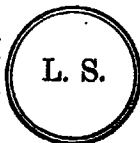


to the University for the purposes of the Common University Fund such sum as is by the Statutes of the University made under the powers of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 authorized to be levied from the College provided that so much of the sum so to be paid as shall be levied in respect of the income of any Trust Fund or of the Tuition Fund or of any other separate fund shall be charged on the income of such Trust Fund Tuition Fund or other separate fund respectively unless the Council shall in any case otherwise determine. There may further be paid to the University such sum (if any) as the Council may in any year think fit.

By inserting in Statute LIV intituled "The Tuition Fund" after the paragraph numbered (iii.) the following paragraph:—

(iv.) To the payment of such part of the sum payable by the College to the University under the Statute in that behalf hereinbefore contained as shall be charged on the Fund under the provisions of the said Statute.

THE following Statute, made on the twentieth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, by the Governing Body of Brasenose College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

At a Meeting of the Governing Body of Brasenose College held on the twentieth day of October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine it was resolved in accordance with the provisions of Statute XIX to make the undermentioned alteration of Statute III namely, for the existing clause 13 to substitute a clause as follows:—

Any Official Fellow who shall be instituted to, or otherwise be put in possession of, an ecclesiastical benefice with cure of souls, whether in the gift of the College or not, shall vacate his Fellowship on the expiration of nine months from his presentation, or collation, or otherwise acquiring a title to such benefice, unless an application by him for leave to retain his Fellowship shall, prior to the acquisition of such title, have been sanctioned by the Principal and Fellows and also by the Visitor.

No application shall be considered by the Principal and Fellows except at a meeting held in full term and specially called with notice of the business to be transacted thereat, the votes at such meeting being taken by secret ballot. The consent of the Principal and Fellows shall only be given by a majority of two-thirds of those present at such meeting, whether voting or not, the Principal being counted as two persons, and shall in no case be given unless it appear to the required majority that the holding of such benefice is not incompatible with the full discharge by the applicant of his duties to the College as Official Fellow or otherwise.
