Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

HE following General Order, dated 11th March, 1898, publishing corrections in the letter from the Adjutant-General in India and General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart's Despatch of the 26th January, 1898 (published in the London Gazette of the 5th April, 1898), has been received from the Government of India:-

No. 270.—THE following corrections are made in the letter from the Adjutant-General in India and Sir William Lockhart's despatch describing the operations of the Tirah Expeditionary Force from 1st November, 1897 to the 26th January, 1898, published in G.G.O. No. 244 of 1898 :-

304.—THE Right Honourable the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the subjoined letter from the Adjutant-General in India, submitting a despatch from Colonel G. L. R. Richardson, C.I.E., 18th Bengal Lancers, describing the operations of the Flying Column, Kohat Field Force, from 20th August to 1st October, 1897. From Major-General G. De C. Morton, C.B.,

I HAVE the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to forward, for the information of the Government of India, the accompanying letter\* from the Lieutenant-General Commanding the Forces, Punjab, transmitting a report from Colonel G. L. R. Richardson, C.I.E., 18th Bengal Lancers, describing the operations of the Flying Column under his command from the 20th August to 1st October, 1897.

2. His Excellency endorses the commendatory remarks made by the Lieutenant-General Commanding the Forces, Punjab, in paragraph 2 of his transmitting letter, and recommends that the report may be treated as a despatch and published

in the Gazette of India.

From Lieutenant-General Sir G. B. Wolseley, K.C.B., Commanding the Forces, Punjab, to the Adjutant-General in India,—(No. 927-A, dated Rawal Pindi, the 11th February, 1898).

I HAVE the bonour to forward for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, a letter from Colonel G. L. R. Richardson, commanding 18th Bengal Lancers, submitting a report on the operations conducted by him with the flying column, Kohat Field Force, from 20th August to 1st October, 1897.

2. In recording my approval of the operations of the column, I desire to bring to notice, for His Excellency's favourable consideration, the good and prompt work of Colonel Richardson and all under his command, especially Lieutenant-Colonel H. A. Abbott, commanding the 15th Sikhs.

From Colonel G. L. R. Richardson, C.I.E., Commanding 18th Bengal Lancers and the Flying Column, Kohat Field Force, to the Deputy Adjutant-General, Punjab Command, -(No. 18, dated Shinawari, the 28th January,

FOR the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief I have the honour to submit a report on the operations conducted by me with the Flying Column, Kohat Field Force, extending from the 20th August, 1597, to the 1st October, 1897.

2. Had Major-General Yeatman-Biggs been alive I should, of course, have submitted this report through him, but owing to his unfortunate death I trust that the Lieutenant-General Commanding the Punjab will kindly forward the ment with a half battalion of the 5th Punjab report with such remarks as he may think fit.

From Colonel G. L. R. Richardson, C.I.E., 18th Bengal Lancers, and Commanding Flying Column, Kurram Valley, to the Deputy Adjutant-General, Punjab Command (dated Camp Shinawari, the 28th January, 1898).

FOR the information of the Lieutenaut-

General Commanding, Punjab, I have the honour to report that I assumed command at Kohat on

the 20th August, 1897.

2. On the 20th August, owing to urgent telegraphic information from the officer on special duty in Kurram, I considered it necessary to form a flying column for prompt action in the Kurram The Deputy Commissioner, Kohat, Valley. agreeing with me, I submitted my plans and general dispositions for the approval of the Lieutenant-General Commanding.

3. Sanction being accorded on 21st August, 1 concentrated the column, marginally noted,\* at Hangu, and assumed command of the Column, with Captain Kennedy, 3rd Punjab Cavalry, as

my Staff Officer.

- 4. I continued to receive disquieting reports from Sadda and Para Chinar. My intention was to move the column higher up the valley, towards Doaba and Surzai, where possibly I could better support the Samana and Upper Kurram. Major-General Yeatman-Biggs, who had in the meanwhile assumed command at Kohat, preferred my remaining at Hangu and issued orders to that effect.
- 5. On the 25th August I proceeded with two guns of No. 2 Derajat Mountain Battery and the 5th Punjab Infantry to put a convoy of ammunition in o Fort Leckbart. The route taken was by Pat Darband and Dhar. No opposition was offered, and there were no difficulties on the road.
- 6. On the 27th August I saw a large tribal gathering, reported to be Orakzais, with several standards, massed on the Samana Ridge, in the vicinity of the Laka Post, garrisoned by local levies, and whose position appeared to me to be one requiring immediate action on my part. I at once ordered the force marginally noted† under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott, 15th Sikhs, to move out to the relief of the Laka garrison. At mid-day the little force marched out, but at 1 P.M., as the number of standards on the ridge appeared to be increasing, I took a halfbattalion, 5th Punjab Infantry, and moved to the support of Lieutenant - Colonel Abbott. About 3 P.M. I could see that Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott's force had crowned the ridge, and at 4 P.M. received the following helio from top: "Laka relieved; am taking garrison with me. Saifuldarra hard pressed; an enemy in force between. Will move to their relief directly." As Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott's force advanced along the ridge, I kept along the base, on his left flank, with the object of possibly assisting him. About 7 P.M. I heard heavy firing in the direction of the Saifuldarra gorge, and was fortunate enough to meet the head of Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott's force coming down the gorge. I was then excellently placed to cover the retire-

Infantry under Lieutenant-Colonel Jameson.

7. The enemy followed up the retirement for a considerable distance with great vigour, but were well held in check by the rear-guard,-5th Punjab Infantry. Concentrating the entire force on the Hangu-road I marched back to camp, reaching Hangu about 10 P.M., Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott reporting to me that he had successfully relieved the posts of Laka and Saifuldarra, and brought down the garrisons. That night both posts were dismantled and burnt by the Orakzais.

8. I cannot speak too highly of the able manner in which Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott handled his small force. The fact that this force, in the middle of an August day, captured the Samana Ridge, relieved Laka and Saifuldarra, and fought a rear-guard action home, with the loss of 1 sepoy killed, I wounded, 1 follower killed, 1 wounded, testifies to the skill with which the operation was conducted.

9. On the 29th August the Hangu Post was largely re-inforced, which permitted my despatching a force, strength vide margin\*, under Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott, in the direction of Doaba, reported unsettled and mischievous.

10. Major-General Yeatman-Biggs arrived at Hangu on the 31st August and assumed command, dividing the troops into two brigades. I was allotted the 1st brigade, consisting of the troops

marginally noted.†

11. On the 1st September Major-General Yeatman-Biggs detailed me to form my brigade into a flying column and push on with the greatest possible haste to the relief of Sadda and Para Chinar, 70 miles distant, and reported to be in peril and in dan, er of being attacked on the 3rd September. The disposition of my flying column on the 1st September stood as follows.

Under Lieutenant-Colonel H. A. Abbott (15th

Sikhs), at Doaba ‡

Under Colonel G. L. R. Richardson at Hangu.§ 12. At mid-day, on the 1st September, I marched out of Hangu for Doabs. The heat was intense, but the gallant officers and men under my command were not to be denied, and marched throughout a desperately hot day, on an open plain, with very little water and absolutely no shade, making Doaba, distant 22 miles, at 10.30 P.M. I had in the meanwhile sent on orders to Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott to push on towards Sadda. It appears that Lieutenant - Colonel Abbott on approaching Doaba the day previously had been opposed; the advanced squadron, 18th Bengal Lancers, under Captain Chesney, was engaged, and killed three of the enemy.

13. On the 2nd September finding the country round Doaba unsettled, I dropped the 1-3rd Gurkhas, under Lieutenant-Colonel Pulley, with orders to remain at Doaba and keep the road open. At 4 A.M. I moved forward with three squadrons, 18th Bengal Lancers, under Captain Eardley-Wilmot, towards Thal, distant 13 miles. leaving orders for Lieutenant-Colonel Jameson

5th Punjab Infantry, to escort the guns and Native Field Hospital into Thal during the day.

14. At Thal I found Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott with his force, and by mid-day the whole of my flying column was concentrated, with the exception of the 1-3rd Gurkhas at Doaha.

15. During the temporary halt at Thal some men, subsequently reported to be residents of Thal, fired on the 18th Bengal Lancers while watering in the Kurram River. The regiment quickly mounted and gave pursuit; the enemy had a long start, and the ground was very strong, and intersected with ravines; but I am glad to say that the cavalry were fortunate enough to inflict a punishment of five killed and one wounded\* on the raiders—a most excellent deterrent against future misdemeanours, and greatly steadied the country.

16. At 6.45 P.M. the same day the force marginally noted† left Thal with orders to make Sadda, distant 34 miles, the next day if possible,

under Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott.

17. On the 3rd September I moved with four squadrons of the 18th Bengal Lancers, at daybreak, and marched as far as Alazai, distant 20 miles, when, finding Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott had moved on, I halted and continued my march towards Sadda early on the 4th September, reaching Sadda about 10 A.M., which place Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott had arrived at at 6.30 P.M. on the 3rd.

18. It was very apparent that the rapid and unexpected approach of the flying column had completely demoralized the enemy, as the tribal gathering, which so recently menaced Upper Kurram, had completely dispersed. I therefore sent orders back to the rest of my column not to needlessly hurry up.

19. I venture to record the fact that the flying column under my command covered as nearly as possible 70 miles in 70 hours, while the advanced partion under Lieutenant-Colonel Abbott covered

the last 34 miles in  $23\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

20. His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief was good enough to record his approval of the parformance of the column under my command, which I had much pleasure in communicating to the officers and men composing my column.

21. At Sadda I utilized the garrison to prepare an entrenched position on a plateau north-east of Sadda and about one mile south-west of the

Karmanna Darra.

22. On the night of the 16th-17th September, about 10.30 P.M., the camp was attacked by a lashkar, comprising some 2,000 Mazuzais and Chamkannis, who were repulsed with loss shortly after midnight.

23. The report of the engagement was submitted to the General Officer Commanding Kohat-Kurram Force and published in G.G.O., No. 1417, dated Fort William, 24th December 1897.

24. On several occasions tribal gatherings were reported as collecting in the Karmanna Darra for a fresh attack on Sadda, but the punishment inflicted on the 16th and 17th September was sufficiently severe to shake their confidence, and they gave me no further cause for anxiety.

25. On the 1st October, 1897, the flying column under my command was broken up. In submitting this report I venture to hope that the duty allotted to the column has been carried out

to your satisfaction.

26. I have the honour to bring to your notice, for the favourable consideration of His Excellency

the Commander-in-Chief, the undermentioned officers:-

Lieutenant-Colonel H. A. Abbott, commanding the 15th Sikhs, who was my right-hand man throughout the operations. His vast experience and untiring energy I cannot speak too highly of. He is a most valuable officer.

Captain H. Kennedy, 3rd Punjab Cavalry, was my staff officer from the formation of the flying column to the day I gave up the command. With no staff to assist him and no office, he conducted the duties of Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General and Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General with great zeal and tact. I cannot speak too highly of the services rendered by this officer.

27. My thanks are also due to the following officers to whose services the success attending the movements of the flying column are largely

due :--

Lieutenant-Colonel R. F. Jameson, commanding the 5th Punjab Infantry.

Captain I. Eardley-Wilmot, commanding the 18th Bengal Lancers.

Captain J. L. Parker, Royal Artillery, commanding No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery.
Captain W. J. D. Dundee, Royal Engineers,

Captain W. J. D. Dundee, Royal Engineers, commanding No. 4 Company, Bombay Sappers and Miners.

# Foreign Office, May 3, 1898.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received the following Note from the American Ambassador at this Court:—

American Embassy,

MY LORD, London, April 23, 1898.

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Lordship that I have been informed of the intention of the Government of the United States, in the event of hostilities between that Government and Spain, not to resort to privateering, but to adhere to the following recognized rules of International Law:

First, the neutral flag covers enemy's goods, with the exception of contraband of war;

Second, neutral goods, with the exception of contraband of war, are not liable to capture under the enemy's flag; and

Third, blockades, in order to be binding, must be effective. I have, &c.,

#### Foreign Office, May 3, 1898.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, through Her Majesty's Embassy at Madrid, the following Translation of a Decree issued by the Spanish Government on the 23rd of April, 1898:—

Royal Decree.

In accordance with the advice of my Council of Ministers; in the name of my son, King Alfonso XIII, and as Queen-Regent of the Kingdom,

I decree as follows :-

ART. I. The state of war existing between Spain and the United States terminates the Treaty of Peace and Friendship of the 27th October, 1795, the Protocol of the 12th January, 1877, and all other agreements, compacts, and conventions that have been in force up to the present between the two countries.

ART. II. A term of five days from the date of the publication of the present Royal Decree in the Madrid Gazette is allowed to all United States' ships anchored in Spanish ports, during which

they are at liberty to depart.

ART. III. Notwithstanding that Spain is not bound by the Declaration signed in Paris on the 16th April, 1856, as she expressly stated her wish not to adhere to it, my Government, guided by the principles of international law, intends to observe and hereby orders that the following Regulations for maritime law be observed :

(a.) A neutral flag covers the enemy's goods,

except contraband of war.

(b.) Neutral goods, except contraband of war, are not liable to confiscation under the enemy's flag.

(c.) A blockade to be binding must be effective; that is to say, maintained with a sufficient force to actually prevent access to the

enemy's coast.

ART. IV. The Spanish Government, while maintaining their right to issue letters of marque, which they expressly reserved in their note of the 16th May, 1857, in reply to the request of France for the adhesion of Spain to the Declaration of Paris relative to Maritime Law, will organize for the present a service of "Auxiliary Cruisers of the Navy," composed of ships of the Spanish Mercantile Navy, which will co-operate with the latter for the purposes of cruising, and which will be subject to the statutes and jurisdiction of the

ART. V. In order to capture the enemy's ships, to confiscate the enemy's merchandise under their own flag, and contraband of war under any flag, the Royal Navy, auxiliary cruisers, and privateers, if and when the latter are authorized, will exercise the right of visit on the high seas and in the territorial waters of the enemy, in accordance with international law and any regulations which may be published for the purpose.

ART. VI. Under the denomination contraband of war, the following articles are included:-

Caunons, machine-guns, mortars, guns, all kinds of arms and fire-arms, bullets, bombs, grenades, fuzes, cartridges, matches, powder, sulphur, saltpetre, dynamite, and every kind of explosive, articles of equipment like uniforms, straps, saddles and artillery and cavalry harness, engines for ships and their accessories, shafts, screws, boilers and other articles used in the construction, repair, and arming of war-ships, and in general all warlike instruments, utensils, tools, and other articles, and whatever may hereafter be determined to be contraband.

ART. VII. Captains, Commanders, and officers of non-American vessels or of vessels manned as to one-third by other than American citizens, captured while committing acts of war against Spain, will be treated as pirates, with all the rigour of the law, although provided with a licence issued by the Republic of the United States.

ART. VIII. The Minister of State and the Minister of Marine are charged to see the fulfilment of the present Royal Decree and to give the

orders necessary for its execution.

Translation.) Your Excellency

HIS Majesty the King, and in his name the Queen-Regent, have been pleased to approve of the annexed instructions for exercising the right of visit. They have been drawn up by the Minister of Marine in accordance with Article 5 of the Royal Decree issued by the President of the Council of Ministers on yesterday's date.

Instructions for the Exercise of the Right of Visit.

(Translation.)

1. Right of visit can only be exercised by belligerents; hence it can evidently be only resorted to during international conflicts by one or other of the States at war, as also during internal civil or insurrectionary wars, when one or more foreign Powers have recognized the insurrectionary party as belligerents. In such circumstances, right of visit can be exercised by the mother country, but it is restricted to the merchant vessels of the nation or nations who have given this recognition, and who are for such reason in the position of neutrals.

2. In accordance with the position laid down in the preceding Article, ships of war and merchant vessels of the belligerents, when legally armed either as auxiliary cruisers of their navy or as privateers, if and when they are authorized, may in their own territorial waters, or those under the jurisdiction of the enemy, or in the open seas, detain such merchant vessels as they meet with in order to verify the legitimacy of their flag, and, if neutrals, and proceeding to a port of the other belligerent, the nature of their

3. Seas subject to the sovereign jurisdiction of neutral Powers are absolutely inviolable: right of visit may not therefore be resorted to within them, even if it be alleged that it was attempted to exercise such right in the open sea, and that, on chase being given, and without losing sight of the vessel pursued, the latter

penetrated into neutral waters. Neither may the violation of the rights attaching to such waters be justified under the pretext that the coast washed thereby was undefended or uninhabited.

4. The following is the method of exercising

right of visit:-

(A.) Notification to the vessel to be visited to lay to and state its nationality is made by the visiting vessel hoisting her national flag and firing a blank shot, a signal upon which the merchant vessel is bound to hoist the flag of the

nation to which it belongs and lay to.

(B.) If the merchant vessel does not obey this first intimation, and either refuses to hoist her flag or does not lay to, a second gun will be fired, this time loaded, care being taken that the shot does not strike the vessel, though going sufficiently close to her bows for the vessel to be duly warned; and if this second intimation be disregarded, a third shot will be fired at the vessel, so as to damage her, if possible, without sinking her. Whatever be the damage caused to the merchant vessel by this third shot, the Commanding Officer of the man-of-war or Captain of the privateer cannot be made responsible.

Nevertheless, in view of special circumstances.

merchantman, the auxiliary vessel of war or [ privateer may delay resorting to the last extremity until some other measure has been taken, such as not aiming the third discharge at the vessel, but approaching it and making a fresh notification by word of mouth; but if this last conciliatory measure prove fruitless, force will immediately be resorted to.

(C.) The visiting vessel will place herself at such distance as her Commander or Captain may think convenient from the vessel to be visited, according to circumstances of wind, sea, current, or the suspicion inspired by the said vessel; and if these circumstances make it advisable for the beat about to make visit to approach on the windward side and go to leeward on returning, there is no reason why she should not do so.

But if, by existing Treaties between the nations to which the vessels respectively belong, the distance to be kept is specified, such a clause of Conventional Law shall be respected, if the circumstances of wind, sea, or current above

mentioned permit:

(D.) The visiting vessel will send to the merchant vessel a boat with an officer, who will effect the visit in question, under a verbal commission from his Commanding Officer; said officer may board the merchant vessel in company with two or three of the crew of the boat, but it will be left to his discretion whether he shall do so or

go alone.

(E.) The visiting officer will inform the Captain of the merchant vessel that, under com-mission from the Commander of the Spanish ship of war, or of the auxiliary cruiser (here follows name of ship of war or auxiliary cruiser), or from the Captain of the privateer (here follows name of vessel), he intends to effect a visit, and will request him to produce his sailing papers, or official document which takes their place, in proof of the nationality of the vessel therein stated being that of the flag which he has hoisted, and to show the port to which the vessel is proceeding.

Should the first point be satisfactorily proved, and should the port of destiny prove to be a neutral one, the visit is thereby concluded.

But should the vessel be proceeding to a port belonging to the enemy of the nation to which the visiting vessel belongs, the officer will ask the Captain of the merchant vessel for the documents in which the nature of the cargo is stated, in order to ascertain if there be contraband of war; should there be none the visit is definitely concluded, and the neutral vessel is at liberty to proceed on its voyage; but should there be contraband its capture is proceeded with, but no search may, in these circumstances,

5 The visiting officer should have instructions from his Commanding Officer authorising the visited vessel to continue her voyage, if the visit has presented no difficulties, in order that the delay may not be longer than is absolutely

indispensable.

6. If the Captain of the visited vessel asks to have the visit certified the visiting officer will accede to his request and will insert a note in the sheet for the day in the ship's books in the

following form :-

7. The visit will likewise be recorded in the books of the visiting vessel, the following circumstances being stated:—
(A.) Details of the intimation or intimations

given to the visited vessel.

(B.) Hour of its laying to.

C.) Name and nationality of visited vessel and Captain thereof.

(D.) Manner in which visit was effected, and its result, stating name of officer who executed

(E.) Hour at which vessel was authorized to

proceed.

8. The record of the visit, which, as stated in Article VI, can be made at the wish of the Captain of the visited vessel, will become an indispensable formality should the vessel contain wounded or sick soldiers, subjects of the enemy, for in such a case all such persons will, by the mere act of visit, be incapacitated from bearing arms again during the war, in accordance with the 1st paragraph of the Xth Additional Article of the Geneva Convention.

The visiting officer will therefore in such a case make a notification of the same to the chief of the expeditionary force, and will make a note in the books of the visited vessel in the form prescribed in Article VI, with the following

addition:-

This vessel contains (number of sick and wounded) individuals (of the army or navy or both) sick and wounded, subjects of the enemy, all of whom, by the fact of this visit, are incapacitated from bearing arms again during the war, according to paragraph 1 of the Xth Additional Article of the Geneva Convention, of which I have made notification to the Commander of the expeditionary force, who stated that he was (here follow rank and name).

9. The visit is not an act of jurisdiction on the part of the belligerent; it is a natural means of legitimate defence allowed by international law, lest fraud and bad faith should assist the enemy. This right should therefore be exercised with the greatest moderation by the belligerent, special care being taken to avoid causing. the neutral any extortion, damage, or trouble,

that is not absolutely justifiable.

In consequence of this, the detention of the ship visited should always be as short as possible, and the proceedings restricted as far as they can be, their exclusive object being, as explained, for the belligerent to accertain the neutrality of the ship, and in case of its neutrality (if bound for a port of the enemy) the inoffensive and neutral description of its cargo.

It is not necessary, therefore, to demand during the visit any other documents than those proving these two conditions, for what the belligerent requires is to prevent any damage, favouring, or assisting the enemy; to prevent assistance and help being furnished to them that may contribute directly to the prolongation of the war, and not to be assured that all ships belonging to neutral Powers are provided with all the documents required by the laws of their country

.10. In consequence of the visit the vessel is

captured in the following cases:-

(1.) If the nationality of the vessels proves to

immunities established by the Geneva Convention by which Spain is bound.

(The said exceptions are given at the end of these instructions.)

(2.) If active resistance is offered to the visit, that is, if force is employed to escape it.

(3.) If a legal document to prove the nation-

ality cannot be produced.

(4.) If bound for the enemy's ports, the vessel cannot produce a document proving the nature of the cargo.

(5.) If the cargo is composed in whole or more than two-thirds of contraband of war.

In the case of the illicit part of the cargo being less than two-thirds only the articles which are contraband of war will be confiscated, and to unload them the ship will be conducted to the nearest and most convenient Spanish port.

It must be understood that goods directly and immediately affecting the war are contraband only when destined for the enemy's ports, for when they are consigned to a neutral port these goods are munitions of war, but not contraband.

But if a vessel is dispatched for a neutral port in proper form but makes for a port of the enemy, then, if found near to one of these ports or sailing in quite a different direction than the proper one shown in her papers, she shall be captured if the Captain cannot prove that force majeure drove him from his proper course.

(6.) If she carries on behalf of the enemy

officers, troops, or seamen.

(7.) If she carries letters and communications of the enemy, unless she belong to a marine mail service, and these letters or communications are in bags, boxes, or parcels with the public correspondence, so that the Captain may be ignorant of their contents.

(8.) If the vessel is employed in watching the operations of the war, either freighted by the other belligerent or paid to perform this service.

(9.) If the neutral vessel takes part in this employment, or assists in any way in such

operations.

The vessel will also be captured when during the visit duplicate or false papers are found, since such cases fall under the Regulations contained in Clauses (3) and (4) or in both, since neither false nor duplicate papers can serve to justify the conditions referred to.

Neither an attempt at flight to escape visit, nor simple suspicion of fraud respecting the nationality of the vessel or the nature of its cargo,

authorise the capture of the vessel.

The circumstance that the papers are written in a language unknown to the officer making the virit does not authorise the detention of the vessel.

11. Merchant vessels sailing under convoy, under charge of one or more ships of the navy of their nation, are absolutely exempt from the visit of the belligerents, being protected by the

immunity enjoyed by the warships.

As the formation of a convoy is a measure emanating from the Government of the State to which belong the vessels protecting the convoy as well as the vessels under convoy, it must be taken as certain that the Government in question not only will not allow fraud of any kind, but has employed the strictest measures to avoid fraud being committed by any of the vessels under the convoy.

It is therefore useless for the belligerent to inquire of the chief officer of the convoy whether he guarantees the neutrality of the ships sailing under his charge, or of the cargo they carry.

12. On the visit taking place, it is not permissible to give orders to open the hatchways in

order to examine the cargo, nor to open any article of furniture to search for documents. The ship's papers presented by the Captain to prove the legitimacy of the flag and the nature of the cargo are the only proof which International Law allows.

13. Although it very seldom occurs that the principal ship's papers, whether those referring to her nationality or to the nature of her cargo, are lost, mislaid, or left on shore by mistake, if such a case should occur, and by other papers or means the Captain can convince the officer visiting the ship of the neutrality of the ship and her cargo, he may authorize the Captain to continue his voyage; but if an explanation cannot be given, the ship will be detained and conducted to the nearest Spanish port, until the necessary investigation concerning the point or points in question is made.

14. The Commander of the vessel carrying out the visit and the officer commissioned to make the visit, the former in ordering and the latter in carrying it out, should act without prejudice to the good faith of the neutral being visited, and without losing sight of the consideration and respect that nations owe to one another

another.

Note relative to the first section of Article X. The clauses of the Geneva Convention of the 22nd August, 1864, and those of its Additional Articles drawn up at the second Diplomatic Conference of the 20th October, 1868, are as follows:—

# " Articles concerning the Marine. " ARTICLE VI.

"The boats which, at their own risk and peril, during and after an engagement, pick up the shipwrecked or wounded, or which, having picked them up, convey them on board a neutral or hospital ship, shall enjoy, until the accomplishment of their mission, the character of neutrality, as far as the circumstances of the engagement and the position of the ships engaged will permit.

permit.
"The appreciation of these circumstances is intrusted to the humanity of all the combatants. The wrecked and wounded thus picked up and saved must not serve again during the con-

tinuance of the war.

#### "ARTICLE VII.

'The religious, medical and hospital staff of any captured vessel are declared neutral, and, on leaving the ship, may remove the articles and surgical instruments which are their private property.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"The staff designated in the preceding Article must continue to fulfil their functions in the captured ship, assisting in the removal of the wounded made by the victorious party; they will then be at liberty to return to their country in conformity with the second paragraph of the Ist Additional Article.\*

"The stipulations of the IInd Additional Article are applicable to the pay and allowance

of the staff already mentioned.

### "ARTICLE IX.

"The military hospital ships remain under martial law in all that concerns their stores; they become the property of the captor, but the latter must not divert them from their special appropriation during the continuance of the war.

#### "ARTICLE X

"Any merchantman, to whatever nation she

\* This Article states that the time of departure will be fixed by the Commander of the boarding party.

of sick and wounded, is protected by neutrality; but the mere fact, noted on the ship's books, of the vessel having been visited by an enemy's cruiser, renders the sick and wounded incapable of serving during the continuance of the war. The cruiser shall even have the right of putting on board an officer in order to accompany the convoy, and thus verify the good faith of the operation.

"If the merchant ship also carries a cargo, her neutrality will still protect it, provided that such cargo is not of a nature to be confiscated by the

belligerents.

"The belligerents retain the right to interdict neutralized vessels from all communication, and from any course which they may deem prejudicial to the secrecy of their operations. In urgent cases special Conventions may be entered into between Commanders-in-chief, in order to neutralize temporarily and in a special manner the vessels intended for the removal of the sick and wounded.

#### "ARTICLE XI.

"Wounded or sick sailors and soldiers, when embarked, to whatever nation they may belong, shall be protected and taken care of by their

captors.
"Their return to their own country is subject to the condition that they are bound not to bear

arms again during the war.

#### "ARTICLE XII.

"The distinctive flag to be used with the national flag, in order to indicate any vessel or boat which may claim the benefits of neutrality, is a white flag with a red cross. The belligerents may exercise in this respect any mode of verification which they may deem necessary.

" Military hospital ships shall be distinguished by being painted white outside, with green

strake.

#### " ARTICLE XIIL

"The hospital ships which are equipped at the expense of the Aid Societies, recognized by the Signatory Powers to the Geneva Convention. and which are furnished with a commission emanating from the Sovereign, who shall have given express authority for their being fitted out, and with a certificate from the proper naval authority that they have been placed under his control until their final departure, and that they were then appropriated solely to the purpose of their mission, shall be considered neutral, as well as the whole of their staff. They shall be recognized and protected by the bellige-

rents.
"They shall make themselves known by hoisting, together with their national flag, the white flag with a red cross. The distinctive mark of their staff, while performing their duties, shall be an armlet of the same colours. outer painting of these hospital ships shall be

white, with red strake.
"These ships shall bear aid and assistance to the wounded and wrecked belligerents, without

distinction of nationality.

THE undersigned Her Britannic Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in Japan hereby makes known to British subjects residing in or resorting to Japan that owing to the outbreak of the pest at Hong Kong the Japanese Government have deemed it necessary to enforce from to-day Medical Inspection Regu-

lations in accordance with Imperial Ordinance No. 56 of May, 1894, against all arrivals from that port, and from the coast ports of China, at the ports of Yokohama, Kobé, Moji, Nagasaki, and Kuchinotsu.

Vessels which are liable to inspection proceeding to Yokohama are to stop at Nagahama; those proceeding to Kobé are to stop at Wada-no-Misaki, and those proceeding to Shimonoseki are to stop at Moji to be inspected.

When vessels arriving at other than the abovementioned ports require to be disinfected they will be caused to proceed to the nearest place of

inspection.

British subjects are hereby required to conform to the above Regulations.

Quarantine Proclamation.

State of Louisiana, Executive Department. Baton Rouge, March 15, 1898.

AT the request of the Board of Health of the State of Louisiana, embodied in a resolution adopted by that body at a regular meeting held on March 8, 1898, and by virtue of the authority in me vested by law, I, Murphy J. Foster, Governor of the State of Louisiana, do hereby issue this my proclamation, to take effect from and after the 1st day of April, 1898, that all vessels with their cargoes, crews, and passengers arriving at the Mississippi River Quarantine Station shall perform quarantine under the following schedule:

"1. Vessels of the first class, that is, those arriving with clean bills of health, from ports where yellow fever is known never to prevail in epidemic form, shall be subject to inspection by the quarantine officer, and if found in good sanitary condition shall be permitted to proceed.

"2. Vessels of the second class, that is, those arriving with clean bills of health from ports where yellow fever is known to sometimes exist in epidemic form, shall be subject to disinfection and sanitation without further detention there-

"3. Vessels of the third class, that is, those vessels arriving with bills of health indicating existence of yellow fever at ports of departure, shall be subjected to disinfection, sanitation and detention thereafter for three days.

"4. Vessels of the fourth class, that is, vessels arriving having had sickness of a contagious nature on board at ports of departure or during voyage, or having such while at quarantine, shall be subject to disinfection, sanitation, removal of sick, if any, to a hospital, isolation of vessel, and detention for five days after complete disinfection.

"5. Vessels engaged in the fruit trade will be permitted to ply between this city and only those ports positively known to be free from infectious and contagious diseases, without detention at quarantine beyond such time as may be necessary for a careful and complete daylight inspection.

"6. Such vessels shall carry only fruit, rubber, specie, ore, wood, coffee and passengers who may give satisfactory evidence to a local Medical Inspector of this Board, or to an inspector of the I from going ashore, especially at night.

United States Marine Hospital Service, that such passenger is personally free of, and is from a locality positively free from, suspicion of infectious disease; provided, further, that all baggage of said passenger shall be fumigated or disinfected by suitable means at port of departure previous to being brought on board, under the supervision of the medical inspector appointed for such port by this Board of Health, or by the United States Marine Hospital Service, and such baggage shall be labelled and accounted for by special list of certificates issued by said medical inspector, setting forth the fact that each parcel of baggage has been disinfected or fumigated before being brought on board.

"Vessels of the first class arriving at the Rigolets, the Atchafalaya, and the Lake Charles Quarantine Stations, will be inspected and, if in good sanitary condition, allowed to pass without

further detention.

"Vessels of second, third, fourth, and fifth classes shall not be allowed to pass these stations without having undergone proper maritime sanitation at the Mississippi River Quarantine Station.

Quarantine officers at the several stations in this State are especially charged and required to enforce the execution of this proclamation, and the Board of Health in the City of New Orleans, is requested to prosecute vigorously all violators of the same, as well as of the quarantine laws and regulations of this State.

Hereafter full quarantine restrictions will be imposed on all vessels whose officers wilfully attempt deception in regard to any case of sickness, or material capable of carrying infection, or wilfully disregard the rules and regulations of the Board of Health; and such detention will be imposed thereafter on every vessel on which any officer who has previously attempted to practise deception is found in any official capacity.

Special Instructions to Owners, Agents, Masters of Vessels, and Passengers.

The Louisiana State Board of Health recommends the following suggestions to agents, owners, masters of vessels, and passengers for the purpose of facilitating the work of quarantine officers and reducing the period of detention to a minimum :-

1. That vessels should be stripped during the quarantine seasons of all woollen hangings, carpets, curtains, and such-like materials, and upholstered furniture as far as practicable. Hair or moss mattresses to be replaced by wire or wicker beds.

2. That, as far as possible, vessels trading with tropical ports should be manned with acclimated crews.

3. Masters of vessels, ship and consular agents are earnestly requested to instruct passengers from quarantinable ports to dispense, as far as possible, with baggage which may be injured by wetting or heat (230° F.) while undergoing disinfection. Such passengers are specially warned against bringing furs, silks, skins, laces, velvets and other fabrics of delicate texture, as they will be compelled to assume all risks of injury.

4. While in ports infected with yellow fever, vessels should be anchored out in the harbour, when this is possible, and the crew prohibited

5. When practicable, cargoes should be loaded in such a manner as to allow access to the pumps, and also to enable the quarantine officers to pump

out and wash the bilge.

6. For the purpose of avoiding delay and expense at quarantine, owing to the necessity of shifting of cargo for the object of disinfection, it is recommended that there be constructed in all vessels from quarantined ports, an open framework shaft, fifteen inches in diameter, from the centre of each hatch, through which the fumigating pipe may be introduced down to the dunnage of the vessel.

7. Special attention should be given to cleanliness of vessels and persons, and provisions should be made for all possible ventilation of the entire vessel. The best disinfectants, and instructions for using same, can be obtained by application to the Board of Health or any of its officers.

8. Masters should, before arrival, see that the bilge is th roughly pumped out and cleansed, and that the entire vessel be put in such good sanitary condition as to permit of the least possible detention. Fruit vessels, particularly, should be kept thoroughly cleansed for the purpose of avoiding delay at the quarantine station.

9. Vessels observing the above recommendations will receive special consideration at the quarantine station, detention and cost of cleaning, disinfecting, &c., being materially lessened

thereby.
