Bankrupt to be discharged as from 10th August, 1902	Bankrupt's assets are not of a value equal to 10s. in the pound on the amount of his unsecured liabilities; that he had omitted to keep such books of account as are usual and proper in the business carried on by him, and as sufficiently disclose his business transactions and financial position within the three years immediately preceding his bankruptcy; had continued to trade after knowing himself to be insolvent; had brought on or contributed to his bankruptcy by unjustifiable extravagance in living; and had within three months preceding the date of the Receiving Order, when unable to pay his debts as they became due, given an undue preference to some of his creditors
