

missioners for England (which deed is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of Your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said John Rogers did grant and convey unto the minister (so soon as a minister shall have been appointed) of the herein proposed district and to his successors and when such district shall have become a new parish then to the vicar or incumbent of such new parish and to his successors. All those several pieces or parcels of land messuages and buildings situate in Accrington within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Accrington, which are more particularly mentioned and described in the schedule to the said deed and are delineated and set forth on the plan drawn on the same deed and thereon edged red and numbered plots 1 to 7 inclusive. Together with the benefit of the progressive rents and of the several ultimate rents amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and fifty-six pounds fourteen shillings and two pence per annum reserved by the covenants of the lessees and the conditions contained in the indentures of lease severally specified in the said schedule to the same deed as and for an endowment for the said proposed district the said annual ground rents amounting to one hundred and fifty-six pounds fourteen shillings and two pence forming part of the endowments of the said vicarage of the new parish of Saint James, Accrington.

"And whereas the said ground rents will not produce the full statutory yearly income for the minister of the said proposed district until the year beginning on the second day of May one thousand nine hundred and one.

"And whereas a sum of two hundred and thirty-four pounds thirteen shillings and six pence has been contributed and paid to the credit of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at the Bank of England by the Reverend Percival Saben, Clerk in Holy Orders, in order to make up such statutory income until the full amount of the said rents shall become payable.

"And whereas the said yearly endowment of one hundred and fifty-six pounds fourteen shillings and two pence has been so provided granted and conveyed as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned to the said John Rogers, the vicar of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint James, Accrington, and his successors vicars of the same vicarage for ever.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Accrington, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Andrew, Accrington.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district of Saint Andrew, Accrington, and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof

shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be fully and freely exercised by the said John Rogers, vicar of the said vicarage of the new parish of Saint James, Accrington, and his successors vicars of the same vicarage for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Andrew, Accrington being :—

"All that part of the new parish (some-time district chapelry) of Saint Peter, Accrington, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which is bounded upon the west and upon the north-west by the parochial chapelry of Church, upon the north partly by the said parochial chapelry and partly by the district of Saint Mary Magdalen, Milnshaw, Accrington, upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint James, Accrington, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James, Accrington from the new parish of Saint Peter, Accrington aforesaid, at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway over Scaitcliffe-street, and extending thence westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of fifty-six chains and a half or thereabouts to the boundary on the southern side of the Lower Reservoir Lower Antley, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, Accrington, from the parochial chapelry of Church aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the herein-before mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the cure out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and
