FACTORY AND WORKSHOP.

DAINGEROUS TRADES:—THE GLAZING OF BRICKS
WITH USE OF LEAD.

Certificate of the Secretary of State, dated the 17th December, 1898, under the Factory and Workshop Act, 1891, that a certain Process is Dangerous or Injurious to Health.

WHEREAS by Section 8 (1) of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1891, it is enacted that:—

“Where the Secretary of State certifies that in his opinion any machinery or process or particular description of manual labour used in a factory or workshop (other than a domestic workshop) is dangerous or injurious to health, or dangerous to life or limb, either generally or in the case of women, children, or any other class of persons, or that the provision for the admission of fresh air is not sufficient, or that the quantity of dust generated or inhaled in any factory or workshop is dangerous or injurious to health, the Chief Inspector may serve on the occupier of the factory or workshop a notice in writing, either proposing such special rules or requiring the adoption of such special measures as appear to the Chief Inspector to be reasonably practicable and to meet the necessities of the case.”

Now I, the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby certify that in my opinion the process of—

GLAZING BRICKS WITH THE USE OF LEAD
is dangerous or injurious to health.

TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY
BILLS.

1. THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Thursday, the 29th instant, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Acts 40 Vic., cap. 2, and 52 Vic., cap. 6, to the amount of £1,325,000, in replacement of Bills paid off.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1,000, £5,000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 4th January, 1899, and will be payable at three months, or six months, or twelve months, after date (at the option of the persons tendering), viz.:—on the 4th April, 1899, or 4th July, 1899, or 4th January, 1900, respectively.

3. The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for; and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Friday, the 30th instant, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than three o'clock, on Wednesday, the 4th proximo.

6. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Secretary for Scotland has confirmed the following Bye-law passed by the Fishery Board for Scotland, viz.:—
BYE-LAW (No. 16) made by the Fishery Board for Scotland under the powers conferred on the Board by the Sea Fisheries (Scotland) Amendment Act, 1885, the Herring Fishery (Scotland) Act, 1899, and the Herring Fishery (Scotland) Act Amendment Act, 1890.

I. The bye law (No. 6) made by the Fishery Board for Scotland on the 24th day of September, 1889, and confirmed by the Secretary for Scotland on the 26th day of November, 1889, shall be, and the same is hereby revoked as on the 1st day of January, 1899.

II. This bye-law shall extend and apply to the waters inside of three straight lines drawn (a) from Garroch Head, Island of Bute, to Gull Point, Little Cumbrae; (b) from Gull Point to Portincross Castle on the Ayrshire coast; and (c) from Colintrave Hotel, Argyllshire, to a point due south (magnetic) on the Island of Bute.

III. From and after the 1st day of January, 1899, until the 15th day of March, 1899, inclusive and thereafter from the 15th day of June to the 15th day of March, both inclusive, annually, it shall be lawful, within the said limits, to fish by means of a beam trawl, provided the boat from which the same is used is a sailing vessel of not more than 7 tons gross.

IV. This bye-law shall come into force on the 1st day of January, 1899.
