# By the QUEEN. A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

HEREAS We are happily at Peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States:

And whereas, notwithstanding Our atmost exertions to preserve Peace between the two Sovereign Powers, a State of War unhappily exists between His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey and His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, and between their respective Subjects and others inhabiting within their Countries, Territories, or Dominions:

And whereas We are on Terms of Friendship and amicable intercourse with each of these Sovereigns, and with their several Subjects and others inhabiting within their Countries, Terri-

tories, or Dominions:

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal Subjects reside and carry on Commerce, and possess Property and Establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within the Dominions of each of the aforesaid Sovereigns, protected by the faith of Treaties between Us and each of the aforesaid Sovereigns:

And whereas We, being desirous of preserving to our Subjects the Blessings of Peace, which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to maintain a strict and impartial Neutrality in the said State of War unhappily existing between the aforesaid Sovereigns:

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this

Our Royal Proclamation:

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects to govern themselves accordingly; and to observe a strict Neutrality in and during the aforesaid War, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the Laws and Statutes of the Realm in this behalf, or the Law of Nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril;

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the 33rd and 34th year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the conduct of Her Majesty's Subjects during the existence of hostilities between Foreign States with which Her Majesty is at Peace," it is, amongst other things, declared and enacted as follows. This Act shall extend to all the Dominions of Her Majesty, including the adjacent territorial Waters:—

" Illegal Enlistment.

"If any person, without the licence of Her Majesty, being a British Subject, within or without Her Majesty's Dominions, accepts or agrees to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Foreign State at Peace with Her Majesty, and in this Act referred to as a friendly State, or, whether a British Subject or not, within Her Majesty's Dominions, induces any other person to accept or agree to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any such Foreign State as aforesaid—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without

hard labour.

"If any person, without the Licence of Her Majesty, being a British Subject, quits or goes on board any Ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's Dominions, with intent to accept any

Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State, or, whether a British Subject or not, within Her Majesty's Dominions, induces any other person to quit or to go on board any Ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's Dominions with the like intent—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person induces any other person to quit Her Majesty's Dominions or to embark on any Ship within Her Majesty's Dominions under a Misrepresentation or false Representation of the Service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State,—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without

hard labour.

"If the Master or Owner of any ship, without the licence of Her Majesty, knowingly either takes on board, or engages to take on board, or has on board such ship within Her Majesty's Dominions any of the following Persons, in this Act referred to as illegally enlisted persons; that is to say.—

"(1.) Any person who, being a British Subject within or without the Dominions of Her Majesty, has, without the licence of Her Majesty, accepted or agreed to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at

War with any friendly State:

"(2.) Any person, being a British Subject, who, without the licence of Her Majesty, is about to quit Her Majesty's Dominions with intent to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State:

"(3.) Any person who has been induced to embark under a Misrepresentation or false Representation of the Service in which such person is to be engaged, with the inte t or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the Minitary or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State:

"Such Master or Owner shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and the following con-

sequences shall ensue; that is to say,-

"(1) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour; and

"(2.) Such Ship shall be detained until the Trial and Conviction or Acquittal of the Master or Owner, and until all Penaltics inflicted on the Master or Owner have been paid, or the Master or Owner has given security for the payment of such penalties to the sati-faction of two Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrate or Magistrates having the authority of two Justices of the Peace; and

"(3.) All illegally enlisted persons shall, immediately on the discovery of the effence, be taken on shore, and shall not be allowed to return to the Ship.

" Illegal Shipbuilding and Illegal Expeditions.

"If any person within Her Majesty's Dominions, without the Licence of Her Majesty, does any of the following Acts; that is to say: —

"(1.) Ruilds or agrees to build, or causes to be built, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State: or

"(2.) Issues or delivers any Commission for any Ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State: or

"(3.) Equips any Ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State: or

"(4.) Dispatches, or causes or allows to be dispatched, any Ship with intent or know-ledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State:

"Such person shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Act, and the

following consequences shall ensue: -

"(1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"(2.) The Ship in respect of which any such offence is committed, and her equipment,

shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

"Provided that a person building, causing to be built, or equipping a Ship in any of the cases aforesaid, in pursuance of a contract made before the commencement of such War as aforesaid, shall not be liable to any of the penalties imposed by this Section in respect of such building or equipping if he satisfies the Conditions following; (that is to say),—

"(1) If forthwith upon a Proclamation of Neutrality being issued by Her Majesty he gives notice to the Secretary of State that he is so building, causing to be built, or equipping such Ship, and furnishes such particulars of the contract and of any matters relating to, or done, or to be done under the contract as may be required by the Secretary of

State:

"(2.) If he gives such security, and takes and permits to be taken such other measures, if any, as the Secretary of State may prescribe for ensuring that such ship shall not be dispatched, delivered, or removed without the Lie-nce of Her Majesty until the termination of such War as aforesaid.

"Where any ship is built by order of or on behalf of any Foreign State when at War with a Friendly State, or is delivered to or to the order of such Foreign State, or any person who to the knowledge of the person building is an agent of such Foreign State, or is paid for by such Foreign State or such Agent, and is employed in the Military or Naval Service of such Fo eign State, such ship shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been built with a view to being so employed, and the burden shall lie on the builder of such ship of proving that he did not know that the ship was intended to be so employed in the Military or Naval Service of such Foreign State.

"If any person within the Dominions of Her Majesty, and without the Licence of Her

"By adding to the number of the guns, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any Equipment for War, increases or augments, or procures to be increased or augmented, or is knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting the warlike force of any ship which at the time of her being within the Dominions of Her Majesty was a ship in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State,-

"Such person shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with

or without hard labour.

"If any person within the limits of Her Majesty's Dominions, and without the licence of Her Majesty : -

"Prepares or fits out any Naval or Military Expedition to proceed against the Dominions of any Friendly State, the following consequences shall ensue:-

"(1.) Every person engaged in such preparation or fitting out or assisting therein, or employed in any capacity in such expedition, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"(2.) All Ships and their equipments, and all Arms and Munitions of War, used in or forming part of such expedition, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

" Any person who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the Commission of any offence against this Act shall be liable to be tried and punished as a

principal offender.'

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that Ships built, commissioned, equipped, or desputched in contravention of the said Act, may be condemned and forfeited by Judgment of the Court of Admiralty; and that if the Secretary of State or Chief Executive Authority is satisfied that there is a reasonable and probable cause for believing that a Ship within Our Dominions has been or is being built, commissioned, or equipped, contrary to the said Act, and is about to be taken beyond the limits of such Dominions, or that a Ship is about to be despatched contrary to the Act, such Secretary of State, or Chief Executive Authority, shall have power to issue a Warrant authorizing the seizure and search of such Saip and her detention until she has been either condemned or released by process of law. And whereas certain powers of seizure and detention are conferred by the said Act on certain Local Authorities;

Now, in order that none of Our Subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the renalties imposed by the said Statute, We do hereby s ever do commit any act, matter, or thing what oever contrary to the provisions of the said and Scottish Office.

Statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said Statute imposed, and of Our high displeasure.

And We do hereby further warn and admonish all Our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our p: otection, to observe towards each of the aforesaid Sovereigns, their subjects and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever with whom we are at Peace, the duties of neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those Belligerent Rights which We and Our Royal Predecessors have always claimed to exercise.

And We hereby further warn all Our loving Subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this Our Royal Proclamation, and of Our high displeasure, to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a Neutral Sovereign in a War between other Sovereigns, or in violation or contravention of the Law of Nations in that behalf, as more especially by breaking, or endeavouring to break, any Blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of either of the said Sovereigns, or by carrying Officers, Soldiers, Despatches, Arms, Ammunition, Military Stores or Materials, or any Article or Articles considered and deemed to be Contraband of War according to the Law or modern Usages of Nations, for the use or service of either of the said Sovereigns, that all persons so offending, together with their ships and goods, will rightfully incur and be justly liable to hostile capture, and to the penalties denounced by the Law of Nations in that behalf.

And We do hereby give notice that all Our Subjects and Persons entitled to Our protection who may misconduct themselves in the premises will do so at their peril, and of their own wrong; and that they will in nowise obtain any protection from Us against such capture or such penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary, incur Our high displeasure by such misconduct.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this third day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, in the sixtieth year of Our reign.

THE Marquess of Salisbury to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty\*:—

Foreign Office,

May 3, 1897. IIER Majesty being fully determined to observe the duties of neutrality during the existing state of war between His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey and His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, and being moreover resolved to prevent, as far as possible, the use of Her Majesty's harbours, ports, and coasts, and the wa ers within Her Majesty's territorial jurisdiction, in aid of the warlike purposes of either belligerent, has commanded me to communicate to your Lordships, for your guidance, the following rules, which are to be treated and enforced as

Her Majesty's orders and directions :-Her Majesty is pleased further to command that these rules shall be put in force in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands, on and after the 8th instant, and in Her Majesty's territories, and possessions beyond the seas, six days after the day when the Governor, or other chief authority of each of

such territories or possessions, respectively, shall [ have notified and published the same; stating in such Notification that the said rules are to be obeyed by all persons within the same territories

and possessions.

1. During the continuance of the present state of war, all ships of war of either belligerent are prohibited from making use of any port or readstead in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station, or place of resort, for any warlike purpose, or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities for warlike equipment; and no ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to sail out of or leave any port, roadstead, or waters subject to British jurisdiction, from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war or a merchant ship) shall have previously departed, until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

2. If any chip of war of either belligerent shall, after the time when this Order shall be first notified and put in force in the United Kingdom, the Is'e of Man, and the Channel Islands, and in the several colonies and foreign possessions or dependencies of Her Majesty, respectively, enter any port, roadstead, or waters belonging to Her Majesty, either in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, such vessel shall be required to depart and to put to sea within twenty-four hours after her entrance into such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessary for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases the authorities of the port, or of the nearest port (asthe case may be), shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use; and no such vessel which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repair shall continue in any such port, road-stead, or waters, for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall Provided, nevertheless, have been completed. that in all cases in which there shall be any vessel (whether ships of war or merchant ships) of the said belligerent parties in the same port, roadstead, or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twenty-four hours between the departure therefrom of any such vessel (whether a ship of war or merchant ship) of the one belligerent, and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of-war of the other belligerent; and the time hereby limited for the departure of such ships of war respectively shall always, in case of necessity, be extended so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but no further or otherwise.

3. No ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any port, road-stead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew, and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer destination, and no Forts coal shall again be supplied to any such ship of days.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-WW fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majosty's reign, intituled "The Militia Act, 1882," it is, amongst other things, enacted that, save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days, and not more than twenty-eight days, in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom as Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may, from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise, in any year, of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days.

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the Regiments, Divisions and Battalions of Militia hereinafter mentioned should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the undermentioned Regiments, Divisions, and Battalions of Militia shall, for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned; that is to say

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. W HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, " chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches " to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may "in some instances with advantage be annexed "to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the "Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop " of any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-"bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place or district within the diocese of such " Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, ".as the case may be, may be advantageously " separated from any parish or mother church " and either be constituted a separate benefice by as follows:-

"itself or be united to any other parish to which "it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any " other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, " or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to " form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be " annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, " or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesi-"astical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the "scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the "said Archbishop for his consideration) de-" scribing the mode in which it appears to "him that the alteration may best be effected, "and how the changes consequent on such "alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties in-"terested; and if the patron or patrons of the " benefice, or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or "their hands to such scheme, or to such modifi-" cation thereof as the said Archbishop may ap-"prove, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with "any such scheme, or modification thereof, " and shall certify the same and such consent as "aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in "Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in "Council to make an Order for carrying such "scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may " be, into effect."

And whereas by section eight of "The Church Building Act 1839" it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order " of Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a " separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is "constituted, the same shall, on registration "thereof, and with the consent in writing of "the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice "or benefices to be thereby affected, become a " perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister "thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, "and his successors, shall be a body politic and " corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have, within the limits of the district " parish formed under the Church Building Acts, "for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the control or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he "or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid; but if such Incumbent or Incumbents " shall not have so consented thereto, this last-"mentioned provision shall not come into opera-" tion until the next avoidance of the benefice by " the Incumbent objecting thereto, or by the sur-"viving Incumbent objecting, if more than one " shall object thereto, and in such case the last. "mentioned provision shall forthwith after such "avoidance come into operation, and shall be " binding on all persons whatsoever."

And whereas the Right Reverend Randall Thomas Lord Bishop of Winchester hath: pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the thirtieth day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury

"I the Right Reverend Randall Thomas Bishop of Winchester, do hereby represent to your Grace that to the benefice (being a rectory) and parish church of Meonstoke in the county of Hants and my diocese of Winchester belongs among other places an ancient parochial chapelry or hamlet known by the name of Soberton the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the population of the parish of Meonstoke exclusive of the said chapelry or hamlet of Soberton is four hundred and forty and the population of the said chapelry

is six hundred and ten.

"That there is in the said chapelry or hamlet of Soberton a church or chapel affording accommodation for about two hundred and forty persons and distant from the parish church of Meonstoke about two and a half miles in which church or chapel of Soberton Divine service is performed by the rector of Meonstoke or his curate. The church at Meonstoke accommodates about three hundred people.

"That baptisms marriages churchings and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized in the church or chapel of Soberton and in the burial ground thereto be-

longing.

"That the gross value of the said rectory of Meonstoke is eight hundred and thirty pounds or thereabouts, six hundred and one pounds of which income arises from tithe rent charge assessed upon lands situate within the chapelry of Soberton—this is exclusive of the value of the rectory house which is situate at Meonstoke and is a good house. There is no residence house at Soberton. The net value of the income arising from Meonstock is one hundred and ninety-five pounds or thereabouts—from Soberton four hundred and eighty pounds or thereabouts.

"That I am the patron or person entitled (in right of my Bishopric) to present to the said benefice of Meonstoke with Soberton if the same were now vacant and that I hereby signify my consent as such patron to the proposals herein

contained.

"That the Reverend James Richard Philip Hoste, B.A. Honorary Canon of Winchester is the present incumbent of Meonstoke with Soberton

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' and 'The Church Building Act 1839' the said chapelry or hamlet of Soberton may be advantageously separated from the said rectory and parish church of Meonstoke and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Pluralities Act 1838 I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent thereto of myself as patron and of the said James Richard Philip Hoste as incumbent of the said rectory I submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows:—

"The chapelry of Soberton shall be separated from the rectory and parish church of Meonstoke and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name and style of 'The Perpetual Curacy

of Soberton' of which the church or chapel within the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"The proposed separate parish and benefice of Soberton shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdictions as the said rectory of Meonstoke and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"The rectory house at Meonstoke with its garden and appurtenances situate at Meonstoke shall belong to the rector of Meonstoke and his successors.

"The present rector of Meonstoke shall be entitled to have and retain to his own use during his incumbency the clear annual income of four hundred pounds as a first charge upon the present net income of the benefice of Meonstoke with Soberton. The balance of such present net income during such incumbency shall belong and be paid to the perpetual curate for the time being of the proposed new benefice of Soberton by the rector of Meonstoke.

"That upon the cesser of the present rector's incumbency the incumbent of the proposed new benefice of Soberton and his successors shall be and become entitled to receive all the income arising from tithe rent charge rent of glebe and from all other sources within the said chapelry of Soberton and the rector of Meonstoke shall be entitled only to the residue of income arising from tithe rent charge glebe and other sources within the parish of Meonstoke or otherwise (subject as

hereinafter mentioned).

"That the balance standing to the credit of the benefice of Meonstoke with Soberton in the books of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne arising from the sale of the old rectory shall after payment thereout of all sums already approved for payment by the said Governors with the consent of the Governors hereinafter signified together with any interest accrued or to accrue due thereon be held accumulated and appropriated for the purpose of providing a residence house for the incumbent of Soberton.

"That the shares of income assigned to the rectory of Meonstoke and the new benefice of Soberton respectively as aforesaid shall be subject to the liabilities which they may now or at any time hereafter severally be or become subject and the sum of forty-six pounds two shillings and eleven pence for first fruits and four pounds twelve shillings and three pence for tenths shall be apportioned as follows: The rectory of Meonstoke shall be liable to pay and discharge eleven pounds ten shillings and eleven pence for first fruits and one pound four shillings and three pence for tenths and the new benefice of Soberton thirty-four pounds twelve shillings for first fruits and three pounds eight shillings for tenths and the first payment of the said sums of thirty-four pounds twelve shillings for first fruits and three pounds eight shillings for tenths shall be made by and be recoverable from the first incumbent of the proposed new benefice of Soberton in respect of his admission thereto.

"All fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for marriages churchings burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Soberton and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said proposed separate parish and benefice shall belong to the incumbent thereof.

"The patronage of or right of presentation or nomination to the proposed separate parish and benefice of Soberton shall be vested in the Bishop |

of Winchester and his successors.

"The parishioners of the proposed separate parish shall not be entitled to accommodation in any other church than the church of the said proposed separate parish of Soberton nor shall the parishioners of Meonstoke or of any other chapelries which may belong thereto be entitled to any accommodation in the church or chapel of the said proposed separate benefice and parish of Soberton except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pew or pews sitting or sittings in either church who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"Given under my hand this thirtieth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand

And whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council by his report dated the twenty-fifth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, which said report is in the words following: -

"We the undersigned Frederick, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend Randall Thomas Bishop of Winchester has represented unto us (amongst other things

" That there is in the county of Hants and his diocese of Winchester the benefice (being a rectory) and parish church of Meonstoke and that there belongs thereto among other places an ancient parochial chapelry or hamlet known as Soberton the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined and the population of which chapelry is six hundred and ten.

"That the said chapelry of Soberton has its own church which is sufficient for the accommodation of about two hundred and forty persons.

"That baptisms marriages churchings and

burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized in the church or chapel of Soberton and in the burial ground thereto belonging.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' the said chapelry of Soberton may be advantageously separated from the said rectory and parish church of Meonstoke and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice of which the said church or chapel belonging to the said chapelry

shall be the parish church.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the said Pluralities Act 1838 the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed separation may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consent thereto in writing of the said Randall Thomas Bishop of Winchester as patron of the said rectory and parish church of Meoustoke with the said chapelry of Soberton, of the Reverend James Richard Philip Hoste, B.A., Honorary Canon of Winchester the incumbent of the same rectory and chapelry and of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the Maintenance of the Poor Clergy has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fortytwo duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say :-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, have prepared, and humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting au union of two contiguous benefices situate within the metropolis, and within the city and diocese of London, namely, the benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry (being a vicarage) with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street (being a rectory), and the benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw (being a rectory), and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, and were approved by the said Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and were assented to by the patrons of the said two benefices, that is to say, by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, as the sole patrons of the said benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw, and as the alternate patrons of the said benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, and by the Master and Scholars of Balliol College, in the University of Oxford, as the other alternate patrons of the lastly-mentioned benefice, and the same proposals were also assented to, subject to certain modifications, by the vestries of the parishes concerned, that is to say, by the joint vestry of the parishes of Saint Lawrence Jewry and Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, and by the vestry of the parish of Saint Michael Bassishaw.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the two benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained, should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such Bishop, and the patrons of the said two benefices, and the vestries of the said respective parishes, are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

" Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Frederick, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal), with the consent of the said Master and Scholars of Balliol College, in the University of Oxford (in testimony whereof they have to this scheme affixed their common or corporate seal), with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, in London (in testimony whereof they have to this scheme affixed their capitular or common seal), and with the consents of the joint vestry of the said parishes of Saint Lawrence Jewry and Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk street, and of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Michael Bassishaw (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the Chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent);

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:—

#### "PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and propose:—

11. That the said benefice of Saint Lawrence | No. 26849.

Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, and the said benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw. be united into one benefice under the style and title of 'The United Benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, and Saint Michael Bassishaw,' which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

"2. "That if, upon the day when any Order. of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be vacant, the union shall forthwith take effect, and if one of the said benefices only shall be then vacant, the said union shall forthwith take effect, if the incumbent of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the first incumbent of the said united benefice; but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice, and if, upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be full, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of either of them, if the incumbent for the time being of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the incumbent of the united benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be. the first incumbent of the united benefice, and in any case the Bishop of the said diocese of London shall admit to the united benefice such first incumbent (if an incumbent for the time being of either of the said present benefices) without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the united benefice. Until the time of the union taking effect the said two benefices shall remain separate, and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof, and of the incumbents of each of them, shall remain unaffected.

"3. That if, after this scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council, duly published in the London Gazette, and before the union shall have taken effect, the incumbent for the time being of either of the said two benefices, shall, with the consent of the Bishop of London, retire from his incumbency in order that the said union may take immediate effect, then, if the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be the present incumbent of the Lenefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-s reet, he shall be entitled, during the period hereinafter specified, to receive in equal halfyearly sums a reciding pension or yearly sum of six hundred and seventy-three pounds in the manner following, namely, from and out of the annual income of the united benefice the sum of two hundred pounds (computed on the annual value of the tithe, or rate in lieu of tithe, now payable to him), and from the Trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation, or from us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of moneys to be hereafter paid over to us by the same Trustees under the provisions of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, the sum of four hundred and seventy-three pounds (computed on a similar sum now payable to him by the said Trustees), the first of such half-yearly sums to become due at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the said union shall take effect; and if the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be the present

incumbent of the benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw he shall be entitled, during the period hereinafter specified, to receive out of the annual income of the united benefice a retiring pension or yearly sum equal to the net annual value of the tithe, or rate in lieu of tithe, and all other endowments belonging to the said benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw, computed on the average receipts of the two years immediately pre-ceding the year in which the said incumbent shall so retire, which said pension or yearly sum shall commence as from the day on which the said union shall take effect, and shall be payable by equal half-yearly payments in every year, the first half-yearly payment thereof to become due at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the said union shall take effect, and in either case the said retiring pension or yearly sum shall be payable to the retiring incumbent during the remainder of his life, if he continues to be a member of the Church of England, but not otherwise, or until he shall accept other church preferment of a net annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said retiring pension or yearly sum to be so made payable to such retiring incumbent, and upon his accepting such preferment, the said retiring pension or yearly sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but if he shall accept other church preferment of a less net annual value than as aforesaid, then, whilst he shall hold such other preferment, the said retiring pension or yearly sum shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum payable to him for the same year in respect of such other preferment, and that the net annual value of such other church preferment, as may be accepted by the retiring incumbent, shall be ascertained without reference to and exclusively of the house of residence, if any, which may belong or be attached to such other church preferment.

"Provided always that if such retiring incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law, the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension, his right to receive such retiring pension or yearly sum as aforesaid shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also, that if the same retiring pension or yearly sum shall cease or determine by reason of the retiring incumbent ceasing to be a member of the Church of England as aforesaid, or by reason of his being convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law as aforesaid, or by his acceptance of other church preferment, or by his death (as the case may be), on any other than one of the half-yearly days of payment, then he, or his executors, or administrators, shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said retiring pension or yearly sum for the period which, at the time of such cesser, shall have elapsed of the current halfyear, which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the current half-year.

"4. That the said retiring pension or yearly sum so payable to a retiring incumbent as aforesaid shall at all times be subject to the same reduction in amount as the income, or portions of income, upon which the said pension is by this scheme comparted or directed to be computed, would be subject to if the retiring incumbent-continued to be the incumbent of his present benefice, and that, subject to this possible reduction, and to the provisions hereinafter contained, the said retiring pension or yearly sum shall (except as to tre hereinafter mentioned portion; a counting to four hundred and seventy-three-pounds per annum, of the contemplated peasing to a retired incumbent

of the said benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street) by charged upon the annual income of the united benefice, and shall be payable out of the same be the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice, and as between the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and the retiring incumbent and his assigns the said retiring pension or yearly sum, excepting such portion as aforesaid, shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the said united benefice, and the incumbent of the united benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the said retiring incumbent or his assigns the said retiring pension or yearly sum, excepting such portion as aforesaid, out of the income of the said united benefice, and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united benefice, and that if such retiring pension or yearly sum, or any part thereof (except any part which may be irrecoverable by the incumbent of the united benefice) shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than twenty-eight days after any of the said halfyearly days of payment, and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns, or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London, it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order upon the incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice, requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order, and if the same be not paid within such period then it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied, but the power to be so conferred upon the said Bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with any rights of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns to recover the said retiring pension or yearly sum and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the legal or equitable rights of the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice to recover from the preceding incumbent of the united benefice, his executors, or administrators, any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding incumbent.

"5. That if the said union shall have taken immediate effect by reason of the imcumbent for the time being of either of the present benefices having retired from his incumbency and such incumbent shall be living when the united benefice shall for the first time after such union become vacant, and shall not have accepted other church preferment of a value equal to or greater than the amount of his retiring pension, the incumbent who shall have so retired shall (if he be willing, and if in the opinion of the Bishop of London he be not disqualified by age or otherwise) be entitled to fill such vacancy, and if admitted by the Bishop to the united benefice, shall be so admitted without any form or fee of or for presentation, institution, or induction, and without being required to make any payment in respect of first fruits to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, and he shall upon such admission become the second incumbent. of the said united benefice, and the retiring pension or yearly sum hereinbefore made payable to him shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable... " PART II.

- "As to the parish church of the united benefice

and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith, or with the church of Saint Michael Bassishaw, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England further recommend

and propose:
"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Lawrence Jewry shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of

the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the fout and communion table and secramental plate used in the church of Saint Michael Bassishaw, if the joint vestry of the united benefice desire it, shall be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if not needed for such church, the font, communion table, or sacramental plate (or such portion thereof as may not be so needed) shall be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of the fourteenth section of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, that is to say, shall be transferred to any other church or chapel or churches or chapels within the Diocese of London,

as the Bishop of London may select.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the carved work and similar fixed fittings now in the said church of Saint Michael Bassishaw, or so much of such carved work or fittings as the joint vestry of the united benefice may desire, and may be sanctioned by the Bishop of London, shall be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if they be not so transferred, or only in part so transferred, then the whole of them, or the residue not so transferred, shall be transferred to the church of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned, unless it should seem more ...expedient to the Bishop of London that the same shall be sold, and the proceeds to arise from such sale shall, in such case, be added to the proceeds to arise from the sale hereinafter recommended of the materials and site of the said church of Saint Michael Bassishaw.

" 4. That upon the union taking effect, the register books of baptisms, marriages, and burials of the parish of Saint Michael Bassishaw shall be transferred from the church of Saint Michael Bassishaw to the church of the said united benefice.

" 5. That upon the union taking effect, the table of fees heretofore in customary use in the church of Saint Lawrence Jewry, shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for all the parishes included in the said united

benefice.

6. That if, upon the union taking effect, the persons who at the present time hold the respective offices of organist and verger of Saint Lawrence Jewry shall at that time hold their respective offices, such persons shall be respectively organist and verger of the united benefice, but no organist or verger of the united benefice shall have any larger estate or interest in his office than he shall have possessed in his original office before

" 7. That if, upon the union taking effect, Mr. .. Henry. Elsworth, who is now the verger of Saint Michael Bassishaw at a salary of fifty pounds per annum, shall hold the same office, his services shall be dispensed with, and that, by way of compensation for the loss of his office, he shall receive for the remainder of his life a yearly sum or pension of fifty pounds, and such yearly sum or pension shall be paid to the said Henry Elsworth by the incumbent of the said united benefice, as is contemplated by clause 2 of Part III of this scheme.

"PART III.

... "As to the endowments or income of the united |

benefice, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, recommend and propose:

"1. That, subject to existing vested interests in the income now belonging to either of the present benefices, and to the pensions or compensations to be provided under the terms of this scheme, the incumbent of the said united benefice and his successors shall be entitled to and shall receive:

" (a.) The sum of two hundred pounds per annum, at present payable under the amended Fire Act, 44 Geo. III, to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milkstreet.

"(b.) The sum of two hundred and twenty pounds eighteen shillings and fourpence per annum, at present payable under the amended Fire Act, 44 Geo. III, to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw.

"(c.) The rent, being now a sum of forty pounds per annum, receivable by the present incumbent of the benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw in respect of the former parsonage

or rectory house of that benefice.

"(d.) The sum of fifty-eight pounds per annum, being the amount of a yearly payment now made to the present incumbent of the benefice of Saint Michael Bassishaw, by the said trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation, such payment of fifty-eight pounds per annum to be made to the incumbent of the united benefice, either by the same trustees or by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of moneys which may be hereafter paid over to us by the same trustees under the provisions of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883.

"(e.) The sum of one hundred and eighty pounds per annum, being the amount which the said trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation now pay to the incumbent and churchwardens of the parish of Saint Michael Bassishaw for ordinary repairs at the church of that parish and for the maintenance of divine service in the same church, such payment of one hundred and eighty pounds per annum to be made to the incumbent of the united benefice, either by the said trustees or by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners. out of moneys which may be hereafter paid over to us by the same trustees under the provisions of the aforesaid City of London

Parochial Charities Act, 1883.

"2. That so long as the yearly sum or pension of fifty pounds, which is contemplated by clause 7 of Part II of this scheme is payable to the said Henry Elsworth, such yearly sum or pension shall be paid by the incumbent of the said united benefice, and that during the same period the incumbent of the united benefice shall be entitled to receive for his own use and benefit from the trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation or from us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of moneys to be hereafter paid over to us by the same trustees under the provisions of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, the sum of forty-five pounds per annum, which is now payable by the aforesaid trustees, to the incumbent and churchwardens of the parish of Saint Michael Bassishaw, towards the cost of substantial repairs at the church of that parish.

"3. That if the union should take effect by the retirement upon a full pension of one of the present incumbents of the two benefices to be united, the foregoing recommendations shall come into full operation only upon his ceasing to be entitled to his pension, and if, on the retiring incumbent accepting other church preferment, a portion, but not the whole, of his pension shall become available, or if in any other way part of the income of the united benefice shall become available for the eventual purposes of the whole, then the part so becoming available shall be applied to the object to which the whole is eventually to be applied.

"4: That if the Reverend Main Swe c

Alexander Walrond, clerk in holy orders, the present incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, shall become the first incumbent of the united benefice, he shall not be entitled to receive, by way of income in respect of such incumbency, an amount in excess of nine hundred

pounds per annum.

"5. That the incumbent of the united benefice shall be entitled to receive for his own use and benefit any accumulations which may, at the time of the union taking effect, be in the hands of the incumbent and churchwardens of the parish of Saint Michael Bassishaw, in respect of the two yearly payments of one hundred and eighty pounds and forty-five pounds respectively, at present made to such incumbent and churchwardens by the said trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation as above mentioned.

#### "PART IV.

"As to a certain new ecclesiastical district, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,

recommend and propose:

"1. That an ecclesiastical disrrict within the limits of the Metropolis (as that word is or may be from time to time defined by statute for the purposes of the hereinbefore mentioned Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two) such district then having been, or then being about to be, formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament authorizing the formation or constitution of such district shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church shall be built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended.

"2. That the sum of two hundred pounds per annum, which is at present paid by the said trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Lawrence Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, in respect of the Campden Lecture, shall form the endowment of the intended new church and district, if the said trustees are willing to assign such sum of two hundred pounds per annum for that purpose, or are willing to pay over that sum to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be applied towards that object, but in the event of the said trustees of the City of London Parochial Foundation deciding to apply the said sum of two hundred pounds per annum to any incumbent of the said united benefice, the income or endowments assigned to such incumbent under the provisions of clause 1 of Part III of this scheme shall thereupon be and become charged with a payment of two hundred pounds per annum in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said intended new church and district, and such payment shall be made in two equal half-yearly portions.

"3. That, as a further endowment for the same new church and district, the sum of forty-five pounds, which is referred to in clause 2 of Part III of this scheme shall, after it has ceased to be payable to the incumbent of the said

united benefice, become and be payable to the incumbent for the time being of the said new church and district.

"PART V.

"As to the church of Saint Michael Bassishaw and the site and appurtenances thereof, and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture, or fittings of the same church, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners

for England, recommend and propose:

"1. That, as soon as conveniently may be after the union shall have taken effect, the church of Saint Michael Bassishaw shall be taken down, and that, subject to the provisions contained in clause 3 of Part II of this scheme, the furniture and fittings, and the materials and site of the said church, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, such sale or sales leing made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the sevent-enth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and fortytwo, and special regard being had to the tomb of Doctor Thomas Wharton.

"2. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England as aforesuid, of the site and materials and furniture and fittings of the said church, shall form one aggregate fund, and shall be applied as follows, and in the follow-

ing order, that is to say:—
"(a.) That we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, shall, out of such moneys appropriate a sum of four thousand pounds, or such larger sum as we may find necessary, as part of the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, with a view to providing means for defraying the cost of completing the removal of the human remains from under the said church of Saint Michael Bassishaw, and also with a view to re-paying the authorities of the same parish for any reasonable and proper expenditure already incurred by them in connection with the removal of such human remains.

"(b.) That we shall next set apart out of the said proceeds a capital sum of four thousand pounds for the provision, so soon as an opportunity shall arise, of a suitable house of residence for the incumbent of the said united benefice, such house to be within the limits of the parishes comprised in the united benefice. or within a reasonable distance of the church of such united benefice, the position of such house of residence to be approved by the Bishop of London, and that until such house shall have been provided the interest (calculated at the rate of two pounds and ten shillings per centum per annum) accruing upon such capital sum of four thousand pounds shall be paid by us to the incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice in addition to the income which, as such incumbent, he shall be entitled to receive under the provisions of this scheme.

"(c.) That we shall next set apart out of such proceeds such a sum, not exceeding five hundred pounds, as may appear to the Bishop of London and to us to be necessary for the purpose of putting the church of the united benefice, that is to say, the church of Saint Lawrence Jewry, into complete repair, and for developing its accommodation for

worshippers.

"(d.) That the remainder of such net proceeds shall be appropriated by us for or towards the acquisition (if necessary) of a suitable site for, and the erection of, a new church within the limits of the said new district, constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the church for such new district, and if the amount of such remainder shall be sufficient, the same shall also be appropriated by us for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for, and the erection of, a parsonage house (or the purchase, enlargement, or alteration of any existing house, suitable with or without enlargement or alteration for a parsonage house), within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the parsonage house of such new district.

#### "PART VI.

"Upon the subject of patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, recom-

mend and propose:

"1. That the said united benefice be in the patronage of the said Master and Scholars of Balliol College, in the University of Oxford, and of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, in London, alternately, the next turn of presentation to belong to the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, provided always that if, for the purpose of giving early effect to the union, the present incumbent of the benefice of Saint Lawrence, Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, should be presented to the benefice of Saint Michael, Bassishaw, or the present incumbent of the benefice of Saint Michael, Bassishaw, should be presented to the benefice of Saint Lawrence, Jewry, with Saint Mary Magdalene, Milk-street, such presentation shall be made without prejudice to the rights of the patrons to the next turn upon a vacancy occurring in the ordinary course, and also without prejudice to the right of the first incumbent of the united benefice to receive all payments whatever to which he is entitled during his incumbency of his present

"2. That the sole patronage of the new church and district, referred to more particularly in Part IV of this scheme, shall be vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church

of Saint Paul and in their successors.

"Provided always that this scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval, which by the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, are made requisite, to the sale, or letting, or appropriation, under the powers conferred by that Act, of the site of any church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the church of Saint Michael, Bassishaw, and of the site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof, and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed.

"And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, or of any

other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid

before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the twentythird and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two and Her Majesty by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.
