REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVÉES TO BE HELD AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levées are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levée, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levée, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

SHEFFIELD (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1899.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1891 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Provisions of Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896 applied to the Borough of Sheffield.

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the provisions of the Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896, dated the eleventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, shall, except as herein-after provided, apply to the borough of Sheffield.

Movement of Swine out of Borough of Sheffield.

2.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in the Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896, no swine, fat or store, shall be moved out of the borough of Sheffield except as expressly authorized by this Order.

(2.) Provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine where they are moved through that borough by railway from a place outside that borough to another place outside that borough without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within that borough,

Swine only to be Moved out of Borough for Immediate Slaughter.

3.—(1.) Swine (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Place) may be moved out of the borough of Sheffield with a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that borough, on the following conditions (namely):

- (i.) Every pig so moved shall be slaughtered within four days after and exclusive of the day on which the pig is moved out of the borough of Sheffield, or if it has been exposed in a market fair or sale licensed under the above-mentioned Order then within four days after and exclusive of the day on which the market fair or sale was held.
- (ii.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than five days inclusive of the day of issue; and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted and the name or description of the slaughter-house, pig-sty, or other place of destination to which the swine are to be moved.
- (iii.) The Local Authority of the borough of Sheffield shall cause a copy thereof to be forthwith sent to the Local Authority of the District into which the swine are to be moved.
- (iv.) The swine moved under this Article shall be accompanied by the Licence required by this Article.
- (v.) The swine while being moved under this Article and until they are slaughtered shall so far as practicable be kept separate from all swine not marked for slaughter under this Order or the above-mentioned Order.
- (vi.) The Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate shall take such steps as are necessary to insure that the swine are moved to the said place and are slaughtered there within the period prescribed by this Article.
- (vii.) No pig shall be moved under this Article unless and until it has been marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(2.) Movement of swine under this Article is subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of swine into the District of the Local Authority, but nothing in any such Regulation shall permit the movement of swine in contravention of this Order.

Forms of Movement Licence.

(4.) If a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the pig is granted, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so marked, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(5.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Provisions of Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896 applied to the Borough of Leeds.

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the provisions of the Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896, dated the eleventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, shall, except as hereinafter provided, apply to the borough of Leeds.

Movement of Swine out of Borough of Leeds.

2.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in the Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896, no swine, fat or store, shall be moved out of the borough of Leeds except as expressly authorized by this Order.

(2.) Provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine where they are moved through that borough by railway from a place outside that borough to another place outside that borough without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within that borough.

Swine only to be Moved out of Borough for Immediate Slaughter.

3.—(1.) Swine (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Place) may be moved out of the borough of Leeds with a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that borough, on the following conditions (namely):

(i.) Every pig so moved shall be slaughtered within four days after and exclusive of the day on which the pig is moved out of the borough of Leeds, or if it has been exposed in a market fair or sale licensed under the above-mentioned Order then within four days after and exclusive of the day on which the market fair or sale was held.

(ii.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than five days inclusive of the day of issue and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted and the name or description of the slaughter-house, pig-sty, or other place of destination to which the swine are to be moved.

(iii.) The Local Authority of the borough of Leeds shall cause a copy thereof to be forthwith sent to the Local Authority of the District into which the swine are to be moved.

(iv.) The swine moved under this Article shall be accompanied by the Licence required by this Article.

- (v.) The swine while being moved under this Article and until they are slaughtered shall so far as practicable be kept separate from all swine not marked for slaughter under this Order or the above-mentioned Order.
- (vi.) The Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate shall take such steps as are necessary to insure that the swine are moved to the said place and are slaughtered there within the period prescribed by this Article.
- (vii.) No pig shall be moved under this Article unless and until it has been marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

premises where the market or fair or sale or exhibition is held, and the owner or consignee of each head of cattle and of each sheep or pig exposed thereat, and the person exposing the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale or exhibition, and the person, if any, taking entrance-money or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereat of any cattle sheep or swine, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the market or fair or sale or exhibition to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.
