

“Her Majesty the Queen may, on being satisfied that the Legislature of any British Possession has made adequate provision for the recognition in that possession of Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom, direct by Order in Council that this Act shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications specified in the Order, apply to that Possession, and thereupon, while the Order is in force, this Act shall apply accordingly.”

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Legislature of the British Possession hereinafter mentioned has made adequate provision for the recognition in that Possession of Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Act in Her Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

“The Colonial Probates Act, 1892,” shall apply to the British Possession hereunder mentioned:—

The Colony of Queensland.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, one of Her Majesty’s Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the twenty-fourth of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, in the words following, viz:—

“Whereas by Your Majesty’s Order in Council dated the twelfth December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, establishing, among other things, regulations for the grant from the funds of Greenwich Hospital of Pensions to widows and allowances to children and of gratuities to parents and other relatives of seamen, marines, and other seafaring persons, it is provided that such pensions, allowances and gratuities shall be granted only in cases where men have been killed or drowned on duty in Her Majesty’s Service, or when it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Admiralty that they died from the effects of injuries or diseases caused by accident, extraordinary exposure, or exertion, on service within twelve months after being first certified to be ill.

“And whereas we deem it expedient to grant a gratuity to the mother of the late Edward Lynch, Stoker, who has died from the effects of injuries received while gallantly attempting to save the life of a comrade during the accident to Your Majesty’s Torpedo Boat Destroyer ‘Thrasher’ on the twenty-ninth September, one thousand

eight hundred and ninety-seven, notwithstanding the lapse of more than twelve months since the date of the injuries.

“We beg leave to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize us to grant a gratuity to Mrs. Lynch, as a special case, without regard to the before mentioned limit of twelve months.”

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
