THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Constantinople, date 1 28th December, reporting that a quarantine of ten days will be imposed on arrivals from Persian ports, excepting those from Mohammerahi (from the Karun river, on the left bank of which Mohammerah is situated, and from the Haffar, that is the canal which connects the Karun river with the Shat-al-Arab river, formed by the junction of the Euphrates and Tigris), which will be repulsed.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram from Her Majesty's Representative at Constantinople, reporting that 15 days' quarantine with rigorous disinfection is imposed on all pilgrim ships coming from India including Kurrachee and that should a case of plague occur on voyage or lazaretto the ship can either return or undergo 20 days' quarantine from the date of the last case; property of persons dying of the plague and all suspected objects will be burnt.
