TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY.

#### By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Bart., Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and the Right Honourable the Earl of Lathom, the Lord Chamberlain, were in attendance on Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.
We, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of
Sheffield, humbly offer to Your Majesty our glad
and loyal welcome to this City.

We humbly thank Your Majesty for having been pleased to open our new Town Hall which, begun in the year 1891 during the mayoralty of the late Alderman Clegg, has now been completed during that of our present Mayor, the Duke of Norfolk.

We gratefully rejoice that this dedication of the home of our Municipal Government will for ever link Your Majesty's name with the history of this city, and through far off years will strengthen the bonds with which a grateful and ever growing loyalty shall bind the subjects to the Throne.

But we have a second and unique cause for our gladness to-day. It is our proud privilege to herald the outburst of thanksgiving with which the world-wide British Empire hails the unparalleled length of Your Majesty's Reign. More than a thousand years have rolled away since England became a Kingdom, but, during all those centuries, no Sovereign has worn the Crown so long as Your Majesty, or has seen such moral and material blessings conferred upon our country. How wondrous has been the history of these sixty happy years. Abroad, vast regions have been added to Your dominions, whole races and peoples have been gathered to Your sway, Your subjects have explored every Continent, and Your fing floats over every sea.

For while we glory in the undimmed lustre of Your Reign, we remember how heavy has been the cross of sorrow laid upon You, and how that sorrow has been graciously reflected in a deep and tender sympathy with the griefs of Your people. We devoutly thank Almighty God for His priceless gift to this Kingdom of such a Queen, wife and mother, and for His abounding mercy in sparing Her to us so long.

Several additions have been made to the original buildings, including a commodious and well arranged out-patients' department, and only a year ago an appeal was made for £20,000 to provide a new wing for ophthalmic wards and a separate house for the accommodation of the sisters and nurses. Through the success of the appeal these new buildings are now in course of construction, and it was our earnest hope when Your Majesty's intention to visit Sheffield was announced, that our long established charity might be honoured with the illustrious presence of our beloved Sovereign to lay a memorial stone of the Nurses' House.

Your Gracious Majesty's arrangements, however, not permitting of a personal visit to the Infirmary, we humbly beg that Your Majesty will, in consideration of its centenary and in commemoration of this Royal Visit to our city bestow a mark of Your Queenly favour, and signify that it is Your Majesty's pleasure that the Sheffield General Infirmary be henceforth known as the Sheffield Royal Infirmary. And we devoutly pray that Your Most Gracious Majesty may long be spared to reign over a peaceable and prosperous Empire, secure in the loyal affection of a contented

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, K G. May it please Your Royal Highness,

WE, the Chairman and Members of the Council of the Administrative County of London, desire to approach Your Royal Highness and to express to You our great appreciation of Your having undertaken, on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, the dedication of the Blackwall Tunnel to the public.

We gratefully recall that London is under a lasting obligation to Your Royal Highness for having declared most of the bridges which cross the River Thames within the Council's jurisdiction free from toll, thereby conferring a boon on the

people residing in the western districts.

The want of free communication to connect the two sides of the River Thames has long been felt by the inhabitants residing in the east and south-east districts of the Metropolis, and the tunnel which has just been completed is the first of the schemes which the Council propose to carry out in order to meet the pressing requirements of the public.

It is to us a source of much satisfaction to know that this great engineering work has been successfully completed. The formation of the Tunnel by means of compressed air has proved to the engineering and scientific world that the difficulties which are met with in sub-aqueous tunnelling can be overcome.

We feel sure that Your Royal Highness will be glad to learn that owing to the great care which has been taken for the protection of the workmen, the operations have been carried out with unusual freedom from serious accidents.

We are much gratified that the work has been finished in the Sixtieth year of Her Majesty's reign, and we anticipate that Her wish that it "will be of lasting benefit to the traffic of London" will be

fully realized.

In conclusion, we have to express our fervent hope that our much loved Sovereign may be spared to preside over the destinies of Her vast Empire for many years, and that You will express to Her our loyalty to Her Throne and Person.

We tender to Your Royal Highness our most hearty thanks for the great honour you have done us in opening this work to the public and to Your Royal Consort the Princess of Wales for having graced the cccasion with Her presence, and we pray that Your Royal Highnesses may continue to evince that interest which You have always taken in those matters which tend to promote the welfare of the capital of the Empire.

Wales and Myself to learn that, by reason of the great care taken for the protection of the workmen during the performance of their labours, the tunnelling operations have been carried out with unusual freedom from the serious accidents which, unhappily, so often attend enterprises of this and a like character; and I cannot refrain from observing that not the least of the glories of the reign of Her Majesty is the increased solicitude of the State for the protection of those whose lot it is to follow occupations involving hazard to life, limb, and health.

"Another noteworthy feature of the present reign which may fittingly be mentioned to day, is to be found in the many and great improvements which have been made in connection with our famous river. Old bridges have been freed from tolls; new bridges and ferries have been provided; noble embankments have been built, and to-day we witness the conclusion of another triumph of engineering skill and civic spirit.

"I thank you for your kind expressions towards the Princess and Myself, and I will not fail to convey to the Queen your message of loyalty to Her Majesty's Throne and Person.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may " be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong, with great advan-" tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may " in some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop if that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, "or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may "be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more "conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district,"
parochial or extra-parochial so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said "Archbishop for his consideration), describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, titles, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, " and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by " such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to " make an Order for carrying such scheme, or " modification thereof, as the case may be, into

And whereas the Right Reverend William Lord Bishop of Oxford hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the sixteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:-

"I William by Divine Permission Bishop of Oxford do in pursuance of Section 26 of the

United Property Owners' Conference at Pluralities Act 1838 hereby represent to your Grace as follows:-

"1. There is in the county of Buckingham in my diocese of Oxford the vicarage of Wendover the parish whereof contains a population according to the last census of two thousand and thirty-six.

"2. There is in the same county and diocese the perpetual curacy of Lee having a population according to the last census of one hundred and

nineteen.

"3. The net annual value of the vicarage of Wendover is one hundred and seventy-seven pounds twelve shillings and eleven pence and of the perpetual curacy of Lee eighty-seven pounds thirteen shillings and two pence and there is a residence house belonging to each of the benefices.

"4. There is a certain district of the parish of Wendover known as 'The Swanbottom District' the boundaries of which are well known and defined which is contiguous to the parish or perpetual curacy of Lee the nearest point of which district lies at a distance of two and three quarter miles from the parish church of Wendover, the centre of population three and a half miles distant and the extreme end of the district four and three eighths of a mile from such panish church. The point in the said district farthest from Lee Church is little more than a mile and a half from Lee Church and the centre of population less than a mile and the inhabitants of the said district are as a consequence in the habit of attending the parish church of Lec.

"5. It therefore appears to me that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act 1838 that the said district known as 'The Swanbottom District' may with advantage to the interests of religion be separated from the said parish and benefice of Wendover and be united and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish and benefice

"6. That in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the said Act I have prepared the following scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to patronage and rights of pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto of the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain as patron of, and of the Reverend Albert Smith as the incumbent of the benefice of Wendover, also of John Plaistowe of High Wycombe Bucks Esquire as patron and of the Reverend James Pownall Britton as incumbent of the said benefice of Lee I do hereby submit to your Grace to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied with such scheme you may certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows:-

"SCHEME. "That there shall be separated from the parish and benefice of Wendover and united and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish and benefice of Lee all that part of the said parish of Wendover which is known as 'The Swanbottom District' and which is shown on the Ordnance sheet or map hereto annexed and is thereon verged

"That the said separated district shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Lee and the incumbent of the said parish of Lee shall have exclusive cure of souls.

"That the inhabitants of the said separated

district shall be entitled in common with the parishioners of Lee to accommodation in the church of that parish and shall not be entitled to accommodation in any other church or chapel except nevertheless such person or persons (if any) who may possess a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in any other church or chapel and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That all fees offerings and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the church of the said parish of Lee and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice as shall arise or become payable within or in respect of the said separated portion of the said parish of Wendover shall belong to the incumbent of the

said benefice of Lee.

"That there shall be assigned and attached to the benefice of Lee the clear annual charge or sum of forty pounds charged upon and payable to the incumbent of the benefice of Lee out of the gross income of the benefice of Wendover. Provided nevertheless that in any and every year in which the payment of such annual sum of forty pounds from Wendover to Lee would have the effect of reducing the net income of the benefice of Wendover below the net income (including such payment of forty pounds) of the benefice of Lee then in any and every such year there shall be paid to the incumbent such part only of the said annual sum of forty pounds as shall be sufficient to make the net income of Lee for that year equal to the net income of Wendover for the same year.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said benefices or either of them.

"I John James Stewart Bishop of Worcester beg leave to represent to your Grace that the parish of Long Itchington in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester has belonging to and forming part of it a hamlet place or district known by the name of Stoney Thorpe the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined and are delineated in the accompanying plan and thereon coloured red and that the said hamlet adjoins the parish of Ufton in the same county and diocese.

"That the said hamlet or district of Stoney Thorpe contains according to the last census a population of forty or thereabouts and is distant two and a half miles from the parish church of Long Itchington and from the parish church of Ufton one and a half miles reckoning from the further boundary of the said hamlet or district.

"That the population of the parish of Long Itchington according to the last census is one thousand one hundred and three or thereabouts and the net annual value of the benefice of Long Itchington is two hundred and one pounds or thereabouts.

"That the population of the parish of Ufton according to the last census is two hundred and sixty-nine or thereabouts and the net annual value of the benefice of Ufton is one hundred and fiftyfive pounds or thereabouts.

"That there is no church or chapel within the said hamlet but the parish church of Ufton is in a situation and at a distance convenient to the population there and is adequate for their accommodation.

"That it appears to me that the said hamlet or district may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament 1st and 2nd Victoria chapter 106 and 2nd and 3rd Victoria; chapter 49 be advantageously separated from the said parish of Long Itchington and be annexed to the said parish of

Ufton for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing. the manner in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration may be made with justice to all parties interested and I submit the same to your Grace together. with the consents in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices of the said parishes to the intent that your Grace may if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme, certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed that the said hamlet or district of Stoney Thorpe shall be separated from the said parish of Long Itchington and be annexed to and united with the said parish of Ufton for ecclesiastical purposes. · ·

"That the Rector of Ufton shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said hamlet

or district.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said hamlet or district in the church of the said parish of Ufton and that the fees for all such offices and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice as shall arise or become payable within or in respect of the said hamlet or district, except the titles, tithe rentcharges thereof, compositions in li-u of tithes endowments and other annual payments, shall belong to the incumbent of the said parish of Ufton.

"That no change shall be made in regard to the glebe lands, tithes or tithe rentcharges, compositions in lieu of tithes, endowments or other annual payments of or belonging to the said

vicarage of Long Itchington.

"That the inhabitants of the said hamlet or district shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Ufton equally and in common with other parishioners of that parish and shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the church of Long Itchington except nevertheless any person or persons, if any, possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the said last-mentioned church and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Saint Mary, Streatham, commonly known as Saint Mary, Balham, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary Streatham otherwise Saint Mary Balham is vested in the rector or incumbent for the time being of the parish of Streatham, in the said county of Surrey, and in the said diocese of Rochester.

"And whereas the Reverend John Richard Nicholl Clerk in Holy Orders, and Honorary Canon of Rochester the present rector or incumbent of the said parish of Streatham is desirous that the whole advows on or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary Streatham, otherwise Saint Mary Balham now vested in him as aforesaid as such rector or incumbent should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Rochester.

"And whereas it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Mary Streatham otherwise Saint Mary Balham, which is hereinbe ore mentioned, and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or

exists, that is to say in the new parish of Saint Mary Streatham, otherwise Saint Mary Balham.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John Richard Nicholl, rector or incumbent of the said parish of Streatham, acting as such rector or incumbent (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Edward Stuart Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary Streatham otherwise Saint Mary, Balham, now vested in him the said John Richard Nicholl, as such rector or incumbent of the said parish of Streatham as aforesaid, shall be transferred from him the said John Richard Nicholl and from his successors rectors or incumbents of the said parish of Streatham to the said Edward Stuart Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward Stuart Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Wentworth Canning Blackett Beaumont (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Edgar Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Oswald in Lee with Saint Mary Bingfield now vested in the said Wentworth Canning Blackett Beaumont and his heirs and assigns as aforesaid shall be transferred from the said Wentworth Canning Blackett

Beaumont and from his heirs and assigns to the said Edgar Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle as such Bishop and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edgar Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

and income of the said benefice of Methley which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Methley is now full the Honourable and Reverend Philip Yorke Savile Clerk in Holy Orders being the incumbent rector thereof.

"And whereas a sum of ten thousand pounds local loans three pounds per centum per annum stock is (together with a further amount of the same stock) now standing in our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England to the credit of the said benefice of Methley.

"And whereas the said sum of stock produces an income of three hundred pounds per annum.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Henry Baron James of Hereford acting on behalf of Your Majesty as such Chancellor of Your Duchy of Lancaster as aforesaid (in testimony of which consent he has signed and scaled this scheme) and with the consent of the Bishops of the several dioceses within which the said benefice of Methley and the said other five benefices are respectively situate as aforesaid that is to say with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd Bishop of Ripon and of the Right Reverend John Wogan Bishop of Saint Alban's and of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Norwich and of the Right Reverend Charles John Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof the said four Bishops have respectively signed this scheme and sealed the same with their respective episcopal

"We the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice of Methley shall from whatsoever cause be next voided the said sum of ten thousand pounds local loans three pounds per centum per annum stock shall cease to be held by us to the credit of the said benefice of Methley and shall be held by us upon the trusts following that is to say :-- Upon trust as to the sum of one thousand six hundred and sixtysix pounds thirteen shillings and four pence part thereof for the incumbent of the said benefice of Easthorpe otherwise East Thorpe and his successors and as to the sum of three thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence other part thereof for the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Andrew with Saint Mary and Saint Nicholas Hertford and his successors and as to the sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence other part thereof for the incumbent of the said benefice of Beeston Regis and his successors and as to the sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence other part thereof for the incumbent of the said benefice of Trimingham and his successors and as to the sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence other and remaining part thereof for the incumbent of the said benefice of Poole Keynes and his successors and that the dividends from time to time accruing on such stock or portions of stock shall be paid by us to the repective incumbents of the said five lastly mentioned benefices and to their successors.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing heroin contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts

or of any or either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said several dioceses of Ripon Saint Alban's Norwich and Gloucester and Bristol.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Holmside in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham and to be annexed to the new parish of Beamish in the same county and diocese being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Holmside which is bounded upon the north-west and upon the east by the said new parish of Beamish and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Beamish from the new parish of Holmside aforesaid at the middle of the western end of the bridge which carries the Pontop and South Shields Branch Line of the North-Eastern Railway over South-moor-lane and extending thence first south-west-ward and then westward along the middle of the

said line of railway for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses Shieldrow-lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Holmside from the new parish of Beamish aforesaid.'

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented;

And in the other parts of the churchyard, which were added in one thousand eight hundred and forty-five and one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, except as

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-fifth day of June next:

HEREAS Archibald Bence Bence-Jones Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, duly appointed as Commissioner for the purposes of the Municipal Corporations Acts 1882-1893 has transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State his scheme in the following terms:-

"BOROUGH OF REIGATE.

"WHEREAS by section thirty of 'The Municipal Corporations Act 1882' amended by 'The (b.) In such earthen graves now existing Municipal Corporations Act 1893' it is provided as can be opened to the depth of five feet that if the Council of a borough agree to petition and the Council thereupon petition the Queen for the division of the borough into wards or for the alteration of the number and boundaries of its wards it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to fix the number of wards into which the borough shall be divided. And where the Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards and apportioning the Councillors among them. And if Her Majesty in Council does not approve the scheme as originally prepared by the Commissioner it shall nevertheless be published in the London Gazette and shall be in force for the purposes of any municipal election until Her Majesty in Council on further information and report from the Commissioner definitely approves a scheme in that behalf.

"And whereas a scheme dated the twentyfourth day of July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six was duly prepared for the borough of Reigate by Archibald Bence Bence-Jones Barrister-at-Law a Commissioner for determining the boundaries of the wards of the borough of Reigate and for apportioning Councillors thereto and was duly transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State and was published in the London Gazette dated the eighteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-

"And whereas Her Majesty by the advice of Her Privy Council at the Court at Osborne House Isle of Wight on the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six present the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty did not approve the said scheme for the borough of Reigate and in order to give full force and validity to the said scheme as directed by the hereinbefore, recited Municipal Corporations Acts 1882-1893 the said scheme was published in the London Gazette as aforesaid.

"And whereas such further inquiry and report have been held and made as aforesaid and certain alterations in the said scheme have been found desirable so far as concerns the boundaries of the wards of the said borough but not as to the apportionment of the Councillors among the said wards.

"Now therefore I the said Archibald Bence Bence-Jones the Commissioner appointed by the Secretary of State to originally prepare the said scheme for the borough of Reigate as aforesaid do hereby declare that this is my scheme so amended as aforesaid for determining the boundaries of the wards of the said borough of Reigate and I hereby fix and determine that the boundaries of the said wards shall be as follows namely:-

"North-West Ward.

- 2. a. Small channels.—In the smaller channels the colour and topmark of the buoy or perch indicates the side of the channel on which it is
- b. The starboard side of the channel is marked by buoys or perches, painted red, and surmounted by one or two brooms.
- c. The port side of the channel is marked by buoys or perches, painted white, and surmounted by one or two straw wisps.
- d. Middle grounds and dangers that may be passed on either side are marked by buoys or perches, painted red and white in stripes, and sur-mounted by a broom over a straw wisp.
- e. Distinguishing marks are painted red and white in stripes, and surmounted by a red and white striped ball.

3. a. Application of System.—The starboard side of a fairway is that which is on the starboard side of a vessel when entering, and the port side that which is on the port side.

b. In the Skagerrak, the Kattegat, the Sound, the Great Belt, and the Little Belt, a vessel is said to be entering the channel when proceeding from the North Sea towards a Danish harbour or

to the Baltic.

c. In land-locked flords and inlets to a port or roadstead, a vessel is said to be entering when
