

don, Clerk in Holy Orders, of the said Francis Augustus Bevan, and of John Deacon of No. 20 Birch-lane in the said city Banker (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Kilburn, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Kilburn, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Paul, Kilburn, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Kilburn.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Kilburn, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, Kilburn, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, which is bounded upon the north-east by the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Mary, Kilburn, (including the hereinafter described portion thereof), in the said county and diocese and upon all other sides, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, Kilburn, from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Kilburn, aforesaid at a point in the middle of High-road, Kilburn, opposite to the north-eastern end of the wall which divides the shop and premises numbered 117 High-road, Kilburn, from the house and premises numbered 1, Kilburn-square, and extending thence south-westward and in a straight line for a distance of half a chain or thereabouts to the said wall and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward, and then again south-westward along the said wall for a distance of three-quarters of a chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the north-eastern boundary of the house and premises numbered 2 Kilburn-square, and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-eastern boundary of the houses and premises numbered respectively 2 as aforesaid 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 Kilburn-square for a distance of one chain and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-western boundary of the said house and premises numbered 7 Kilburn-square as aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of three-quarters of a chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-eastern boundary of the houses and premises numbered respectively 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 Kilburn-square and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-western boundary of the said house and premises numbered 14 Kilburn-square as aforesaid

and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of three-quarters of a chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-eastern boundary of the house and premises situate on the south-western side of Kilburn-square aforesaid and called or known as Clifton House, and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of three-quarters of a chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the south-western boundary of the last-mentioned house and premises and of the house and premises (including the tennis ground) also situate on the said south-western side of Kilburn-square and called or known as Fairlight House and extending thence that is to say from the last described point of junction north-westward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the north-western boundary of the said tennis ground and of the houses and premises numbered respectively 14A, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22 Kilburn-square, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the boundary at the backs of the houses and premises numbered respectively 23 and 24 Kilburn-square and extending thence generally eastward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the north-eastern boundary of the said house and premises numbered 24 Kilburn-square as aforesaid and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of half a chain or thereabouts to its junction with the wall which divides the house and premises numbered 123 High-road, Kilburn, from the house and premises numbered 121 High-road, Kilburn, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of twenty-six yards or thereabouts to a point on the south-western side of High-road, Kilburn aforesaid, and continuing thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of half a chain or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the last-named road upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Kilburn from the new parish of Saint Mary Kilburn aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Kilburn, which is bounded upon the south-west partly by the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Kilburn (including the above described portion thereof) and partly by the new parish of Christ Church Brondesbury in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint James, West Hampstead, in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-east and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James, West Hampstead from the new parish of Saint Mary, Kilburn, aforesaid at the point where the road called or known as Messina-avenue joins Kingsgate-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Quex-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Mutrix-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Birchington-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle
