Shipping Company Limited shall not exceed

forty pounds.

2. Every Master or Mate certified as aforesaid shall within fourteen days next after the expiration of each calendar month make a return in writing to the said Pilot Master at the Office of the Cork Harbour Commissioners at Queenstown of the occasions during the calendar month immediately preceding on which he shall have navigated vessels within the said Pilotage District (except as aforesaid) having passengers on board with the names register tonnage, and all needful particulars of the vessels so navigated and shall within the same period from time to time pay to such Pilot Master as aforesaid the amounts due from him under the foregoing Bye-law.

3. The contribution under these Bye-laws shall be in addition to the fees payable on the issue and

renewal of Pilotage Certificates.

4. The Bye-laws made by the Cork Harbour Commissioners and approved by Her Majesty in Council on the twenty-ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, shall be rescinded on the day these Bye-laws take effect.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and pinety-nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirtcenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the Loundaries of the new parish of Greenhithe in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas by the authority of au Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-ninth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six and published in the London Gazette upon the thirteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven certain contiguous portions of the parish of Swanscombe and of the parish of Stone both in the said county of Kent and in the diocres of Rochester aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary situate at Greenlithe within the limits of the parish of Swanscombe aforesaid and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Greenhithe.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Greenhithe has under the provisions of the diocesan boundary in the middle of the sact of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth moored there in the said River Thames."

and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Greenhithe should be altered in the manner hereinafter men-

tioned

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart Bi-hop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Greenhithe shall be altered so that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Stone and of the parish of Swanscombe aforesaid which are described in the Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured pink and green respectively shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Greenhithe.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of

Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Greenhithe in the county of Kent and in the

diocese of Rochester being :-

"I. All that portion of the parish of Stone in the said county and diocese which is bounded on the north and on the north-east by the said new parish of Greenhithe and on the remaining sides that is to say on the south and on the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boun lary which divides the said new parish of Greenhithe from the parish of Stone aforesaid at the point where London-road is joined by Cobham-terraceroad, and extending thence westward along the middle of the said London-road for a distance of eighteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Butcher's-lane at or near to the building formerly known as the Stone and Swanscombe National Schools and extending thence first north-westward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said Butcher's-lane for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary at or near to the south-western end of the row of cottages known as Lamb-terrace which boundary divides the said parish of Stone from

the new parish of Greenhithe aforesaid.

"II. And also all those two portions of the said parish of Stone and of the parish of Swanscombe in the county and diocese aforesaid, which comprise that part of the foreshore and tidal way of the River Thames, which extends along the river front of the said new parish of Greenhithe, and between that front and the county and diocesan boundary in the middle of the said river, thereby including within the limits of the said new parish of Greenhithe the two training ships 'The Arethusa' and 'The Worcester,' which are
