Cadix, July 16.

ON the 11th instant sailed out of this Bay 10 Spanish Men of War and 2 Fireships, commanded by the Conde d'Agular General of our Armada, to cruize off of Cape Vincent for the Galeons that are now expected home.

Rome, July 21. On Sunday last was Performed in St. Peter's Church the Coronation of the Pope, who celebrated Mass himself, the Cardinals and foreign Ambassadors assisting at the Ceremony. The Nephews of the late Pope are removed from their Offices of General of the Church, Governor of the Castle of St. Angelo, and Legat of Avignon, the Income whereof the Pope has ordered to be brought into the Publick Treasury; But the Vice-Legatship of Avignon is given to the Bishop of Fieschi. Cardinal Imperiali is continued in the Legatship of Ferrara; and Cardinal Cantelmi is made Archbishop of Naples. The Pope has resolved to maintain the Decree of his Predecessor Innocent XI. for suppressing the Franchises of the Quarters of Ambassadors, and Orders are given accordingly to the Officers of Justice. He has caused 10000 Scudi to be distributed among the Poor here, and 6000 at Naples; Has published an Ordinance for the better supplying this City with Corn; and intends to lessen the number of his Guards. He has, at the Request of the Cardinal de Fourbin, granted his Bulls to the Bishop of Chartres in France; and on Monday will hold a Consistory, to thank the Cardinals, according to custom, for his Election; which he has notified to the Emperor and other Potentates by Letters written with his own hand.

Turin, July 22. The Dutchess of Savoy, with her whole Court, (which removed in the beginning of the last month to Verelli) was expected back here on Thursday last, but her Royal Highness being taken ill at Chivasso in her return hither, miscarried on Wednesday last of a Daughter. Our Duke continues still encamped at Monasterio, but is resolved, so soon as the German Succors have joyned him, to march directly towards the Enemy, who lye near Carmagnola, having burnt several Villages therabouts. We have adviced, that the Garison of Montmelian, in a late Sally they made upon the French, cut off 5 or 600 of them.

Legorne, July 23. The 6 Spanish Gallies, which lately arrived in this Port with Soldiers for the Service of Milan, are still here waiting for Orders; And this morning came in 5 more from Genoa under the command of the Duke of Turis, who took the last week a very rich French Ship, bound from Marseilles to this place and Alexandria, her Cargo valued at 70000 Dollars; In her Company were two Barks laden with Wines, whom they likewise seized.

Milan, July 25. Our Maistre de Camp-General the Count de Lowigny has sent 600 Horse and some Foot towards Monza, where they are to encamp to observe the

Garison of Cassal, which has been lately reinforced, but not so considerably as was at first reported. The German Succors pass daily through Como.

Venice, July 27. By a Felucca, dispatched on the 23d of the last month from Porto-Termia, we have adviced, That the Captain General was arrived there with the Venetian and Auxiliary Gallies, and intended to stand over from thence towards Andros to joyn the Men of War and Galeasses, and after that to enter into the Archipelago.

Vienna, July 29. The Letters of the 22d of this month from the Imperial Camp near Valkovar give an account, that on the 19th the Auxiliary Troops of Brandenburg joynd the Army, which on the 20th marched from Talebadins to Bonec near the Danube. The same day Count Marsiglio (Secretary to the English Embassy at the Port) parted from thence towards Belgrade. On the 21st the Army passed the River Waipa over 3 Bridges, and marched to Valkovar, where they were joynd the day following by the Regiment of Count Guido of Staremberg, and on the 23d they would continue their march to Looch; We are still assured by all the Deferters and Spies, that Sultan Sohyman is dead, and his younger Brother Achmet advanced to the Throne; And that the Grand Visier is gone back to Constantinople to settle the Government under the new Sultan; Upon which, Priace Lewis has resolved to hasten his march towards the Save, which 'tis believed the Army will pass without any hindrance from the Enemy, who do not yet appear in any considerable Body. 'Tis confirm'd from Transylvania, that the Rascians being informed that 80 Wagons of Provisions were designed to Temeswar under the Convoy of 800 Turks, way-laid them so successfully, that they routed the Turks on the 10th instant, and took all the Booty.

Berne, July 28. We hear by Letters of the 25th from St. Gal, that on the 20th passed through Lindau a Bavarian Regiment of Foot, and on the 24th two of Dragoons, in their march towards Piedmont; And from Ausbourg of the 18th they write, that the same morning the Elector of Bavaria's Equipage, with part of his Guards, took the same way.

From the Elector of Saxony's Camp near Rhingemun, about a League and half from Manheim, August 4. On the 2d instant, upon adviced that the French had detached 2000 Horse towards Neustadt, General Caprara went out himself with a like Body of German Horse to cut off their Retreat, but this Intelligence proving a mistake, he returned into the Camp towards evening. Yesterday the Army marched from Oberhausen, and came to this place, where we expect 3 Regiments of Saxe Gotta to joyn us. The same day we were informed, that the French were marched from Ofenbach near Landau, and encamped between Spire and Philipsburgh, from whence they had feat a strong Detachment over the Rheine; And this day we hear, that their whole Army has passed that River.

Hydelberg, August 4. The Deferters that are come in here report, that the French Army, being about 20000 strong, have passed the Rheine at Philipsburgh; and that they

they are marched higher up, having yesterday their Head Quarters at *Graben*; They have burnt down the Monastery and Church of *Waghauch*, and design by this diversion to oblige the Confederates to repass the *Rhine*.

Cologne, August 7. We have advice from the Country of *Eyffelt*, that 1000 Horse of the Elector Palatine's Forces have invested the Castle of *Gerolstein*, and that they expected the coming up of some Foot with several Pieces of Cannon, in order to attack that place, in which there is a Garrison of 4 or 500 French. The Letters of the 3d instant from the Confederate Army in the Palatinate say, they were still encamped between *Oberheims* and *Ruckheim*; and that they were making several Retrenchments to cover the Bridge they had laid over the *Rhine* at *Maukeim*. And by Letters from *Frankfort* of the 6th we are told, that the French Army had passed the *Rhine* at *Philipburgh*; And that the Elector of *Saxony* was drawn nearer to *Mannheim*.

Paris, August 4. The last Letters from our Army in *Flanders*, which lay still near *Florennes*, say, that Forage began to grow very scarce thereabouts, inasmuch that they were forced to go 3 or 4 Leagues to seek it. From *Catalonia* we hear, that the Duke de *Nouilles* had taken the Castle of *Valence*, about 2 days march from *Urgel*. They write from *Piedmont*, that the Duke of *Savoys* Army was daily reinforced, and ours as much weakened, as well by Sickness and Desertion, as by the Losses we had sustained before *Coni*, and in other Actions since the beginning of this Campaign, and that in all appearance Monsieur *Carnat* would be obliged to be hereafter wholly upon the Defensive. We have an account, that divers English Merchant Men, bound to the *West-Indies*, having fallen in with a Squadron of the French Fleet, 6 of them, with the 2 Frigats their Convoy, are taken and brought into *Port Louis*.

Brussels, August 8. Our Governor-General marched on Monday last from *Ham* on the *Dendre*, and encamped near *Alost*, from whence he will march again to morrow towards the *Schelde*, to force (as is believed) the Enemies Retrenchments between *Menin* and *Pont-Esperies*. The Baron de *Fleming*, who lay 3 or 4 days ago with the Troops under his command near *Charleroy*, has, it is said, received Orders from His Majesty to join our Army, which marched yesterday from *Gerpines*, and encamped within a League and half of the French, who lye near *Philipville*.

From the Kings Camp at Court sur Heure, August 9. On Tuesday last, very early in the morning, we decamped from *Gerpines*, and leaving *Walcourt* on our left, marched in 4 Columns to the little River called *Heure*, which falls into the *Sambre* about *Marchienne au Pont*; We passed it over 2 Ponton-Bridges between *Thyl Chasteau*, and *Berfe*, and after a long march in regard of the many Detiles, the King himself keeping all the while in the Rear, which the Enemy gave out they would attack whenever we moved, we encamped here about 5 in the evening, our left reaching to *Ham sur Heure*, and our right a little behind *Castillon* pointing towards *Beaumont*, an old walled Town, which the Enemy quitted upon the approach of a Detachment His Majesty sent out the night before to possess themselves of that place. The Duke of *Luxembourg*, as we are informed by Deserters, sto d upon a Hill near *Walcourt* to observe our march, and commended the excellent order of it, keeping his Troops close within their Camp, without offering to give us the least disturbance. Yesterday about 4 in the morning the French began to move, but it was only to alter the front of their Army, their right Wing being now towards *Philipville*, and their left towards *Cerff Fontaine*; The two Armies lie almost in sight of each other, but are parted by two great Detiles, and the Enemy have besides done all they can to secure their Camp. The same day we came hither, about 40 French Horse, not knowing that *Beaumont* was in our hands, entered into the Town, and were all made Prisoners. Yesterday 10 Deserters, whereof one was a Lieutenant, came over to us from *Philipville*. The Enemy have likewise quitted *La Bassere*. This morning Major-General *Kirke*, and Mr. *Poley* Their Majesties Envoy Extraordinary to the Duke of *Savoys*, arrived here from *England*.

Hague, August 10. The King marched on the 7th instant from *Gerpines* to *Court sur Heure*, within a League of *Beaumont*, into which place he has put a Garrison. The Enemy are retired nearer to *Philipville*, and have taken all the care imaginable to do post themselves, as that they may avoid a Battel. The Marquis de *Gastanaga* was encamped on the 8th near *Alost*, from whence he intended to march the next day towards the *Schelde*. The last Letters from *Vienno* tell us, that Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* was

marching towards the *Saure*, and that 'twas thought he would attack *Belgrade*, and that a Body of Imperial Troops, under the command of Colonel *Seelicke*, did duck up *Gre at Waradin*.

From on Board Their Majesties Ship the Britannia, about 50 Leagues W. S. W. of Ushant, July 31. We having taken several Vessels bound with Provisions to the French Fleet, and being informed by them, that their Rendezvous was about 60 Leagues W. or W. S. W. of *Ushant*, Admiral *Russell* directed his Course thither in search of the Enemy, but not finding them, we are returning towards *Ushant*.

Westminster, August 3. The Parliament met this day, and was by Commission again Prorogued to the 5th of *October* next.
