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Whitehall, November 7.

ON Tuesday the 27th of October the following Address from the Town of Andover was delivered to His Majesty by the Bayliff of the said Town, (Eminent for his Loyalty and Faithfulness to the Government) and several of the Corporation, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Bolton, which His Majesty was pleased to receive very Graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects the Bayliff, Approved Men, and Burgesses, of Andover in the County of Southampton, do in all Humility praye our selves at Your Sacred Feet, to Congratulate Your Majesties safe and happy Arrival after so long, so laborious, and so hazardous an Expedition, for the necessary Defence and Security of Your Injured and Oppressed Allies abroad, and to express our unfeigned Joy for the Glorious and Happy Success of Your Majesties Victorious Arms in Ireland.

It is the Lord of Hosts, even the Lord strong and mighty in Battal, who giveth Victory unto Kings, to whose Auspicious Care and Providence we have (according to Your Majesties own Pious Direction) incessantly and heartily recommended the Safety of Your sacred Person, the Success of Your Councils, and the Triumph of Your Arms.

Blessed therefore be our Gracious GOD, who hath heard and answered our Prayers, and who hath so often and so seasonably declared Your Majesty to be the Darling, and highly favoured Object of the Divine Care and Protection.

That the same Divine Care and Protection may still continue to watch over You and Your Royal Consort our most Gracious Queen; That Your Throne may be Established in a lasting Peace and Prosperity at home; That You may possess Your Glory, and enlarge Your Triumphs abroad, to the utter Shame and Confusion of the Common Enemy and Oppressor the Most Unchristian King; shall be the most fervent and utmost Endeavours of the Prayers and Vows, of the Hearts and Hands, of the Lives and Estates, and of all the most vigorous, active, and unfeigned Duty and Obedience of,

Rome, October 20. The Conferences for accommodating the Differences with France are still continued, but hitherto very little progress is made towards removing the Difficulties that obstruct this Affair. Cardinal Barberigo whose Promotion to the Papacy was so long and earnestly contended for during the last Conclave, especially by the Party of the Zealots, taking lately his Leave of the Pope, before he went to his Bishoprick, at his desire, freely declared his Thoughts about the Matters now in question with the French, and what he would have done thereupon in case he had been raised to the Papal Chair, which, we are told, has very much confirmed the Pope in his Resolution to maintain the Rights of the Church, and not to grant his Bulls to the French Bishops, till the Clergy of France have, by a publick Act, reposed the same Propositions made in their Assembly in 1672. The Abbot Scarlati, who has resided here some time on the part of the Elector of Bavaria, is gone to wait upon his Electoral Highness in Piedmont; Before his departure he had a long Audience of the Pope about the present State of Affairs in France, on which Subject the Pope likewise writ by him to the Elector. The Duke of Mantua continues his solicitation by his Minister at this Court, to have his Countries exempted from Winter Quarters, About which the Pope has lately written to the Emperor. The Business concerning the Inhabitation of Naples is not yet Adjudged, and several Rapports have on occasion thereof been sent to the Court at Madrid, and to Naples.

Genova, October 13. Yesterday arrived here 6 Gallies of the Squadron of Naples, and 4 of Sicily, bringing in with them a small French Privateer, which they took near Viareggio. The Commandant of the Gallies has sent an Express to the Governor of Milan to receive his Orders. By a Vessel that's come in here from the Coast of Catalonia we understand, that the Conde d'Aquilar was returned with the Spanish Armada towards Cadix, in order to go and meet the Galcons.

From the Imperial Camp before Great Waradin, October 24. On the 19th instant we began to work on two Batteries, one of which was finished the 20th towards night, and there were placed on it 11 great Pieces of Cannon; The 21st they began to fire upon the Town; The 22d the same number of Cannon was placed upon the other Battery, and 2000 Rasciens arrived in the Camp. The 23d our Batteries had made a great breach, and Orders were given to storm, but the Enemy being unwilling to let things come to this extremity, resolved to quit the Town, and about 3 in the Afternoon set it on fire in several places; Our Men thereupon ran to the breach and entered the Town, the Turks retiring into a Fort that lies before the Cittadel. The Fire with the help of the Rascien Inhabitants was soon quenched; And we found in the place a good number of Cattel. This day the Enemy made a Sally out of the Cittadel towards the Town, but were presently beaten back. We are now making our Approaches in order to attack the Cittadel. A Party of Tartars fell some days ago upon our Foragers, and took about 100 Prisoners, with some Horses and Camels, but our Hussars pursued them, recovered most of the Prisoners and Booty, and killed and took divers of the Enemy.

Vienna, November 1. The Letters from the Imperial Camp before Great Waradin of the 24th past give an account, that our Troops were possessed of the whole Town, part of which they took by assault, the rest the Enemy abandoned after having set it on fire, and retired into the Castle, which is very strong, and resolutely defended by the Turks; but on the other side our Attacks are carried on with that vigour, and our Bombs begin already to have such extraordinary effect, as promises a good and speedy Issue of this Siege. From Eszack they write, that the Imperial Horse, commanded by the Duke de Croj, continued their march beyond the Save, and that the Troops of Croatia were likewise in motion to join them. In the mean time Preparations are making here for the recruiting the Imperial Armies against Spring. The Hereditary Countries are to raise 12000 Men; And a Treaty is concluded with the Duke of Saxa Gotta, by which he is to put 6 Regiments of Foot into the Emperor's Service. Count Marfigli is likely to recover of his Wound.

Cologne, November 9. The Dyet that was held here of the Circle of Westphalia is ended, and the Deputies stay only for the Ratification of their Principals, with reference to the Resolutions that have been taken at this Meeting. Commissions are given out for the raising 4000 Men for the Service of our Brecktor. The Baron de Fleming, General of the Brandenburg Troops, went from hence this day to Aix la Chapelle.

Hamburg, November 9. The Elector of Brandenburg's Frigats having lately seized 2 Hamburgish Ships, upon this City's refusing to pay his Electoral Highness the 70 thousand Crowns assigned on it by the Emperor, the King of Denmark reclaimed them, as having sailed with his Colours and Passports, and the Matters being Burghers of Copenhagen, and by way of Reprisals a Danish Man of War took several Vessels belonging to the Subjects of Brandenburg; But this matter is now accommodated, the Ships taken on both sides are to be released, and this City is to pay the Sum before-mentioned, 40000 Crowns now, and the rest in a short time.

Paris, November 9. The Advices from Piedmont of the 27th past tell us, that the Confederate Army encamped on the 23d within Cannon Shot of some of our advanced Posts about *Susa*. Monsieur de Laroy, who commands there, had, with 14 Battalions and 12 Pieces of Cannon, secured the Hills and Avenues near the place; and the 24th Monsieur *Catinat*, who had made a very hasty march through the Valley of *Parouse*, arrived at *Susa*, being followed by 15 Battalions, who came up the next morning. In the mean time the Confederates raised several Batteries, and made other Preparations to attack the French in their Posts, and on the 26 a Detachment was sent from their Army to possess themselves of the *Col de Fenestrelle*, which they did, but finding the Enemy too advantageously posted on the Hills round it, that they could not maintain themselves there, they afterwards quit it, and returned to their main Body. In their Retreat the French fell upon their Rear-Guard, of whom, after a sharp Dispute, they killed about 100, and the loss was not much less on our side. The Lieutenantcy of *Guienne* is given to the Duke de *Noblesse*, who commanded this last Summer on the side of *Catalonia*. The *Marschal de Loge* is returned hither from *Germany*.

Brussels, November 11. The Troops designed to remain in Garrison here this Winter are all arrived, except some Regiments of Horse, who are expected about the beginning of the next week, by which time the Stables, that are making for them in the Park and other places of this City, will be ready to receive them. The Marquis de *Beaufiers*, who now commands the French Troops on our frontiers, arrived the 2d of this month at *Mont*, and went from thence on the 6th to *Tornay*, having ordered several new Works to be made at the first of these places. From *Spain* we have advice, of the safe arrival of the Galeons; And that Don *Jean de Angulo* was declared Secretary of the Universal Dispatches, in the Place of Don *Manuel de Lora*, who lately resigned that Employment. From *Vienna* they write, that the Imperialists had taken the Town of *Great Waradin*, and that they hoped in a short time to be Masters likewise of the Castle.

Hague, Nov. 13. The States-General have lately ordered three Privileges to be Published; By the first, they forbid the Greenland Fishery for the whole Year 1692, upon penalty of confiscation of Ship and Goods; The second prohibits the going out of all Ships and Vessels, as well on the account of Merchandizing, as on private Commissions, to the Westward, Eastward, or Northward, either through the Channel, or round by *Scotland*, or to any Parts whatsoever, as also the Great and Small Fishery, upon pain of forfeiting both Ship and Goods, or the value thereof to be paid by the Owners and Freighters of such Ships, as shall go out contrary to this Prohibition, excepting only the Ships of the *East* and *West India* Companies, and those bound to *Sorinam*, as likewise the Vessels going to *England*, *Scotland*, and *Ireland*, to the *Elbe*, the *Wjse*, the *Eme*, and on the *Flemish Coast*; Those that go out for fresh Fish, and all Ships laden with Piece Goods, &c. By the third, all Capers and Privateers, that are now abroad, are commanded, so soon as they have notice of this Privilege, to return home with all the haste they can, upon forfeiture of Ship and Goods, and the Prizes they shall take after such notice, except such as are at present engaged in the *Streights*, &c. And the Men of War of this sort are commanded, when they meet the said Privateers, to give them notice hereof. Of our *Moskovy* Fleet, which consisted of 19 Sail, 14 are arrived in the *Tweed*; Two are stranded at Sea; and the other three, which were separated from the rest in bad Weather, are still missing. Our *North-western* Fleet of about 100 Sail is likewise arrived in the *Tweed*.

Dublin, November 1. About 1500 Irish are shipped at *Cork*. It is believed the rest marched yesterday out of the English Towns of *Limerick*, to embark on the French Transport Ships that are come into the *Shannon*. The General is expected here on Tuesday next, and great Preparations are making by this City for his Reception. Their expected Ships the *Centurion*, *Planchet*, and *Adventure*,

with 2 Vessels laden with Ammunition, arrived the 26th at *Kinsale*, having left Sir *Ralph Delaval*, with the Squadron under his command, above 25 Leagues from thence. The Rapperies submit every day; And last Friday *Gasping Hegan*, who had been one of their chief Leaders, desired and had a Protection, promising to be serviceable for the future in reducing those of his Gang that still hold out.

Whitehall, Nov. 4. His Majesty was pleased this day to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon *John Penn*, one of the Barons of the Court of *Exchequer*.

Whitehall, Nov. 8. This day Signior *Hain Toland*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor of *Tex* and *Morocco*, had his publick Audience of Their Majesties with the usual Ceremony, being conducted by Sir *Charles Canning*, Master of the Ceremonies.
