Now, therefore, in pursuance of the beforementioned Acis, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Japan (Consular and Marriage Fees) Order in Council, 1900."

2. The several fees set forth in the Tables annexed to this Order are hereby established, and the said Tables and notes thereto shall be construed as part of this Order.

3. This Order shall come into force on the 1st day of April, 1900, or at such later day as in the case of any particular Consular jurisdiction,

or part thereof, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by any general or particular instructions, may from time to time direct.

4. On and after the day on which this Order comes into operation in any place in Japan, "The Consular Fees (China, Japan, and Corea) Order in Council, 1892," shall be repealed as to that place, but this repeal shall not affect any right or liability existing at the time when this Order so comes into operation.

5. In this Order the expression "Consular Jurisdiction" means and includes the district, place, or places for which a Consular officer acts.
6. This Order shall extend to all places in

Japan.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the law respecting the office of County Coroner," it was amongst other things enacted that "when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the Justices of any County that such County should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of this Act or that any alteration should be made of any division theretofore made under this Act it shall be lawful for the said Justices in General or Quarter Session assembled to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty praying that such division or alteration be made and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such County as hereinafter provided.

"The Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said Justices into consideration and the Justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the Justices for that purpose touching such petition having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants the nature of their employments and such other circumstances as shall appear to the Justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of this Act, and such petition with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof with the reasons upon which the petition is founded shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the Justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and

the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a true copy of such petition certified under his hand to every Coroner for such

county.

"It shall be lawful for Her Majesty if She shall think fit with the advice of Her Privy Council after taking into consideration any such petition and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purpose of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of this Act as to Her Majesty with the advice aforesaid shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette."

And whereas by "The Local Government Act 1888" the powers and business of the said Justices in respect of the matters aforesaid in each county have been transferred to the council of such county.

And whereas by an Order in Council made the twenty-sixth November one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two under the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act the county of Essex was divided into three districts for Coroners' purposes and for the purposes of the said Act which said districts were named respectively the Eastern Coroner's District; the Western Coroner's District and the Romford Coroner's District and comprised respectively the several parishes named and set forth in the Schedule to the said Order in Council.

And whereas by a further Order in Council made the seventh day of July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven pursuant to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act the county of Essex was again divided into four districts for Coroners' purposes and for the purposes of the said Act which said districts were named respectively:—

The Eastern Coroner's District, The Romford Coroner's District,

The Romtord Coroner's District, The Metropolitan Coroner's District, and

The Southern and Western Coroner's District, and comprised respectively the several parishes and places named and set forth in the Schedule to the said Order in Council.

And whereas the office of Coroner for the Romford District of the said county has become, and now is, vacant.

And whereas by virtue of the provisions of the law relating to Local Government the parish of Romford forming part of the said Romford Coroner's District has been divided into three separate parishes named respectively Noak Hill, Romford Urban and Romford Rural.

And whereas on the third day of October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine a petition was presented to Her Majesty by the County Council of Essex praying that the Romford Coroner's District might be amalgamated with the Southern and Western Coroner's District of the said county which sail petition together with a Schedule thereto containing a list of the parishes in the said Romford Coroner's District proposed to be added to the said Southern and Western Coroner's District of the said county and the reasons upon which the petition is founded were duly certified to Her Majesty.

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petition. And whereas the Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty.

And whereas Her Majesty has with the advice of Her Privy Council taken into consideration the said petition and is minded to make such alteration and division as prayed in the said petition.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed and declared that from the date of this Order:—

1. The county of Essex shall be divided into three districts for Coroners' purposes and for the purposes of the said first recited Act by the incorporation with the said Southern and Western Coroner's District of the parishes comprised in the said Romford Coroner's District of the county of Essex namely the parishes of Havering, Hornchurch, Noak Hill, Romford Urban and Romford Rural.

2. The said three Districts shall be named respectively the Eastern Coroner's District the Metropolitan Coroner's District, and the Southern and Western Coroner's District, and the said districts shall respectively comprise the parishes and places mentioned or referred to in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

3. This Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

7 HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong, with great advan-" tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may " in some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united-" to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed " to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said "Archbishop for his consideration) describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-" tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, "and payments, and in respect to patronage and "rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by " such alteration shall consent in writing under " his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may " approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, " by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it "shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or "modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect.'

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the eighth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of Canter-

bury as follows:-

"I the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln do hereby represent to Your Grace that there is in the county and diocese of Lincoln the rectory of Scotton to which belongs amongst other places the ancient chapelry of East Ferry the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the population of the said parish of Scotton according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one exclusive of the said chapelry of East Ferry is two hundred and

twenty-five persons.

"I hat the population of East Ferry according to the same census amounts to one hundred and

twelve persons.

"That there is one church in the parish of Scotton affording accommodation for about two hundred and fifty persons and one other church or chapel in the said chapelry of East Ferry affording a commodation for about one hundred persons.

"That the parish church of Scotton is distant from the church or chapel of East Ferry upwards

of six miles.

"That the net annual value of the said rectory of Scotton and the chapelry of East Ferry after deducting all rates taxes and other permanent charges and outgoings is four hundred and five pounds or thereabouts arising from tithe rentcharge glebe land dividends and fees.

"That there is a good and sufficient house of residence belonging to the said rectory of Scotton but there is no house of residence belonging to the

said chapelry of East Ferry.

- "That the said rectory of Scotton is at the present time subject to an outstanding mortgage debt to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne amounting to the sum of four hundred and sixty-six pounds six shillings and fourpence on account of principal with current interest thereon at the rate of four per centum per annum.
- "That Scotton and East Ferry though forming one civil parish have each its own parish meeting are s parately rated and are for all practical purposes quite distinct. That baptisms churchings marriages and burials happening or arising within the said chapelry of East Ferry have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized or take place in the parish church of Scotton or the churchyard thereto belonging.
- "That the said rectory of Scotton is in the patronage of the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain acting for and on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria and is now held by the Reverend Thomas Harris as incumbent thereof.
- "That there is in the same county and diocese the vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston the parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one a population of one thousand two hundred and ninety-six persons.

"That the said vicarage and parish of Oulston otherwise Owston have one church containing

accommodation for six hundred persons.

"That there is a good and sufficient house of residence belonging to the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston.

of Oulston otherwise Owston after deducting all rates taxes and other permanent charges and outgoings amounts to two hundred and sixty-three pounts or thereabouts arising from tithe rent charge glebe land and payments by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"That the parish church of Oulston otherwise

Owston is distant from the aforesaid chapelry of East Ferry half a mile.

"That the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston is in the patronage of the First Lord Commissioner of Her Majesty's Treasury acting for and on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria and is now held by the Reverend Harry Emmitt Clark as incumbent thereof.

"That owing to the great distance between the parish church of Scotton and the chapel at East Ferry it is a matter of very considerable difficulty for the rector resident at Scotton to exercise that spiritual oversight of the people at East Ferry which is to be desired.

"That for a long time past by a voluntary arrangement between the incumbents of Scotton and Oulston otherwise Owston the incumbent of the latter place has made himself responsible for the services at East Ferry and for the spiritual

oversight of the people there.

"That a rector of Scotton taking duty at East Ferry could only do so to the detriment of both services that he would be unable to superintend the Sunday School and taking the services at both places would involve a journey of at least twelve miles every Sunday.

"That owing to the distance the Rector of Scotton cannot adequately visit the sick and dying

at East Ferry.

"That as regards baptisms churchings and marriages it will be a very great convenience to the residents in the said chapelry of East Ferry if these could be performed celebrated and take place in the parish church at Oulston otherwise Owston instead of at Scotton as heretofore but it is considered to be desirable that the burial of the bodies of persons dying inhabitants of the said chapelry shall be buried in the churchyard of the said parish of Scotton as heretofore.

"That although there is no bridge across the River Trent which separates East Ferry from Oulston otherwise Owston yet there is a ready mode of access from one place to the other by means of a Queen's ferry which is by law continuously served every day from six o'clock in the

morning until ten o'clock at night.

"That it will be a much greater convenience for the people of East Ferry to cross the Trent by means of the aforesaid ferry whenever they wish to attend Divine service at the parish church of Oulston otherwise Owston half a mile distant than to walk to their present parish church at Scotton six miles distant.

"That it is very desirable in the interests of religion that such chapelry should be placed under the care of the Vicar of Oulston otherwise Owston whereby the visitation of the sick the management of schools and all other parish work may be carried out much more efficiently and with greater usefulness and satisfaction than at present and therefore it appears to me that the said chapelry of East Ferry may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated from the said rectory and parish of Scotton and united to the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That in the event of the said proposed separation and union taking effect it is proposed that the said chapelry of East Ferry and any portion of the endowments of the said rectiny of Scotton which may be transferred and annexed shall with the consent of the aforesaid Governors be wholly freed released and discharged from all liability to the aforesaid mortgage debt and all

interest thereon which consent is signified by an instrument in writing hereunto annexed and

scaled by the said Governors.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in section twenty-six of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and in respect to rights to pews if any may be made with just ce to all parties interested. And I do submit the same to Your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley Earl of Halsbury Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for and on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria the Patron and of the Reverend Thomas Harris the Rector of the said rectory of Scotton and also of the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, M.P., First Lord Commissioner of Hor Majesty's Treasury for and on behalf of Her said Majesty the Patron and of the Reverend Harry Emmitt Clark the Vicar of the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston. To the intent that Your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the

said representation are as follows:-

"That the said chapelry of East Ferry be separated from the said rectory of Scotton and united to the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston for all ecclesiastical purposes and be under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston now is and the chapel of East Ferry shall be a chapel of ease to the parish church of Oulston otherwise Owston.

"That the vicar of Oulston otherwise Owston shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said chapelry of East Ferry.

"That baptisms churchings and marriages arising happening or accruing within the said chapelry of East Ferry shall be performed celebrated and take place in the parish church of Oulston otherwise Owston instead of the parish church of Scotton and that the fees for all other ecclesiastical offices including such burials of persons dying inhabitants of East Ferry as shall be buried at Oulston otherwise Owston and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other encluments arising from or in respect of the said chapelry of East Ferry and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall except as hereinafter provided belong and be paid to the vicar of Oulston otherwise Owston aforesaid.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry of East Ferry shall continue to be entitled to bury their dead in the said burial ground belonging to

the said parish of Scotton as heretofore.

"That the fees for t e burial in the suid churchyard of Scotton of the bodies of persons dying inhabitants of the said chapelry shall be payable to the Incumbent of the said parish of Scotton as heretofore and shall be of the same amount as at present.

"That the tithe rent-charge specified and set forth in the schedule hereunder wr tten being part of the tithe rent-charge arising within the said chapelry of East Ferry and now belonging to and forming part of the endowment of the said rectory of Scotton be transferred from the said rectory of Scotton and annexed and belong to and form part

of the endowment of the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry of East Ferry shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Scotton or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said parish of Scotton but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act 1868' to repair the said parish church of Oulston otherwise Owston as well as the said chapel of East Ferry and the said rector of Scotton shall henceforth cease to be liable to repair or contribute to the repair of the chancel of the said chapel of East Ferry.

Ferry.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry of East Ferry shall be entitled to resort to and attend the parish church of Oulston otherwise Owston aforesaid as their parish church and also the said chapel of East Ferry and to be accommodated with pews and sittings the rein concurrently with all other parishioners of the said parish of Oulston otherwise Owston as the ordinary may direct sanction or approve but shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Scotton.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the rights of patronage to either of the said benefices of the rectory of Scotton or the vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston but that the same shall remain continue

and be as they now are.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the revenues and endowments of the said rectory of Scotton except that there shall be annexed to the said benefice of Oulston otherwise Owston a certain part of the tithe rent c argea rising within the said chapelry of East Ferry as set forth in the schedule here o and the fees arising within the said chapelry which are hereinbefore assigned thereto.

"I the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley Earl of Halsbury Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for and on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria the patron entitled to present to the said rectory of Scotton in case the same were now vacant I the Reverend Thousas Harris Clerk the Rector of the said rectory of Scotton I the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, M.P., First Lord Commissioner of Her Majesty's Treasury for and on behalf of Her said Majesty the patron entitled to present to the said vicarage of Oulston otherwise Owston in case the same were now vacant and I the Reverend Harry Emmitt Clark Clerk, the Vicar of the said vicarage of Oulst-n otherwise Owston do hereby severally and resp crively signify our consent to the scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"Witness our hands the thirteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Christ Church Ebbw Vale of the district chapelry of Saint Michael Abertillery and of the parish of Bedwellty both such last-mentioned cures being in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such cures respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Christ Church Ebbw Vale, of the district chapelry of Saint Michael Abertillery, and of the parish of Bedwellty should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul Cwm situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his Sce of the vicarage of the said new parish of Christ Church Ebbw Vale and of the vicarage of the said parish of Bedwellty (in testimony whereof he has signed this representation and has caused his episcopal seal to be affixed hereto) and with the consent of the Reverend Howell Howell the Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Aberystruth in the county and diocese aforesaid, as such rector or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the district chapelry of Saint Michael Abertillery aforesaid (in testimony whereof he the said Howell Howell has signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for-England humbly represent that it would in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Christ Church Ebbw Vale of the said district chapelry of Saint Michael Abertillery and of the said parish of Bedwellty which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and

set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Paul Cwm situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul Cwm.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul

Cwm, comprising:—
"I. "Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the above-mentioned parochial chapelry which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas we are satisfied that the said parochial chapelry of Littleborough is a cure wherein, or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof.

"And whereas certain glebe lands messuages tenements and hereditaments sometime belonging to the vicarage of the said parish of Rochdale have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the lastly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any other assurance in the law all that part of the said parochial chapelry of Littleborough which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Barnabas, Shore.'

"And with the like consent, we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district of Saint Barnabas, Shore, and when it shall have become a new parish then of the said new parish shall be assigned to and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Barnabas, Shore, being:—

Circular No. 35. Division of Customs and Insular Affairs.

War Department, Washington, January 4, 1900.

The following Order of the President, relative to quarantine regulations for ports in the Philippine Islands, is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned:—

Executive Mansion, Washington, January 3, 1930.

To prevent the introduction of epidemic disease, it is ordered that the provisions of the Act of Congress approved February 15, 1893, entitled "An Act granting additional quarantine powers and imposing additional duties upon the Marine Hospital Service," and all rules and regulations heretofore or hereafter prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury under that Act are to be given full force and effect in the Philippine Islands, in so far as they are applicable, and the following additional rules and regulations are hereby promulgated :-

The examination in ports of the Philippine Islands of incoming and outgoing vessels, and the necessary surveillance over their sanitary condition as well as of cargo, passengers, crew, and of all personal effects, is vested in, and will be conducted by, the Marine Hospital Service, and medical officers of that service will be detailed by the Secretary of the Treasury as quarantine officers at the ports of Manila and Iloilo immediately, and at other ports in the Philippine Islands as soon as practicable or necessary.

Quarantine officers shall have authority over incoming vessels, their wharfage and anchorage, in so far as is necessary for the proper enforcement of the quarantine regulations, including vessels of the Army Transport Service and noncombatant vessels of the navy.

Collectors of Customs at ports of entry will not permit entry without quarantine certificates.

Any vessel leaving any port in the Philippine Islands for any port in the United States, or its dependencies, shall obtain a bill of health from the quarantine officer, when such officer is on duty; said bill of health to correspond to the consular bill of health now required by Treasury regulations; and the bill of health shall not be given to an outgoing vessel unless all quarantine regulations have been complied with. At ports where no medical officer is detailed the bills of health will be signed by the collector of customs or other officer to whom such duty has been legally delegated. Special regulations relating to the bills of health to be obtained by vessels of the United States Navy will be promulgated by the Secretary of the Treasury.

The medical officer detailed under this Order as quarantine officer at the Port of Manila shall be the chief quarantine officer for the Philippine Islands. It shall be his duty to make appointments and removals from the service in the Philippines (subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury), and shall authorize necessary expenditures, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe.

The regulations for the government of the Marine Hospital Service shall, so far as practicable, have force and effect in the management of the quarantine service in the Philippine Islands.

The expenses of the quarantine service will be charged against the revenues of the Islands, and a sum not to exceed three hundred thousand

dollars (\$303,000) in each fiscal year is hereby set aside from the revenues collected in said Islands for this purpose. .The expenses shall be paid therefrom upon the certificate of a detailed quarantine officer, and upon the approval of the chief quarantine officer for the Philippine Islands.

The chief quarantine officer shall render a report on the last day of each month to the Supervising Surgeon-General of the Marine Hospital Service, who will issue to him necessary instructions.

The Epidemic Fund will be reimbursed from the revenues of the Island, for the cost of disinfecting appliances and materials ordered to be forwarded to the Islands prior to the date of this Order. WILLIAM MCKINLEY.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE INFECTED AREA.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected

with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. Notwithstanding the existence of any footpaths or right of way across or through any field, shed, or other place in the Infected Area declared by this Order, no person shall enter such field, shed, or other place while any cattle, sheep, or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—

(i.) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii.) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agricul-

3. No dog shall be allowed to be at large within the Infected Area declared by this Order except while being used for the driving of cattle or sheep.

4.—(1.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If the owner or person in charge of any dog permits such dog to be at large in contravention of this Order, such owner or person shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
