THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Hamburg respecting Quarantine:—

British Consulate-General, Hamburg, My Lord, March 13, 1897.

I HAVE the honour to report to your Lordship that, according to a notice published in the Hamburg Official Gazette (of which it is not at present possible to obtain a copy), the German Imperial Law of February 8th, 1897, prohibiting, in order to guard against and prevent the introduction of the plague, the importation by sea to this and other ports of the Empire from Persia, the mainland of India, Formosa, Hong Kong, Macao, and from China (south of the thirtieth degree of latitude), of the following articles, viz.:—

Linen and cotton wearing apparel, old and castoff clothing, cast-off bedding, shreds and rags of
all sorts, carpets, human hair, untanned skins and
hides, unworked hair and bristles, wool, claws,
and hoofs is now further extended; that is to say,
the prohibition against the importation of the
above named articles from the countries aforementioned is made applicable also in case these
articles derived from the countries mentioned are
imported (by sea) to Hamburg and to other ports
of Germany from European countries

of Germany from European countries.

Exemptions from this import prohibition shall (according to section 6 of the Imperial German Law of February 8th, 1897, above referred to), only be granted with the special consent of the

Imperial Chancellor.

The Hamburg authorities have accordingly been directed to keep a careful watch over all vessels arriving likewise from European ports at this port, and to see that the above import prohibition is in every case conformed with. Any contravention against such prohibition will, according to section 327 of the German Penal Code, be punished by imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years.
