## NOTICES TO MARINERS.

(Nos. 171 to 181 of the year 1899.)

[The bearings are magnetic, and those concerning the visibility of lights are given from seaward.]

No. 171.—SOUTH AMERICA—PATA-GONIAN CHANNELS.

*Pascua, Bories, and Memphis Rocks—Particulars.*

WITH reference to Notices to Mariners Nos. 174 of 1890 and 105 of 1899:—

The Chilian Government has given further notice, that during a recent survey of Indian Reach, the following dangers were discovered and the exact position of the Memphis Rock, reported by the German steamship "Memphis" in 1889, ascertained:—

a. A rock, now named Pascua, about 200 feet in extent, with a depth of 19 feet on it at low water, lying right in the track recommended, westward of Halliday Point. This rock, the existence of which was also reported by the same vessel last November, is steep to and well marked by kelp. A red buoy, with the name of the rock inscribed on it in white letters, and surmounted by a white cage, has been moored in  $6\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms 50 yards south-westward of the rock, with Halliday Point bearing N.  $76^{\circ}$  E., distant  $3\frac{1}{4}$  cables, and Paradise Point N.  $26^{\circ}$  W.

Approximate position, lat.  $49^{\circ} 6' 20''$  S., long.  $74^{\circ} 22' 10''$  W.

Between this rock and the coast there is a depth of 16 to 19 fathoms.

b. At a distance of about  $3\frac{1}{4}$  cables north of the above, lies another rock of small extent called Bories, on which there is a depth of 3 feet at low water, from which Paradise Point bears N.  $33^{\circ}$  W., distant  $4\frac{1}{2}$  cables, and centre of Ollard Islands S.  $61^{\circ}$  W. It is surrounded by deep water and there is a depth of from 16 to 22 fathoms between it and the shore.

c. Memphis Rock was found to be about 100 yards in extent north and south, having  $4\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms on its southern end and a least depth of  $1\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms on the northern end, from which Paradise Point
