

siary from the Republick; The new Grand Vicer is on his Journey to *Belgrade* to promote it; and there appear such Dispositions on all sides, that we do not doubt but it will be soon concluded.

Heidelberg, Octob. 20. The Swedish Troops, consisting of between 2 and 3000 Men, have left the *Palatinates*, and intend to repass the *Main* near *Frankfort* in their march homeward. The Saxons are lodged between the *Main* and the *Neckar*, and their Elector is to receive 300000 Crowns of the Circles of *Franconia*, *Suabia*, and others for Winter Quarters. The Imperial and Confederate Troops, Commanded by General *Caprara*, (who continues still at *Esslingen*) have their Quarters from the *Neckar* to the *Black Forest*.

Cologne, Octob. 23. On the 21st instant Major General *Dewitz* arrived with 3 Brandenburg Regiments of Horse at *Utrecht*, 120 hours from hence, who are to have their Quarters in the upper Diocess of *Colone*. The Regiment of Guards of the Landgrave of *Hesse* passed the *Rhine* here this day, being to Quarter about *Coblentz*. Several others of the Troops of *Hesse* are coming from the *Meuse*, and are to pass the *Rhine* near *Bonn*, and continue their march towards *Wetzlar*, in case the States of this Diocess do not rather desire that they should continue hereabouts to cover this Archbishoppick during the Winter. They write from *Africa*, That the *Marchal de Lorges* would stay on the other side of the *Rhine* till towards the end of this Month, and then put his Troops into Winter Quarters; He had detached 10 Regiments towards *Piedmont*, and expected in their place the like number, from *Flanders*, and Monsieur *Boufflers* Campon the *Meuse*. Two Deputies are at last arrived here from the Bishop of *Munster* to assist at the Diet of the Circle, which is now held in this place.

Paris, Octob. 20. On Sunday last arrived here a Courier from *Piedmont*, with advice, That *Carmagnole* was Surrendered, the Garison marching out on the 9th instant with their Arms and Baggage, and 3 pieces of Cannon. The Letters from a General of the 11th of this Month give an account, That the Garison of *Carmagnole* was arrived there, having given up that place upon a Signal from Monsieur *Catinat*, who was not in a condition to relieve them; and that soon after he decamped with the Army from *Saluces*, and having repass'd the *Po*, retired under the Cannon of *Pignerol*. That the Prince *d'Ebeneuf*, who Commanded the Rear-guard consisting of 1500 Men, had fallen into an Ambush of the *Vandois*; who, after the first discharge, fell on with their Bayonets at the end of their Muskets, and killed between 7 and 800 of our Men; and that they feared other Ambushes in the defiles of the Mountains, the People being extremely enraged against the *French*. That the Confederate Army was come to *Vigone*, making their March directly towards *Susa*; which place, 'twas believed, they would Attack. And, by further Advices, from *Piedmont*, we understand, That Monsieur *Catinat* had separated his Army; and that the Troops were retiring into *Dauphine*, *Provence*, and *Bresse*. The Duke of *Maine* is returned from the Army in *Flanders*; and the Duke of *Luxemburg* is expected at *Versailles* the beginning of the next Week. The Prince *de Courtenay*, and the Marquis *de Vauguien* are both sent to the *Bastille*.

Brussels, 24. October. We have advice, That the Baron *de Fleming*, and the Count *de Lippe*, with the Forces under their Command, had rejoined those of *Liege*, Commanded by the Count *de Tilly*, in the Plain of *Thouange*, between *Huy* and *Liege*, and were afterwards marched towards the Marquis *de Boufflers*, who, upon the news of it decamped the 17 from *Oquer*, and retired with his 15000 Men towards *Murche* and *Reckfort*; and we hear since, That he has put them into Quarters. The Regiments that are to enter into Garison here, lye as yet encamped with some other Troops, about 2 or 3 Leagues from hence. The new Forts that are made at the head of the Suburbs of *Anderlecke* are almost finished. The Prince *de Soudemont* is expected back to Morrow from the *Hague*.

Hague, Octob. 26. The State of the War is settled for the next Year, both by Sea and Land. The Armies in *Flanders* are separated and gone into Winter-Quarters. The Letters from *Vienna* confirm the good dispositions towards a Peace, between the Emperor and the *Turks*; as those from *Italy* do the Surrender of *Carmagnole*, and the retreat of Monsieur *Catinat* into *Dauphine*.

Dublin, Octob. 14. The Lords Justices returned hither on the 9th in the Evening, having been met near this City by most of the Persons of Quality about the Town, and received at the City Gate, by the Magistracy and Militia. The General continues Encamped with the Army near *Limerick*, till the *Irish* are marched away, which they will do, so soon as Shipping is ready for their Transportation. Upon a late review, above 2000 came over to us, among whom is the Lord *Essex*, with his whole Regiment; and 'tis not doubted but a greater number will follow. On the 7th *Barbarack O'Donnell* waited upon the General in the Camp. There is a Report, That a

French Fleet of Men of War and Transport Ships, with Provisions and Ammunition, is come into the Bay of *Dough* on the Coast of *Kerry*, of which we are expecting to hear with more certainty.

Plymouth, Octob. 18. Yesterday arriv'd here from the North West passage the *Hudsons Bay Frigate*, Leonard *Edmonds* Commander, and the *Loyalty*, James Young Commander, both of London. This day we have advice from *Loo*, That a great Dutch East India Ship, homeward Bound, was cast away last night near that place. She had been out 5 years, and was very Rich.

Portsmouth, Octob. 20. This Morning arriv'd at Spithead Dutch homeward Bound East India Ships, together with one from the West Indies, a Gallies and a Privateer. The Dutch Squadron of Men of War now Riding at Spithead, is preparing to Sail.

Kensington, Octob. 20. The King Embarked last day on the *Mary-Yacht*, in the *Macle*, being accompanied by several other Yachts, and a Squadron of Men of War under the Command of Sir *Clovelly Skewel*, Rear-Admiral of the Blue. And yesterday, about 9 in the Morning His Majesty Landed at *Margate*, and came later in the night. The Cannon were fired from the Tower in the Evening, which was followed with Bonfires, Illuminations and great demonstrations of Joy for His Majesty's Return.
