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Rome, August 4.

THE Pope has declared, that he will give publick Audience the first Monday in every Month to all persons who have any Complaints to make to him, which he begun on the 30th past. The same day the Cardinal *Spinola de St. Cecilia* resigned the Government of this City, and his Successor Signior *Gio. Batista Spinola* took possession of it; The *Sbirri's* are continually passing through the Ambassadors Quarters without any opposition, the Pope being resolved to suppress those Privileges, which have given so much disturbance to his Predecessors. On Wednesday last the Prince *de Liechtenstein*, the Emperor's Ambassador Extraordinary, had Audience of the Pope, to whom he presented a Letter from his Imperial Majesty, congratulating his Promotion to the Papal Chair. The French Cardinals continue their Conferences, in order to find out Expedients for the adjusting the Differences between this Court and France.

Venice, August 10. This week arrived here a Vessel from *Constantinople*; She parted from thence on the 3d of the last Month, and on the 4th met the Captain-Bassa with the Turkish Fleet near the *Dardanelles*, where she was detained 8 days. On the 12th the Captain-Bassa, upon advice that the Venetians had plundered and burnt several places on the Island of *Metalina*, took his Course that way with 35 Gallies, after having put on board them 2000 Men taken out of 9 Turkish and 3 *Tripoli* Men of War, which were before so ill mann'd, as to render them unfit for Service this Summer.

Lemberg, July 26. The Crown-General went from hence the last week to the Army, which being ioyned by the Forces of *Lithuania*, and making together about 24000 Men, decamped on the 22d instant, and marched towards the Frontiers of *Moldavia*. The King of Poland seems still resolved to Head the Army himself, and the Discourse continues of his design to detach 6000 Horse towards *Transylvania*, to joyn the Imperial Forces that are to act on that side this Summer, especially if it be true, that the Chan of *Tartary* is marched with a great Body of his Troops towards *Hungary*, which the last advices from *Moldavia* and *Valachia* do all make mention of. We hear likewise, that the Hospodar of *Valachia* has promised to joyn his Forces with those of the

Turks, but that the Hospodar of *Moldavia* has declared, that he cannot spare his, having himself occasion for them to defend his Country. The last Letters from *Moscovy* give an account, that the Czars Forces had taken a Fortrets on the Frontiers of the *Krimea*, in which there was a Turkish Garison, and that they had afterwards advanced farther into the Enemies Country.

From the Imperial Camp near Salankemen, August 4. Prince *Lewis* having received advice, that the Ottoman Army had passed the *Save*, with design, as they gave out, to fight him, was willing to improve the opportunity that seem'd to be offer'd of coming to Action with them, and therefore decamped yesterday from *Peter Vradin*, after giving the necessary Orders for maintaining the Communication with *Upper Hungary*, and advanced to this place, which is about 4 Leagues from *Belgrade*. But the Parties and Spies that were sent out to get Intelligence of the Enemies motions, brought us word this morning, that upon the news of our march they had in great haste repass'd the *Save*, breaking down the Bridges behind them, and that the Grand Visier was retired to *Belgrade*, on pretence of holding there a great Council of War, to which he had summoned *Teckley* and all the principal Commanders of the Turkish Forces. It's said, that we shall march from hence to morrow, nearer to the *Save*.

Vienna, August 16. Though there has already been published, an account of the Death of Sultan *Solyman*, and the Advancement of his Brother *Achmet* to the Ottoman Throne, yet the following Relation thereof, which comes from a good hand in *Turkey*, under the date of the 5th. of the last Month, may not be unacceptable to those that are curious to know the most remarkable particulars of so considerable a piece of News.

The Grand Visier preparing to depart from *Constantinople* towards *Hungary*, determined to leave the Sultan (who was ill of a Dropsey) behind him; but understanding from the Physicians that his Disease was incurable, he summoned the Mufti, Cadeleschiers, and chief of the Divan, to consult and advise whom they should Exalt to the Throne after the Death of *Solyman*; Most of these having been concerned in the Deposition of *Mahomet*, were for the Promotion of *Achmet*, a second Brother, and the youngest Son of Sultan *Ibrahim*, who having

ving been all his life a Prisoner, had no Experience, and was therefore likely to consign the whole Government to them; But several other Bassa's and great Men, who were not called to this Council, publishing the good Qualities and Warlike Disposition of *Mustapha*, (Son to the late deposed *Mahomet*;) endeavoured to gain a Party for him, as soon as occasion should offer, which their design coming to the Grand Visier's knowledge, he by means of the Musti, and other Creatures of his, so insinuated into the principal of them, that he discovered their whole Intrigue, and the Contrivers of it, some of which he privately put to death, others he banished to *Rhodes*, *Cyprus*, or *Lemnos*, and to dispersed the Cabal, among whom was an Aga of the Janisaries, and a black Eunuch of the Seraglio. But still doubting, least if the Grand Signior died at *Constantinople*, some Tumult or Insurrection of the People and Soldiers might follow, he resolved to bring him to *Adrianople*, where he could better dispose Affairs, and put his designs in execution; Being arrived at *Adrianople*, and informed by the Physicians that the Grand Signior could not hold out many days longer, he was still in some apprehension, least the Troops he had there with him might not (knowing their strength) pretend to set up a Sultan of their own liking contrary to his intention, so after 8 days stay there he marched forward with the Camp towards *Philippopolis*, where he resolved to wait for advice; In the mean time (*June 22.*) Sultan *Sojman* died, and the same day, as the Grand Visier had before ordered, the Musti, Caimacan, and Bassa's of the Divan, raised his younger Brother *Achmet* to the Throne without the least stir or tumult; What the Grand Visier most feared next was, lest the Army upon the news thereof should mutiny for their usual Donative at the beginning of every Reign, which he was yet in no condition to pay them, however with 3000 Purles at present, and a promise of the whole with Interest at the end of the Campaign, the Soldiers seem to be satisfied; But every one perceives, that if the Grand Visier does not succeed this Campaign, both he and his new Sultan are infallibly lost, which may prove a powerful Argument to incline him to a Peace. There is no Preparation made this year for the *Morax*, nor against the *Poles*, their whole Force is employed in *Hungary*, which is not very considerable neither, and is mostly composed of raw undisciplined Men.

Bil-Hington, Aug. 21. On Friday last came in here 4 Dutch Men of War from 24 to 30 Guns each, with about 150 Sail of Fishing-Busses. On Saturday passed by a great Fleet of Laden Colliers, under the Convoy of three of their Majesties Ships. On Sunday 2 Dutch Men of War more came into this Bay.

Plimouth, August 23. The Ships that lately arrived here from *Antegoa*, with several other homeward-bound Merchant Men, that were in this Port, failed from hence yesterday with their Convoy for the *Downes*. The same day failed their Majesties Ships the *Deptford* and the *St. Johns*, with several Ships under their Convoy, for *Ireland*. This day came in here the *Suzanna* and *Mary* from *Bilboa*.

Torbay, August 24. The Fleet under the command of Admiral *Russell* having taken on board Water and Provisions, are now ready to sail, and will go to Sea again with the first opportunity of Wind and Weather, in pursuance of Her Majesties Orders.

Deale, August 24. Yesterday in the afternoon Colonel *Aylmer* came into the *Downes* with several of their Majesties Ships from cruising off of *Dunkirk*. The *Royal Charles*, who arrived here on the 22d with the *Newcastle* and the *Greenwich* from *Portsmouth*, is gone for the River to be rebuilt.
