

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 16TH JULY 1898.)

(SWINE-FEVER INFECTED AREA.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Order described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1896 and the Order described in the

Schedule to this Order before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, those Orders before the commencement of this Order.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS (supplementary to the General Regulations issued 8th April, 1872, and amended by subsequent Notices in the London Gazette) respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Junior Assistant in the South Kensington Museum (Science Branch).

N.B.—*These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examination.*

I. The limits of age for this situation are 18 and 26, and Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.

II. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz:—

III. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Commissioners may appoint.

IV. A fee of £6 will be required from each Candidate attending the Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 11th October, 1898.

The number of situations to be filled will be the number vacant at the time of the Examination.
