnage which are then payable for each time of arrival in and departure from the river pursuant to "The Thames Conservancy Act 1894."

Piers to be lighted or marked.

19. Any pier or jetty in the river or on the shore thereof shall be lighted or marked in such manner as the Conservators may from time to time direct.

No Vessels to be moored to Piers, &c., without permission.

20. No vessel shall be moored to or remain at any pier or premises belonging to the Conservators without the permission of the officer in charge of such pier or premises being first obtained and shall move away when ordered by such officer so to do.

As to Advertisements on Vessels or River.

21. No advertisement or advertising notice shall be exhibited upon or by means of any vessel or otherwise on or over the river except advertisements or notices by the owner of any vessel on such vessel for the purposes of or in reference to his trade or business.

The expression "owner" in this Bye-law shall mean the person whose name appears in the certificate of registration of such vessel.

Vessels between Battersea Bridge and Charlton to pass singly.

22. All vessels navigating the river between Battersea Bridge and the landing-place at the end of Trinity-street Charlton shall be navigated singly and separately except small boats fastened together or towed alongside or astern of other vessels and except vessels towed by steam.

Not more than six to be towed at one time.

23. Vessels navigating the river between Battersea Bridge and the landing-place at the end of Trinity-street Charlton and towed by steam shall if more than two in number be placed two abreast except vessels trading on any canal and not exceeding 14 feet 3 inches in width which may be placed three abreast and not more than six of any such vessels shall be towed together at one time.

Above Battersea Bridge only six to be towed in a single line.

24. Above Battersea Bridge six vessels and no more may be towed together in a single line at one time and the distance between any two of the vessel so towed shall not exceed 50 feet except vessels trading on any cunal and not exceeding 14 feet 3 inches in width which may be towed between the landing-place at the end of Trinitystreet Charlton and the entrance to the Grand Junction Canal at Brentford three abreast and not more than six of any such vessels shall be towed together at one time.

No Passenger or Excursion Vessel above 301 feet in length to be navigated above Blackwall.

25. No vessel exceeding 301 feet in length and in the case of a paddle wheel steamer exceeding 60 feet in width measured from the outside of the paddle boxes and in the case of other vessels exceeding 36 feet in width which is used only or principally for the carriage of passsengers or for the purposes of excursions shall be navigated in the river above Blackwall.

For the purposes of this bye-law the length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her Certificate of Registry. LIGHTS AND SIGNALS, STEERING AND SAILING. 26. In obeying and construing the following Bye-laws relating to lights and signals and steering and sailing due regard shall be had to all dangers of navigation and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from them necessary in order to avoid danger.

Not to neglect proper precautions.

27. Nothing in the following Bye-laws shall exonerate any vessel or the owner master or crew thereof from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals or to keep a proper look out or of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen or by the special circumstances of the case.

28. The Bye-laws as to lights shall be complied with in all weathers from sunset to sunrise and during such time no other lights which may be mistaken for the lights prescribed by the Bye-laws shall be exhibited.

LIGHTS REQUIRED BETWEEN YANTLET CREEK AND TEDDINGTON LOCK. Steamers' Lights.

29. A steam vessel when under way shall carry :---

(a.) On or before the foremast or if there be no foremast on a staff at the forepart of the vessel at a height above the hull of not less than 20 feet and if the breadth of the vessel exceeds 20 feet then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth but in no case higher than 40 feet above the hull a bright white light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the vessel viz. from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least two miles. Provided that steam vessels which navigate both above and below the Tower Bridge shall not be required to carry their lights at a greater height than 12 feet above the hull.

Above the Tower Bridge.

Steam vessels navigating above the Tower Bridge only may curry the white light in any convenient position above the hull.

- (b.) On the starboard side a green light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the starboard side and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile.
- (c.) On the port side a red light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile.
- (d.) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted in such a manner as to prevent their being seen across the bow of the vessel.

Steamers when towing to have two White Lights.

(e.) A steam vessel when towing another vessel shall in addition to her side lights carry two bright white lights in a vertical line one over the other not less than four feet apart. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character and shall be carried in the same position as the white light which other steam vessels are required to carry.

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Sailing Vessels' Lights.

30. A sailing vessel when under way or being towed shall only carry the side lights provided by (b.) and (c.) of the last preceding Bye-law for a steam vessel under way.

Vessels at anchor or moored.

31. With the exceptions hereinafter named every steam vessel sailing vessel or lighter not exceeding in length 150 feet shall when at anchor or moored in the river carry in the forepart where it can best be seen but at a height of not less than 20 feet and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull a white light (hereinafter called the riding light) in a globular lantern not less than eight inches in diameter and so constructed as to show an unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile and every vessel exceeding in length 150 feet when at anchor or lying at mooring buoys where she will swing shall in addition to the above riding light carry another such light at or near the stern of the vessel and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

The exceptions are as follows :---

- (a.) Where masted vessels are lying in tiers the outermost off-shore masted vessel only of each tier shall carry the riding light.
- (b.) Lighters lying at the usual barge moorings in the river above Gravesend are not required to exhibit the riding light.
- (c.) Every steam vessel sailing vessel or lighter moored permanently head and stern in the river shall in addition to or in lieu of the riding light exhibit such light or lights as the Conservators shall from time to time order or direct.

For the purposes of this Bye-law the length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her certificate of registry.

Lights for Dumb Barges below Silvertown.

32. Every person in charge of a dumb barge when under way and not in tow shall between sunset and sunrise when below or to the eastward of an imaginary straight line drawn from the centre of the wharf of the India Rubber Gutta Percha and Telegraph Works Company Limited at Silvertown in the county of Essex to the landing place at the end of Trinity-street Charlton in the county of Kent have a white light always ready and exhibit the same on the approach of any vessel.

Lights for Lighters in tow.

33. The person in charge of the sternmost or last of a line of lighters when being towed shall exhibit between sunset and sunrise a white light from the stern of his lighter.

Overtaken Vessels.

34. A vessel below Barking Creek which is being overtaken by another vessel shall show from her stern to such other vessel a white light or a flare-up light.

This Bye-law shall not apply to boats wherries punts or canoes.

Lights to mark positions of Wrecks.

35. All vessels when employed to mark the positions of wrecks or other obstructions shall exhibit two bright lights placed horizontally not less than 6 nor more than 12 feet apart.

Dredgers' Lights.

36. Every steam dredger moored in the river shall exhibit three bright lights from globular lanterns not less than 8 inches in diameter the said three lights to be placed in a triangular form at right angles to the keel and to be of sufficient power to be visible at a distance of at

least one mile and to be placed not less than 6 feet apart on the highest part of the framework athwartships.

FOG AND STEAM WHISTLE SIGNALS.

As to navigation in Fog.

37. Vessels entering or being overtaken by a fog shall be navigated with the greatest caution and at a very moderate speed.

Steam Vessel Whistle and Bell.

38. Every steam vessel navigating the river shall be provided with a steam whistle so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstruction and also with an efficient bell.

Sailing Vessel Fog Horn and Bell.

Every sailing vessel navigating the river shall be provided with an efficient fog horn and also with an efficient bell.

Steam Launch Whistle or Sound Signal.

Every steam launch and vessel propelled by electricity or other mechanical power navigating the river shall be provided with a whistle or other efficient sound signal to be approved by the Conservators.

Fog Signals when under way.

39. In fog whether by day or night the signals described in this Bye-law shall be used that is to say:---

- (a.) A steam vessel or steam launch under way shall make with her steam whistle at intervals of about two minutes a prolonged blast of not less than four seconds' nor more than six seconds' duration.
- (b.) A sailing vessel under way shall sound her fog horn at intervals of about two minutes.
- (c.) All steam and sailing vessels when in the fairway of the river and not under way shall at intervals of about one minute ring the bell rapidly for about five seconds.

When Steam Vessels are approaching.

40. When two steam vessels are in sight of each other and are approaching with risk of collision the following steam signals shall be intimations of the course they intend to take :--

- (a.) One blast of the steam whistle of about two seconds' duration to mean—"I am directing my course to starboard and intend to pass you port side to port side."
 (b.) Two blasts of the steam whistle cach of
- (b.) Two blasts of the steam whistle cach of about two seconds' duration to mcan—"I am directing my course to port and intend to pass you starboard side to starboard side."
- (c.) Three blasts of the steam whistle each of about two seconds' duration to mean—" I am reversing my engines."

Vessels not under command.

41. When a steam vessel is turning round or for any reason is not under command and cannot get out of the way of an approaching vessel or when it is unsafe or impracticable for a steam vessel to keep out of the way of a sailing vessel she shall signify the same by four blasts of the steam whistle in rapid succession each blast to be of about two seconds' duration.

Vessels coming out of Dock.

42. A vessel coming out of dock shall signify the same by a prolonged blast of the steam whistle of not less than four seconds' nor more than six seconds' duration and in case of a vessel not under steam the tug boat in attendance shall make the signal.

Signa's by Whistle to be made by ordinary Steam Whistle or opproved Sound Signal and not to be used f.r any other purpose.

43. The signals by whistle mentioned in the

preceding Bye-laws shall not be made by means of a siren or any instrument other than an ordinary steam whistle or other efficient sound signal previously approved by the Conservators and shall not be used on any occasion or for any purpose except those therein mentioned and no other signal by whistle or sound signal shall be made by any vessel.

STEERING AND SAILING. Sailing Vessels approaching.

44. When two sailing vessels are approaching each other so as to involve risk of collision one of them shall keep out of the way of the other viz.:--

- (a.) A vessel which is running free shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is closehauled.
- (b.) A vessel which is close-hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled on the starboard tack.
- (c.) When both are running free with the wind on different sides the vessel which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the
- way of the other.(d.) When both are running free with the wind on the same side the vessel which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is to leeward.
- (e.) A vessel which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other vessel.

Steam Vessels to keep out of the way of Sailing Vessels.

45. If a sailing vessel and a steam vessel are proceeding in such a direction as to involve risk of collision the steam vessel shall keep out of the way of the sailing vessel.

If Steam Vessel cannot keep out of the way.

If owing to causes beyond the control of those navigating the steam vessel it is unsafe or impracticable for that vessel to keep out of the way of the sailing vessel she shall signify the same to the sailing vessel by four blasts of the steam whistle in rapid succession as mentioned in Bye-law 41 the sailing vessel shall then keep out of the way of the steam vessel.

All Steam Vessels to pass Port Side to Port Side.

46. When two steam vessels or steam launches proceeding in opposite directions the one up and the other down the river are approaching each other so as to involve risk of collision they shall pass port side to port side.

Steam Vessels rounding certain Points.

47. Steam vessels navigating against the tide shall before rounding the following points viz. Coalhouse Point Tilburyness Broadness Stoneness Crayfordness Cold Harbour Point Jenningtree Point Halfway House Point or Crossness Margaretness or Tripcock Point Bull Point or Gallionsness Hookness and Blackwall Point ease their engines and wait until any other vessels rounding the point with the tide have passed clear.

Steam Vessels crossing the River.

48. Steam vessels and steam launches crossing from one side of the river towards the other side shall keep out of the way of vessels navigating up and down the river.

Steam Vessels when approaching each other to slacken speed.

49. Every steam vessel and steam launch when approaching another vessel so as to involve risk of collision shall slacken her speed and shall stop and reverse if necessary.

50. Steam vessels and steam launches navigating against the stream above Richmond Lock a public shall case and if necessary stop to allow vessels vehicle.

coming down with the stream to pass clear particularly when rounding points or sharp bends in the river.

51. Steam launches navigating above Richmond Lock shall where the channel or depth of water permits be navigated in mid-river.

Overtaking Vessel to keep out of the way.

52. Every vessel overtaking another vessel shall keep out of the way of the overtaking vessel which latter vessel shall keep her course.

Every vessel coming up with another vessel from any direction more than two points abaft her beam *i.e.* in such a position with reference to the vessel which she is overtaking that at night she would be unable to see either of that vessel's side lights shall be deemed to be an overtaking vessel and no subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two vessels shall relieve the overtaking vessel of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken vessel until she is finally past and clear.

As by day the overtaking vessel cannot always know with certainty whether she is forward or abaft this direction she shall if in doubt assume she is an overtaking vessel and keep out of the way.

53. Where by the above Bye-laws one of two vessels is to keep out of the way the other shall keep her course.

LIGHTS REQUIRED ABOVE TEDDINGTON LOCK.

54. Every steam vessel and steam launch shall when navigating in or above Teddington Lock carry and exhibit the following lights and no other—that is to say :—

- (a.) On or before the foremast or if there be no foremast on the funnel or on a staff at the bow in either case at a height above the hull of not less than four feet a bright white light so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the vessel viz. from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side which light shall in the case of a steam launch registered under the provisions of "The Thames Conservancy Act 1894" be behind a glass shade or slide upon which the registered number of such steam launch shall be legibly and conspicuously painted in black figures and in the case of any other vessel the glass shall be perfectly plain and clear.
- (b.) On the starboard side a green light so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam.
- (c.) On the port side a red light so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam.
- (d.) Every such light shall be of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile.

55. The master of the vessel shall be responsible for the due carrying and exhibiting of such lights and no other.

Obstructions on Towing Paths.

56. No person shall without the previous consent of the Conservators unload on the bank or towing path of the river any sand gravel timber or other material or place any rubbish boat cart or other article or thing upon such bank or towing path.

Trespassers on Towing Paths.

57. No person shall allow cattle to pasture on the towing path or shall ride or drive any horse thereon except when towing a vessel or drive or place any cart waggon or other vehicle over or upon any part of the towing path unless there be a public right of way for such cart wagon or other vehicle.

Removing Stones, &c.

59. No person shall remove any stone clay or other material from the banks weirs tumbling bays towing paths lands or other works of the Conservators.

Vessels not to be moored or placed in front of Towing Paths.

59. No vessel shall be moored to or placed in front of the towing path so as to cause an obstruction to or interference with either the navigation or the use of the towing path.

Channel not to be obstructed above Richmond Lock.

60. The navigable part of the channel of the river above Richmond Lock shall at all times be kept clear for the passage of vessels navigated thereon and no vessel shall be stopped in the navigable part of the said channel so as to impede or obstruct the free and clear passage of any other vessel and no ryepeck or punt pole shall be left fixed in any part of the bed of the river.

As to removal of Obstructions above Teddington Lock.

61. If any vessel or thing shall be stopped be aground or sunk or placed in any part of the river above Teddington Lock so as to impede or obstruct the free and clear navigation thereof the owner or any person having the care of such vessel or thing shall immediately on the request of any person impeded or obstructed thereby or of any officer of the Conservators remove such impediment or obstruction so as to clear the channel and on the refusal or neglect of such owner or other person to remove such obstruction forthwith any officer of the Conservators may remove or cause the same to be removed and if necessary cause any such vessel to be unloaded and the costs of such removal and unloading shall be paid by the owner of such vessel or thing.

Vessels not to stop in Locks.

62. No vessel shall enter any lock unless there be sufficient water to float and carry such vessel through such lock and the channel or cut leading to or from the same and no vessel shall stop in any lock longer than is necessary for the filling or emptying the lock and passage through the same.

As to Vessels passing Locks without paying Tolls.

63. If any vessel shall have passed through any lock and the toll for the passage thereof shall not have been duly paid such toll may be demanded and taken at any other lock through which such vessel is to pass before the same be permitted to proceed.

Passage of Vessels through Locks.

64. The passage of vessels through locks shall be regulated by the lock keepers in accordance with the directions given from time to time by the Conservators.

Sails not to be used in Locks.

64. No vessel shall enter any lock with sail up nor hoist any sail during the time it continues in the lock.

Vessels to be made fast in Locks.

66. When any vessel used for carrying goods or merchandise steam tug or steam launch enters a lock a rope or chain shall be immediately put out from the bow and stern of such vessel and made fast on shore in order to prevent the vessel from running foul of the gates or works or other vessels in the lock.

As to Towing Lines and mooring of Vessels.

67. When any vessel is stopped between the for the navigation the flood-gate towing path and the navigable channel the mast or towing mast or the funnel (if any) shall be in until the water shall have risen to lowered so as to permit the towing lines of any mark affixed at the adjoining locks.

other vessel to pass without obstruction and when any vessel shall be moored at any wharf or elsewhere in the river the same shall be securely made fast at both ends thereof and shall be laid as close to and along the side or front of such wharf or mooring place as conveniently may be.

Ferry Boats.

68. No person shall without the consent of the ferry man first obtained take away or use any ferry boat or any pole or tackle belonging to such ferry.

Injury to Banhs.

69. No person employed on board any vessel shall without actual necessity place or hold a pole or boat hook against any bank or towing path or works on the river so as to injure or damage the same.

As to Trespassers on Towing Paths and Injuries to Works.

70. No owner of a towing horse or his servant or driver shall permit or suffer the horse to go out of the towing path or to trespass graze or trample on land adjoining or leave any gate on the towing path or bridge open or leave any swing-bridge open or suffer the towing line to tear away or damage any rail gate post bridge or works.

As to erecting Bucks or planting Osiers.

71. No person shall without the previous consent of the Conservators erect any new buck or weir or drive or affix any pile or stake or make any hedge or plant any willows or osiers in the river.

Persons not to meddle with Sluices.

72. No person without the previous consent of the lock keeper shall use interfere or meddle with the gear at any lock or weir or with any sluice belonging to the Conservators.

Mode of Towing.

73. No vessel shall be towed upon the river from the bank otherwise than from a mast of sufficient height to protect the banks gates and works from injury by the towing line except in places where the strength of the stream renders it necessary that the line should be brought down to the vessel and made fast.

Mill-owners to give notice before drawing down Water for Repairs.

74. No owner or occupier of a mill shall except in case of sudden necessity draw down the water at the mill for the purpose of repairing the works of such mill or for cleansing the mill stream unless he shall have given notice in writing of his intention so to do to the Conservators at their office seven days previously thereto.

Flashes.

75. Two flashes and no more shall be penned for or drawn in a week and those only on such days and at such hours as the Conservators from time to time appoint. Previously to the drawing for such flashes all the flood-gates and sluices and shuttles at all mills and weirs affected thereby shall be close shut in and be kept close shut in till the flash is at best and such flash shall then be drawn and all the flood-gates and sluices and shuttles at the several mills and weirs shall be And all the flood-gates sluices and opened. shuttles at the said mills and weirs shall be kept open to permit such flash to pass without obstruction until the water is d awn down to low water mark if necessary and be kept so for three hours if necessary after the opening or drawing thereof. Immediately after sufficient water has been drawn for the navigation the flood-gates sluices and shuttles shall be close shut in and kept close shut in until the water shall have risen to the low water

No Sewage &c. to pass or be put from Vessels above Teddington Lock.

76. No sewage or any other offensive or injurious matter whether solid or fluid shall be allowed to pass or be put or thrown into the river from any vessel on the river above Teddington Lock.

Vessels above Teddington Lock to be provided with approved Sonitary Appliances.

77. Every houseboat and steam-launch used on the river above Teddington Lock shall be provided with such sanitary appliances as shall have been approved by the Conservators or their duly authorized officer and no certificate of registration shall be granted to the owner of any such vessel who does not show upon the form to be furnished to the Conservators when applying for the registration of such vessel that a satisfactory method exists thereon for the disposal of the sewage and other refuse.

Exception to Bye-laws 76 and 77.

78. The preceding Byc-laws 76 and 77 shall not apply to the vessels of the Victoria Steamboat Association Limited or their successors certified by the Board of Trade as passenger steamers to carry three hundred or more passengers whilst such vessels are bonâ fide engaged in the business of the said Association or their successors below 'Molesey Lock.

Vessels at Boot Races Regattas &c.

79. Any vessel being on the river on the occasion of any boat race regatta public procession or launch of a vessel or on any other occasion when large crowds assemble thereon shall not pass thereon so as to obstruct impede or interfere with the boat race regatta procession or launch or endanger the safety of persons assembling on the river or prevent the maintenance of order thereon and the master of every such vessel shall observe the directions of the officer of the Conservators engaged in supcrintending the execution of this Bye-law.

As to Offences against Decency, Bathing, &c.

80. No person shall while using or while in upon or about the river or the banks or towing-paths thereof or any land of the Conservators do or cause or incite any other person to do any of the acts specified in the following sub-sections of this Bye-law.

(1.) Commit any offence against decency or be otherwise disorderly.

(2.) Bathe without proper bathing dress or drawers.

(3.) Bathe or prepare to bathe except at bathing-places authorized by the Conservators between the hours of eight in the morning and nine in the evening during the months of June July and August or during the remaining months in the year between the hours of eight in the morning and eight in the evening.

(4.) Bathe or prepare to bathe at any place where or between any hours when bathing is for the time being prohibited by the Conservators.

(5.) Do any act which may cause danger to any person or property or occasion a nuisance obstruction or annoyance to the public or to any person.

(6.) Cast or throw into or upon or place or cause or suffer to fall or flow into or upon any of the places specified in this Byc-law any sewage rubbish or other offensive or injurious matter or thing.

(7.) Destroy or injure any flowering or other plant or any shrub vegetation tree wood or underwood. (8.) Light maintain throw down place or leave any fire or any flaming smouldering or burning substance matter or thing in any place where the same may cause danger or damage to property of any kind or annoyance to any person.

(9.) Kill injure take catch or trap or attempt to kill injure take catch or trap any animal or bird or the young of any animal or bird. Provided always that this sub-section shall not extend to prevent any person employed by the Conservators or acting with the consent of the Conservators from killing vermin or shall affect any right of fowling shooting hunting or sporting existing on the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty five.

(10.) Take destroy search for or disturb the nest of any bird.

(11.) Destroy injure disturb or take out of or remove from the nest whether permanently or temporarily the egg of any bird.

(12.) Move injure or deface any notice noticeboard work or thing whatsoever the property or in charge of the Conservators or set up by them or with their consent.

(13.) Do any act injuriously affecting the safety or amenity of the river.

Owners or persons in charge of Vessels to obey directions of Officers of Conservators.

81. The owner or other person in charge of every vessel on the river shall obey and conform to the directions of every officer of the Conservators and of every person for the time being in their employ.

Houseboats and Steam Launches not to lie in any part of the River marked off by Conservators.

82. No houseboat or steam launch shall lie or loiter in any part of the river from time to time marked off by the Conservators or defined by notice given by the Conservators or by noticeboards sot up by them as being a part of the river in which no houseboat or steam launch shall lie or loiter. Provided always that nothing in this Byelaw shall prevent any pleasure boat from remaining during any regatta boat race procession or other special occasion at such place and for such length of time as may be sanctioned by the Conservators or any of their officers.

REGISTRATION.

83. Every pleasure boat used or intended to be used upon the River Thames above Teddington Lock shall be registered and marked as in these Bye-laws provided.

84. No person shall use or assist or be concerned in using or cause or suffer to be used upon the river above Teddington Lock any pleasure boat unless such boat shall be registered and marked as in these Bye-laws provided.

85. No person shall hire or let for hire or hold out or offer for hiring or suffer or permit to be let for hire any pleasure boat to be used upon the river above Teddington Lock or ply for hire with any pleasure boat upon the river above the said lock unless the same shall be registered and marked as in these Bye-laws provided.

86. The preceding Byc-laws 83 84 and 85 shall not apply to steam launches required to be registered under "The Thames Conservancy Act 1894" nor to any vessel required to be registered under the "Thames Fishery Bye-laws 1893."

87. Every person applying to the Conservators for registration of a houseboat shall furnish to the Conservators in writing upon a form to be obtained at the office of the Conservators Victoria Embankment London E.C. or from such of the officers or servants of the Conservators as may be from time to time supplied with such forms correct information as to the particulars following that is to say :---

- (a.) The length from head to stern of such houseboat.
- (b.) The method of disposal of the sewage and other refuse in such houseboat.
- (c.) The true name and usual residence of the owner thereof.

(1.) At the time of making such application for registration the applicant shall pay to the Conservators the sums following that is to say:--

- (a.) For a houseboat not exceeding 30 feet in length the sum of five pounds.
- (b.) For a houseboat exceeding 30 feet in length the sum of five pounds and in addition thereto the further sum of two shillings for every complete six inches of length by which such houseboat shall exceed 30 feet in length.
- (c.) Houseboats kept stationary throughout the year and used only for purposes in connection with boating such as for dressing places or store rooms for boats' gear shall pay $\pounds 1$ 1s. annually in lieu of the payments fixed by articles (a.) (b.) such reduced payment to be in the discretion of the Conservators.
- (d.) Houseboats kept by hoat owners and boat builders to be let for hire shall be exempt from payment of registration fees if neither let nor used during the year.

(2.) The Secretary may if he shall think fit before complying with any application for registration of a houseboat require such houseboat to be measured by such person in the employment of the Consevators as he shall think fit.

(3.) Upon registration a number shall be appropriated by the Conservators to each houseboat and such number together with the length of such houseboat and the full name and address of the owner thereof and the date of registration shall be entered in the Register.

(4.) Upon registration of a houseboat there shall be furnished to the person registering the same a certificate containing the name in full and the residence of the owner the register number and the date of such registration and such other particulars as the Conservators shall think fit.

(5.) The registration of any certificate for a houseboat shall become void immediately upon the expiration of twelve calendar months from the date of registration but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(6.) Every houseboat registered under these Bye-laws shall have legibly and conspicuously painted upon each side thereof either the register number or the name thereof subject to such conditions as the Conservators may require.

88. Every person applying to the Conservators for registration of a private pleasure boat other than a houseboat or steam launch shall (urnish to the Conservators in writing upon a form to be obtained as in Bye-law 87 mentioned correct information as to the particulars following that is to say:---

- (a.) The true name and usual residence of the owner thereof.
- (b.) The number of such private pleasure boats belonging to such owner.
- (c.) The class to which each of such private pleasure boats belongs as for example skiff or sculling boat pair-oar four-oar eight-oar cance or punt or otherwise as the case may bc.

(1.) At the time of making such application for registration the applicant shall pay to the Conservators the sum of two shillings and sixpence for every boat to be registered.

(2.) Upon registration there shall be appro-No. 26801. E priated by the Conservators to the owner of every such boat a number to be called the owner's number and such number shall be entered in the Register together with the date of registration and shall be appropriated to such person in respect of every such boat which shall be registered in his name.

(3.) Upon registration of every such boat there shall be furnished to the person registering the same a certificate containing the name in full and residence of the registered owner and the owner's number and the date of such registration and such other particulars as the Conservators shall think fit.

(4.) The registration of and certificate for every such boat shall lecome void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(5.) Every such boat shall have fixed in a conspicuous place inside such boat a plate with the registered number of the owner such plate to be made in accordance with a pattern approved by the Conservators.

89. Every person applying to the Conservators for registration of a pleasure boat for hire other than a houseboat or steam launch shall furnish to the Conservators in writing upon a form to be obtained as in Bye-law 87 mentioned correct information as to the particulars following that is to say:—

- (a.) The true name and usual residence of the owner thereof.
- (b.) The number of such pleasure boats for hire belonging to such owner.
- (c.) The class to which each of such boats belongs as for example skiff or sculling boat pair-oar four-oar eight-oar cance or punt or otherwise as the case may be.

(1.) At the time of making such application for registration the applicant shall pay to the Conservators the sum of two shillings and sixpence for every such boat.

(2.) Upon registration there shall be appropriated by the Conservators to the owner of every such boat a number to be called the owner's number and such number shall be entered in the Register together with the date of registration and shall be appropriated to such person in respect of every such boat which shall be registered in his name.

(3.) There shall also at such time be appropriated by the Conservators to every such boat a number to be called the boat's number and a separate number shall be appropriated to every such boat and shall be entered in the Register.

(4.) Upon registration of any such boat there shall be furnished to the person registering the same a certificate containing the name in full and the residence of the owner the owner's number the boat's number and the date of such registration and such other particulars as the Conservators think fit.

(5.) The registration of aud certificate for every such boat for hire shall become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(6.) Every such boat shall have fixed in a conspicuous position inside such boat the owner's and boat's numbers which numbers shall be in plainly legible black figures on a white ground on a plate of an oval shape not less than 4 inches by 3 inches.

90. The members of any rowing club or canos club may apply to the Conservators to register the club colours badge or mark as the distinctive mark of rowing hoats or canoes belonging to such club and by these Byc-laws required to be registered.

(1.) Every such application shall be in writing and signed by the secretary of such club or other authorized person and shall specify particularly :---

(a.) The name and headquarters of the club.

- (b.) The name and description of every rowing boat or cance used upon the Thames and at the time of such application owned by the club.
- (c.) The colours badge or mark used by the club and where proposed to be painted or placed on the rowing boats or canoes or on the oars or paddles thereof.

(2.) The Conservators may if they shall think fit and subject to such conditions (if any) as they shall think fit register such club colours badge on mark.

(3.) The Conservators may in their absolute discretion refuse any such application whether in respect of any particular club colours badge or mark or in respect of any club generally.

(4.) The Conservators may at any time if they shall think fit to do so cancel any such registration.

(5.) Every such registration shall if not previously cancelled become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(6.) Every such rowing boat or canoe shall be marked in such manner as the Conservators may from time to time determine.

91. The members of any sailing club may apply to the Conservators to register a burgee as the distinctive mark of sailing boats belonging to members of such club and by these Bye-laws required to be registered.

(1.) Every such application shall be in writing and signed by the secretary of such club or other person authorized in that behalf and shall specify particularly :---

- (a.) The name and address of every member of the club.
- (b.) The name and description of every sailing boat used upon the Thames owned by every such member.

(2.) The Conservators may if they shall think fit and subject to such conditions (if any) as they shall think fit register such burgee.

(3.) The Conservators may in their absolute discretion refuse any such application whether in respect of any particular burgee or in respect of any club generally.
(4.) The Conservators may at any time if they

(4.) The Conservators may at any time if they shall think fit to do so cancel any such registration.

(5.) Every such registration shall if not previously cancelled become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(6.) The owner of every such sailing boat shall also cause such sailing boat to be registered under these Bye-laws as a private pleasure boat but such sailing boat shall not be required to be marked otherwise than as is hereinafter specified that is to say :--

(7.) Such sailing boat shall be distinguished by flying the registered burgee of the club and by having her name painted horizontally across the stern thercof in white or gilt letters of a block character not less than two-and-a-half inches in length and proportionately thick. Provided always that nothing in this Bye-law contained shall exempt the owner of any sailing boat which shall not be registered and marked in accordance therewith from having the same registered and marked in accordance with such of the provisions of Bye-laws 88 and 89 as may be applicable thereto.

92. Every person applying to the Conservators for renewal of the registration of or certificate for a pleasure boat shall furnish the same information and make the same payments as are hereinbefore prescribed with reference to the first registration or certificate and every such renewed registration and certificate shall if not previously cancelled have effect for twelve calendar months or for thirty-six calendar months as the case may be from the date thereof and no longer but may again be renewed in like manner.

93. Upon every transfer of the ownership of a pleasure boat registered under these Bye-laws the transferor shall and the transferee may forthwith give to the Conservators notice in writing of such transfer and the Conservators shall in either case thereupon without charge grant to such transferee a fresh certificate for the period for which the existing certificate shall be unexpired and shall cause his name and address to be inserted in the Register in the place of those of the transferor and until such notice shall have been given the transferor shall for all the purposes of "The Thames Conservancy Act 1894" and of these Bye-laws and of all other Bye-laws Rules Orders and Regulations of the Conservators for the time being in force be deemed to be the owner of such pleasure boat

(1.) Upon every such transfer of ownership the person previously registered as the owner of such pleasure boat shall return to the Conservators at their Office Victoria Embankment London E.C. the certificate for the time being in force in respect of such boat.

(2.) Immediately upon the granting of a fresh certificate the certificate previously in force in respect of the same boat shall become void.

(3.) From and after the granting of a fresh certificate the person to whom the same is granted shall have the boat in respect of which the same is granted marked. as if such fresh certificate were the first certificate in respect of such boat.

94. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding Bye-laws relating to registration the Conservators may if in the case of any particular pleasure boat they shall think fit by writing under the hand of their Secretary require or sanction the marking of any such boat in some manner different from that required under the foregoing Bye-laws and in such case such boat shall be marked according to such writing.

95. All names numbers or other distinctive marks or things by these Bye-laws required to be placed or kept in upon or about any pleasure boat shall be placed in a conspicuous position and if outside the boat above the water line and shall be kept and maintained by the respective owners of every such boat in a cleanly and plainly distinguishable condition and to the satisfaction of the Conservators or their officers.

(1.) No person shall knowingly conceal or cause or suffer to be concealed any name number or other distinctive mark or thing by these Byelaws required to be kept in upon or about any pleasure boat.

(2.) No person shall display or cause or suffer to be displayed upon or about any pleasure boat by these: Bye-laws required to be registered any number other than is required by these Bye-laws.

(3.) Every certificate of registration when issued shall be subject to the condition that the owner or other person in charge of the vessel to
