be expedient that banns of matrimony should be ! published and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church called Christ Church situate as afcresaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend Edward Domett Shaw Clerk in Holy Orders the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Chipping Wycombe or High Wycombe shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the said church called Christ Church situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Edward Domett Shaw and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Christ Church

High Wycombe being :--

"All that part of the parish of Chipping Wycombe otherwise called or known as High Wycombe in the county of Buckingham and in the diocese of Oxford which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the town of High Wycombe at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Amersham over the Wycombe Aylesbury Thame and Oxford Branch Line of the Great Western Railway and extending thence southwestward along the middle of the said road for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Castle-street and with Crendonstreet and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of two chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the north-eastern boundary of the buildings and premises called or known as the Christ, Church Schools and extending thence north-westward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of seventy-five feet or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence forming the north-western boundary of the said buildings and premises and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned wall or fence for a distance of fifty-eight feet or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the same buildings and premises and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned wall or fence for a distance of sixty feet or thereabouts to its south-eastern end on the north-western side of Crendon-street aforesaid and extending thence first south-eastward to and then south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of three chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with High-street and with Easton-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of eighteen chains and three-quarters or thereabouts

to its junction with the footway or passage which passes along the south-eastern side of the Trinity Congregational Chapel and leads to Saffron-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said footway or passage for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the last-named road as aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the footway and subway leading under the Wycombe Aylesbury Thame and Oxford Branch Line of the Great Western Railway aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said footway and subway to a point at the middle of the said branch line of railway and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of eighteen chains and a quarter or thereabouts (thereby passing through the Wycombe Railway Station) to the said firstly hereinbefore mentioned point at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Amersham to High Wycombe over the said branch line of railway at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.
