PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The number of Presentations is limited to 200.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, did on the thirteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, issue Our Royal Proclamation establishing a branch of Our Royal Mint at Perth in Our Colony of Western Australia, and by Article ten thereof did direct that such Proclamation should come into force in the said Colony on the expiration of six months from the date thereof, unless it was sooner promulgated in the Colony, and in that case on such promulgation:

And whereas it has been represented to Us that it is desirable to postpone the date at which the said Proclamation is to come into force;

We do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

(1.) Article ten of Our Proclamation respecting a branch of Our Mint at or near Perth, in Our Colony of Western Australia, bearing date the thirteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, is hereby rescinded; and there shall be substituted for it the following Article:

This Proclamation shall come into force in Our Colony of Western Australia on the expiration of nine months from the thirteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, unless it is sooner promulgated in the Colony, and in that case on such promulgation.

(2.) This Proclamation shall come into force on the twelfth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, unless it is sooner promulgated, and in that case on such promulgation.

Given at Our Court at Windsor this seventh day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and in the sixty-first year of Our Reign.

HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, on a representation of the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, to appoint Alfred Eichholz, Esquire, M.A., M.B., B.C., Fellow of Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and Basil Sidney Cornish, Esquire, M.A., Brasenose College, Oxford, to be two of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

WHEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction within the dominions and territories of the King of Siam:

And whereas by a Treaty made the third day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, between Her Majesty the Queen and His Majesty the King of Siam, it was amongst other things agreed as follows:—

"Article VIII. His Majesty the King of Siam will appoint a proper person or proper persons to be a Commissioner and Judge, or Commissioners and Judges, in Chiengmai for the purposes hereinafter mentioned. Such Judge or Judges shall, subject to the limitations and provisions contained in the present Treaty, exercise civil and criminal jurisdiction in all cases arising in Chiengmai, Lakon, and Lampoonchi, between British subjects, or in which British subjects may be parties as complainants, accused, plaintiffs or defendants according to Siamese law: provided always that in all such cases the Consul or Vice-Consul shall be entitled to be present at the trial, and to be furnished with copies of the proceedings, which, when the defendant or accused is a British subject, shall be supplied free of charge, and to make any suggestions to the Judge or Judges which he may think proper in the interests of justice: provided also that the Consul or Vice-Consul shall have power at any time before judgment, if he shall think proper in the interests of justice, by a written requisition under his hand, directed to the Judge or Judges, to signify his desire that any case in which both parties are British subjects, or in which the accused or defendant is a British subject, be transferred for adjudication to the British Consular Court at Chiengmai, and the case shall thereupon be transferred to such last-mentioned Court accordingly, and be disposed of by the Consul or Vice-Consul, as provided by Article II of the Supplementary Agreement of the 13th May, 1856."

And whereas in pursuance of the said Treaty His Majesty the King of Siam has from time to time appointed Commissioners or Judges for the purposes mentioned in the said Article, and civil and criminal jurisdiction has been and is exercised in Chiengmai subject to the limitations and provisions contained in the said Treaty:

And whereas, in pursuance of powers reserved in the said Treaty, it has been from time to time agreed between Her Majesty and His Majesty the King of Siam that the limits within which the jurisdiction of the said Commissioners and Judges under, and for the purposes of, the said Treaty shall be extended to the Provinces of Muang Nan, Phre, Muang Thon, Raheng, Sawankaloke, Sukotai, Utaradit, and Pichai:

And whereas such limits of jurisdiction may hereafter be further extended:

And whereas in order to the fulfilment of the said Treaty, and for other purposes, it is expedient to amend "The Siam Order in Council, 1889," hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Order":

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The

Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," and otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Siam Order in Council, 1898."

2. In this Order the expression "the International Court" means the Court of any Commissioners or Judges exercising jurisdiction at Chiangmai in pursuance of and under the provisions of the said recited Treaty as modified by any subsequent Agreement whether made before or after the passing of this Order.

The expression "limits of the International Court" means the provinces and parts of provinces to which the jurisdiction of that Court for the time being extends.

3. With respect to any civil or criminal case arising within the limits of the International Court between British subjects, or in which British subjects may be parties as complainants, accused, plaintiffs or defendants, the principal Order shall not operate or have any effect so long as the said Treaty continues in force, unless and until such case shall have been transferred to the District Court at Chiangmai in manner provided by the said Treaty.

4. Where a case is so transferred, the District Court shall give such directions as seem proper for its determination, having regard to the proceedings (if any) in the International Court.

In a criminal case, if the accused is handed over by the International Court in custody, he may be detained in custody as if on the day on which he is handed over he had been arrested under a warrant of the District Court.

5. The Consul at Bangkok shall, if and so long as he shall be so authorized by the Secretary of State, have and exercise concurrently with the Consul-General all the judicial powers and jurisdiction of the Consul-General under the principal Order throughout Siam; and the provisions of that Order relating to such judicial powers and jurisdiction shall be construed accordingly; provided that

(1) The said powers and jurisdiction shall be exercised by the said Consul subject to any directions which may from time to time be given by the Consul-General, specifying the cases which are to be heard and decided by the Consul, and to the power of the Consul-General to direct that any particular case shall be heard and decided by himself.

(2) Nothing in this Article shall operate to confer upon the said Consul any powers or duties of the Consul-General under the principal Order which are in their nature administrative, executive, ministerial, or otherwise not judicial, and all matters required or authorized to be done, by or to the Consul-General other than matters in their nature judicial, shall be done by or to the Consul-General as if this Order had not passed; and

(3) Nothing in this Article shall affect the powers or jurisdiction of the said Consul as a Consular Officer when holding a District Court under the principal Order.

Any Order of the Secretary of State conferring authority upon the said Consul under this Article shall be publicly exhibited in the office of the Consul-General, and be kept exhibited there for one month after the first exhibition thereof.

6. Articles 95 and 96 of the principal Order are hereby repealed as from the commencement of this Order, but this repeal shall not prejudice any rights acquired, or affect anything done or suffered before such commencement.

7. This Order shall come into force on the day

on which a copy thereof is first exhibited in the public office of the Consul-General at Bangkok, and notice of the time of such first exhibition, together with a copy of this Order, shall, as soon thereafter as practicable, be published in every Consular district in Siam, in such manner as the Consul-General directs.

The day on which this Order is first exhibited in the public office of the Consul-General is hereinbefore referred to as the commencement of this Order.

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Salisbury, K.G., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein. *C. L. Peel.*

WHEREAS on the ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six a Convention (hereinafter called the Berne Convention) with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works was concluded between Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the foreign countries following, that is to say:—

Belgium
France
Germany
Hayti
Italy
Spain
Switzerland and
Tunis.

And whereas on the fifth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven the ratifications of the said Convention were duly exchanged between Her Majesty the Queen and the aforesaid countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and made under the authority committed to Her Majesty by the International Copyright Acts 1844 to 1886 Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for giving rights of copyright throughout Her Majesty's Dominions to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in any of the said foreign countries (therein referred to as the foreign countries of the Copyright Union) and otherwise giving effect throughout Her Majesty's Dominions to the terms of the said Berne Convention, and an English translation of the said Convention was set out in the First Schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas since the date of the said Order in Council hereinbefore recited the foreign countries following, namely, Luxembourg, Monaco, Montenegro and Norway, have acceded to the said Berne Convention and by Orders in Council dated respectively the tenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the fifteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, the sixteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and made under the authority aforesaid the provisions of the herein-

before recited Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven have been extended to the last-mentioned foreign countries respectively and the last-mentioned foreign countries together with the foreign countries comprised in the said Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, now constitute the foreign countries of the Copyright Union within the meaning of the said Order in Council:

And whereas an additional Act to the said Berne Convention of which additional Act an English translation is set out in the Schedule to this Order has been agreed upon between Her Majesty and the foreign countries next hereinafter mentioned for the purpose of varying the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Convention of the ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six:

And whereas on the ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven the ratifications of the said additional Act were exchanged between Her Majesty and the foreign countries following that is to say:

And whereas Her Majesty in Council is satisfied that the foreign countries named in the body of this Order and parties to the said additional Act have made such provisions as it appears to Her Majesty expedient to require for the protection of authors of works first produced in Her Majesty's dominions:

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts 1844 to 1886 doth order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. The additional Act to the Berne Convention set forth in the Schedule to this Order shall as from the commencement of this Order have full effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions and all persons are enjoined to observe the same:

2. This Order shall extend to the foreign countries following that is to say:

Belgium
Spain
France
Italy
Luxembourg
Monaco
Montenegro
Switzerland and
Tunis:

3. The fourth Article of the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven shall as from the commencement of this Order cease to apply to the foreign countries to which this Order extends:

4. The hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven shall continue to be of full force and effect save in so far as the same is varied by this Order:

5. Nothing contained in this Order shall prejudicially affect any right acquired or accrued

before the commencement of this Order by virtue of the said Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven or otherwise and any person entitled to such right shall continue entitled thereto and to the remedies for the same in like manner as if this Order had not been made.

6. The author of any literary or artistic work first produced before the commencement of this Order shall have the rights and remedies to which he is entitled under section six of "The International Copyright Act 1886":

7. This Order shall be construed as if it formed part of "The International Copyright Act 1886":

8. This Order shall come into operation on the date hereof which day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of this Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

SCHEDULE.

ADDITIONAL ACT.

The following is an English translation of the Additional Act with the omission of the formal beginning and end:—

ARTICLE I.

The International Convention of the 9th September, 1886, is modified as follows:—

1. ARTICLE II.—The first paragraph of Article II shall run as follows:—

"Authors belonging to any one of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries for their works, whether unpublished, or published for the first time in one of those countries, the rights which the respective laws do now or shall hereafter grant to nationals."

A fifth paragraph is added in these terms:—

"Posthumous works are included among those to be protected."

2. ARTICLE III.—Article III shall run as follows:—

"Authors not belonging to one of the countries of the Union, who shall have published or caused to be published for the first time their literary or artistic works in a country which is a party to the Union, shall enjoy, in respect of such works, the protection accorded by the Berne Convention, and by the present Additional Act."

3. ARTICLE V.—The first paragraph of Article V shall run as follows:—

"Authors belonging to any one of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries the exclusive right of making or authorizing the translation of their works during the entire period of their right over the original work. Nevertheless, the exclusive right of translation shall cease to exist if the author shall not have availed himself of it, during a period of ten years from the date of the first publication of the original work, by publishing or causing to be published in one of the countries of the Union, a translation in the language for which protection is to be claimed."

4. ARTICLE VII.—Article VII shall run as follows:—

"Serial stories, including tales, published in the newspapers or periodicals of one of the countries of the Union, may not be reproduced, in original or translation, in the other countries, without the sanction of the authors or of their lawful representatives."

"This stipulation shall apply equally to other articles in newspapers or periodicals, when the authors or editors shall have expressly declared in the newspaper or periodical itself in which they shall have been published that the right of reproduction is prohibited. In the case of periodicals it shall suffice if such prohibition be indicated in general terms at the beginning of each number.

"In the absence of prohibition, such articles may be reproduced on condition that the source is acknowledged.

"In any case, the prohibition shall not apply to articles on political questions, to the news of the day, or to miscellaneous information."

5. ARTICLE XII.—Article XII shall run as follows:—

"Pirated works may be seized by the competent authorities of the countries of the Union where the original work is entitled to legal protection.

"The seizure shall take place conformably to the domestic law of each State."

6. ARTICLE XX.—The second paragraph of Article XX shall run as follows:—

"Such denunciation shall be made to the Government of the Swiss Confederation. It shall only be effective as regards the country making it, the Convention remaining in full force and effect for the other countries of the Union."

ARTICLE II.

The Final Protocol annexed to the Convention of the 9th September, 1886, is modified as follows:—

1. No. 1.—This clause shall run as follows:—

"As regards Article IV, it is agreed as follows:

"(a.) In countries of the Union where protection is accorded not only to architectural plans, but also to the architectural works themselves, these works shall be admitted to the benefits of the Berne Convention and of the present Additional Act.

"(b.) Photographic works and works produced by an analogous process shall be admitted to the benefits of these engagements in so far as the laws of each State may permit, and to the extent of the protection accorded by such laws to similar national works.

"It is understood that an authorized photograph of a work of art shall enjoy legal protection in all the countries of the Union, as contemplated by the Berne Convention and by the present Additional Act, for the same period as the principal right of reproduction of the work itself subsists, and within the limits of private arrangements between those who have legal rights.

2. No. 4.—This clause shall run as follows:—

"The common agreement contemplated in Article XIV of the Convention is established as follows:—

"The application of the Berne Convention and of the present Additional Act to works which have not fallen into the public domain within the country of origin at the time when these engagements come into force, shall operate according to such stipulations on this head as may be contained in special Conventions either actually existing or to be concluded hereafter.

"In the absence of such stipulations between any of the countries of the Union, the respective countries shall regulate, each for itself, by its domestic legislation, the manner in

which the principle contained in Article XIV is to be applied.

"The stipulations of Article XIV of the Berne Convention and of the present clause of the Final Protocol shall apply equally to the exclusive right of translation, in so far as such right is established by the present Additional Act.

"The temporary stipulations noted above shall be applicable to countries which may hereafter accede to the Union."

ARTICLE III.

The countries of the Union which are not parties to the present Additional Act, shall at any time be allowed to accede thereto on their request to that effect. This stipulation shall apply equally to countries which may hereafter accede to the Convention of the 9th September, 1886. It will suffice for this purpose that such accession should be notified in writing to the Swiss Federal Council, who shall in turn communicate it to the other Governments.

ARTICLE IV.

The present Additional Act shall have the same force and duration as the Convention of the 9th September, 1886.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Paris, in the manner adopted in the case of that Convention, as soon as possible, and within the space of one year at the latest.

It shall come into force as regards those countries which shall have ratified it three months after such exchange of ratifications.

IN pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows:—

1. The Northern and Salford Divisions (as defined by the Order in Council of the 4th day of May, 1864) of the County of Lancaster shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of the Spring Assize County, No. 2.

2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Manchester.

3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Manchester shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provision of Section three of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said section "the Sheriff of the county for which such Assizes were held" shall mean the Sheriff of the county in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand

Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of Lancaster.

6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

7. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either Division comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document.

8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 2."

9. Any person who after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance.

11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Manchester.

12. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to Her Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lan-

caster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as afore-said, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 20*l.* to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

16. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the same

meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.

17. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1898.

2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Leeds.

3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Leeds shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provision of Section three of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said Section "the Sheriff of the County for which such Assizes were held" shall mean the Sheriff of the County in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of York shall alone act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and subject to the provisions of this Order shall have jurisdiction for that purpose over the whole district constituting the said Spring Assize County, and precepts and other documents relating to the said Spring Assizes shall be addressed to him alone.

5. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of York; and the Jurors so summoned shall be deemed to be good and lawful men of the body of the several counties constituting the said Spring Assize County; and the Grand and Petty Jury formed out of those Jurors shall be deemed to be a Grand and Petty Jury respectively of the body of the said Counties respectively, and shall have jurisdiction accordingly.

6. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Leeds, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any writ of Habeas Corpus.

7. In all matters not before specifically mentioned the precepts to the said Sheriff shall direct him to issue, and he shall issue the like notices, precepts, warrants, and documents, and perform the same acts (*mutatis mutandis*) as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, and

all Under Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, and Officers in the said Spring Assize County shall obey accordingly.

8. The said Sheriff shall, as to all matters in relation to such Spring Assizes for which no specific provision is made by this Order, have the same power, jurisdiction, and responsibility as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, except that this provision shall not authorize the said Sheriff to carry sentences into execution outside the county of York, or to levy outside the said County fines imposed or recognizances estreated at the said Spring Assizes.

9. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either of the Counties comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize or the proper officer thereof any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize or the proper officer thereof such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document. This provision shall not apply to the Sheriff of the County of the City of York.

10. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes, the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 3."

11. Any person who after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for any of the Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

12. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in any of the Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes, or forfeit his recognizance.

13. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Leeds, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of York, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Leeds.

14. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed

to be held, to send, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to Her Majesty's Gaol at Leeds for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

15. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 20*l.*, to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

16. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

17. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

18. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the

same meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.

19. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1898.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Daniel Lewis, Lord Bishop of Bangor hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the twenty-eighth day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Frederick by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Daniel Lewis by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Bangor do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in

the county of Carnarvon and within my diocese of Bangor the perpetual curacy and parish church of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin and that the said parish of Bodferin is bounded partly on one side by the parish of Brynccroes and partly on the other side by the parish of Aberdaron. That the said parish of Bodferin has a population of forty-five persons and was separated from the rectory of Llaniestyn in the said county of Carnarvon and within my diocese and annexed to the said perpetual curacy of Llangwnadl for ecclesiastical purposes under the style of the perpetual curacy of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin by an Order in Council dated the eighteenth June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and the said parish of Bodferin does not contain within its limits any church or chapel and the inhabitants residing within the said parish have now to attend Divine service at the mother church of Llangwnadl which is three miles away. That it is now proposed to erect a church on the site shown in the map or plan hereunto annexed for the convenience and accommodation of the inhabitants residing within the said parish of Bodferin and within the portions of the parishes of Brynccroes and Aberdaron severally mentioned and described in the Schedule hereunder written and delineated in the plan or map hereunto annexed and that the said portions of the said parishes of Brynccroes and Aberdaron shall in future form part of the said perpetual curacy of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin. That the portions of the said parishes of Brynccroes and Aberdaron which are contiguous and adjacent to the said parish of Bodferin are remote from the said several parish churches of Brynccroes and Aberdaron and in consequence thereof the inhabitants of the said portions of the said parishes of Brynccroes and Aberdaron are not in the habit of attending Divine service in the said parish churches of Brynccroes and Aberdaron respectively but in the parish church of Llangwnadl which is nearer though still difficult of access. That the portion of the said parish of Brynccroes contiguous to the said parish of Bodferin contains twenty-five inhabitants or thereabouts and is distant from the parish church of Brynccroes about three miles and is distant from the said parish church of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin about three miles. That the portion of the said parish of Aberdaron contiguous to the said parish of Bodferin contains thirty inhabitants or thereabouts and is distant from the parish church of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin about three and a half miles and is distant from the said parish church of Aberdaron about three miles. That it appears to me that the said portions of the said parishes of Brynccroes and Aberdaron severally mentioned and described in the Schedule hereunder written and delineated in the map or plan hereunto annexed may under the provisions of the 'Pluralities Act 1838,' advantageously to the cause of religion be separated from the said respective parishes of Brynccroes and Aberdaron and annexed to the adjoining parish of Bodferin for ecclesiastical purposes. That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing how the alteration above proposed may be effected and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Reverend George Augustus Salusbury the patron of the said perpetual curacy of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin Colonel Wynne Finch the patron of the said parish of Brynccroes and the Master Fellows and Scholars of the College

of Saint John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge the patrons of the sinecure rectory of Aberdaron and myself the patron of the vicarage of Aberdaron together with the consents in writing of the Reverend Thomas Jones Vicar of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin the Reverend David Owen vicar of Brynccroes and the Reverend William Allen Whitworth sinecure rector of Aberdaron and the Reverend Henry Lloyd vicar of Aberdaron respectively to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you should be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council. Given under my hand this twenty-eighth day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

"On the south-east side of the said parish of Bodferin to take in that portion of the parish of Brynccroes which is bounded on the west side by a part of the said parish of Bodferin on the north and north-east side by that part of the high road lying between the boundaries of the said parishes of Bodferin and Aberdaron respectively and leading from Methlem to Brynccroes and on the south side by a part of the parish of Aberdaron and on the extreme south-east side of the said parish of Bodferin to take in that portion of the said parish of Aberdaron bounded on the north side by the above described portion of the said parish of Brynccroes on the west side partly by a portion of the said parish of Bodferin and partly by a field known as Caebont and forming part of a tenement called Glanrhyd and now in the occupation of Griffith Griffiths and numbered three thousand and sixty-four in the Ordnance Survey of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine on the south side partly by that portion of the high road lying between the east boundary of the said field known as Caebont and the east boundary of the field known as Rhospantydwr and forming part of a tenement called Pantydwr and now in the occupation of John Pritchard and marked three thousand and seventy-one in the Ordnance Survey aforesaid and partly by a portion of the east boundary of the said field known as Rhospantydwr and partly by the north boundaries of the two fields known as Caeau Bodffordd and forming part of a tenement called Bodffordd and now in the occupation of John Williams and numbered three thousand and nineteen and three thousand and twenty respectively in the Ordnance Survey aforesaid on the north-east side by a portion of the said high road leading from Bodferin to Brynccroes and lying between the boundary of the said parish of Brynccroes and the point marked 'A' on the plan hereto annexed and on the south-east side by the high road lying between the said point marked 'A' and the north boundary of the said field known as Caeaubodffordd.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows:—

"The SCHEME above referred to:—

"That the portion of the said parish of Brynccroes mentioned and described in the above Schedule and in the annexed plan be separated from the said parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Bodferin and that such portions shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said perpetual curacy of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin. That the inhabitants of the said portion of the said parish of Brynccroes shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Brynccroes and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said parish church but shall

be entitled to accommodation in the said proposed new church and shall be liable subject to the provision of 'The Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act 1868' to the repairs of the said new church. That the incumbent of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the above described portion of the parish of Bryn croes. That the portion of the said parish of Aberdaron mentioned and described in the above Schedule and in the annexed plan be separated from the said parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Bodferin and that such portion shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said perpetual curacy of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin. That the inhabitants of the said portion of the said parish of Aberdaron shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Aberdaron and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said parish church but shall be entitled to accommodation in the said proposed new church and shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act 1868' to the repairs of the said church. That the incumbent of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the above described portion of the parish of Aberdaron. That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of any of the benefices affected by this scheme nor shall the endowments of any of such benefices be in anywise affected. That all fees ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments other than tithes arising from or in respect of the said portions of the said parishes of Bryn croes and Aberdaron and usually payable to the incumbent of the benefice shall belong and be paid to the incumbent of Llangwnadl-cum-Bodferin.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," as amended by "The Pluralities Act, 1850," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sine-

cure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas by "The Baldock and Bygrave Benefices Union Act, 1897" it is enacted that the provisions of section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," as amended by section eight of "The Pluralities Act, 1850," shall extend and be applicable to and for the union of the rectory of Baldock and the rectory of Bygrave both in the county of Hertford and diocese of Saint Albans into one benefice notwithstanding that the aggregate population of the parishes of Baldock and Bygrave may exceed one thousand five hundred persons in like manner as if the words 'and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons' had not been inserted in the said provisions of the said Acts."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said first recited Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twelfth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Frederick, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend John Wogan Lord Bishop of Saint Albans as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Bygrave and the rectory of Baldock both in the county of Hertford and diocese of Saint Albans having represented unto Us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice We inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to Us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Most Honourable Robert Arthur Talbot Marquess of Salisbury (being the patron or person entitled to present to the said rectory of Bygrave) and he the said Bishop of Saint Albans as the patron or

person entitled to present to the said rectory of Baldock if the same were now vacant consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council We caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to Us the said Archbishop against such union and no cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Saint Albans made in pursuance of 'The Baldock and Bygrave Benefices Union Act 1897' and a print of the said Act, Our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And We do hereby certify the inquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"And We further recommend that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate or present to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same become vacant shall be as follows that is to say As to the first and every alternate turn thereof the patronage shall be vested in the said Robert Arthur Talbot Marquess of Salisbury his heirs and assigns and as to the next and every alternate turn thereof in the Bishop of Saint Albans for the time being and so on in like order and succession.

And Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to such united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the patrons of the rectories of Baldock and Bygrave alternately, the patron of Bygrave having the first turn or right of presentation.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven; and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme

bearing date the sixteenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Your Majesty, chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for providing the Archbishop of Canterbury with a more convenient house of residence.

"Whereas the house and premises known as Addington Park with the lands hereditaments and appurtenances thereto belonging situate in the parish of Addington, in the county of Surrey, is at present one of the Archiepiscopal residences of the said Archbishop of Canterbury.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick, now Archbishop of Canterbury, and it has been made to appear to us that the said house, lands, hereditaments, and appurtenances are inconveniently situate with respect to the said diocese of Canterbury at large, and to the cathedral city of Canterbury in particular, and are expensive to maintain and otherwise undesirable for use as such Archiepiscopal residence.

"And whereas under the circumstances hereinbefore set forth, it appears to us to be expedient and likely to conduce to the permanent benefit of the See of Canterbury that the sale of the said house and premises known as Addington Park, with the lands, hereditaments and appurtenances thereto belonging should be effected in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Frederick Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony of which consent he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal Seal) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say:—

"That the said Archbishop be authorized and empowered to sell for such price or prices and at such time or times and in such manner as shall be approved by us, and to transfer and convey to any purchaser or purchasers by an assurance or assurances to be made in manner and form approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners under our Common Seal, the whole estate, right, title, and interest of him the said Frederick, Archbishop of Canterbury and of his successors, of in and to the said house and premises known as Addington Park aforesaid with the lands, hereditaments, and appurtenances thereto belonging (save and except the advowson or right of patronage of and presentation to the benefice of Addington in the said county of Surrey) which are more particularly described in the schedule to this scheme annexed as the same are now vested in him and that all monies received by or on account of the said house and premises and the lands hereditaments and appurtenances thereto belonging or of any part thereof except such sum as the purchaser shall pay to the Archbishop for tenant's fixtures shall be by him the said Archbishop paid over to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall be held by us and be applied by the said Archbishop for the purposes and in manner next hereinafter mentioned, but with and subject to our approval, and at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, that is to say, firstly, in defraying all costs, charges, and expenses of and incident to

the sale of the said Archbishopal residence known as Addington Park. Secondly, in defraying the cost of providing in such manner and at such time as shall be approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, another Archbishopal residence with the appurtenances thereto, which shall be within or near to the city of Canterbury, and lastly in applying any balance of the said monies which may remain after defraying the expenses incident to the sale, and providing another house of residence, to such purposes agreed upon between us and the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being as may be sanctioned by and in conformity with the provisions of any Act of Parliament which may hereafter be passed in relation to the matter.

"And we further recommend and propose that as soon as the above mentioned new Archbishopal residence shall have been provided the said Frederick, Archbishop of Canterbury, or his successors, shall at his or their personal charge and expense, insure and keep insured from loss or damage by fire the same residence with the out-buildings and appurtenances, such insurance being effected in one of the public offices of assurance in London or Westminster for such a sum (not being less than the sum which may be certified by the

Ecclesiastical Commissioners' Surveyors as the probable cost of entirely rebuilding the same in case of fire) as may be determined by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that such Archbishop shall within fourteen days after any premium for such insurance shall have become payable deliver to us the receipt for the same, and that in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said residence, any and every sum of money receivable under such insurance shall become and be payable and be paid to and deposited with us in trust to be applied, and we recommend and propose that the same together with any interest and accumulations thereof shall be applied by us towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating of the said residence or any part thereof which may have so suffered loss and damage, in such manner as shall be determined on by us with the concurrence of the said Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them or of any other Act or Acts of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Augustine Highgate situate within the limits of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of All Saints Highgate in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry district) of Saint Michael Highgate in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate and of the said new parish of Saint Michael Highgate should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Augustine Highgate situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Mandell Bishop of the said diocese of London as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See both of the vicarage of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate and of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Michael Highgate (in testimony whereof he the said Bishop has signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate and of the said new parish of Saint Michael Highgate which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Augustine Highgate situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named

'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Augustine Highgate.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of Saint Augustine Highgate comprising:—

"1. All that portion of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of All Saints Highgate in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded upon the west and upon the south-west by the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry district) of Saint Michael Highgate (including the hereinafter described portion thereof) upon the south-east by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Whitehall Park, Hornsey-lane upon the north-east by the new parish of Christ Church, Hornsey all which cures are situate in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Hornsey from the new parish of All Saints Highgate aforesaid at the junction of Stanhope-road with Shepherd's Hill-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Archway-road and with Jackson's-lane and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Southwood-lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints Highgate from the new parish of Saint Michael Highgate aforesaid.

And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Michael Highgate which is bounded upon the north-west and upon the north-east by the above described portion of the new parish of All Saints Highgate aforesaid upon the south-east by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Whitehall Park Hornsey-lane aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew Whitehall Park Hornsey-lane from the new parish of Saint Michael Highgate aforesaid at the junction of Hornsey-lane with the roadway or passage called or known as Tile Kiln-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said roadway or passage for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Winchester-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Cromwell-avenue and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the wall or fence which forms the south-western boundary of the house and premises numbered ten Cromwell-avenue and extending thence north-westward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to the north-eastern end thereof and continuing thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of one yard or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the footpath leading from Archway-road into Southwood Lawn-road which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Michael Highgate

from the new parish of All Saints Highgate aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London. *C. "And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity, Newtown, which is hereinafter recommended and proposed, will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Newtown.

"And whereas the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John Morley Lee and John Carpenter-Garnier (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Newtown now vested in them the said John Morley Lee and John Carpenter-Garnier as aforesaid shall be transferred from them to the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued

wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the churchwardens of the parishes of Milton and Portsea in the county of Southampton ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the twenty-ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in so far as it affects burials in Milton Churchyard should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Order, with respect to burials in the said churchyard, viz.:

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the Church of Milton, Portsea, in the county of Southampton, and in the churchyard within five yards of the church; and in the rest of the churchyard except as follows:—

(a.) In vaults and wholly walled graves now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In partly walled and earthen graves now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed of the relatives of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of April next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the

London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twentieth day of April.

(a.) In vaults and wholly walled graves now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In partly walled and earthen graves now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed of the relatives of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

BUXTON, DERBYSHIRE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Churches of Saint Anne and Saint John, Buxton, in the county of Derby; and also in the churchyards attached thereto, except as follows:—

In vaults and wholly walled graves now existing in the churchyards burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented at a minimum depth of two feet below the surface of the soil.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of April next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said twentieth day of April.

THE following Statutes, made on the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, by the Governing Body of Magdalen College, Oxford, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTES to amend the existing Statutes of Magdalen College in the University of Oxford, that is to say the Statutes dated the sixteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, made for the College by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48), and approved by the Queen in Council on the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, as altered by the Statutes made by the Governing Body of the College on the first day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight and approved by the Queen in Council on the tenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, duly made at a General Meeting of the President and Fellows especially summoned for this purpose held on the first day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight and passed at such meeting by the votes of two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting and submitted to Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

Preliminary.

These Statutes are supplementary to the existing Statutes of the College, that is to say, the Statutes dated the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, made for the College by the University of Oxford Commissioners (hereinafter referred to as the Statutes of 1881) as altered by the Statutes, dated the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, made by the College under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (hereinafter referred to as the Statutes of 1888).

President.

1. In the Clause numbered 8 of the Statute of 1881, as to the President, two thousand pounds shall be substituted for one thousand eight hundred pounds, and in the Clause numbered 9 of the same Statute two thousand two hundred pounds shall be substituted for two thousand pounds, and the said Clauses shall be read and shall take effect accordingly.

2. If the President, after having held the office for fifteen years and having attained the age of seventy years, shall desire to retire, the Visitor may, on the Petition of the President, presented with the consent of a majority of the Fellows present at an Extraordinary General Meeting, direct that the President shall be permitted to retire from his office with such a pension, not exceeding eight hundred pounds per annum, as the Visitor shall deem suitable to the circumstances of the case. Any pension awarded to a retired President under this Clause shall be provided in like manner as if the same had been awarded under the Clause numbered 10 of the Statute of 1881 as to the President.

Officers.

1. In the absence of the Vice-President all powers belonging to him shall be vested in the Senior Fellow in residence, provided always that the President and Fellows may by resolution in any particular case relieve any Fellow or Fellows in whom such powers would otherwise be vested

from the duty of exercising the same, and in such case the said powers shall be vested in the next Senior Fellow in residence.

2. The Clause numbered 2 of the Statute of 1881 as to Officers so far only as is necessary for the purposes of the last preceding Clause is hereby repealed.

Fellows.

1. The number of Fellowships within the College (other than Honorary Fellowships and Fellowships without emolument) shall not be less than thirty nor greater than forty. An election to any Fellowship (other than as aforesaid) which shall fall vacant shall (subject to the provisions for postponement hereinafter contained) be held within a year of its so falling vacant; provided always that whenever more than two ordinary Fellowships are vacant at the same time it shall be competent for the President and Fellows, if they shall think fit, to postpone for such period, not exceeding two years from the date of vacancy, as they may think desirable, the election to one or more of such Fellowships in excess of the number of two.

2. The clauses numbered 1 and 4 of the Statute of 1881 as to Fellows are hereby repealed.

3. The examination for ordinary Fellowships shall as regards not less than one in six of such Fellowships have special reference to excellence in Theology, and as regards not less than one in six of such Fellowships to excellence in Mathematics, Natural Science, or Medicine.

4. The clause numbered 6 of the Statute of 1881 as to Fellows so far only as is necessary for the purposes of the last preceding clause is hereby repealed.

5. Whenever there shall be no duly qualified candidate for a vacant Fellowship whom the electors shall judge to be of sufficient merit for election, the election shall be postponed to some other day to be fixed by the President and Fellows for the purpose not later than six calendar months after the day previously fixed for the election.

6. The clause numbered 7 of the Statute of 1881 as to Fellows so far only as is necessary for the purpose of the last preceding clause is hereby repealed.

7. The number of Fellows elected or re-elected under clauses 20 and 21 of the Statute of 1881 as to Fellows shall not exceed six; and the number of such Fellows elected or re-elected on the qualification of undertaking to perform educational work in the College shall not at any time exceed two; and if there be already one such Fellow elected or re-elected on this qualification, a second shall not be elected on the like qualification, unless the total number of Fellows elected or re-elected under the said clauses shall at the time of such election already exceed four.

8. So much of the clause numbered 20 of the Statute of 1881 as to Fellows as limits the number of Fellows elected thereunder to four is hereby repealed.

9. In the clause numbered 22 of the Statute of 1881 as to Fellows twelve shall be substituted for eleven as the number of Fellowships which may be held officially by persons holding the offices therein mentioned, and the said clause shall be read and shall take effect accordingly.

10. The period of probation shall be dispensed with in the case of any person elected to an Official Fellowship as Dean of Divinity, Senior Dean of Arts, or Senior Bursar, and may be dispensed with on the election of any person to any Fellowship by a resolution then passed by all or a majority of not less than two-thirds at least of the electors present and voting.

11. The clause numbered 1 of the Statutes of 1888 as to Fellows is hereby repealed.

12. It shall be lawful for the President and Fellows in the manner and under the conditions specified in the clauses numbered 5 and 6 of the Statute of 1888 as to Fellows, to elect and admit to a Fellowship without emolument any person who shall have been President of the College, whether he shall have been an actual Fellow of the College or not. Any retired President elected a Fellow under this clause shall not be counted in the number of Fellows which it is permitted to elect under the said clause numbered 5 of the Statute of 1888 as to Fellows, but shall be additional thereto. No election shall be made under this clause during a vacancy in the office of President.

Professors.

The Professor of Mineralogy shall be called the Waynflete Professor of Mineralogy, and the Statute of 1881 as to Waynflete and other Professorships shall be read and shall take effect accordingly.

Pensions.

1. Retiring Pensions may be granted to Tutors and Bursars of the College under the following conditions:—

a. The scale of payment shall in no case exceed one-fortieth for each year of service of the maximum annual salary which shall have been received at any time during the period of service; so nevertheless that no pension shall exceed four hundred pounds per annum.

b. Any Tutor or Bursar may be permitted by the consent of a General Meeting to retire upon a pension in case of disability through illness or other infirmity, or after completing fifteen years of service; provided always that save in case of such disability as above mentioned no Tutor shall be permitted to retire upon a pension until after completing twenty years of service except upon the recommendation of the Tutorial Board.

c. The President and Fellows by resolution passed at an Extraordinary General Meeting (but in the case of a Tutor only upon the recommendation of the Tutorial Board) may enforce the retirement of any Tutor or Bursar without a pension if before the completion by him of fifteen years service or upon a pension if after such completion.

In the interpretation of this clause "service" shall be taken to mean any period or periods during which a person shall have acted in one or more of the following capacities, namely as Lecturer, Tutor, or Bursar of the College, and "salary" shall be taken to mean any annual remuneration paid to him while acting in such capacity or capacities, and in the case of a Fellow shall include the emoluments of his Fellowship, and in the case of a Tutor holding an official Fellowship shall also include the yearly sum of one hundred pounds payable to him out of the general revenues of the College.

2. The Pension Fund formed under the clause numbered 2 of the Statute of 1881 as to Pensions shall be continued. Ten per cent. per annum shall be deducted from the Tuition Fund and contributed to the Pension Fund, and the College shall also make a contribution to the Pension Fund of not less than five hundred pounds nor more than seven hundred pounds per annum out of the corporate revenue. The income of the Fund, being the annual sums so contributed together with the dividends or interest arising from investments made or to be made as hereinafter mentioned, shall be applied in the first place in payment of such pension or pensions

granted under this Statute as shall properly be chargeable to the year in which the said income shall accrue, and subject thereto shall be invested in any securities in which trust funds may legally be invested; provided nevertheless that no pension shall be granted to a Tutor or Bursar which the said income shall not in the judgment of the President and Fellows be sufficient to satisfy, and no pension to a Tutor or Bursar shall be payable except out of the said income. Every person to whom a pension chargeable on the said Fund shall have been granted shall be entitled to payment of the same in priority to all others to whom pensions chargeable on the said Fund shall have been subsequently granted. When the capital of the said Fund (being the aggregate of the investments made or to be made as aforesaid) shall have been raised to such an amount as in the judgment of the Visitor shall be sufficient, the payments from the Tuition Fund and from the Corporate revenue shall be discontinued save so far as may be required for payment of current pensions.

3. The Statute of 1881 as to Pensions is hereby repealed.

Demyships.

1. In clause 1 of the Statute of 1881 as to Demyships the words "definite scientific or literary study or occupation" shall be substituted for "definite scientific or literary employment," and in clause 3 of the same Statute the words "study or occupation" and "studies or occupations" shall be substituted for the words "profession or employment" and "professions or employments" respectively, and the said clauses shall be read and shall take effect accordingly.

2. The number of Junior Demyships within the College shall (subject to the provisions hereinafter contained) be thirty. The emoluments which a Junior Demy shall receive shall commence and be payable from the date of his coming into residence.

3. Every Junior Demy hereafter to be elected shall hold his Demyship for two years from a day to be fixed by the Board of Electors to such Demyship, and his Demyship shall determine at the end of such period of two years unless the Tutorial Board shall by certificate in writing have declared themselves satisfied with the industry and good conduct of the Demy, in which case the tenure of his Demyship shall be renewed for such period, not exceeding two years, as the Tutorial Board shall in each case determine, and the said tenure may from time to time be further renewed for such period as the Tutorial Board shall in each case determine, but so that the periods of tenure, original and renewed, shall not exceed four years in all; provided always that at the end of four years the Tutorial Board may extend the tenure of any Junior Demyship for one year longer if for special reasons they deem it advisable so to do, but so that the total number of Demyships the tenure whereof is extended beyond four years shall not at any time exceed five.

4. Any Junior Demyship, the tenure whereof is extended beyond four years, shall not be counted in the number of thirty above mentioned but shall be additional thereto, and the whole number of Junior Demyships shall be filled up as though no such extension of tenure beyond four years had taken place.

5. Nothing in the three last preceding clauses shall prevent the exercise at any time for any sufficient cause of the power of deprivation conferred by Clause 12 of the Statute of 1881 as to Demyships or of any power of inflicting fines or penalties less than deprivation under any By-law of the College for the time being in force.

6. The clause numbered 4 of the Statute of 1881 as to Demyships, so far only as is necessary for the purposes of the clauses numbered 2, 3 and 4 of this Statute, is hereby repealed, and the clause numbered 1 of the Statute of 1888 as to Demyships, is hereby repealed as regards Junior Demies hereafter to be elected.

7. In the clause numbered 8 of the Statute of 1881 as to Demyships, the words "such day or days in each year as the President and Fellows shall from time to time appoint," shall be substituted for the words "on a stated day or stated days in each year to be appointed by the President and Fellows," and the said clause shall be read and shall take effect accordingly.

Exhibitions.

1. A Fund to be called the Exhibition Fund shall be formed by the payment thereto of an annual sum of five hundred pounds out of the corporate revenue, and shall be applied to the granting of Exhibitions of such amounts and for such periods and to such persons being in need of support at the University and otherwise deserving, whether members of the College or not, as the President and Fellows or electors appointed by them for that purpose shall think fit.

2. The Statute of 1881 as to Exhibitions is hereby repealed.

A Statute to alter and amend a Statute framed by the University of Cambridge Commissioners appointed under "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877," in relation to Downing College in the University of Cambridge; such amending Statute being duly made at a general meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose and held on the twenty-sixth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and being passed at such meeting by the votes of the whole of the number of persons present and voting.

Whereas the said College was declared in the Statutes made for it by the said Commissioners to be intended mainly for the encouragement of the studies of Law and Medicine in all their branches and of the cognate subjects of Moral and Physical Science.

And whereas in Statute VI of the Statutes made by the said Commissioners for the said College it is enacted that the persons who shall be eligible to Fellowships in the said College shall not be above the age of thirty years.

And whereas such limitation of age may prejudice the interests of the College by preventing

the election of persons of mature experience in Law or in Medicine.

We the Master Professors and Fellows of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) in exercise of the powers given to us by the fifty-fourth section of the said Act do hereby alter the said Statute VI "Of the Fellows" by omitting from the first paragraph thereof the words "and who are not above the age of thirty years."

That any Statute made in exercise of the powers of this Act may at any time or times after the expiration of the powers by this Act conferred on the Special Commissioners be repealed or altered by the Governing Body for the time being in the same manner and subject to the same provisions with the exception of those requiring such Statutes to be submitted to and approved by the Special Commissioners in and subject to which Statutes may be made by the Governing Body.

And whereas by the said Statute made by the Special Commissioners on sixteenth May one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one it is enacted as follows:—

CLAUSE VII. No business shall be transacted at a Meeting of the Governing Body unless five Members at the least be present.

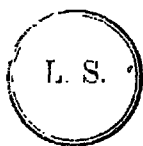

dated 24th January, 1898, that the undermentioned alterations have been made in the tidal signals shown at the various ports and harbours on the coast of France, and they now universally indicate the height of the tide either above the level to which the soundings have been reduced, viz, the lowest possible tide, in which case the number of feet indicated added to the soundings on the Chart will give the depth at the time any particular signal is shown; or above some fixed mark, whose relation with the low water tide level has been determined.

By Day.—The signals are made from a mast, with a yard across, by means of a black pendant, and a white flag with a black, diagonal cross, and black balls, as follows:—

1. The pendant above the flag indicates:—Rising tide.

2. The pendant below the flag indicates:—Falling tide. No flag or pendant is shown at high or low water.

3. A ball at the left yard-arm, as seen from seaward, indicates a height of about 10 inches above the soundings or fixed mark.

4. A ball at the right yard-arm, as seen from seaward indicates a height of $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the soundings or fixed mark.

5. A ball at each yard-arm indicates a height of $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the soundings or fixed mark.

6. A ball, placed on the mast, below the yard, indicates a height of $3\frac{1}{4}$ feet above the soundings or fixed mark.

7. A ball, placed on the mast, above the yard, indicates a height of $6\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the soundings or fixed mark.

8. A ball, placed at the intersection of the mast and yard, indicates a height of $9\frac{1}{4}$ feet above the soundings or fixed mark.

9. Heights above $9\frac{1}{4}$ feet are given by combinations of the above signals.

The signals are not made in complete detail at all ports, but any particular signal has the same meaning everywhere. They may be made for every half-metre or every metre of rise only, or indicate with one ball either heights of 1, 2, or 3 metres, or one only of those three. In some ports they indicate by flag or pendant only, without a ball, the time during which the sea level is above some fixed mark.

By Night.—The signals are arranged to suit the requirements of each particular port.

Berkshire and Buckinghamshire.—An Area comprising the parishes of Bray, and Cookham, and the municipal borough of Maidenhead, in the county of Berks, and also comprising the petty sessional divisions of the Hundred of Stoke, the Hundred of Desborough (First Division), and the Hundred of Desborough (Second Division), and the parishes of Wooburn, Boveney, Burnham, Dorney, Farnham Royal, Hedgerley Dean, Hitcham, and Taplow, in the county of Buckingham, and also comprising the borough of Chepping (or High) Wycombe (10 February, 1898).

Gloucestershire.—(1.) An Area in the county of Gloucester comprising the parishes of Stroud, Bisley with Lippiatt, Chalford, Stonehouse, Rodborough, Kings Stanley, Leonard Stanley, Standish, Randwick, Woodchester, Whiteshill, Cainscross, Uplands, and Thrupp (26 January, 1897).
