The Humble Address of the Chief Magistrates of England and Wales on the happy completion of the Sixtieth Year of Her Reign.

... May it please Your Majesty,

WE, the Chief Magistrates of the Cities and Towns of England and Wales, desire to present to Your Most Gracious Majesty our loyal and heartfelt congratulations on the completion of the Sixtieth Year of Your Majesty's beneficent Reign.

We are profoundly conscious of the deep and sympathetic concern Your Majesty has evinced for so many years in the health, comfort, and prosperity of Your Majesty's people; a concern which, in a constantly increasing degree, has attached the people to Your Majesty's Person and Family by the ties of an affection stronger and more enduring than the relations between a Sovereign and the people have hitherto attained. We pray that Your Majesty's beneficent Reign may long continue.

During this most progressive Sixty Years Epoch, in which the Arts and Sciences have found a development hitherto unknown, and Commerce has expanded its operations and enormously enhanced the National wealth, our Municipal Institutions have shared in the general welfare. In no previous period of our country's history has the self-government of our Cities and Towns been so efficient or its operations so salutary; never was the health and well-being of the great mass of Your Majesty's subjects so carefully sale-guarded, or their comfort more completely assured.

We venture to assure Your Majesty of our profound loyalty and reverence, and devoutly pray Almighty God that Your Majesty's health may long be preserved, that the Empire may for many years happily enjoy the benignant and

beneficent Royal influences by which it has been blessed during the last Sixty Years of its history.

THE Queen has been pleased, by Warrant under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, bearing date the 24th instant, to appoint William Pinder Eversley, Esq., Barrister-at-Law, to be Recorder of the Borough of Sudbury, in the room of the Honourable John Augustus de Grey, resigned.
