Madrid, Sept. 19.

**T**HE Queen of Spain is perfectly recover'd of her late Illness, for which *Le Deum* had been sung in all the Churches here. Our Fleet, commanded by the Count d'*Aquilar*, continues on the Coast of *Catalonia*.

**Rome, Sept. 22.** The Pope is still somewhat indisposed; but gives however Audiences. Cardinal *Ginetti* dyed on Tuesday last, and Cardinal *Colonna* lyes very ill, without any hopes of his Recovery; By whose Death there will be six Places void in the College of Cardinals. The Popes Bulls for confirming Prince *Anthony* of *Neubourg*, Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order, in the Coadjutorship of *Mentz*, are not yet dispatched, by reason of some Difficulties that are arisen in this matter, about which a Congregation was held 2 days ago, but the Resolution they took therein is not yet become publick.

**Venice, Sept. 28.** By a Vessel, which arrived here this week from the *Levant*, we are told, that the Captain-General *Mocenigo* was sail'd with the Fleet of this State from *Andros* to the Island of *Mecellino*. That Signior *Delfino*, who cruizes in the *Archiepelago* with a Squadron of Men of War, had taken 12 Vessels bound with Provisions to *Constantinople*; And that the Serafquier of the *Morea* had attempted to pass the *Isthmus* of *Corinth*, but that he was repulsed by our Troops appointed for the Guard of it.

**From the Confederate Camp at Reuel in Piedmont, Sept. 22.** On the 14th instant we marched from *Brilane* near *Carignan* to *Villie Franche*. The next day Monsieur *Catinat* quitted his Camp at *La Methe* near *Carmagnole*, and marched to *Saluces*; Hereupon, to cut off his Communication with *Pignerol*, we decamped again on the 16th about midnight, and marched to the Plain of *Cabours*, where our Army drew up in Battalia, our right Wing reaching to the foot of the Mountains, and our left almost as far as *Staffards*. Some of the Enemies Squadrons appeared to observe us, but a Detachment being sent towards them, they presently retired. We continued in Battalia till towards Evening, advancing still towards the Enemy, and at last encamped within a League of them, in the same place where Monsieur *Catinat* designed to have had his Camp that day, which was already marked out by his order. The 17th, in the morning, the Dukes of *Savoy* and *Bavaria* went with 2000 Horse and Foot to view the Passages of the *Po*, and the situation of the Enemies Camp; They fired upon us from the other side of the River, where they had posted Detachments to guard the Fords of it, but without any effect. We understood that Monsieur *Catinat* had put 5 or 6000 men into *Saluces*, that he had placed strong Guards in the Desiles of the Mountains, and that he lay with the rest of the Army very advantageously encamped between *Saluces* and the *Po*. The 18th, 19th, 20th, and 21th, were employed in making large Ways from our Camp to the *Po*, and in laying Bridges over that River. The *Vaudois* were ordered to observe the French Parties, and to

hinder the passage of their Convoys to *Pignerol*, in which place we are assured they have not at present above 1200 men in Garison. The Peasants of *Montdoi* are very troublesome to the French, of whose Foragers and Stragglers they have killed above 300 since their Army has layn near *Saluces*. Just now Orders are given for the Army to march to morrow at break of day, to pass the *Po*, and it's believed (since the Enemy is so strongly posted, that we cannot force them to a Battel) that we shall besiege *Carmagnole*.

**Milan, September 26.** The last Advices from *Piedmont* give an account, that the Confederate Army was passing the *Po*, with design, as 'twas thought, to attack *Carmagnole*. That Monsieur *Catinat* lay still encamped near *Saluces*; but that he had quitted *Fossan*, after having exacted great Contributions from the Inhabitants.

**Vienna, Sept. 30.** We have no fresher Letters from the Imperial Camp than those of the 23d, which gave this account of their march from *Segedin*. On the 16th they moved to *Sibinhor*, the 17th to *Dankier*, the 18th to *Hochfollen*, where they rested the 19th, the 20th to *Kizke*, the 21st to *Doffecke*, within an hour of *Zolnocke*; The 22d they laid Bridges over the *Thayse*; And on the 23d the Army passed that River, and continued their march towards *Great Waradin*. General *Veterani* was, by our last Advices, still encamped near *Lippi*; and the Duke de *Croy* about *Darda*.

**Hydelberg, October 6.** The Elector of *Saxony* continues at *Hailbron*; The States of *Franconia* and *Suabia* are now assembled to settle the Winter Quarters for his Forces, which in the mean time are lodged between the *Neckar* and the *Main*. The French lye still about *Brisac*.

**Francfort, October 7.** The Troops of *Saxony* passed the *Neckar* on the first instant at *Hailbron*, *Lauffen*, and *Wimpffen*, and are lodged between *Lauffen* and this place till such time as their Winter Quarters are regulated. From *Ratisbonne* we have an account, that Prince *Herman* Margrave of *Baden*, the Emperor's Principal Commissioner at the *Dyets*, dyed there on the second instant of an Apoplexy.

**Cologne, October 9.** The Troops of *Neubourg* commanded by the Marquis d'*Antel*, are encamped about 4 or 5 hours march from *Steynselt*, and so soon as the Forage is consumed thereabouts, they will go into Quarters, and put strong Garisons into *Dueren*, *Munster Effelt*, *Schleyden*, and *Monfaw*, which lye must be exposed to the Enemy.

**Liege, October 6.** The Troops of *Brandenburg* and *Hesse* are still encamped in the Neighbourhood of this City; And those of *Liege* are posted at *Flemal* on the other side of the *Meuse*. The Marquis d'*Boufflers* lyes with the Troops under his command in the *Condrotz*, having been lately reinforced with 6 Battalions, and some Squadrons from *Flanders*.

**Paris, October 9.** On the 4th instant arrived here a Courier from *Piedmont*, with an account, that the Confederate Army had passed the *Po*, and that they were going to besiege *Carmagnole*, but this News is not being confirmed by the fresher Advices that are come in since, we seem here to give no credit to it. The last Letters

cers from *Brest* said, that the *Sieur de Chateau Renaud* lay still in that Road with the Squadron of 30 Men of War which he commands. They begin here to be in some Pain for *Limerick*, fearing that the want of Provisions will force the Garrison to Capitulate. We hear from the *Upper Rhine*, that the *Marschal de Lorge* was encamped the 27th past at *Endingen*, and that he had removed his Bridge of Boats from *Rheinaw* towards *Marqueiborn*, not far from *Briac*.

*Brussels*, October 10. The Armies in *Flanders* keep the Field still; Ours continues at *Nenou*; And the French on the River *Lys*, having their Chief Quarters at *Dainse* and *Nevee*. On Monday last passed by this place two Regiments of Horse and two of Foot, and yesterday again the like number, who are detached by *Prince Waldeck* towards the Country of *Liege*. The Duke of *Luxemburg* has likewise sent Detachements towards *Dixmude*, *Firmin*, and the Duchy of *Luxemburg*. The two Regiments of *Lansy* and *Amelswaert*, which have been posted for some time on this Canal, are march'd to *Charleroy*; and two *Waloon* Regiments are come hither from *Ghent*. The *Prince de Vaudemont* is returned from *Aix la Chapelle*.

*Hague*, October 12. The King arrived here last Wednesday night from *Loos*; The next day the States-General, and the States of *Holland*, made their Compliments to His Majesty; The like was done by the Courts of Justice, and other Colleges. This day His Majesty was present in the Council of State, to settle the state of the War for the Year ensuing. And about the end of the next week, if the Wind be fair, it's believed His Majesty will Embark for *England*. They write from *Spain*, that the Galeons are not expected at *Cadix* till towards *Christmas*.

From the Camp before *Limerick* in *Thomonds Isle*, Sept. 28. On Tuesday the 22d instant the General having passed the *Shannon*, with 10 Regiments of Foot, and a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons, marched to *Thomond Isle* without any opposition; When he was there, he ordered all the Grenadiers, together with the Regiments of *Kirke*, *Tiffin*, and *Lord George Hamilton*, to advance and attack the Works that cover *Thomond Bridge*, which they did with such Resolution and Bravery, that they presently beat the Enemy out of them, who would have fled into the Town, but the French Governor durst not let the Draw-Bridge down to receive them, for fear our Men should at the same time have entered the place, so that about 600 of the Irish were killed, there being nothing to be seen from the foot of the Bridge to the Draw-Bridge but heaps of dead Bodies, and about 130 were taken Prisoners, among whom was Colonel *Skelton*, (who is since dead of his Wounds,) 2 Lieutenant-Colonels, 2 Majors, 9 Captains, 7 Lieutenants, and 6 Ensigns. All this while the Enemies Cannon and small Shot played from the Walls and the warmth of our Men having carried them too far, they were very much exposed to their fire, and between 2 and 300 were killed and wounded, but no body of Note. Next day, in the afternoon, the Garrison beat a Parly on both sides the River, and desired a Truce, which was agreed on till 9 the next morning, when *Sarsfield* and *Walop* came out, and desired it might be continued for 3 days longer, that they might send to their Horse which lay towards *Carr*, in order to their being included in the Capitulation, which was granted. On the 25th, *Sheldon*, with some other of their Officers, came into our Camp, and passed into *Limerick*. The 26th, *Sarsfield* and *Walop* dined with the General; And my Lord *Curtis*, *Sir David Coeffer*, Colonel *Tiffin*, and Colonel *Piper*, were sent as Hostages into the Town, in the room of the Lords *Westmeath*, *Eragh*, *Trincollewyn*, and *Louth*, who remain in the Camp. The Ceilation was continued, and on the 27th the Irish sent out their Proposals, which the General did not approve of, and instead of an Answer to them, sent back 12 Articles which he would allow them, and at the same time gave Orders for our Cannon and Mortars to be in a readiness to play again upon the Town, in case they did not comply with them, which made the Irish more reasonable. And this day their Commissioners have had a long Conference with those appointed by the General to Treat with them, and we are assured, that Matters are almost brought to a Conclusion.

*Dublin*, October 4. This morning by an Express we received Letters from the Camp of the first instant, which give an account, That the Lords Justices arrived there that day; That the Substance of the Articles was agreed on, and wanted only to be put into form; And that so soon as the Capitula-

tion was signed, the Irish Town would be delivered up to Their Majesties Forces.

*London*, October 10. We have advice, that the *Eastland Fleet*, with their Convoy, is arrived in the River.

It was this day Ordered by Her Majesty in Council, That the Monthly Fast, appointed by Their Majesties Proclamation of the 9th day of April last, be for the present discontinued till further Order.
