Milan, August 30.

Is Confirmed by the last Letters from the Duke of Savoy's Camp, that the German and Spanish Troops that were marched towards the Valley of Aoste, are Countermanded, in order to Fight the French Army before they had received the Reinforcements they expect. Monsieur Catinat is retired in the mean time between Pignerol and Villa Franca, and has sent Detachments to secure the Pass of Susa, and the Passages into Dauphine, which however has not hindered the Excursions of the Vaudois.

Venice, Septemb. 6. We have no fresh Letters from the Army, but the ordinary Advices from Hungary say, That Prince Lewis had pass'd the Danube near Peter Waradin, with a Resolution as 'twas believed to join the Imperial Forces that came from Transilvania, under the Command of General Veterani, and after that to Attack Temeswar or Great Waradin. That the Turks since their late defeat have quitted Possega, and all the other places they were possid'd of in Sclavonia. That the Enemies Opinion that Action appeared every day greater, and that they all conclude, the Grand Viceroy was killed, though they had not yet found his Body, which Prince Lewis had order'd to be searched for. We have an account from Colonel Selicke, who at present Commands the Blockade of Great Waradin, that being informed that the Enemy had several Hundred Head of Cattle in the Meadows near the Town, he sent a Party of Hussars to drive them from thence towards a Wood, where he posted himself with 400 Horse: The Hussars Executed their Orders, and the Turks there upon killed one of the Town, and falling into the Ambush Colonel Selicke had laid for them, were most of them killed or taken Prisoners. On Sunday last Count Nicestomoni was sent from hence by the Emperor, to present to the Pope one of the best of the Standards lately taken from the Turks; the rest are expos'd in the Chappel of St. Anthony of Padua; Among these Standards is that which belonged to the G and Viceroy, that of the Aga of the Janiferies, and that of the Volunteers; They are most of them Embroider'd with Gold and Silver, and Arabick Letters, containing several Sentences out of the Alcoran. The Emperor in Consideration of the great Services of Prince Lewis, has declared him Lieutenant General of all his Forces, as the Duke of Lorraine formerly was; and Prince Charles Thieriot of Lorraine, who is gone back to the Army, is made Colonel of the Regiment of Horse of Hesse.

Zell, August 24. On the 16th instant Sir William Colt, Envoy extraordinary from Their Majesties of Great Britain at this Court, made a very Splendid Entertainment on occasion of the happy Accession of Their Majesties Arms in Ireland, which was followed with a very fine Banquet, and the running of Wine among the Spectators. The same day the Duke after Singing of Te Deum in the Churches, caused the Cannon to be fired round the Town and Castle, as also at Harbourg, a Fort is on the Elbe over against Hamburg. And the Sunday following there was the like Rejoicing at Brunswick and Wolfenbuttel by order of the Duke of Wolfenbuttel.

Berlin, Septemb. 1. Last Night we had a great Storm, with Thunder and Lightning, which has done a great deal of mischief to the Fortresses of Spandau, two Miles from this place; The Vault under one of the Battions was burst, and the Magazine of Powder that lay there, took Fire, and blew up the said Battion; the Cannon were thrown into the River, and the Wachtmeister and his Family, who lived near it, and 12 Prisoners, with as many of the German Soldiers that were posted thereabouts, are still missing, and supposed to be Swallow'd up in the Ruines; which the Elector has been himself this Morning to view, and to order them to be repaired.

From the Saxon and Confederate Camp near Termentz, Sept. 7. The Forage hereabouts growing very scarce, it is resolv'd that we shall decamp on the 10th, and march to Rackingen, about 2 Leagues from hence. The French Army according to our last advice was encamped near Badon, on the other side of Baden, not far from Fort Louis, and was very much weakened by Sickness. We have likewise

a great many Sick in our Camp. The Electoral Prince of Saxony returned hither this day from Tubingen, with the good News of the Electors Recovery, who is now so well as to walk about in his Chamber. Just now we have advice, that the French had attack'd the Fort near Biederach in the Kinzinger Dal, and that they were repair'd with great loss, some speak of 1000 Men.

Cologne, Septemb. 14. The Marquis de Harcourt moves with the Troops under his Command towards Luxembourg; The Neighbourers are still posted near Lommersdorf. We hear from the Moselle, that one of our Parties of 200 Men have defeated 300 French that were out upon an excursion.

Frankfurt, Septemb. 14. The Letters from Lemberg in Poland of the 23d past, tell us, That the Army of that Crown after their Conjunction with the Troops of Lithuania, had pass'd the Nister; and that the King followed them, and was resolv'd to march into Moldavia.

Paris, Sept. 14. The last Letters from Piedmont say, that the Troops sent towards Savoy, were order'd to return, and join the Army, and that they expected in the Duke's Camp a Train of heavy Cannon, in order to execute some great design. The Vaudois have made of late several incursions towards Senz in Provence. A Declaration is published here, which requires the bringing all the pieces of 3 Sols and a half into the Mint, where they are to have a new Mark put upon them, and after that are to be given out again at 4 Sols, by which the King gains the 8th part; Several other Projects are daily set on foot for the raising of Money, which are put in Execution, with difficulty enough. This Court continues very Jealous of the new Converts, and has given repeated Orders to the Intendants of the several Provinces, to have a very strict Eye upon them. At Rochelle they have taken away the Children of several, whom they suspect not to be real Converts. Monsieur le Blanc, eldest Counsellor in the Chief Court of Justice at Sedan, and aged about 70 years, is Condemn'd to the Gallies, and his Wife shut up in a Monastery, for endeavoring to depart the Kingdom.

Brussels, Septemb. 16. Our Army is still encamped near Aeth, and the French towards Lessines. The Forces which lay at Gaux on the Schelde, under the Command of the Marquis de Gastanaga our Governor General, are separated; part of them are gone back to their Garisons in Flanders; four Battalions are posted on the Canal near P. l'orde, and the rest are encamped between this place and the Burnt-Bridge. The Confederate Troops, Commanded under the Landgrave of Hesse, by the Baron de Fleming, pick'd the Meuse the 12th instant at Namur; we know not yet whether they will direct their march; they make with the Troops of Liege 12000 Foot, and 6 or 7000 Horse. The Marquis de Boufflers is encamped on the River Effe with 4000 Horse, and two Battalions, detached from the Duke of Luxembourg's Army, and part of the Garisons of Dinant and Charlemont; And the Marquis de Harcourt, Governor of Luxembourg, is marching to Reinforce him.

Utrecht, Septemb. 18. The Duke of Luxembourg's continuing his Resolution not to Fight, although our Army was incited by the marching off of the Landgrave of Hesse, and having so posted himself, that he could not be forced to it, His Majesty left the Army yesterday Morning near Aeth, and is come to this place in his way to Breida.

Hague, Septemb. 18. The King has left the Army in Flaners under the Command of Prince Waldecke, and will be this Night at Breda, where His Majesty will stay one day, and then go and pass 4 or 5 at Loos. The Landgrave of Hesse, and the Generals Fleming and Tilly, have pick'd the Meuse at Namur, and are marching with 20000 Men, in order to Fight the Marquis de Boufflers, who is at present about Rochfort and Chimay, or else to take their Winter Quarters in the Country of Luxembourg.

From the Camp before Limerick, September 2. On the 25th of the last Month we decamp'd from Carrickish, and about 3 in the Afternoon came before this place, our Left reaching to the River, but the Enemy plac'd several pieces of Cannon on the other side, which oblig'd a Regiment of Dragoons, and another of Horse, that were posted nearest

to it, to remove to a little more distance from thence. We advanced to *Cromwell's Fort* without any opposition, the Enemy quitting that and the Line of Communication they had made to the Church, and retiring within their Trenchments that are nearer the Town; A Detachment of 80 of our Grenadiers were immediately ordered to Attack one of their Out-works, being a new Fort, guarded by 600 Men, which upon our Men's advancing, they abandoned after one discharge, and fled by the Covered Way into the Town; The Grenadiers entered the Fort, and pursued the Enemy, of whom they killed several, and took about 20 Prisoners, with the loss of but one Man on our side. Colonel *Dunlop* of the *Danish Horse* was killed this Night by a Random Shot. The 26th our heavy Cannon and Mortars came up, and we began to work on our Lines of Communication. The 27th a Battery was raised against *Phonand-Bridge*. The same day the Prince of *Hesse-Darmstadt* marched with a Detachment of Foot, Horse, and Dragoons, and 3 pieces of Cannon, to attack *Castle-Cornell*. And Lieutenant General *Serwennmore* went with another Detachment to reduce *Carrick a Gunnel*, which presently surrendered, and 250 of the Enemy in Garrison there, were made Prisoners of War. Our light frigates came and Anchored within sight of the Town, Captain *Cole* lying with the rest about 6 Miles off; The Irish upon the first appearance of them expressed a mighty Joy, believing them to be French, and were as much troubled when they found their Mistake: Most of the Enemies Horse lay encamped near the River, about 4 Miles from *Limerick*, but the Cannon of our Ships forced them to remove from thence; They have another Camp for their Horse under the Cannon of the Town. The 28 *Castle-Cornell*, a very strong Castle, was surrendered, there being in it a Garrison of 100 Men. We have taken likewise other Castles hereabouts, and in them above 900 Prisoners. On the 30th we began to play upon the Town with 9 Mortars, which set it on fire in several places, but did not burn long; On the 31st Nine Cannon began to play on the Bridge, to ruin it, and to hinder the Enemies Communication with their Camp. That Night we placed in Battery two Mortars more of 18 Inches Diameter, and we have now finished two Batteries, one of 14 pieces, and the other of 10, all 24 and 18 Pounders. Defenders come daily over to us, who say, there is a strong Garrison in the Town, but that they are not above half Armed, and that they are in want of Provisions. Our Lines of Communication are finished; and we are to begin to work this day on a Line of Circumvallation.

The General, upon advice that several Regiments of the Enemies Horse, with a Party of Rapparies, were drawn together in *Kerry*, about 16 miles from hence, detached Brigadier *Love* with 500 Horse and Dragoons. The Party being informed of his march, divided themselves into two Parties, for their more easy Retreat; Brigadier *Love* followed the like, and with part of his Detachment pursued one of the Enemies Parties, whilst Colonel *Newcomb*, with the rest pursued the other; And the Brigadier has sent the General word, That he had taken up in the Party which he pursued, consisting of 2 Regiments of Horse, and a great number of Rapparies, and routed them, very few escaping, and had taken the Lord *Murton*, with several other Prisoners, and a great Prey of Cattle of all sorts; And we are expecting the like good account from Colonel *Newcomb*, who was in close pursuit of the other Party.

Falmouth, September 7. Yesterday arrived here the *Sarah*, and the *Thomas and Richard*, both of *London*, and bound home for the *Bermudas*: They came from thence about 9 Weeks ago in Company of a great Fleet of Merchant Men, from whom they were separated some days after. Here are come in likewise the *Princess of London* from *Galpat*; and the *Angel Guardian* from *O Porto*.

Penzance, September 8. Yesterday Admiral *Ruffel* set Sail from hence with the Fleet under his Command for *Portsmouth*: Sir *Cleavelly Snowel*, Rear Admiral of the Fleet remains here in a Ship Rare; The *Royal Oak* that was a Ground is got off with very little Damage. This day arrived here Their Majesties Ship the *Tiger Prize* from the *Leeward Islands*, and brings an account, that the homeward bound *Bombardier* Fleet, consisting of 75 Merchant Ships, under the Convoy of the Prince's *Anne* and the *Princess*, were on Sunday last off the *Old Head of Kinsale*, standing into that Harbour.

Perthmouth, September 10. The English and Dutch Fleet is come to an Anchor at *St. Helens* and *Spitzberg*, out of which will be detached a strong Squadron to go northward to Sea again.

Deal, September 10. Their Majesties Ship the *Vanguard* as she was coming yesterday into the *Loynes* from the Westward, had the Misfortune to run aground on the *Goodwin Sands*, but with the help that was lent from hence, she got off again this Morning Tyde, but having made so great a Leak, that they could not keep her above Water, they were forced to run her ashore in *Saxwich Bay*, where not only the Men, Guns, and all her Tackle and Fur-

niture will be saved; but its hoped the Ship too, if the Weather proves fair.

Sandwich, September 12. Several of the Guns are already taken out of the *Vanguard*, and more will be taken out this Tide, which has very much lightened her; The Ship sets upright, and in a very good place, at low Tide there is but two Foot and half Water, so that they may easily come to stop her Leaks, and we have great hopes of saving her.

Whitehall, September 10. Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of *Denmark* returned hither this day from *Timbridge*.
