#### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY.

*By Her Majesty's Command,*

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

**W**HEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction in Persia :

And whereas it is expedient to amend "The Persia Order in Council, 1889" (in this Order referred to as "the Principal Order") :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Persia (Judicial Fees) Order in Council, 1898."

2. (a.) The Consul-General may, with the approval of the Secretary of State and concurrence of the Treasury, make rules imposing fees leviable in respect of any proceedings in, or processes out of, any Court established under the principal Order.

(b.) But the Court may in any case, if it thinks fit, on account of the poverty of a party, or for any other reason, dispense in whole or in part with the payment of any fee chargeable in respect of such matter.

(c.) The Court shall in every such case forthwith report the dispensation to the Consul-General, and he shall give such directions thereon as he thinks fit.

(d.) Nothing in this Order shall affect any Order in Council prescribing a table of fees to be taken by Consular officers; and, when a fee is taken under that Order, no fee shall be taken in respect of the same matter under any rules made in pursuance of this Order.

3. As from the time when any rules under this Order come into operation, Article 27 of the Principal Order, and the second Schedule thereto, shall be repealed, and any reference in that Order to the fees imposed by that Article shall be construed to apply to the fees that may be imposed by Rules under this Order.

**W**HEREAS by sub-section (one) of section two hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is provided that, where it appears to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given by the Government of any foreign country for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant-ships in that country, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that that section shall apply in the case of such foreign country, subject to any limitations, conditions, and qualifications contained in the Order :

And whereas it appears to Her Majesty that due facilities are given by the Government of Japan for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant-ships in that country :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the hereinbefore recited sub-section (one) of section two hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that the said section two hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," shall apply in the case of Japan.

And whereas the immediate operation of this Order is urgent, this Order shall come into operation forthwith, and shall be a *Provisional Order* within the meaning of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893."

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the law respecting the Office of County Coroner" it is, amongst other things enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the Justices of any County that such County should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said Justices in General or Quarter Sessions assembled to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such County as in that Act thereafter provided and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said Justices into consideration, and the Justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the Justices for that purpose touching such petition having due regard to

the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment and such other circumstances as shall appear to the Justices fit to be considered into carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof with the reasons upon which the petition is founded shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the Justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition certified under his hand to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty if She shall think fit with the advice of Her Privy Council after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty with the advice aforesaid shall seem expedient and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

And whereas by the Local Government Act, 1888, the powers and business of the said Justices in respect of the matters aforesaid in each county have been transferred to the Council of such county.

And whereas by an Order in Council made the twenty-fifth August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, under the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act, the county of Hertford was divided into six districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said Act, which said districts were named respectively, the Bishop's Stortford Coroner's District, the Hemel Hempstead Coroner's District, the Hertford Coroner's District, the Hitchin Coroner's District, the Royston Coroner's District, and the St. Alban's Coroner's District, which said districts comprised the several parishes and places, and had the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the Schedule thereto.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board made the eleventh June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 17) Act, 1895, session 2, the boundary between the counties of Buckingham and Hertford was altered, and the parish of Nettleden, and certain parts of the parish of Ivinghoe, ceased to form part of the administrative county of Buckingham, and were transferred to and now form part of the administrative county of Hertford, and certain portions of the said parish of Ivinghoe, and of the said parish of Nettleden, were united and constituted a new parish called the parish of Nettleden, and certain other portions of the said parish of Ivinghoe, and of the said parish of Nettleden were united and amalgamated with the parish of Little Gaddesden, and all the said portions of the parishes of Ivinghoe and Nettleden were by the said Provisional Order included in the Hemel Hempstead Coroner's District of the county of Hertford, subject to any alteration which might be made in that district.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board made the thirteenth June one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five

and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 1) Act 1896 the boundary between the counties of Cambridge and Hertford was altered and the parish of Royston (Cambs.) and such parts of the parishes of Bassingbourn, Kneesworth and Melbourn as were included in the North Royston Special Drainage District, ceased to be within the administrative county of Cambridge, and were transferred to and now form part of the administrative county of Hertford, and the said parish of Royston (Cambs.) became the parish of North Royston, and the said parts of the parishes of Bassingbourn, Kneesworth, and Melbourn, thereby added to the county of Hertford became separate parishes named respectively the parishes of South Bassingbourn, South Kneesworth, and South Melbourn, which said parishes together with the aforesaid parish of North Royston, were included in the Royston Coroner's District of the said county subject to any alteration which might be made in that district.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board made the eighteenth May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 13) Act, 1896, the boundary between the counties of Hertford and Middlesex was altered, and part of the rural district and parish of South Mimms ceased to form part of the administrative county of Middlesex, and was transferred to and now forms part of the administrative county of Hertford, and was amalgamated with the parish of South Mimms Urban, and included in the St. Alban's Coroner's District of the said county, subject to any alterations which might be made in that district.

And whereas by an Order of the Hertfordshire County Council dated the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, duly confirmed by the Local Government Board it was provided that the parishes of Royston (Herts), North Royston, South Bassingbourn, South Kneesworth, and South Melbourn, and so much of the parish of Therfield as forms part of the Special Drainage District of South Royston, should be formed into one parish to be called the parish of Royston.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board made the eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Order Confirmation (No. 10) Act, 1897, the boundary between the counties of Bedford and Hertford was altered, and the hamlet of Humberhoe and that part of the parish of Houghton Regis which was included in the Ecclesiastical District of St. John Markyate Street called in the said Order "The Beds transferred areas" ceased to be within the administrative county of Bedford and were transferred to and now form part of the administrative county of Hertford, and so much of the parish of Caddington as was not included in the said Ecclesiastical District and the whole of the parishes of Kensworth and Studham ceased to be within the administrative county of Hertford and were transferred to and now form part of the administrative county of Bedford. And whereas the aforesaid "Beds transferred areas" together with part of the parish of Whipsnade situate in the county of Hertford were directed by the said Order to be included in the Hemel Hempstead Coroner's District of the said county subject to any alteration which might thereafter be made in that district, and the said "Beds transferred

areas" together with such part of the parish of Caddington as was situate in the said Ecclesiastical District of Saint John Markyate Street were constituted a new parish to be called Markyate Street and the aforesaid part of the parish of Whipsnade was amalgamated with the parish of Flamstead;

And whereas by a Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board the eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and confirmed by "The Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 10) Act 1897" the boundary of the counties of Bedford and Hertford was altered and the parish of Holwell and certain portions of the parish of Shillington ceased to be within the county of Bedford and were transferred to and now form part of the county of Hertford and the said areas so transferred were by the said Order directed to be included in the Hitchin Coroner's District of the said county of Herts subject to any alteration that might be made in that district, and certain portions of the said parish of Shillington were amalgamated with the parish of Holwell and certain other portions with the parishes of Pirton and Ickleford respectively;

And whereas a petition was on the nineteenth July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven presented to Her Majesty by the Hertfordshire County Council praying that the administrative county of Hertford might be divided into seven Coroners' districts in accordance with such Petition and for the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purpose of authorizing the Petitioners to elect an additional Coroner such Coroner to be attached to the proposed Watford District which said petition with a description of the said proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition was founded, was duly certified to Her Majesty.

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petition.

And whereas the Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty.

And whereas Her Majesty has with the advice of Her Privy Council taken into consideration the said petition, and is minded to make such alteration and division as aforesaid.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to order direct and declare, and it is hereby ordered directed and declared that from the date hereof:—

(1) The county of Hertford shall be divided into seven districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said first recited Act.

(2) The said seven districts shall be named respectively "The Bishop's Stortford Coroner's District," "The Hemel Hempstead Coroner's District," "The Hertford Coroner's District," "The Hitchin Coroner's District," "The Royston Coroner's District," "The Saint Alban's Coroner's District," and "The Watford Coroner's District" and the said districts shall respectively comprise the parishes and places and shall have the boundaries set forth in that behalf in the Schedule hereto.

(3) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James, Silsden situate within the limits of the parish of Kildwick in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint James, Silsden situate as aforesaid.

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Kildwick which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint James, Silsden situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint James Silsden.’

“And with the like consent of the said William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint James Silsden situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The District Chapelry of Saint James, Silsden, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Kildwick, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the ancient limits of the township of Silsdon."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighteenth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership for an estate in fee simple in remainder expectant on the death of the survivor of Mary Sleight Nutter Jessie Nutter and Gertrude Emily Nutter hereinafter mentioned of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation of and to the rectory parsonage and parish church of Wanstead in the county of Essex and diocese of Saint Albans (which said rectory parsonage and parish church are hereinafter called 'the said living')."

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the fifth year of Your Majesty (session two) chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain further additions and improvements at the episcopal residence belonging to the See of Peterborough which is situate in the city of Peterborough.

“Whereas the Honourable and Right Reverend Edward Carr, now Bishop of the diocese of

Peterborough; is desirous that certain permanent additions and improvements should be made at the said episcopal residence and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed additions and improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed additions and improvements a sum of one thousand five hundred pounds (being a sum which together with the outstanding balances of the several sums of two thousand pounds, one thousand and eight hundred pounds, one thousand and two hundred pounds, and two hundred and eighty pounds, already borrowed upon the same security by the predecessors of the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough under the authority of the Statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by borrowing the same by way of further mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong to the Bishoprick of Peterborough.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Carr Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts a further sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty years or until the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds with interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of thirty years, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one twenty-fifth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid and that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be

approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and shall bind as well the said Edward Carr now Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that the receipt of our joint treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed additions and improvements at the episcopal residence aforesaid.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said parochial chapelry of Bilsdale, of the parish of Hawnby in the said county and diocese and of the parish of Helmsley in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such cures respectively.

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Lord Archbishop of York as such Archbishop with the consent of the Right Honourable William Ernest, Earl of Feversham of Duncombe Park in the said county of York, as the patron both of the vicarage of the said parochial chapelry of Bilsdale, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Helmsley, and with the consent of Andrew Wood of Whitewell Lodge Whitechurch in the county of Salop Esquire as the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Hawnby (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parochial chapelry of Bilsdale of the said parish of Hawnby, and of the said parish of Helmsley which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Bilsdale Midcable as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Bilsdale Midcable.’

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such

Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Bilsdale Midcable, comprising:—

“I. middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to its intersection by the bridge road or footpath leading from Bilsdale West Moor past the eastern side of Easterside Hill to Wass House and Easterside Farm, and extending thence generally southward along the middle of the last described bridge road or footpath for a distance of one mile and fifty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading past the south side of the cottage called or known as Timber Holme towards the farm buildings also called or known as Timber Holme and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to the junction of the same footpath with the bridge road leading towards Wass House aforesaid and the house called or known as Grimes Holme and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned bridge road for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading from Wass House to Grimes Holme aforesaid and extending thence south-eastward and in a straight line for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the ford by which the footpath leading from Grimes Holme aforesaid to the house called Fair Hill crosses the River Seph aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Hawnby from the parish of Helmsley aforesaid.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

“And whereas the said Board of Directors of Bass and Co. Limited and the said Michael Arthur Baron Burton have nominated to us as the persons in whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish should be vested, viz.:—John Henry Buxton of Hunsdon Bury Ware in the county of Hertford Esquire, Edward Hildred Hildred Carlisle of Helme Hall near Huddersfield in the county of York Esquire, the Reverend Francis James Chavasse of Wyeliffe Hall in the city of Oxford Clerk in Holy Orders, the Reverend John Fewick Kitto of Number 6 Saint Martin's-place Westminster Clerk in Holy Orders and the Reverend Arthur James Robinson of Holy Trinity Rectory Marylebone in the county of Middlesex Clerk in Holy Orders their heirs and assigns for ever.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Christ Church Burton-upon-Trent and of the said district chapelry of Saint Saviour Branstone which are described in the Schedule hereunder written (all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed) shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of All Saints Burton-upon-Trent.’

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of All Saints, Burton-upon-Trent, comprising:—

"I. WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation, stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the under-mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the twenty-sixth day of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-

ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows; viz.:-

SKELTON, YORKS.—Wholly and forthwith in the Parish Church of Skelton, in the county of York; and also within the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented;

(b.) In such reserved grave spaces (limited to twelve in number) in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and which, when opened, are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members of the families (being parishioners) to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

HINTON, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—Forthwith and entirely in Hinton Church, in the county of Gloucester; and also in those parts of the churchyard which lie to the west, south-west, south, and south-east of the church, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be permitted on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

BOLLINGTON, CHESHIRE.—Forthwith and entirely in Bollington Church, in the county of Chester; and also, after the thirtieth June one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, in the old part of the churchyard (opened in one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five) except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

CASTLE CARY, SOMERSET.—Forthwith and entirely in Castle Cary Church, in the county of Somerset; and also, after the thirtieth September one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled and earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order viz., widows, widowers, parents and unmarried

children as can be buried at or below that depth.

**GULDEN MORDEN, CAMBRIDGE.**—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Guilden Morden, in the county of Cambridge; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In existing partly walled or earthen graves, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz., widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces (limited to thirteen in number) now existing in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, which, when opened, are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

**SKIDBY, YORKS.**—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Skidby, in the county of York; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In such reserved grave spaces (limited to ten in number) now existing in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, which when opened are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

**WELLOW, SOMERSET.**—Forthwith and entirely in Wellow Church; and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth September one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

A STATUTE made by the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Oxford, in amendment of the Statutes made under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act of 1877.

Whereas by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act of 1877, 40 and 41 Victoria, c. 48, sections 54 and 55, it is enacted that a Statute made by the Commissioners for a College shall be subject to alteration from time to time by Statute made by the College under this Act, the same being passed at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the College, specially summoned for this purpose, by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting; and further that every such alteration of Statute shall be submitted to the Queen in Council, and be proceeded on and have effect as if it were a Statute made by the Commissioners:

Now therefore, we, the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, in the University of Oxford,

being the Governing Body of the said College, and being this day assembled in a General Meeting specially summoned for the purpose, after due notice given of the business to be transacted thereat, do, by the votes of all the persons present and voting, enact as follows, that is to say, in the Statute VI, clause 16, we strike out the full stop at the end of the clause and substitute a comma, and do add the following words to form part of the clause:—"unless and until the Master and Fellows shall have made other regulation or regulations hereupon. And the same provision shall apply to Exhibitions. The Master and Fellows shall have power to vary such regulations from time to time, as they think expedient."
