DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies, have been received from Rear-Admiral Sir Robert H. Harris, K.C.M.G., Commander-in-Chief on the Cape of Good Hope and West Coast of Africa, reporting proceedings of Naval Brigade from the time of reaching Lord Methuen's Headquarters to the Battle of Graspan:—

H.M.S. "Doris," Simon's Bay,

SIR, 4th December, 1899.

IN accordance with your orders I left Simon's Bay on Sunday the 19th November, and arrived with the Naval Brigade at Lord Methuen's Headquarters at about 1 o'clock on the 22nd. On reporting myself to Lord Methuen I received orders to accompany him that afternoon to Belmont. Having to wait for transport from Orange River, which arrived very late in the evening, I could not manage to leave until the brigade had already marched some hours. Having packed waggons and harnessed mules I marched at 8.30 to Belmont. Being a long column it was necessarily a very slow march, and the mules were troublesome.

2. On arriving within one mile of Belmont I received orders through a staff officer to go back along the road, and to be in Belmont by 3 o'clock next morning to report myself to the General. On arriving at headquarters at 3 A.M., I received orders to communicate with Colonel Hall, commanding Royal Artillery; having met him, I marched out of Belmont by road in company with Colonel Hall's battery of field artillery. After clearing Belmont kopjes we turned off the road on the open veldt; day was just dawning, and we could see the top of the line of kopjes held by the enemy. We were then advancing towards the centre of his position, over very rough ground intersected with dykes. This tried our gun-mountings very severely.

Unfortunately one gun capsized, but was soon righted, and I was relieved to find that there was no damage done, and that the dockyard work stood the test so well.

On proceeding to higher ground a view of the Boers' position was then obtained. A long line of kopjes, which looked very much higher at dawn of day than they really were, the light being very bad indeed, and the sun coming up behind the kopjes cast dark shadows, which made it very hard to distinguish any objects. In addition to this there was a mist round the lower part of the kopjes.

3. Firing was now going on in our front, the Boers evidently having been repulsed. Colonel Hall here turned away to his left, and to the left of the Boer position, on the understanding that I should take up a position across the railway line on higher ground, and he would soon communicate with me. This I did, but had great difficulty in taking my heavy ammunition waggons and guns across the railway-line, finally succeeding. I here brought the battery into action to try the range of the extreme depth of the Boer position, but after firing a range-finding shot and not seeing it pitch, I limbered up.

4. Hearing heavy firing on the right of the position, and not having had any communication from Colonel Hall, I determined, if possible, to get the battery in range of the large kopje, which a battery of the Royal Artillery were shelling. The guns not being mobile, and having to cover heavy ground I was unfortunately too late to take part in shelling the top of the kopje, which the Guards carried.

5. I then turned to the left between two kopjes, and found the Boers on the rear kopje firing upon advancing infantry. I immediately got the battery into action, and at 1,700 yards shelled the Boers who were firing on our troops, the practice being excellent. The Boers were very soon silenced and retreated.

6. I received orders from the General to take my guns, if possible, on to a low kopje about 800 yards from my front, so as to shell the retreating Boers from their position. I limbered up and advanced as quickly as possible over very rough ground, and advancing well ahead myself to survey the kopje. I found, when I arrived on top, that it was impossible to take wheels over it, so reluctantly had to give it up. Here my officers, men, and mules were almost dead beat and the battle over. Having watered my mules I returned to camp with the remainder of the troops.

7. At 3 P.M. next day the whole Brigade marched out of Belmont to the railway station, where our guns were entrained. The gun mules were handed over to Colonel Hall to save his horses. The guns and ammunition were left entrained under command of Lieutenant Dean, with his half-battery and officers to guard them. The remainder of the Naval Brigade marched at the head of the column to the next bivouac. At 10.30 P.M. I received orders from General Methuen that next morning the Naval Brigade would lead the attack on the enemy's position, supported by the Yorkshire Light Infantry, the attacking force being under the command of Brigadier-General Money. We paraded at 3 A.M., and marching at the head of the column, came up to the left of the enemy's position at daylight, the Field Artillery engaging the right and left of the enemy's position and shelling the top of the kopjes.

The armoured train with naval guns in rear was steaming up on the left of our advance. I observed one of our guns in action firing at the extreme left of the Boer position, which rested on the railway line. The infantry marching away to the right I had no further opportunity of observing the action of the guns after that.

8. The Brigade was deployed into line single rank four paces interval, and advanced on the enemy's position. The disposition of officers was as follows:—

Major Plumbe, R.M.L.I., in command of the left;
 Commander Ethelston, in command of the right;
 Myself in the centre.

When in front of the kopje to be attacked the line was wheeled, the right brought up, and the Brigade advanced to the attack immediately. The enemy opened fire on the Brigade at about 600 yards, a very heavy front fire. The Brigade still advanced steadily by rushes, and in a short time a very heavy cross fire was opened from our left flank, but in spite of the murderous fire the behaviour of our officers and men was beyond all praise. They all showed great courage and cool determination. Although losing heavily both in officers and men, I had the satisfaction of seeing, after being wounded and being carried to the rear, our bluejackets and marines in possession of the enemy's position. To give some idea of the heavy fire, several times I saw a man hit three times before he reached the ground, but there was never the slightest hesitation in the advance from beginning to end.

9. After the death of Commander Ethelston, Lieutenant Boyle led his bluejackets into the enemy's position. Captain Marchant also, after the death of Major Plumbe, led his marines into the enemy's position. When the conduct of all officers is of such a quality it is impossible to single out any particular instance, but I may mention Lieutenant Jones, R.M.L.I., who, although wounded in the thigh, did not stop until he led his men into the enemy's position.

10. I herewith embody two reports: the first from Captain Marchant, R.M.L.I.; the second from Lieutenant Deau of his action on the left of the position, which I did not see, as he was some miles off, but he and his officers and men must have behaved excellently to have done what they did.

Royal Naval Brigade,

I HAVE the honour to report that the Naval Brigade was in action yesterday morning at the battle of which you have had telegraphic information.

2. The officers, petty officers, non-commissioned officers, and men behaved with conspicuous gallantry, but I regret to inform you that the losses in killed and wounded were exceptionally heavy for the small number of men forming the Naval Brigade.

3. I enclose a report from Lieutenant F. Dean, who was in command of the guns during the action, as I did not see what the movements of the guns were during that stage of the action.

4. The remainder of the bluejackets who were not with the guns and all the marines formed part of the firing line, and were under the command of Captain Prothero.

They advanced with other troops, and attacked a very strong position held by the Boers, who were in large force and had large guns with them. About 400 yards from the foot of an almost inaccessible hill, from which the enemy had to be driven, the line was fired on from two positions, and it was here that so heavy a loss was sustained.

I regret to inform you that at this point Commander A. P. Ethelston, Major J. H. Plumbe, R.M.L.I., and Captain Guy Senior, R.M.A., were killed whilst gallantly leading their men, and Midshipmen C. A. E. Huddart was mortally wounded. Captain Prothero, both before and

after he was wounded, behaved with great gallantry and coolness.

Lieutenant W. T. G. Jones, R.M.L.I., who was wounded in the hip by a bullet which has not yet been extracted, was also wounded at this stage, but undeterred charged to the top of the hill, where his wound was dressed. The conduct of this officer is deserving of the highest praise, and I strongly recommend him to your notice.

Midshipman Wardle also showed great gallantry, and remained with Major Plumbe and several dead and wounded men, and attended to them and dressed their wounds under a heavy fire.

5. Lieutenant the Hon. E. S. H. Boyle and Lieutenant F. J. Saunders, R.M.L.I., Gunner Lowe, R.N., and Midshipman W. W. Sillem, also charged to the top of the hill, gallantly leading their men all the time under a very heavy fire, and are all deserving of special mention.

6. At the top of the hill I collected as many men as possible and advanced to the farthest position, driving the enemy before us until the position was finally captured and the Boers in full retreat with their horses and waggons.

7. Lieutenant F. Dean, Lieutenant G. W. McC. Campbell, Sub-Lieutenant White (who was in charge of the ammunition supply), and Midshipman Armstrong, who were with the guns, behaved with great gallantry in a very exposed position, which was commanded by the enemy's guns, and where they were subjected to a heavy artillery fire, which proved so accurate as to wound six men of the guns' crews.

8. Fleet Surgeon James Porter, who was with the firing line, and Surgeon Beadnell with the guns did gallant and most excellent service under trying conditions, under fire nearly the whole time.

9. It is with deep regret that I have to report the death of Midshipman Huddart, who behaved magnificently, and still advanced after he had been twice wounded until he was finally struck down mortally wounded.

10. Midshipman Sillem was stunned half-way up the hill and remained unconscious for some time.

11. General Lord Methuen came specially to see me, and ordered the men to fall in, and complimented them on their behaviour, and expressed his regret at the heavy losses we had sustained in officers and men.

12. After the action was over, being the senior officer present, I collected the men, marched into camp, and took command of the brigade.

SIR,

IN compliance with your orders of this date, I have the honour to submit for the information of the Commander-in-Chief a report of my proceedings with the four naval guns and four half guns' crews under my command yesterday.

2. Arrived at Gras Pan at 5.45 a.m., and observing the enemy in an apparently strong position, 5,000 yards in advance, I detrained two guns—not having enough men to handle more—and at 5.55 a.m. fired one round to test range. I then waited till the Royal Artillery with six guns took up a position on my right front and

opened fire on the enemy. I did the same, and subsequently advanced to ranges of 4,000 and ultimately 2,800 yards, acting from time to time on requests I received from the officer commanding Royal Artillery, who was attacking the same position, viz., two strongly fortified kopjes on either side of the railway with a well protected gun in each.

3. About 8 a.m. I received verbal orders to retire from my position, as the Royal Artillery were about to move away to the right, and it would then be untenable for my two guns. The Royal Artillery were already moving off when I got the order, and the Boer guns, having got our range accurately, were pouring on us such an effective shrapnel fire, that I judged it impossible to carry out the order without either leaving the guns or suffering very heavy losses, both amongst our own men and the company of Royal Engineers who were helping us, if we attempted to retreat with them.

I, therefore, continued to fire as briskly as possible at the Boer guns, with such effect that we continuously put them out of action, first one and then the other, for as much as 15 or 20 minutes at a time. Their shells burst with utmost accuracy, and both our guns and ammunition trolly were spattered all over with shrapnel balls; but, owing to my system of making all hands lie down when we saw their guns flash and remain till the shell burst and the balls flew by, we had only six men wounded when, at 9.30 a.m., the Boers finally ceased firing and abandoned their position.

4. I beg that you will submit to the Commander-in-Chief that Lieut. Campbell and Mr. Armstrong, midshipman, displayed marked coolness and courage in controlling the fire of their guns and inspiring the men, who all worked splendidly. I would recommend for favourable consideration Petty Officers 1st class Ashley (H.M.S. "Doris") and Fuller ("Monarch"), who under the trying circumstances laid their guns with the greatest accuracy. I am confident that, had the Boer guns been exposed as ours were, we should have not only silenced but captured them.

5. On Friday night I found Surgeon Beadnell at Belmont Station; he had been invalided by a medical board that day and was waiting for the hospital train. Though in bad health he gladly accepted my order to remain with the guns in view of the pending engagement, and on Saturday he rendered invaluable aid to our wounded, working close up to the guns where shrapnel balls were showering every other minute.

Forwarded for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, observing that, as expressed in my cable, the conduct of the Naval Brigade at the Graspan action was most gallant and heroic, and I am very proud of the conspicuous gallantry they showed. The wounded men who returned here have continued to exhibit the most excellent courage and fortitude. I deeply lament the sad losses the service has sustained in the death of Commander Ethelston, Major Plumbe, Captain Senior, and Mr. Huddart, midshipman, and the brave seamen and marines who fell with them.

I am glad to say that the wounded officers

and men are doing well; most excellent work is being done at the Naval Hospital, the medical officers of which derive great assistance from Mr. Elliott, torpedo gunner, who has the Röntgen apparatus.

Captain Prothero reported to me verbally that Fleet Surgeon Porter on the field of Graspan was well up to the front with his bearers and did very fine service for the wounded.

SIR,
I BEG to report that the whole force under Sir Redvers Buller advanced at 4 a.m. yesterday intending to take the positions of the enemy on the other side of the Tugela.

The Brigade under my command was disposed as fellows:—Two 4·7" guns and four 12-prs., which were on the outpost line in a position 10,000 yards from the main works of the enemy, from which place we had been shelling them on the previous day, advanced to a small rise about 5,000 yards from the entrenched hills across the Tugela.

Six 12-prs. under Lieut. Ogilvy, with Lieut. James of H.M.S. "Tartar" and Lieut. Deas, of "Philomel," were attached to the Field Artillery under Colonel Long, and placed under his orders, to work down towards Colenso on the opposite side of the railway, which was on our right.

Two 12-prs. under Lieut. Burne held the kopje from which we advanced.

For details of what occurred to the six 12-prs. under Lieut. Ogilvy, I refer you to his report, enclosed.

My guns, supported by the King's Royal Rifles and Scottish Rifles, came into action about 5.30 a.m., and commenced shelling the enemy's rifle pits and gun positions, but did not draw a single shot.

Meantime the Brigades of Generals Hart and Lyttleton on the left, and those under Generals Hillyard and Barton on the right, with the Cavalry further out, were working round to cross the river above and below Colenso respectively.

After we had been shelling for about half-an-hour, and the troops had got within range, the enemy opened a tremendous fire from every imaginable direction from miles of rifle pits along the river and on three ridges behind entrenchments, and kept up a continuous fire from guns planted everywhere right in the middle of a plain and on every ledge and hillock commanding every approach.

We kept our guns going on any gun positions that offered and on the trenches, General Buller being with us and directing the fire for an hour or so. I think we silenced a few guns, and am told the lyddite did tremendous execution in the trenches that we could get at.

Their heaviest gun, and one that did tremendous damage to our troops in both directions, was placed very cunningly behind the three hills upon which their principal positions were, commanding a broad valley on each side of them, running down towards the river without being visible from our guns.

At an early stage General Hart's Brigade, which had suffered tremendously from a front and flank fire, retired, and Colonel Lyttleton's Brigade were ordered to cover their retreat.

The Artillery under Colonel Long, which had approached to within 500 yards of the trenches before a shot was fired, were raked at that range

as they came into action, and, after a short time, were driven from their guns, taking refuge in a "donga." They lost 8 guns and most of their officers and many men.

Away on our left the Field Artillery with Hart's Brigade were so roughly handled that they also were driven back, leaving 2 guns, which were afterwards recovered.

General Hillyard's Brigade pushed on doggedly and got into Colenso; and I was ordered to keep up as hot a fire as possible on the rifle pits to enable him to carry out the withdrawal which was subsequently ordered. The withdrawal appeared to be as hot a business as the attack, and took a good long time.

About noon I was ordered to withdraw the two 4·7" guns, and, as soon as the retreating brigade were abreast of us—every one else having gone back—the remainder of the guns were ordered to be withdrawn, and we arrived at the kopje we occupied the day before about 2.30 p.m.

The enemy did not devote much attention to us, being, I suppose, too busy with the troops. Only two guns, that I could discover, were firing at us, and none of their shell did us any damage. We silenced both.

It was extremely difficult to discover where the guns were fired from. The guns were beautifully concealed, and were mostly firing smokeless powder. We fired at ranges from 3,000 to 11,000 yards. The firing was good, and the lyddite shell burst well.

It was blazing hot, and all hands worked well.

SIR,
I HAVE the honour to submit the following account of the part taken by the 12-pr. guns forming the battery under my command during the action in front of Colenso. Acting on orders received from Captain Jones, R.N., I reported myself to Colonel Long, C.R.A., who directed me to attach myself to him until the guns had been placed in a suitable position. I therefore directed Lieut. James, of "Tartar," to lead the battery behind the Royal Artillery Field guns, and told him that we were to form up on the left of the Royal Artillery guns when they came into action. About 6 a.m., the guns being in column of route march with Naval guns in the rear, I was riding in front beside Colonel Long about 450 yards from Colenso Station, when he directed Colonel Hunt to bring his guns into action just in front of a deep "donga" running across our front at right angles to the railway. He then told me to come into action on the left, and proceeded to arrange our different zones of fire, while the Royal Artillery guns were getting into position. In front of us was a line of trees up to which our skirmishers had advanced, also a few artillery outposts. Just as I was about to direct my guns where to go, and as the Royal Artillery were unlimbering, the outposts turned sharply and a murderous fire, both rifle and shell, was opened on the guns and ammunition column. I immediately galloped back to my guns and found that the fire had caught them just as the two centre guns were going through a drift across another donga

parallel to the before-mentioned one, but about 400 yards in the rear. When I arrived I found that all the native drivers with the exception of those for Lieut. James' gun teams had bolted. These guns had just crossed the drift, so I directed him to take up a position on the left and opened fire on Fort Wyllie, from which the majority of the shell fire appeared to come. About this time my horse was shot through the shoulder by a rifle bullet. The two rear guns under Lieut. Deas, of H.M.S. "Philomel," not having crossed the drift, I directed him to take ground to the left and open fire also on Fort Wyllie. The two centre guns under Mr. Wright, gunner, of H.M.S. "Terrible," were unfortunately jammed with their ammunition waggons in the drift, the wheels of the waggons being locked and the oxen turned round in their yokes. I managed by the aid of some artillery horses to extricate these guns from the drift and to bring them into action on each side of the drift to the rear of the donga, one of the horses being shot whilst doing this. I could not manage to move the ammunition waggons as the rifle and shell fire was too severe at the time, a 1½-pr. Maxim Nordenfeldt being particularly attentive, and sending three shells into the drift at every discharge. Repeated messages for more men came back from the Royal Artillery batteries, and these were sent to the front by a Royal Artillery sergeant in charge of the ammunition column. After about half-an-hour's firing, as I should judge, the Royal Artillery guns were silenced, nearly all the men being apparently killed or wounded. Soon after this the fire from Fort Wyllie slackened considerably. The Commander-in-Chief now rode up and directed me to move our guns and ammunition as soon as I could. The guns were got away each by a team of artillery horses, who galloped them up the hill to the rear. The waggons were far more difficult owing to their weight, the large circle they required to turn in, and to the fact that they had to be got out from the drift and turned round by the guns' crews before the horses could be put on. About this time a most brilliant feat was performed by two teams of artillery, who galloped to the front, against a most murderous fire, limbered up, and rescued two guns; a similar attempt by one other team, at least, resulted in the entire team, as far as I could see, being destroyed. The advance of the Infantry on an open plain, with little or no cover against a most heavy rifle fire from entrenched positions was also a magnificent sight. The conduct of our men without exception was particularly fine, the day being a very hot one and the work hard. The way Nos. 1 and 2 guns' crews of the "Terrible" got their wagons out of the drift under heavy fire from shell and rifle was quite up to the standard expected of all seamen. I cannot conclude without mentioning the way Lieut. James of the "Tartar" selected the best suitable position and opened fire with great effect. Lieut. Deas, of the "Philomel," unfortunately had a gun capsized as they were moving off to the left to come into action, but managed to mount it quickly and brought both guns into action. After the first few minutes these two officers took entire charge of their respective guns and brought them safely out of action; Lieut. James coming again into action on the left under the direction of Captain Jones. Mr. Wright, gunner, worked his guns well, and was of great assistance in withdrawing them. Surgeon Macmillan, R.N., Lieut. Palmer, R.A.M.C., were conspicuous in their attendance to the wounded. Our loss was very small, three wounded, one of them very slightly, and I attri-

bute this to (1st) the Fort Wyllie guns and rifle fire being directed principally on the R.A. guns, which were some 300 yards nearer than we were; (2nd) to the enemy directing most of their fire on our ox teams and waggons, they being so much more conspicuous than the guns. 28 oxen were killed, wounded, or lost.

I might mention that Mr. Boldero and Mr. Hodson, midshipmen, and Mr. Hollins, clerk, were attending on me noting ranges and carrying messages between the guns during the four hours we were working at the drift.

To Officers of the Customs :

The appended regulations issued by the Super-
vising Surgeon-General of the Marine-Hospital

Service on the 14th instant, regarding the importation of rags into the United States, are published for the information and guidance of officers of the customs, who are hereby instructed specially to observe the following requirements:—

1. Disinfection of rags, &c., prior to shipment to the United States, must be shown by certificate of United States Consul or medical officer of the United States abroad, attached to consignee's invoice, or attached to bill of health of importing vessel, in default of which entry of the rags, &c., will be refused until unbaled and disinfected by one of the prescribed methods.

2. Rags, &c., originating in Canada, if shipped directly from a port or place in that country free from quarantinable disease for a period of thirty days prior to shipment, are exempt from requirement of such certificate; but entry must be accompanied by affidavits showing such facts to the satisfaction of the collector of customs.

3. Foreign rags not originating in Canada, but shipped through that country, must be accompanied by the certificate above prescribed, in default of which entry of the rags will be refused until arrival of certificate, or until the rags are unbaled and disinfected by one of the prescribed methods.

Amendments to the Quarantine Regulations
regarding Rags imported into the United
States.

1900. Department Circular No. 18.

Treasury Department, Office of the Supervising
Surgeon-General Marine-Hospital Service,
Washington, D.C., February 14, 1900.

To Officers of the Treasury Department, State
and Local Quarantine Officers, and others
concerned :

The following amendments to the regulations
regarding rags and similar articles imported into
the United States are hereby promulgated :

Quarantine Regulations to be observed at
Foreign Ports and at Sea.

Article IV, paragraph 6, Quarantine Regula-
tions to be observed at foreign ports and at sea,
is amended to read as follows :

All rags and textile fabrics used in the manu-
facture of paper and for other purposes, which are
collected, packed or handled in any foreign port or
place, with the exceptions as hereinafter specified,
shall, prior to shipment to the United States, be
subjected to disinfection by one of the prescribed
methods. (Old jute bags, old cotton bags, old
rope, new cotton or linen cuttings from factories,
not included.)

The disinfection of the articles mentioned
herein shall be performed under the supervision
of a United States Consul or a Medical Officer of
the United States, and a certificate in duplicate,
signed by said Consul, or Medical Officer, shall
be issued with each consignment of same, which
certificate shall identify the articles, and state that
they have been disinfected in accordance with the
United States quarantine regulations. The
original certificate of disinfection shall be attached
to the consignee's invoice, and, where the articles
are carried by sea, the duplicate certificate of
disinfection shall be attached to the bill of health
issued to the vessel conveying same.

Exception.

Such articles shipped from the Dominion of
Canada directly to the United States shall be
exempt from this requirement if accompanied by
affidavits demonstrating to the satisfaction of the
collector of customs at the port of arrival that
they have actually originated in Canada and have

not been shipped from a foreign country to Canada, and thence shipped to the United States; and further, that the port or place where collected or handled has been free from quarantinable disease for thirty days prior to shipment.

Quarantine Regulations to be observed at Ports and on the Frontiers of the United States.

Article I, paragraph 3, Quarantine Regulations to be observed at ports and on the frontiers of the United States is amended to read as follows: In making the inspection of a vessel, the bill of health and clinical record of all cases treated during the voyage, crew and passengers' lists and manifests, and when necessary, the ship's log shall be examined. The crew and passengers shall be mustered and examined and compared with the lists and manifests, and any discrepancies investigated. When a freight manifest shows that rags and other articles of this class are carried by the vessel, a certificate of disinfection, signed by a United States Consul or a medical officer of the United States, shall be exhibited and compared with same.

If no certificate of disinfection is produced, the collector of customs at the ports of entry shall be notified of same by the quarantine officer. The collector of customs shall then hold such consignment in a designated place separate from other freight pending the arrival of the certificate of disinfection; and in the event of its non-arrival, the articles shall be disinfected as hereinbefore prescribed, or shall be returned by the common carrier conveying same.

ART. XII.—Canadian and Mexican Frontiers.

The following paragraph is hereby added to Article XII, relating to rags arriving at ports on the Canadian frontier:

Paragraph 12. Rags gathered and baled in Canada, accompanied by affidavits that the ports or places where collected or handled were free from quarantinable disease for thirty days prior to shipment, may be admitted to entry; but rags from foreign ports shipped through Canada shall not be admitted to entry, unless they are accompanied by a certificate of a United States Consul or medical officer of the United States that they have been disinfected in accordance with the United States quarantine regulations.

Foreign rags, not originating in Canada, but shipped through Canada to ports in the United States, will not be permitted to entry by collectors of customs unless accompanied by the above-named certificate, or until after they have been unbaled and disinfected as required by the United States quarantine regulations.

WHEREAS by Section 4 of the District Auditors Act, 1879, it is enacted that the Local Government Board may from time to time assign to District Auditors their Duties, and the Districts in which such Auditors respectively are to act, and may from time to time change wholly or in part such Duties or Districts;

And whereas the said Alfred Walker Dolby is a District Auditor duly appointed under the provisions of the Statutes in that behalf, and is acting as Auditor for the Herefordshire and Monmouthshire Audit District;

And whereas it is expedient that another District should be assigned to the said Alfred Walker Dolby:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, hereby certify the appointment of the said Alfred Walker Dolby accordingly, and hereby Order and Prescribe as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—It shall be the duty of the said District Auditor, from and after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred, to audit the Accounts of the following Authorities and their Officers; namely,—

- (1.) The Guardians of the Poor of the several Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order.
- (2.) The Overseers of the Poor of the several parishes comprised in the said several Unions.
- (3.) The several other Authorities for the time being whose Accounts are or may be by law subject to be audited by a District Auditor, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being wholly situated within one or more of the said Unions.
- (4.) The Rural District Council of Saffron Walden, the District of such Council being partly situated within one or more of the said Unions.

(5.) The Port Sanitary Authority for the Port of Harwich.

(6.) Such other Authorities whose Accounts are or may be by law subject to be audited by a District Auditor, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being partly situated within one or more of the said Unions, as We may by Order under Seal hereafter prescribe.

ARTICLE II.—The said District Auditor shall audit the said Accounts according to the provisions of the several Statutes and of the Orders issued by competent authority in force for the time being in that behalf, and shall perform all such duties and exercise all such powers in connection with the audit of such Accounts as are prescribed and conferred by the said Statutes and Orders.

ARTICLE III.—The District in which the said Alfred Walker Dolby shall from and after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred, act as Auditor, and which We hereby assign to him for the performance of his duties under this Order, shall be termed "The Essex Audit District," and shall, until We otherwise prescribe, comprise the area for the time being included in the several Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order, the District of the Rural District Council named in paragraph (4) of Article I of this Order, and the District of the Port Sanitary Authority named in paragraph (5) of the said Article I, and the Districts or areas subject to the jurisdiction of any such Authority as is mentioned in paragraph (6) of the said Article I.

ARTICLE IV.—Nothing in this Order shall affect or interfere with the duties and powers of the said Alfred Walker Dolby as regards any Audit which may have been already held or commenced by him as District Auditor for the Herefordshire and Monmouthshire Audit District, or any matters or proceedings arising out of any such Audit.

ARTICLE V.—In this Order—

The term "Overseers of the Poor" includes Churchwardens and Assistant Overseers.
