No. 356.—BALTIC ENTRANCE.

Zealand (Sjælland) Sunken Rock North-Eastward of Spotsbjerg.

THE Danish Government has given notice, dated 9th June, 1897, of the existence of a pinnacle rock, with a depth of 16 feet on it, and 5 fathoms around, in a position with Spotsbjerg Lighthouse bearing S. 37° W., distant 1½ miles.

Approximate position, lat. 55° 59' 50" N., long. 11° 52' 40" E.

No. 357.—FRANCE—WEST COAST.

Light on North Side of Entrance to Port Aberildut.

THE French Government has given notice that, on 15th June, 1897, a light would be exhibited on the northern side of the entrance to Port Aberildut (Laberildut):—

Port Aberildut Light is a catoptric fixed light, showing the following sectors:—white from S. 81° E. to S. 77° E., red from S. 77° E. to S. 75° E., and obscured in other directions.

It is elevated 35 feet above high water, 13 feet above the ground; illuminating power of the white light 86 becs Carcel (860 candles), of the red light 17 becs Carcel (170 candles), and in clear weather the white light will be visible 11 miles, and the red light 9 miles.

The lighthouse, constructed of masonry, is rectangular in section.

Approximate position, lat. 48° 28' 20" N., long. 4° 45' 35" E.
