To alter, amend, or repeal Section 26 of the Halifax Corporation Waterworks and Improvement Act, 1868, and to provide that the regulations made, and to be made under the authority of that section, shall be subject to the approval of the Local Government Board, and to enable the Corporation to impose a penalty or penalties in case of the breach of

any such regulations.

To enable the Corporation to make, lay down, form, and maintain all or some of the tramways hereinafter described, with all necessary and proper rails, plates, sleepers, channels (including in that word, where used in this Notice, channels, passages, and tubes for ropes, cables, wires, and electric lines), junctions, turntables, turnouts, crossings, and passing places, stables, carriage houses, engine, boiler, and dynamo houses, sheds, buildings, engines, dynamos, works, and conveniences connected therewith respectively, and where in the description of any of the proposed tramways any distance is given with reference to any street which intersects or joins the streets in which the tramway is to be laid, the distance is to be taken as measured from the point at which lines drawn along the centres of the two streets, and continued, would intersect each other, and a point described as being opposite a street is to be taken (unless otherwise stated) as opposite the centre of the street.

The following are the tramways :--

Tramway No. 1.—Commencing in Hall End by a junction with the authorized tramway at the junction of Commercial-street and Hall End, passing thence along Hall End in a northerly direction, thence along Waterhouse-street, Broad-street, Northgate, North Bridge, Haley-hill, and Boothtown-road, and terminating in Boothtown-road at the borough boundary about sixty yards

south of the south corner of the Punch Bowl Inn.

Tramway No. 1 will be laid as a single line except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Northgate between points 33 yards and 99 yards respectively north of the junction of Northgate and Grove-street.

In Haley-hill between points 100 yards and 166 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Haley-hill and Poplar-street.

In Boothtown-road between points 18 yards and 84 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Boothtown-road and Rawson-street, and between points 186 yards and 252 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Boothtown-road and Ploughcroft-road.

Tramway No. 2, commencing in New Bank by a junction with Tramway No. 1 at the junction of North Bridge and Haley-hill, passing thence along New Bank, Godleyroad, and Godley-lane, and terminating in Godley-lane at the Borough boundary, about 70 yards south-west of the southwest corner of the Stump Cross Inn.

Tramway No. 2 will be laid as a single line except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:

In New Bank, between the point of junction of New Bank and Beacon Hill-road, and a point 66 yards east of that

In Godley-lane, between points 25 yards and 91 yards respectively, north-east of the junction of Godley-lane and Godley-road, between a point opposite the centre of the main entrance to Shibden Hall, and a point 66 yards south-west of that point, and between points 183 yards and 249 yards, respectively, south-west of the south-west corner of the Stump Cross Inn,

Tramway No. 3, commencing in Waterhouse-street, by a junction with Tramway No. 1, at a point 30 yards south of the junction of Waterhouse-street and Broad-street, passing thence along Waterhouse-street, Orange-street, Corporation-street, Lee Bridge-road, Lee Bridge, Lee Bank, Ovenden-road and Keighley-road, and terminating in Keighley-road 21 yards west of the junction of Keighley-road and

Whitehill-road.

Tramway No. 3 will be laid as a single line except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Corporation-street between the point of junction of Corporation-street and South Darley-street and a point 66 yards northwest of that point.

In Lee Bridge between points 10 yards and 76 yards respectively north-west of the centre of the Bridge, over the Hebble Brook known as Lee Bridge.

In Lee Bank between points 50 yards south-east of the junction of Wheatley-lane with Lee Bank, and 16 yards north-west of inch last marriaged point

such last mentioned point.

In Ovenden-road between points 145 yards and 211 yards respectively north of the junction of Ovenden-road and Lintelfield-street, and between points 63 yards and 129 yards respectively north of a point in Ovenden-road opposite the north-east corner of Athol-mount.

In Keighley-road between points 86 yards

Tramway No. 4, commencing in Hortonstreet by a junction with the authorized tramway in that street at the junction of Horton-street and Union-street, passing thence across Horton-street, along Unionstreet, Market-street, Woolshops, Northgate, and terminating in Northgate by a junction with Tramway No. 1, at the point of junction of Northgate and Broad-street.

Tramway No. 4 will be laid as a single line, except between the following points where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

it will be laid as a double line, namely:—
In Market-street between points, 46
yards and 112 yards respectively, north of
the junction of Market-street and Albionstreet.

Tramway No. 5 commencing in Crownstreet by a junction with the authorised tramway in that street, at a point opposite the north-east corner of Central-street, passing thence along Crown-street, St. James-road, and Pellon-lane, and terminating in Pellon-lane, at the junction of Pellon-lane and Spring Hall-lane.

Pellon-lane and Spring Hall-lane.

Tramway No. 5 will be laid as a single line except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Pellon-lane between the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Greenwood-street, and a point 66 yards north-west of such last-mentioned point between points 53 yards and 119 yards respectively north-west of the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Beech-street, between the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Haigh-street, and a point 66 yards north-west of such last-mentioned point, and between points 63 yards and 129 yards respectively west of the junction of Pellon-lane and Dyson-road.

Tramway No. 6, commencing in Pellon-lane, by a junction with Tramway No. 5 at a point 27 yards east of the termination of Tramway No. 5, passing thence along Spring Halllane, Warley-road, and terminating in King Cross-road, at the termination of the authorised tramway at King Cross.

Tramway No. 6 will be laid as a single line, except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Spring Hall-lane, between points 76 yards and 142 yards respectively southwest of the junction of Spring Hall-lane and Clay Pits-lane, and between points 13 yards and 79 yards respectively north-east of the junction of Spring Hall-lane and Warley-road.

In Warley-road, between points 193

In Warley-road, between points 193 yards and 259 yards respectively south-east of the junction of Warley-road and Parkinson-lane.

Tramway No. 7, commencing in Silver-street by a junction with the authorised tramway in Silver-street, at a point 143 yards from the commencement of such last-mentioned tramway, passing thence along Silverstreet, Cow Green, and St. James-road, and terminating in St. James-road at the junction of that road and Pellon-lane by a junction with Tramway No. 5. Tramway No. 7 will be laid as a single line, except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Cow Green between points 20 yards and 86 yards respectively north of the junction of Cow Green and Lister-lane.

Tramway No. 8, commencing in Wards End by a junction with the authorized tramway in Wards End at the junction of Wards End and Commercial-street, passing thence along Wards End, Commercial-street, Portland-place, Skircoat-road, Huddersfield-road, and Elland-road, and terminating in Elland-road at the borough boundary, where it crosses that road.

Tramway No. 8 will be laid as a single line, except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Wards End, Commercial-street, Portland-place, and Skircoat-road, between the commencement of the tramway and a point in Skircoat-road, 680 yards from such commencement.

In Huddersfield-road, between points 46 yards and 112 yards respectively, south of the junction of Huddersfield-road and Spring Hall-lane, between points 90 yards and 156 yards respectively, south-east of the junction of Huddersfield-road and Haigh-lane, between the point of junction of Huddersfield-road and Jubilee-road and a point 66 yards south of such last-mentioned point and between points 400 yards and 466 yards respectively, south of the junction of Huddersfield-road and Jubilee-road.

In Elland-road, between points 66 yards and 132 yards respectively, north-west of

the termination of the tramway.

Tramway No. 9, commencing in Huddersfield-road, by a junction with Tramway No. 8, at the junction of Huddersfield-road and Elland-road, passing thence along Stainland-road and terminating at the borough boundary, where it crosses the centre of the bridge carrying Stainland-road over the River Calder.

Tramway No. 9 will be laid as a single line, except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Stainland-road, between points 26 yards and 92 yards respectively north of

the termination of the tramway.

Tramway No. 10, commencing in Skircoatroad, at the junction of that road with Heath-road, by a junction with Tramway No. 8, passing thence along Heath-road and Skircoat Green-road, and terminating at Skircoat Green, 5 yards north of the Borough boundary, where it crosses the junction of Skircoat Green and Dudwelllane and New-lane.

Tramway No. 10 will be laid as a single line except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line, namely:—

In Heath-road, between points 20 yards and 86 yards respectively, north of the junction of Heath-road and Free School-lane.

In Skircoat Green-road, between points 57 yards and 123 yards respectively, south of the junction of Skircoat Green-road and Bath-road, between the point of junction of Skircoat Green-road and Dryclough-lane, and a point 66 yards south of such lastmentioned point and between points 23 yards and 89 yards respectively, north of the termination of the tramway.

Tramway No. 11, commencing in Heath-road by a junction with Tramway No. 10, at the junction of Heath-road and Free School-lane, passing thence along Free School-lane, Main-road north side Savile-park, Skircoat Moor-road, and terminating in King Cross-road by a junction with the authorised tramway in King Cross-road, 14 yards north-east of the termination of that tramway.

that tramway.

Tramway No. 11 will be laid as a single line except between the following points, where it will be laid as a double line,

namely:-

In Free School-lane, between points 60 yards and 126 yards respectively west of the junction of Free School-lane and Heath-street.

In Main-road north side Savile-park, between points 30 yards and 96 yards west of the junction of that road and Elmfieldterrace, and between points 120 yards and 186 yards respectively west of the junction

of that road and Ingham-street.

Tramway No. 12, commencing in Wards End by a junction with the authorized tramway in Wards End 30 yards south-east of the point of junction of Tramway No. 8 with such authorized tramway in Wards End, passing thence along Wards End in a south-westerly direction and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 8 on the south side of Wards End at a point on that Tramway 30 yards from its commencement.

Tramway No. 12 will be laid as a single line. Tramway No. 13 (a double line), commencing in Church-street at a point on the east side of Church-street at its junction with the approach road to the Great Northern and Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Station, passing thence in a westerly direction across Church-street, and terminating by a junction with the authorized tramway in Horton-street at the commencement of such tramway.

Tramway No. 14 (a single line), commencing in Church-street at the junction of Church-street and Square-road, passing thence in a south-westerly direction along Church-street, and terminating by a junction with the authorized tramway in Horton-street at the commencement of such

tramway.

The whole of the foregoing tramways will be situate in the parish and borough of Halifax.

In the following instances the said tramways will be laid along the several streets and roads hereinafter mentioned so that for a distance of 30 feet or upwards a less space than 9 feet 6 inches will intervene between the outside of the footpath on the sides hereinafter mentioned of the streets or roads, and the nearest rail of the tramways:—

Tramway No. 1.

In Broad-street, on the south side thereof, between points 166 yards and 280 yards respectively north-east of the commence-

ment of the tramway.

In Haley-hill, on the south-west side thereof, between points 30 yards and 273 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Haley-hill and New-bank, and on the west side, between points 100 yards and 166 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Haley-hill and Poplar-street.

In Boothtown-road, on the west side, between points 18 yards and 84 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Boothtown-

road and Rawson-street, and between points 186 yards and 252 yards north-west of the junction of Boothtown-road and Plough-croft-road.

Tramway No. 2.

In New-bank, on the south side thereof, between points 150 yards and 266 yards respectively east of the commencement of the tramway, and between points 10 yards and 76 yards respectively east of the junction of New-bank and Beacon Hill-road.

Tramway No. 3.

In Orange-street, on the east side thereof, between points 33 yards and 113 yards respectively from the commencement of the tramway.

In Lee Bridge-road, on the north-east side thereof, between points 570 yards and 830 yards respectively from the commencement

of the tramway.

In Lee-bank, on the north-east side thereof, between points 20 yards and 560 yards north-west from the junction of Lee-bank

and Shroggs-road.

In Ovenden-road, on the west side thereof, between points 110 yards and 700 yards respectively from the junction of Ovenden-road and Wheatley-lane; on the east side thereof, between points 145 yards and 211 yards respectively from the junction of Ovenden-road and Lintelfield-street; on the west-side thereof, between points 70 yards and 133 yards respectively south of the centre of Ovenden-road, opposite the north-east corner of Athol-mount and between points 70 yards and 133 yards respectively north of the centre of Ovenden-road, opposite the north-east corner of Athol-mount; and on the east side thereof, between points 64 yards and 117 yards respectively northwest of the centre of Ovenden-road, opposite the north-east corner of Athol-mount.

Tramway No. 4.
In Woolshops, on the west side thereof, between points 12 yards and 30 yards respectively north of the junction of Market-

street and Russell-street.

Tramway No. 5.

On the south-west side of Pellon-lane, between points 86 yards and 617 yards from the commencement of the tramway, and on the north-east side thereof between the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Greenwood-street, and a point 66 yards north-west of such last-mentioned point, between points 53 yards and 119 yards respectively north-west of the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Beech-street, and between the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Haigh-street and a point 66 yards north-west of such last-mentioned point, and on the south-west side of Pellon-lane between points 63 yards and 129 yards respectively west of the junction of Pellon-lane and Dyson-road.

Tramway No. 8.

In Portland-place, on the east and west sides thereof, from the junction of Commercial-street and St. John's-lane, and the junction of Portland-place and Prescott-street.

Tramway No. 10.

In Skircoat Green-road, on the west side thereof, between points 180 yards and 200 yards respectively north of the termination of the tramway.

Tramway No. 11.

In Skircoat Moor-road on the north-east side thereof, between points 16 yards and 50 yards respectively south-east of the No. 26911.

junction of Skircoat Moor-road and Cork, street.

. The tramways are intended to be constructed to a gauge of 3 feet and 6 inches, and it is not intended to run thereon carriages or trucks

adapted for use on railways.

The motive power to be used on the intended tramways is animal, steam, compressed air, gas or oil, and haulage by means of wire or rope cables placed underground, and worked by stationary engines, electric energy applied by means of motors in the engines or carriages or trucks, or generated at stations and communicated by means of electric lines either in or

under the ground or overhead.

To empower the Corporation to lay down construct, erect, and maintain in, under, or over the surface of any street, road, or place, and to attach to any house and building such posts, brackets, conductors, wires, tubes, mains, plates, cables, ropes, and apparatus, and to make and maintain such openings and ways in, on, or under any such surface as may be necessary or convenient, either for the actual working of the said intended tramways, or for providing access to or in connection with any engines, machinery, or apparatus.

To enable the Corporation to acquire, hold, and use patent and other rights and licenses.

To empower the Corporation to make from time to time such crossings, passing-places, sidings, loops, junctions, and other works in addition to those specified herein as may be necessary or convenient to the efficient working of the intended tramways, or any of them, or for affording access to the stables, carriage-houses, engine-houses, stations, buildings, sheds, and works or lands of the Corporation or their lessees.

To make provision for taking up, altering the position of and relaying any tramways of the Corporation in the event of the roads or streets in which they are laid being widened.

To empower the Corporation to substitute double lines for single or interlacing lines, single lines for double or interlacing lines, and interlacing lines for double or single lines on

any of their tramways.

To empower the Corporation from time to time, when by reason of the execution of any work in, or the alteration of any street, road, highway, or thoroughfare in which any tramway shall be laid, it is necessary or expedient so to do, to alter, remove, or discontinue all or any of such tramway, and to make and lay down temporarily, in the same or any adjacent street, road, highway, or thoroughfare, a substituted tramway or substituted tramways.

To provide for the repair by the Corporation, their lessees, or other persons, bodies or authorities of the tramways of the Corporation, of the conductors, posts, brackets, wires, tubes, mains, plates, cables, ropes, apparatus, openings, and ways for working the same, and of any streets, roads, highways or thoroughfares in which any of such tramways may for the time being be laid, and for the use or disposition of any materials or things found in the construction or repair of any of such tramways.

To empower the Corporation to place or run carriages on, and to work, and to demand and take tolls, rates and charges in respect of any tramways for the time being belonging to them, and to provide such stables, buildings, carriages, trucks, harness, engines, machinery, apparatus, horses, steam, cable, electric and other plant, appliances and conveniences as may be requisite or expedient for the convenient working or user

of the said tramways by any motive power before mentioned, and to sell, exchange, or dispose of such of the before mentioned articles and things as from time to time may no longer be required and for the purposes aforesaid to vary or repeal the provisions of the Tramways Act, 1870.

To make provision for any deficiency in the revenues or receipts arising from the working by the Corporation of the tramways undertaking being made good out of the borough fund and

borough rate.

To authorise the Corporation and their lessees or other the person or persons working the tramways of the Corporation to levy tolls, rates, and charges for the use thereof by carriages passing along the same, and for the conveyance of passengers, goods, minerals, animals, mer-chandise and other traffic upon the same, and to confer exemptions from tolls, rates, and charges.

To authorize the Corporation and any corporation, person, company, or body, from time to time, to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements for and in relation to the working, lease, sale, and purchase of the whole or any part of the said tramways, in consideration of such gross sum or sums, rent or rents, and generally upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed on between the contracting or agreeing parties, or as the Bill may define, or as Parliament may prescribe, and to confirm any such contracts and agreements which may have been or may be entered into prior to the passing of the intended Act.

To make provision for preventing injury to any tramways belonging to, or worked, or used by the Corporation, and to any works, carriages, and electric or other machinery or apparatus connected therewith, and danger to passengers thereon, and if and so far as may be thought fit to extend and apply to injuries, to interference with and obstruction of the tramways, works, and property of the Corporation all or any of the provisions of the Malicious Damage Act, 1861, and to impose in respect of any such injury, interference, or obstruction any punishment or penalty prescribed by that Act, or such other punishment or penalty as the intended

Act may define.

To enable the Corporation for all or any of the purposes of the intended Act to purchase, take on lease, or otherwise acquire lands.and houses by agreement and to take easements over lands and houses, and to erect and to hold offices, houses, buildings, waiting rooms, and other conveniences on any such lands.

To provide that the intended tramways, lands and works shall, for the purposes of tolls, rates, fares, and charges and for all purposes whatso-ever, unless otherwise provided by the intended Act be deemed part of the tramway undertaking

of the Corporation.

To authorise the Corporation to make the following street widenings and improvements, all situate within the parish and borough of Halifax, in the West Riding of the county of York (that is to say):-

Street Work No. 1.

A new street 60 feet in width throughout, commencing in Horton-street at the junction of that street with Church-street, proceeding thence in a straight line throughout its whole length in a north-westerly direction, crossing the street known as Blackledge, thence entering the south-east corner of the Market-hall, proceeding thence across that hall and passing out at the north-west corner thereof across the fasting yard, Lower Market, and slaughter borough.

house of the Corporation, and thence into Market-street, and terminating north-easterly side of that street opposite its junction with Russell-street. length of such new street will be 331 yards or thereabouts.

Street Work No. 2.

To increase the width of Clover Hill-walk from its existing width of 9 feet to 10 feet between points 80 yards and 240 yards or thereabouts, measured respectively in a southerly direction from the junction of Well Head-lane and Love-lane, and to alter the gradient of such walk between those points respectively from the existing

gradient to a gradient of 1 in 1672.

A new footpath 10 feet in width commencing at such last-mentioned point in Clover Hillwalk 240 yards from the junction of Well Head-lane and Love-lane, proceeding thence in a straight line in a southerly direction for a distance of 50 yards or thereabouts to the junction of Clover Hill-walk and Clover Hill-road, and terminating at such

last-mentioned point.

To stop up Clover Hill-walk from the aforesaid point 240 yards or thereabouts from the junction of Well Head-lane and Lovelane to the termination of such walk at its

junction with Clover Hill-road.

A new occupation road commencing at the aforesaid point in Clover Hill-walk 80 yards or thereabouts from the junction of Well Head-lane and Love-lane, thence proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 170 yards or thereabouts, to the occupation road leading from Clover Hill-walk, in a westerly direction to certain fields belonging or reputed to belong to Mrs. Doherty Waterhouse, and terminating in such lastmentioned occupation road, on the northerly side thereof, 32 yards or thereabouts west of the junction of such occupation road and Clover Hill-walk.

Street Work No. 3.

A widening of King Cross-street on the south-east side thereof, commencing at the junction of that street with Regent-street, and terminating at a point 102 feet or thereabouts, measured in a south-westerly direction from Regent-street. Street Work No. 4.

A widening of Pellon-lane and Dungeonstreet, at the corner of those streets, commencing at a point on the south-west side of Pellon-lane, 85 feet, or thereabouts, from the point of junction of Pellon-lane and Dungeon-street, and terminating in Dungeon-street, on the easterly side of that street, 80 feet, or thereabouts, from such last-mentioned point of junction.

Street Work No. 5.

A widening of Southgate on the east side thereof, commencing at the junction of Southgate with Albion-street and terminating at a point, 90 feet, or thereabouts, measured in a southerly direction from such last-mentioned street.

To enable the Corporation to purchase by compulsion or agreement or to take on lease any lands, houses and buildings for the purposes of the intended street widenings and improvements, and in connection with such widenings, improvements and other the purposes of the intended Act, to acquire by compulsion or agreement rights or easements in, on, or connected with any lands, houses or buildings in the To empower the Corporation to deviate laterally and vertically from the lines and levels of all or any of the intended works, as shown upon the plans and sections to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, or as specified in the Bill, and to make all such subsidiary works, and to temporarily stop up such streets, and to alter the position of such tramways, wires, mains and pipes as may be necessary.

To authorise the Corporation to manufacture

To authorise the Corporation to manufacture and supply carburetted water gas within the limits within which they are now supplying, or are authorised to supply gas, and with that object to maintain, and from time to time improve, enlarge, alter, and renew, or discontinue the existing gas works of the Corporation.

To authorise the Corporation to purchase and acquire by agreement, and to hold additional lands, and to appropriate and utilise for the purposes last aforesaid, or other the purposes of their gas works undertaking, such lands when purchased, and certain lands already belonging to them. The lands so proposed to be acquired

or appropriated are as follows:-

A. A piece of land belonging to the Corporation situate on the east side of Charlestown-road, in the parish and borough of Halifax, containing an area of 5833 square yards or thereabouts bounded on the north by property belonging to the Charlestown Brick and Tile Company Limited, on the east partly by property belonging to the said Charlestown Brick and Tile Company Limited, partly by property belonging to the Trustees of Thomas Crabtree deceased, partly by property belonging to Mr. Thomas Ambler Wilson, and partly by Gas House-lane, on the south and west by Charlestown-road, aforesaid.

B. A piece of land situate at Stoney Royd, in the parish and borough of Halifax, belonging to the Corporation containing an area of 56,739 square yards or thereabouts, bounded on the north by the Halifax Corporation Goux Depôt and Yard, on the east partly by the Halifax Borough Cemetery, partly by the Borough Fever Hospital, and partly by land belonging to the Corporation, on the south by Whitegate, and on the west partly by Whitegate-road, and partly by the Canal of the Calder and Hebble Navigation.

To enable the Corporation in and upon the lands hereinbefore described, or some part or parts thereof, to construct, alter, enlarge, or, when necessary, remove buildings; apparatus, and works for the manufacture and storage of gas and coke, asphaltum, pitch, tar, ammoniacal liquor, and other refuse or residual products arising from the manufacture of gas and any matters producible therefrom, and dwellings for any persons employed in the said works, and to convert or manufacture coke, culm, asphaltum, pitch, tar, oil, ammoniacal liquor, and all refuse or residual products arising from the manufacture of gas by them, and any matters producible therefrom.

To enable the Corporation to supply gas gratuitously to any consumer or person for illuminations on extraordinary public occasions.

To make provisions for the inspecting, testing, and fixing of gas meters, pipes, and fittings in buildings, or from the outlet of any meter, before the owner or occupier of any such building or meter shall be entitled to demand a supply of gas, for the protection of the gas supply and the prevention of waste or misuse of gas.

To empower the Corporation to make further bye-laws and regulations with regard to the

supply of gas within their limits of gas supply, especially for and with respect to the laying and fixing of outlet pipes, pipes, fittings, and ap-

paratus.
