Venice, October 19.

**B**Y a Vessel, which arrived here 2 days ago from Corfou, we have advice, that the Captain-General Mocenigo was returned with the Fleet of this State to *Napoli di Romania*, and that the Gallies of *Malta* are gone home. This week arrived at the *Lido* 800 Men of the new Levy made by the Count de *Hohenloo* for the Service of this State, and the rest are daily expected, who will be sent to the *Levant* with the Convoy that is now preparing, and which may be ready to sail towards the end of this month. The last Letters from the *Morea* say, that the Turks have, since the Repulse they received in their attempt to force the Pass of *Corinth*, been very quiet on that side.

From the Confederate Camp near S. Ambroise, Oct. 20. On the 13th instant we encamped between *Doiron* and *Grughasco*, not far from *Rivole*, where we continued till the 19th. Several Detachements being in the mean time sent towards *Veillane*, which place we possessed our selves of without any opposition, the Troops the Enemy had there relying upon our approach. Monsieur *Catinat* has left the Neighbourhood of *Pignerol*, and is going to repass the Mountains, having posted 15 or 16 Battalions of Foot on the Hills about *Susa*, to defend the Passes and Avenues to that place. Yesterday we decamped; Our Horse moved towards *Pignerol*, and our Foot and Dragoons towards this place. To morrow we shall continue our march towards *Susa*, whither General *Steinau* is sent before with a strong Detachment of Horse and Foot.

Turin, October 20. Our Army decamped yesterday from *Rivole*; A Party of Horse is sent towards *Pignerol* to cover the Country on that side, and the rest of the Army is marched towards *Susa*, which they intend to attack; The French are Masters of the Hills round the place, where they have cast up several Redoubts, and the forcing them from thence will be the most difficult part of this Enterprize, for the Works of the place are of no great strength. Monsieur *Catinat's* Army is separated, most of the Horse has passed the Mountains to return home, and the greatest part of the Foot is marched through the Valley of *Perouse* towards *Susa*, and 3000 men remain under Monsieur de *Fenquieres* about *Pignerol*.

From the King of Poland's Camp near Cherlon in Moldavia, Septemb. 28. After having suffered very much in our march through a Country which afforded very little for our Subsistence, we are now advanced within 6 miles of *Jassi*, the Capital City of this Province, where we find great plenty of Corn, Wine, and several sorts of Fruits. We have not for these 8 or 10 days past heard any

thing of the Tartars till this morning, when one of their Parties appeared, probably, to observe us. 'Tis not yet known when we shall decamp from hence; or whither we shall direct our next march. The Hospodar or Prince of *Moldavia* is retired from *Jassi*, and has sent out Circular Letters to require all his Subjects, able to bear Arms, to come to his assistance. We have advice, that 6000 Cossacks, commanded by the Castellan of *Chelm*, have taken the Fortress of *Sorocke* on the *Niester*, and burnt several Villages thereabouts, after having defeated a Body of Tartars that came to oppose them. The Inhabitants of *Sorocke* were all put to the Sword.

Vienna, October 28. We have had no Letters from the Imperial Camp in *Hungary* since those of the 19th, which gave an account, that our Troops had taken by assault that part of the Town with the Palank that lies on this side the River *Keres*, and that they hoped in 3 or 4 days to be Masters likewise of the Palank on the other side the River; That their new invented Bombs had succeeded very well against the Town, and they promised themselves a good effect from them towards reducing the Citadel, which is fortified with 5 Bastions, and a broad and deep wet Ditch. We hear from *Lippi*, of an ill Accident that has befallen Count *Marfigli* in his return towards *Belgrade*; of which they tell us these Particulars; The Rascians being informed, that a Party of Turks and Tartars had passed the River *Maros*, and committed some Spoil in the neighbouring Country, they placed themselves in an Ambush to fall upon them in their retreat; 'Tis unfortunately fell out, that Count *Marfigli* and the Turkish Chiaux that accompanied him, passed by with their Servants at that very time; and being in Turkish Habits, the Rascians, taking them for some of the Enemy, sallied out, and killed the Chiaux and his Servant, and Count *Marfigli* received a dangerous Wound with a Sable in his Head, and another in his Arm, before the Rascians knew who they were. From *Sclavonia* we have advice, that the Duke de *Croy* was marched with his Cavalry towards *Gradisca*, and that his Infantry was returned to *Esseck*.

Hydelberg, November 3. The French have reinforced the Garrison of *Philipsburgh* to 5000 Men, and have put 3000 into *Landau*. The Winter Quarters for the Confederate Troops are now quite settled. The Suedish Troops have quitted our Neighbourhood, and continue their march towards the Dutchy of *Bremen*. They write from *Strasbourg*, that the French Troops are gone into their Winter Quarters; And the Marschal de *Lorge* returned to *Paris*; The Marquis d' *Uxelles* being to command in *Alsace* this Winter.

Cologne, Novemb. 6. The Garrison of this place will be reinforced by the Circle to 3000 Men, and to form a Line from the *Rhine* to the *Meuse*, 24000 Men of the Troops of *Brandenburg*, *Cologne*, *Netherlands*.

bourg, and Leige, will be quartered during the Winter between these two Rivers. The Elector Palatine is gone to take a Review of his Forces, which are at present encamped near Nideck in the Country of Juliers. Several Regiments of Hessians are to enter into Garison at Coblenz, and others will be posted in the Villages thereabouts. The French have put a strong Garison into the City of Trier, which they have anew fortified with Palisadoes.

Paris, Novemb. 2. Among the other extraordinary Methods that are made use of here to support the Charge of the War, it is, we hear, resolved, that all Persons shall be obliged to bring what Plate they have to the Mint except Spoons and Forks, and some other Pieces that are to be allowed them according to their several Ranks, in order to convert the same into Money, out of which the King is to have the Profit of one Tenth part. A great many Commissions are preparing for new Levies, which it's said will amount to 15000 Men. Our Letters from Pignerol of the 24th past tell us, that the Confederate Army had not yet formally attack'd Saffa, and that our Troops were Masters of the Hills round the place, which rendred the access to it very difficult.

A Vessel is come to Nantes, who met the Sieur de Chasteau-Renaud with the Squadron under his command about 50 Leagues from Brest, standing towards Ireland, but two of his Ships had been separated from the rest in bad Weather. We have now received an account of the Surrender of Lime-rick by an Express from thence.

Brussels, November 7. This day 4 Regiments entered into this place, and 2 more are expected to-morrow, which will compleat the Garison that is to remain here this Winter. A Party of the Garison of Charleroy had 2 or 3 days ago a Rencounter with 70 French Horse belonging to Mons, of whom they killed 30, and took 17 Prisoners. The Marquis de Bussiers does now command the French Troops in Flanders, and the Marquis de Villars between the Sambre and the Meuse. Our Governor the Marquis de Gastanaga is preparing for his return to Spain, though we do not yet hear that his Successor is declared.

Hague, November 9. The States of Holland, after having finished the Affairs that were before them, are Adjourned to the 21st of this month. The Count of Oxeferne, who has resided here some time as Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Sweden, has, it's said, received Orders to go for England in the same Quality. Two of our East India Ships, which came from Batavia on the 28th of March last, are arrived at Hever-Slips; And from England we have advice, that six other Ships from the Coasts of Bengale, Ceylon, and Comandell, are arrived at Spithed.

Dublin, October 23. The number of the Irish that desert for France lessens every day; Many of those that at first seemed willing to go, changing their minds upon better consideration. Our Troops are gone into their Winter Quarters; And the General is come to Kilkenny. The first report we had of the arrival of the French Squadron in the Bay of Dingle was a mistake; But we have now certain advice, that they are come upon the Coast of Kerry, being about 25 Men of War with several Fireships, and 15 Transport Ships, of which Monsieur d'Usson has given notice to Major General Tolmash, who commands at Londonderry, and we hear it is agreed, that the Transport Ships may come into the Shannon to take on Board part of the Irish Garison.

Divers Irish Gentlemen and Persons of Quality are come in, and have taken the Oath of Fidelity to Their Majesties. And many of the Chief of the R. parties have submitted themselves, and brought in their Arms.

Plymouth, October 31. This day Captain Piccard, Commander of Their Majesties Ship the Happy Return,

sent into this Port a French Prize, which he took the 21st instant on the French Coast bound for Lisbon.

Plymouth, November 1. Yesterday a Dutch Cape brought in here a French Prize that came from Dunkirk, bound to St. Malo's with Ammunition and Stores for shipping. Their Majesties Ships the Crown and Drive are come in this day from cruising.
