The fire brigades were under the direction of Mr. D. G. Dyson, of Windsor.

Her Majesty, after inspecting the firemen, who were drawn up in line, drove between the lines of the steam and manual engines.

The Queen inspected in the Quadrangle the two officers and 27 men of the Irish Constabulary who had taken part in the Jubilee Procession on the 22nd inst.

The officers, Mr. Singleton, Commandant, and Mr. Tyson were presented to Her Majesty by Major-General Sir John McNeill, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., \$1.6., and The Queen spoke a few words to them.

After dinner Her Majesty witnessed from the Corridor a Torchlight Procession of the Eton boys.

The School entered the Quadrangle, headed by the Band and Drums of the Coldstream Guards and by the Scots Guards Pipers, to the following tunes:—

- "Cheer, Boys, Cheer" England.
- "The Athole Gathering" Scotland.
- "St. Patrick's Day" Ireland.
- "The March of the Men of Harlech" Wales.

"God Save The Queen" was sung by the boys, who afterwards gave three cheers for The Queen, and one more for Her Imperial Majesty The Empress Frederic.

The following formations were performed by the torch-bearers:—"V.R.," "LX.," "The Rose," "The Union Jack," and the following songs were sung:—"God Save The Queen," "Reign of Reigns," "Queen and Mother," "The Eton Boating Song," "Victoria our Queen," "Carmen Etonense," "Rule Britannia," "Post lustra bis Sep," at the conclusion of which the boys gave three times three cheers for The Queen. They then marched past to the tune of "Auld Lang Syne," leaving the Quadrangle to the tune of "'95."

The Winchester Cricket Eleven were present in the Quadrangle by invitation of The Queen.
