To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the Free and Accepted Masons of Ireland in our Grand Lodge assembled, venture with the most profound and loyal respect to tender to Your Majesty our congratulations upon the completion of the Sixtieth Year of Your glorious Reign.

We feel that we are specially entitled to approach Your Majesty upon such an eventful occasion, inasmuch as our Order has not only numbered amongst its members several of Your Majesty's Royal Ancestors, but we have also the privilege of claiming at present as belonging to our craft many of Your Majesty's descendants.

The school for the orphan daughters of members of the Masonic order has grown and prospered, and instead of accommodating 15 girls as it did in 1837, there are now 100, who are trained to be good and useful subjects of Your Majesty.

A school has also been founded for the orphan sons of Masons, and now maintains and educates 80 boys. And in commemoration of the Fiftieth Year of Your Majesty's Reign in 1887, a fund was started for the providing of pensions for brethren or widows who from old age or infirmity are unable any longer to provide for themselves.

In conclusion, we earnestly pray that the Great God of the Universe from whom all good things do come may continue to pour down upon Your Majesty and Your Royal Family the dew of His
