

of the said house, outbuildings and gardens called or known as 'Mere Bank' as aforesaid and extending thence southward to and along the said wall for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction on the northern side of the said road called Croxteth Drive in Sefton Park as aforesaid with the iron railings forming the southern boundary of the said house, outbuildings and gardens and extending thence westward along the last described railings for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the western boundary of the same house outbuildings and gardens, and extending thence northward along the last described wall for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its northern end on the southern side of Ullet-road aforesaid and continuing thence still northward and in a direct line to the boundary in the middle of the same road which boundary divides the said new parish of Christ Church Toxteth Park from the new parish of Saint Agnes Toxteth Park aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine in the words following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Theodore situate at Pontycymmer within the limits of the parish of Llangeinwyr in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said

parish of Llangeinwyr and of the parish of Bettws in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Llangeinwyr and of the parish of Bettws aforesaid should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Theodore situate at Pontycymmer as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff as such Bishop, and also as the patron, in right of his See, of the vicarage of the parish of Bettws aforesaid, and with the consent of Emily Charlotte Talbot of Margam Park in the said county of Glamorgan, Spinster, as the patron of the vicarage of the parish of Llangeinwyr aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Llangeinwyr, and of the parish of Bettws aforesaid which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Theodore situate at Pontycymmer as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Garw Valley.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Garw Valley comprising:—

"All those two contiguous portions of the parish of Llangeinwyr and of the parish of Bettws both in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Bettws from the parish of Llangeinwyr aforesaid, at the centre of the ford by which the road leading from Bettws Church past the house called Gwernllwyn fâch and past the Llangeinwyr Railway Station to Llangeinwyr Church crosses the River Garw and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road and mountain path which leads past Greenmeadow Inn and past the houses called Ty-du and Ffawyddog respectively along the ridge of the mountain called Mynydd Llangeinwyr towards Glynorwg and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road or mountain path for a distance of four miles and three quarters or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Llangeinwyr from the parish of Llangynwyd in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first westward and then southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and forty-five chains or thereabouts to the point at or near to the spring called Ffynnon
