The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS by the eleventh section of "The Volunteer Act, 1863," it is, amongst other things, enacted that "Her Majesty in Council may, from time to time, declare what is requisite to "entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer by an Order in Council defining for that "purpose the extent of attendance at drill to be given by the Volunteer, and the course of instruction "to be gone through by him, and the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to be attained by "him and his Corps, such proficiency to be judged of by the Inspecting Officer at the Annual "Inspection of the Corps, or otherwise, as by Order in Council is from time to time directed"; and that "the draft of any scheme to be from time to time submitted to Her Majesty in Council for "approval under the present section shall have been laid before both Houses of Parliament for one "lunar month at least, either before or after, or partly before and partly after, the passing of this Act "during the present or for the like period during any subsequent Session of Parliament, before such "scheme receives the approval of Her Majesty in Council :"

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, as amended by the Orders in Council bearing date fourteenth April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, fifteenth September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eight-nine, thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, twenty-first October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, twenty-eighth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, thirtieth April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, seventh August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, fourteenth August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and twentieth October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer, be further amended so far as relates to the appendices to the first clause of the scheme to the said Order annexed.

And whereas a draft of the amendments to the said appendices was on the twenty-fifth day of April last laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words mentioned and set forth in the Schedule to this Order annexed, and, one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the said amendment of the said scheme hath this day been submitted to Her Majesty in Council for Her approval thereof:

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order :---

Amendment of the Scheme relative to the Efficiency of Volunteers under Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated thirty-first July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, as amended by the Schedule attached to Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated fourteenth April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four; and as further amended by Her Majesty's Orders in Council of the fifteenth September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven; the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine; the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety; the twenty-first October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety; the twenty-eighth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two; the thirtieth April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four; the seventh August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four ; the fourteenth August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six ; and the twentieth October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

And whereas the said Corporation have, with the consent of Her Majesty, signified by Order in Council, dated the twenty-third October one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, already made a reduction of ten per centum in such dues, and are desirous of making a further reduction of ten per centum therein :

And whereas the said Corporation have applied for the consent of Her Majesty in Council to the proposed further reduction of the said buoyage and beaconage dues, and Her Majesty has been pleased to approve thereof :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, on the nineteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, to approve the said Bye-laws as *Provisional* Rules within the meaning of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893":

And whereas the provisions of section one of the said "Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been complied with :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to approve of, and doth by this Order confirm, the said Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

Bye-laws made by the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the city of Bristol, acting as the Pilotage Authority for the port of Bristol, under and by virtue of "The Bristol Wharfage Act, 1807," "The Bristol Dock Act, 1848," and "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," for the government of Pilots and others.

1. The following Bye-laws shall commence and take effect on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, on which day all Bye-laws, Rules and Orders now in force for the conduct, government and management of Pilots and Masters and Mates holding Pilotage Certificates for the port of Bristol, and for fixing the rates and remuneration of such Pilots and for regulating the amount to be paid by every such Pilot and every such Master and Mate to the duly appointed officer of the Pilotage Authority towards the Pilotage Fund shall be repealed, but this repeal is not to interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence previously committed or any penalty thereby incurred, nor to affect any annuity or other allowance previously granted or made out of the Pilotage Fund.

2. In these Bye-laws, unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:-

Pilotage Authority" means the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the city of Bristol.

- "Pilotage Committee" means and includes the Committee appointed by the Pilotage Authority for regulating or managing their affairs as a Pilotage Authority and the representatives of Licensed Pilots and Ship Owners elected to serve on such Committee in pursuance of "The Pilotage Order Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1890."
- firmation (No. 2) Act, 1890." "Pilotage District" means the district over which the Pilotage Authority has jurisdiction.
- "Pilot" means a person licensed by the Pilotage Authority to act as Pilot within the Pilotage District.
- "Certificated Master or Mate" means and includes a Master or Mate who holds a Pilotage Certificate granted in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and who is acting within the Pilotage District as Master or Mate of any ship in respect of which such Certificate was granted.

Pilots.

8. No person shall be qualified to become a Candidate for the office of Pilot unless he shall have served an apprenticeship to a Pilot for five years or upwards or shall have been employed in cruising to the westward for seven years or upwards in a Pilot Skiff and in either case shall also have served for one year in a vessel trading between Bristol and some place outside the Bristol Channel and shall be over twenty-five and under forty-five years of age.

4. No person shall be eligible to be licensed to act either as Pilot or as a Certificated Master or Mate within the Pilotage District unless he produce to the Pilotage Authority satisfactory testimonials as to character, a certificate from a Medical Officer to be appointed by the Pilotage Committee that he is not suffering from any ailment which would prevent his performing his duties efficiently, and a recent Board of Trade Certificate as to his effective vision and freedom from colour blindness, and until he shall have satisfied the Pilotage Authority as to his knowledge in the following subjects, viz. :--

- The rules of the road at sea and the rules and regulations to be observed for the preventing collisions at sea, as laid down from time to time by the Board of Trade.
 The Bristol Channel and the River Avon,
- (2) The Bristol Channel and the River Avon, and the proper method of navigating the same respectively.
- (3) The management of vessels, both steam and sailing, how to bring them to anchor and to keep them clear of their anchors in a tide way, and how to moor, unmoor and get them under weigh.

5. Pilots shall be divided into two classes, viz. :-First class and second class Pilots. First class Pilots may pilot vessels of any tonnage, and second class Pilots may pilot sailing vessels of not exceeding 1,200 tons register and steam vessels of not exceeding 1,000 tons register.

6. After a second class Pilot shall have served in that capacity for not less than one year without any serious misbap to a vessel while in his charge through his own default he shall be qualified to be licensed as a first class Pilot.

7. Whenever a sailing vessel exceeding 1,200 tons register or a stram vessel exceeding 1,000 tons register shall from necessity take on board a second class Pilot, in addition to the usual flag, a blue and white flag shall be kept flying showing that the Pilot in charge is a second class Pilot, and such vessel shall at the first practicable moment exchange such Pilot for a first class Pilot. In any such case when a first class Pilot

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shall supersede a second class Pilot the Master shall pay to the second class Pilot a proportionate sum for his services and deduct that sum from the charge of the first class Pilot, and in case of dispute the Pilotage Committee shall determine the proportionate sums to which each party is entitled. No second class Pilot shall continue in charge of a sailing vessel exceeding 1,200 tons register or a steam vessel exceeding 1,000 tons register after a first class Pilot has offered to take charge of her. Provided that in no case shall a change of Pilots take place on board a vessel after such vessel shall have entered the River Avon.

8. Every Pilot shall upon first receiving a licence pay the sum of $\pounds 2$ 2s. to the Pilotage Authority, and shall also pay to them the sum of £1 1s. on receiving every subsequent licence. Every Certificated Master or Mate upon receiving his Certificate shall pay to the Pilotage Authority the sum of £2 2s., and shall also pay to them the sum of £1 1s. on every renewal thereof.

9. No Pilot shall absent himself from his duty without the written permission of the Haven Master.

10. No Pilot when proceeding to the outer limits of the Pilotage District to cruise, or when cruising therein in his pilot boat or in that of another Pilot, shall be towed by a steam vessel so as to prejudice the opportunity of any other Pilot to board an incoming vessel; nor shall he endeavour to obtain the pilotage of any vessel when another Pilot is attempting to board her, under the penalty of forfeiting the pilotage fee to the Pilot whose opportunity of employment has been lost thereby.

11. Every Pilot on boarding a ship for the purpose of piloting her to her destination shall demand of the Master or other Officer in charge, a statement in writing of her draught of water forward and aft.

12. No Pilot shall conduct himself contemptuously, or give abuse, or use improper language to the Haven Master; and every Pilot shall behave himself with strict sobriety and with due civility towards the Owner, Master and Officers of any vessel under his charge.

13. Every Pilot shall obey and execute all orders and regulations given and issued by the Pilotage Authority or the Haven Master, and obey the orders and directions of the Haven Master as to the number of boats and men to be employed in assisting to navigate any vessel up or down the River Avon or to moor or unmoor her in such river, or to enter any of the docks within the Port of Bristol, and he shall also strictly comply with the directions of the Harbour or Dock Master touching the docking or undocking, mooring or unmouring, towing or removing any ship or vessel which such Pilot may have under his charge, so long as such vessel shall be within the limits of the authority of any such Harbour or Dock Master.

14. Every Pilot shall use his utmost care and diligence to conduct vessels under his charge to their destination safely and without damage to other yessels.

15. No Pilot shall leave any inward bound vessel of which he has charge, unless being a second class Pilot to be superseded by a first class Pilot in pursuance of the 7th Clause hereof, until she is safely moored in one of the docks.

16. Pilots shall go on board of outward bound vessels in sufficient time before leaving the dock to ascertain whether they are ready to proceed to sea or anchor in Kingroad; and Pilots are in particular to personally satisfy themselves that such vessel, viz. :-

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the steering gear is connected and in working condition.

17. No pilot shall neglect or refuse to proceed to sea from any of the docks with any vessel which he is qualified to pilot when requested to do so by the Master or Owner of such vessel. In case of refusal he shall at once give his reason therefor in writing to the Haven Master, who shall report the matter at the next meeting of the Pilotage Committee.

18. Whenever any accident shall have happened to or been caused by any vessel while in charge of a Pilot, such Pilot shall within twenty-four hours after arrival or after leaving the vessel, fully report in writing the facts of such accident so far as he knows them to the Haven Master.

19. No Pilot shall conduct or navigate a vessel to a port outside the pilotage district without the permission of the Haven Master.

20. Every Pilot becoming aware of the existence of any danger in the ordinary track of shipping sailing to or from the port, the displacement of any buoy, lightship or beacon, the failure of any light or fog signal, or of any other impediment to the safe navigation of the Bristol Channel or the River Avon shall, as soon as possible, give notice in writing to the Haven Master of the nature and position of such danger or impediment or of such displacement or failure, together with the date and hour when discovered.

Apprentices.

21. Each Pilot shall have regularly at least one Apprentice, who shall be apprenticed to him for not less than five years and he shall instruct his Apprentices in seamanship, in taking soundings, marking the channels, taking bearings of the floating and shore lights, buoys and beacons, and generally in the duties which would devolve upon them in case they should hereafter become Pilots.

22. Every Pilot shall within one month of the time of taking any apprentice, return to the Haven Master the name of such Apprentice in order that a regular Register of Pilots' Apprentices may be kept.

23. Whenever an Apprentice shall for the first time appear for examination for a licence to act as a Pilot, he shall produce his Indenture of Apprenticeship for inspection by the Haven Master and shall furnish evidence to him that he has duly served his apprenticeship.

Pilot Bonts.

24. Every Pilot Boat must be kept in good repair and well found with masts, rigging, sails, anchors, cables, and every other necessary material to the satisfaction of the Haven Master and must be provided with an approved chart of the Bristol Channel, a copy of the Bristol tide table for the current year, and all necessary nautical appliances.

25. Every Pilot Boat shall be painted outside entirely black and the number of her licence shall be painted in white paint on each bow and such number four feet in length at least shall be marked in black paint on the three lower sails of such boat. Every Pilot boat shall carry a flag of two colours the upper horizontal half white and the lower horizontal half red, at the mast head of the dimensions of four feet by five, which flag is to be constantly hoisted as a distinguishing signal ; and the name of her owner and the port to which she belongs shall be painted at full length on the stern of the boat in white letters at least one inch broad and three inches long.

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And in addition thereto any Pilot who may be required to remain on board any ship or vessel for the convenience of the Captain, Master, Owner or Agent, shall be paid ten shillings for every day or part of a day he may be retained on board while at anchor; and any Pilot in charge of a vessel which shall be moored with an anchor in Portishead Dock shall be paid an extra fee of ten shillings.

27. Any Pilot who may have been compelled by stress of weather or by reason of accident or collision to return to an anchorage or dock with the vessel of which he may be in charge shall be paid the rate of Pilotage for the distance he may have proceeded and one third of the Pilotage in addition to the rates fixed to such distance on account of bringing such vessel back again. Provided that in such case he shall not be paid any detention money until he has at the request of the Master of the vessel remained on board of her for twenty-four hours, after which time he shall be paid ten shillings for every day or part of a day he may be retained on board.

28. No Pilot shall demand any Pilotage rate except upon a note for Pilotage approved by the Haven Master and signed by him.

The Haven Master shall be paid by the Pilot for examining the Pilotage note the several sums following :--

- 2 0 register ---If of a vessel 200 and under 400 tons
- 3 0 register If of a vessel 400 tons and upwards 4 0

and such sums shall be added to the Pilotage note and paid therewith by the Master or Owner of such vessel and in default of payment shall be recoverable as part of the rate or fare of Pilotage; and such sum shall forthwith be paid by the Pilot to the Pilotage Authority.

Pilotage Fund.

29. Every Licensed Pilot shall pay to the duly appointed Officer of the Pilotage Authority towards the Pilotage Fund five per cent. of all moneys received by such Pilot in pursuance of the preceding Bye-law so soon as he shall have received the same.

30. Every Certificated Master or Mate shall on every occasion that he may navigate his vessel within the portion of the Bristol Pilotage District in which Pilotage is compulsory pay to the duly appointed Officer of the Pilotage Authority as a contribution to the Pilotage Fund five per cent. of the rates which would have been payable in respect of the Pilotage of his vessel within such portion of the District if he had not held a Pilotage Certificate. Provided that such contribution shall not be payable more than once in every twenty-four hours in respect of any such vessel which is not navigated outside the district in which Pilotage is compulsory.

Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.

31. Every Pilot or Certificated Master or Mate offending against or contravening any of the preceding Bye-laws shall for every such offence be liable to pay a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or to have his Licence or Certificate suspended or withdrawn by the Pilotage Authority.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Augustine situate at Endcliffe within the limits of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mark Broomhall in the county of York and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Mark Broomhall, of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Ecclesall Bierlow in the said county and diocese and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Andrew Sharrow, in the same county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Saint Mark Broomhall, of the said new parish of Ecclesall Bierlow, and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Sharrow, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Augustine situate at Endcliffe as aforesaid.

Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple Archbishop of York, as such Archbishop and also as one of the patrons (in his individual and private capacity) of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Sharrow (in testimony whereof he has signed this representation and has caused his archiepiscopal seal to be hereunto appended) with the consents of the twelve capital burgesses and commonalty of Sheffield, in the said county of York, as the patrons of the vicarage of the new parish of Saint Mark Broomhall aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have caused their common or corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, with the consent of the Venerable John Rashdall Eyre Vicar of Sheffield as the patron in right of his vicarage, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Ecclesall Bierlow, and also as one of the patrons (in his individual and private capacity) of the said vicarage of the new parish of Saint Andrew Sharrow aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of Herbert Unwin of Dowdeswell Court in the county of Gloucester, Esquire as the remaining patron of the said vicaruge of the new parish of Saint Andrew Sharrow aforesaid (in testimony whereof he the last-mentioned consenting party has signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Mark Broomhall, of the said new parish of Ecclesall Bierlow, and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Sharrow which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set for h on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Augustine situate at Endcliffe as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Augustine Endeliffe."

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mark Broomhall of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Ecclesall Bierlow and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Andrew Sharrow all in the county of York and in the diocese of York which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Matthias Sheffield in the said county and diocese from the new parish of Saint Mark Broomhall aforesaid, at the point where Ecclesallroad is joined by Broomgrove-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Clarkehouse-road, and extending thence south-westward al ng the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Westbourne-road and with the road called Brocco Bank and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Endcliffe Vale-road, and

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetynine, in the words following, that is to say :-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch in the city of London and in the diocese of London between that benefice and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint George the Martyr Southwark in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas the advowson of each of the aforesaid benefices is vested partly in Your Majesty in right of the Crown being exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain by virtue of his office and partly in the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the city of London hereinafter referred to as 'the said Corporation.'

"And whereas the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley Earl of Hulsbury now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain as such Lord High Chancellor and the said Corporation have requested us to recommend to Your Majesty in Council the apportionment hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark is at present insufficiently endowed and that the said benefice and rectory of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch has endowments of such an amount as that after allowing for the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made upon the same endowments the lastly-mentioned benefice will still be sufficiently endowed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Mandell Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of Rochester (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Hardinge Stanley Earl of

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Halsbury Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain | acting on behalf of Your Majesty as one of the patrons of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof he hath signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Corporation as remaining patrons of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said Corporation have to this scheme affixed their common or corporate seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice and rectory of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch shall from whatever cause be next avoided all the tithes or annual sums in lieu of tithes glebe lands and all (if any) other the endowments which shall at the date of the next avoidance of the said benefice and rectory of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch or which may thereafter belong to the same benefice and rectory shall be charged and for ever thereafter be chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly charge of three hundred pounds to be as from the day last aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark and to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark or his representatives on the one hand and his successor in the same incumbency on the other hand and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February the first day of May the first day of August and the first day of November in every year.

"Provided nevertheless that in any and every year in which the payment of such annual sum of three hundred pounds would have the effect of reducing the net income of the benefice of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch below the net income (including such payment of three hundred pounds) of the benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark then and in every such year there shall be paid to the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark such part only of the said annual sum of three hundred pounds as shall be sufficient to make the net income of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark equal to the net income of the said benefice of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch for the same year.

"And we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark shall have the following powers for recovering the said yearly rent charge hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say) power if and whenever any part of the said rent charge to which he may be entitled shall at any time be unpaid for twentyone days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark his executors administrators or assigns or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order | daries of the new parish of Wadsley and of the

requiring payment of the arrear to be made within a time to be specified in such order and if the same be not paid within such period then it shall be lawful for the said B shop to sequester the profits of the said benefice of Saint Margaret Pattens with Saint Gabriel Fenchurch until all such arrears due at the time of such sequestration or afterwards to become due during such sequestration together with all costs and expenses of the said sequestration or occasioned thereby shall have been full paid and satisfied but such power of sequestration shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with any rights of the said incombent of the benefice of Saint George the Martyr Southwark or his representatives to recover the said sum or any arrear thereof by proceedings at law or in equity or to use exercise and enjoy all such other powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutably exercied or exercisable by him under the law then in force.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of 'Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now therefore, Her Maje ty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is plansed hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London and by the Registrar of the A. "Whereas by the authority of an Instrument bearing date on or about the thirtieth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one and being under the hand and seal of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward then Archbishop of York a part of the parish of Ecclesfield in the county and dioc se aforesaid was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church situate at Wadsley within the limits of the said parish of Ecclesfield and the same particular district was called 'The Particular District of Wadsley.'

"And whereas the said particular district of Wadsley has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thir:y-seven and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Maj-sty in Council bearing date the fourteenth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four and published in the London Gazette on the eighteenth day of the same month, the boundaries of the said new parish of Wadsley were altered by the inclusion therein of a further part of the parish of Ecclesfield aforesaid.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five and published in the London Gazette on the seventeenth day of the same month certain contiguous portions of the said new parish of Wadsley and of the parish of Ecclesfield aforesaid were together constituted a a separate district for spiritual purposes, and the same was named 'The District of Hillsboroughand-Wadsley-Bridge.'

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Wadsley and of the said district of Hillsborough-and-Wadsley-Bridge should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publi-cation in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries both of the said new parish of Wadsley and of the said district of Hillsboroughand-Wadsley-Bridge shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Wadsley which is described in the First Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said district of Hillsborough-and-Wadsley-Bridge, and that in like manner all that portion of the said district of Hillsborough-and-Wadsley-Bridge which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green

shall be dissevered from the last-named district and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Wadsley.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Wadsley, in the county of York and in the diocese of York, and to be annexed to the district of Hillsborough-and-Wadsley-Bridge in the same county and diocese being :---

" And with the like consent of the said John Wogan Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent, that it appears to us to le expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Mark, Chipping Barnet situate at Barnet Vale as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being : Provided always that so long as the Reverend Daniel William Barrett, Clerk in Holy Orders the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Chipping Barnet shall continue to be such rector or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Mark Chipping Barnet situate at Barnet Vale as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Daniel William Barrett, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"Whereas by the authority of an Instrument bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one and being under the common seal of the late Church Building Commissioners and under the archiepiscopal seal of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend John Bird then Archbishop of Canterbury a certain part of the parish of Folkestone in the said county and diocese was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of Christ Church Folkestone.

"And whereas the said particular district of Christ Church Folkestone has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Instrument bearing date the sixth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixtyeight and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and under the archiepiscopal seal of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend John Thomas then Archbishop of Canterbury a certain part of the said new parish of Christ Church Folkestone was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity Folkestone.

"And whereas the said particular district of the Holy Trinity Folkestone has under the provisions of the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four also become a new parish.

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the nineteenth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one and published in the London Gazette on the twentythird day of the same month a part of the said parish of Folkestone was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael and All Angels Folkestone situate within the limits of such parish and the said district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels Folkestone.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-third day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and published in the London Gazette on the twentyeighth day of the same month a part of the said new parish of Christ Church Folkestone was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Foord in the said new parish and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist Foord.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels Folkestone and the said district chapelry of Saint John the Baptist Foord have each of them under the provisions of the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years

All those contiguous portions of the said parish of Folkestone and of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist Foord which are described in the Fourth Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan and are thereon coloured respectively brown and yellow shall be transferred and annexed to and shall be included within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Folkestone and—

"(5.) All that portion of the said parish of Folkestone which is described in the Fifth Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan and is thereon coloured pink shall be transferred and annexed to and shall be included within the limits of the new parish of Saint John the Baptist Foord and that from and after the said date and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portions of the said new parish of Christ Church Folkestone and of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist Foord (mentioned in the said First and Third Schedules hereto) so to be dissevered as aforesaid shall be restored to and shall become and be and shall again form parts of the said parish of Folkestone and the other portion

of the said new parish of Christ Church Folkestone (mentioned in the said Second Schedule hereto) so to be dissevered therefrom shall be transfer ed and annexed to and shall be included within the limits of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Folkestone and those contiguous portions of the said parish of Folkestone and of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist Foord (mentioned in the said Fourth Schedule hereto) shall be together transferred and annexed to and shall become and be and shall form part of the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Fo kestone aforesaid and the said portion of the said parish of Folkestone (mentioned in the said Fifth Schedule hereto) shall be transferred and annexed to and become and be and shall form part of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist Foord.
