PUBLIC FUNERAL

OF

THE RIGHT HONOURABLE WILLIAM EWART GLADSTONE.

*College of Arms,

**T**HE QUEEN having been pleased to declare Her Royal will and pleasure that the Interment of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone should be solemnized in the Collegiate Church of St. Peter Westminster with all the honour due to his eminent public services, the Earl Marshal received the Royal Command for the purpose of carrying into effect Her Majesty's pleasure accordingly.

On Wednesday evening, the 25th May last, the Remains of the deceased were privately removed from the parish church of Hawarden to the Railway Station and conveyed by Special Train to London, where the body was received by His Grace the Earl Marshal, attended by some of the Officers of Arms, and conveyed to Westminster Hall.

On Thursday, May 26, and on Friday, May 27, the public were admitted, without restriction, to Westminster Hall, where the Body rested in a coffin raised upon a Bier at the foot of which was a white silk pall embroidered with gold.

Early in the morning of Saturday, May 28, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, Members of the House of Peers, assembled in the House of Lords and the Members of the House of Commons in their own House.

At 10.30 o'clock the Representative of Her Majesty the Queen, the Princes of the Blood Royal, the Representatives of the Princesses of the Blood Royal, the Representatives of Foreign Sovereigns, Members of Her Majesty's Privy Council, the family and friends of the deceased, and a deputation from Hawarden assembled in the rooms prepared for their reception adjoining Westminster Hall.

At 10.30 o'clock the Officers of Arms marshalled the procession, which, after a Prayer from the Bishop of London, proceeded from Westminster Hall into Westminster Abbey by the West Door, in the following order, viz. :—
