THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1894.
 ROWLEY REGIS WAKE.

THE Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice, that by Memorial, dated the 21st June, 1897, a representation has been duly made to him by the Rowley Regis Urban District Council, that a Fair, locally known as the Rowley Regis Wake, has been annually held on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in the week commencing with the Sunday next following the 11th day of September in each year, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that such Fair should in future be held on the first Monday and the next following Tuesday and Wednesday in August in each year.

On the 28th day of August, 1897, the Secretary of State will take such representation into consideration, and any person who may desire to

The Order described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1896 and the Order described in the Schedule to this Order before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, those Orders before the commencement of this Order.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.
