HEREAS by section twenty six of "The Pluralities Act 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, " chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches " to which they belong, with great advantage, " and places altogether extra-parochial may in " some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, " or be constituted separate parishes for eccle-"siastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own " diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the "Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese "shall represent to the said Archbishop that any " such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district " within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the "diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may " be advantageously separated from any parish or " mother church, and either be constituted a " separate benefice by itself or be united to any "other parish to which it may be more con-"veniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a

" separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed " to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be " constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said. Archbishop or Bishop " shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme " of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said " Archbishop for his consideration) describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates " and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by " such alteration shall consent in writing under " his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop " may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on " full consideration and inquiry, he satisfied with " any such scheme, or modification thereof, and : " shall certify the same and such consent as afore-" said, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, " it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or " modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect; and such Order being registered in the "registry of the diocese which the registrar is " hereby required to do shall be forthwith binding " on all persons whatscever including the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices " to be affected thereby if he or they shall have consented thereto in writing under his or their "hands; but if such incumbent or incumbents "shall not have so consented thereto the Order shall not come into operation until the next "avoidance of the benefice by the incumbent " objecting to the alteration or by the surviving "incumbent objecting if more than one shall "f object thereto; and in such case the Order shall "forthwith after such avoidance become binding

"on all persons whatsoever."

And whereas the Right Reverend Richard,
Lord Bishop of Llandaff, hath represented in a writing dated the twentieth day of June one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as

follows:

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury Primate of All England and

Metropolitan.

"We Richard Bishop of Llandaff in pursuance of the twenty sixth section of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' (one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six) do hereby represent to your

Grace as follows:—
"1. There is in the county of Monmouth and diocese of Llandaff the benefice or rectory of Lianbilleth the parish whereof contains a popula-tion of about four thousand. The net annual value of the said benefice of Llanbilleth arising from all sources is two hundred and sixty pounds

or thereabouts.

2. There is in the same county of Monmouth and diocese of Llandaff the benefice or perpetual curacy of Penmaen the parish or district whereof . contains a population of eleven thousand or thereabouts the net annual value of the said benefice of Penmaen arising from all sources is two hun-

dred and eighty pounds or thereabouts.

"5. There is also in the same county of Monmouth and diocese of Llandaff the benefice or parish or district whereof contains a population of thirteen thousand or there bouts. The net annual value of the said benefice of Saint Michael Abertillery arising from all sources is two hundred pounds or thereabouts.

· 4. A certain part coloured green on the plan hereto annexed of the district called Crumlin which is situate within the said parish of Llanhilleth and which contains a population of about two hundred and fifty persons which lies con-tiguous to the said parsh of Pennaen (the other portion of such district of Crumlin being already in the same parish of Penmaen) may from its geographical position as well as the fact that these mountain villages are sometimes i cluded in two and sometimes three parishes be with great advantage to the religious interests of the population resident there separated from the said parish of Llanhilleth and annexed to the said parish of Penmaen.

"5. That a certain district called Aberbeeg with a population containing about one thousand persons is situate in the said parishes of Llanhilleth Penmaen and Abertillery. Those portions thereof which lie within the said parishes of Abertillery and Penmaen being coloured respectively blue and red upon the said plan such district of Aberberg is situated between the two hamlets called Six Bells and Llanhilleth and is about two miles from Abertillery the latter being a compact town with a population of about thirteen thousand persons higher up the valley and is also about three miles distant from the parish church of Penmaen but only one mile distant from the parish church of Llanhilleth and therefore such portions of the district of Aberbeeg could with great advantage to the religious interests of the population resident within such portions of the said district of Aberbeeg be separated from the said parishes of Abertillery and Penmaen and unnexed to the said parish of Llanhilleth:

"6. It appears to us the said Bishop of Llandaff and we do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the Pluralities Acts 1838 and 1887 the several places or districts hereinbefore referred to may be advantageously separated from the parishes to which the same now severally belong and be severally annexed to

the parishes as follows:—

"(a.) That portion or district of the parish of Llanhilleth hereinbefore distinguished and called by the name of Crumlin (coloured green on the plan) to be unnexed to the parish of Penmaen.

"(b.) The portions of the parishes of Abertillery and Penmaen hereinbefore described as forming part of the district of Aberbeeg (and coloured respectively blue and red on the plan) to be

annexed to the parish of Llanhilleth:

"7. The Most Honourable the Marquess of Abergavenny K.G. is the patron of the benefice of Lianhilletir. The Crown and we the said Bishop of Llandaff alternately are the patrons of the benefice of Penmaen and the Reverend Howell Howell Clerk Rector of Aberystruth in the county of Monmouth is the patron of the benefice of Saint Michael Abertillery.

"8. The Reverend Daniel Felix Clerk is the present incumbent of the benefice or rectory of Llanhilleth the Reverend David Gower Clerk is the present incumbent of the benefice or per-petual curacy of Penmaen and the Reverend Hiram Smyth Rees Clerk is the present incumbent of the benefice or perpetual curacy of Saint Michael Abertillery.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of 'The Pluralities Act perpetual curacy of Saint Michael Abertillery the 1 1838, we the said Bishop of Llandaff have drawn

up the scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing: the respective districts so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the respective parishes of Llanbilleth and Penmaen and the mode in which it appears to us that the alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands tithes, rent charges and other ecclesinstical du s rates and payments and in respect of rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the necessary consents in pursuance of the 'Pluralities Act 18 8' of the Most Honourable the Marquess of Abergaveeny K.G. the patron of the benefice or rectory of Llauhilleth of the Crown and us the said Bishop of Llandaff the pairons alternately of the benefice or perfectual curacy of Penmaen, and of the Reverend Howell Howell Clerk rector of Aberystruth in the said county of Monmouth the patron of the benefice or perpetual curacy of Saint Michael Abertillery and in case you shall upon full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith we request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council.
"Given under our hand this twentieth day of

"Given under our hand this twentieth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nin-ty-six. "R. Llandaff."

And whereas the said scheine drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows:—

"The scheme of the Bishop of Llandaff referred to in the foregoing representation is as follows :-"It is proposed to separate from the parish of Lianhilleth all that portion of the said parish which is coloured green upon the plan annexed hereto and which lies to the south-west of an imaginary boundary line which line commences at a point in the present boundary between the parishes of Penniaen and Llinbilleth four hundred and forty yards to the south-west of a public-house known as the Royal Oak situate on Craig Swffryd and runs thence in a south-easterly direction in a straight line to Swffrydganol and thence to Pontbren Cottage and from this place along the present boundary line between parishes of Llanhillerh and Trevethin to its junction with the boundary line between the parishes of Llanhilleth and Mynyddyslwyr.

"It is proposed to separate from the said parishes or eccle-instical districts of Abertillery and Penmaen and to annex to the parish of Llanhilleth that portion of the district commonly called and known by the name of Aberbeeg which lies within the s id parishes or ecclesiastical districts and is coloured blue and red respectively on the said plan and which is included within a boundary running from Six Bells along the parish road to the main road between Aberbeeg and Abertillery thence along the farm lane to Arrail Farm from Arrail Farm it takes a straight line to the River Ebbw thence along the present boundary between the ecclesiastical district of Penmaen and Bedwellty to Penyfan Farm along the road to Pentrefpiod and Pentwyn to Llanerch-uchaf whence it takes a traight line to the point on the present boundary between the parishes of Penmaen and Llanbilleth waich is four hundred, and forty yards to the south-west of the said public-house known as the Royal Oak situate on Craig Swffryd.

"The incumbent of the parish or ecclesiastical district of Penma-n shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said hereinbefore described district of Crumlin so proposed to be separated from the parish of Lianhilleth and

annexed to the parish of Penmaen and which shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Penmaen and all the fees from churchings marriages and burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized or performed at the church or churchyard of the parish of Penmaen in respect of the inhabitants of the district so proposed to be annexed thereto shall belong to and continue to be received by the present incumbent of Llauhilleth during his incumbency but shall afterwards belong to and be received by the incumbent of Penmaen for the time being.

"The incumbent of the parish of Llanhilleth shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said hereinbefore described district of Aberbeeg so proposed to be separated from the parish or ecclesiastical districts of Abertillery and Penmaen respectively and annexed to the parish of Llanhilleth which shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Llanhilleth and all the fees for churchings marriage: and burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized or performed at the church or churchyard of the parish of Llanhilleth in respect of the inhabitants of the district so proposed to be annexed thereto shall belong to and continue to be received by the present incumbents of Abertillery and Penmaen during the period of their respective incumbencies but shall afterwards belong to and be received by the incumbent of Llanhilleth for the time being.

"Nothing in this scheme is to prejudice the right of the present incumbents of the said three parishes legally entitled to fees in either of the districts affected by such scheme except with the consent of such incumbents.

"CONSENTS.

"We the Most Honcurable the Marquess of Abergavenny K.G. patron of the benefice of Llandhilleth aforesaid the Crown and we the said Bishop of Llandhilleth aforesaid the Crown and we the said Bishop of Llandhilleth alternately the patrons of the said benefice of Penmaen and the Reverend Howell Howell Clerk Rector of Aberystruth in the county of Monmouth the patron of the said benefice of Saint Michael Abertillery do hereby respectively signify our consent to the foregoing scheme for separating the said district of Crumlin from the said parish of Llanhilleth and annexing the same to the said parish of Penmaen and for the separation of the said district of Aberbeeg from the parishes or ecclesiastical districts of Abertillery and Penmaen respectively and annexing the same to the said parish of Llanhilleth for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"(b.) That the portions of the parishes of Abertillery and Penmaen forming part of the district of Aberbeeg (and coloured respectively blue and red on the said plan) may be advantageously separated from those latter parishes and annexed to the said parish of Llanhilleth

for ecclesiastical purposes under the provisions of

'The Pluralities Act 1838.'

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Most Honourable the Marquess of Abergavenny K.G. patron of the benefice of Llauhilleth aforesaid, the Crown and the said Bishop of Llandaff alternately the patrons of the said benefice of Penmaen, and the Reverend Howell Howell, Clerk, Rector of Aberystruth in the county of Monmouth the patron of the said benefice of Saint Michael Abertillery, has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said 'Pluralities Act 1838' certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the conscerated church called Christ Church, Heaton, situate in the township of Heaton in the parish of Deane in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, Heaton situate as

aforesaid.

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"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Deane which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry, to the said church called Christ Church, Heaton, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church Heaton.'

"And with the like consent of the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church called Christ Church Heaton, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or per-formance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Henry Sheridan Patterson, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Deane, shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church called Christ Church Heaton, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Henry Sheridan Patterson. And provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Bamber Bridge, and of the parochial chapelry of Wal on-le-Dale in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish and of such parochial chapelry afore-

AT a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the Queen's College in the University of Oxford, held on the twenty-eighth day of October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and specially summoned for the purpose, the following Statute altering the Statutes made by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Commissioners, appointed under Act 40 and 41 Victoria cap. 48, for the said College, was made by the College under the said Act, tle same being passed unanimously by the persons present.

The Statute.

1. In Statute II, after Clause 2!, to insert the following clause:

"22. If an Official Fellow has served the College as Tutor, Lec urer or Senior Bursar for twenty-five years, he shall be entitled on ceasing to hold his Official Fellowship to hold an Ordinary Fellowship; and every such Fellow shall on censing to hold his Official F. llowship be admitted to an Ordinary Fellowship without public notice of the vacancy and without examination and without any period of probation, and shall be entitled to hold his Ordinary Fellowship for life, and although he be or shall become married, and although he be or shall become in presession of any property, pension or office which would in ordinary cases render the possessor ineligible; provided that if at any time there are more than three Fellows holding or entitled to hold Ordinary Fellowships under these provisions, the three seniors for the time being among such Fellows, and no more, shall receive or be entitled to receive the emoluments of an Ordinary Fellowship; provided also that if any Fellow under these provisions is holding an Ordinary Fellowship without emolument, his Fellowship shall not be counted in the number of Fellowships for the purposes of Clause 1 of this Statute.

"If any Fellow who under the provisions of this clause holds an Ordinary Fellowship is appointed to an Official Fellowship, he shall on becoming an Official Fellow cease to hold an Ordinary Fellowship, but for purposes of seniority shall retain his position on the list of Fellows who, as aforesaid, hold or are entitled to hold an Ordinary Fellowship.

"In computing the years of service of an Official Fellow every term shall be taken into account in which he has served the College as aforesaid, although he may not have been at the time a Fellow of the College.

"For the purposes of this clause the word Lecturer shall not be taken to include Occasional

"In construing this clause, in any case in which the sources of income may have been acquired at several times, the latest time at which any of such sources of income shall have been acquired, shall be considered the time of the acquisition of the whole thereof.

"It shall be law'ul for the Provost and Fellows to require from any such person any information which they may deem necessary for enabling them to enforce the provisions of this clause."

HER Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Serajevo a despatch, inclosing the text of an Order of the Government of Bosnia and Herzegovina, dated December 1, 1896, which modifies the passport system hitherto in force in these Provinces, and of which the following are the provisions applicable to foreigners:—

(Translation.)

3. Native and foreign travellers are henceforth relieved from the obligation to present themselves personally to the authorities and are only obliged to prove their identity by their passports or other documents to those who give them lodging.

When travelling within the district of their ordinary domicile (in which case urban and rural districts are to be considered as one) even this obligation ceases, as in this case also hitherto it was not necessary to present themselves.

4. Householders (keepers of lodgings) in District and Sub-District towns are bound to report, within twenty-four hours, either verbally or in writing, to the local political authorities of First Instance the arrival of all travellers taken in for the night who do not belong to the district.

5. The Keepers of Hotels, Inns, and Khans, in the Departmental District and Sub-District towns, who lodge travellers as a business, must keep a Visitors' Book in the prescribed form, and the local authorities must take all necessary dispositions for the daily presentation of these Visitors' Books by the hotel and inn keepers to the said authorities, or for the daily inspection of these Visitors' Books by a Government Official, or, finally, in the hotels in the larger towns, for the daily presentation of the notices of arrival (Meldezettel).

From the foregoing regulations it follows that henceforth travellers are exempt as a rule from any official control at the railway stations, landing piers of steamers, ferries, &c.

As, however, these facilities to travellers exempt no one from the obligation, which still remains in force, to prove his identity on the demand of the authorities, so also in the future there will be no objection, under exceptional circumstances or as regards suspicious looking persons, to the authorities exercising a control over any traveller or travellers either on his arrival or during the journey, but in such cases they must be careful to avoid every vexation and to treat the traveller with politeness.

It must also be remarked that the existing control of the passenger traffic at certain places on the frontier, so as to keep a watch on evil-disposed persons, will be maintained so long as it may appear necessary, and even in the future introduced where needful, as it is nowise intended by the abovementioned facilities to travellers to hinder the measures taken by the police for the maintenance of order.
