Registration of Births and Deaths.

NOTICE is hereby given that in pursuance of the provisions of the twenty-first section of an Act passed in the thirty-eighth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "The Births and Deaths Registration Act, 1874," I, Sir Brydges Powell Henniker, Bart., Registrar-General of Births, Deaths, and Marriages in England, have, with the sanction of the Local Government Board, ordered and declared that on and after the first day of November next, (1) Hull Registration District shall be re-divided into two Sub-Districts by a boundary line starting from the northern boundary of the District in Spring Bank, and continued southward along the centre of Park-street, Walker-street, and St. James-street, and thence by an imaginary line across the Docks until it reaches the River Humber; (2) that all that portion of the District lying to the east of such boundary line shall constitute and be known as Humber Sub-District; and (3) that the remainder of the District lying west of such boundary line shall constitute and be known as Myton Sub-District.—Witness my hand this 1st day of October, 1897.
