The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Ladies to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in

order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The number of Presentations at each Drawing Room is limited to 200.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levées.

THE following Despatch has been received from Field-Marshal Lord Roberts, V.C., G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa:—

From the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa, to the Secretary of State for War.

*Army Head-Quarters, South Africa,  
Camp Paardeburg,*

*February 23, 1900.*

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to submit for your Lordship's information a Despatch, dated Rensburg Camp, 2nd February, 1900, from Lieutenant-General J. D. P. French, Commanding Cavalry Division, describing the operations of the force under his orders in the vicinity of Colesberg from the 15th December, 1899, to the 25th January, 1900.

2. I consider that Lieutenant-General French showed marked ability and judgment in constantly harassing the enemy and driving them from one strong position after another, without exposing his men to heavy loss.

I concur with the General Officer Commanding in thinking that the discipline, courage, and endurance of the Officers, non-commissioned officers and men employed in these operations are deserving of high commendation, and I am glad to observe that the Royal Horse Artillery and New Zealand Mounted Rifles appear to have specially distinguished themselves.

From Lieutenant-General French to the Chief of the Staff, South Africa Field Force, Cape Town.

SIR,

*February 2, 1900.*

IN continuation of the despatch forwarded to you on the 14th ultimo, describing the operations of the force under my command up to that date, I have the honour to forward a further report of such operations since that time, for the information of the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa.

I have throughout kept in view as my objective the instructions given to me by General the Right Honourable Sir Redvers Buller on leaving Cape Town, which were to seize and hold Naauwpoort and whenever possible to push on and gain possession of Colesberg.

After the various minor engagements which I repeated before, I obtained complete possession of the Arundel position and established my headquarters there on Saturday, 16th December.

From this date till 29th December, when the enemy finally evacuated his position in my front and retired on Colesberg, every opportunity was taken to worry him and harass his flanks and rear. These operations were fully reported each night

by telegraph. I was often able to bring Artillery fire to bear on convoys moving backwards and forwards along the enemy's communications with Colesberg, and repeatedly drew him out under the fire of our guns, fearing threats against his line of retreat.

I wish particularly to bring to notice the excellent conduct and bearing of the New Zealand Mounted Rifles, commanded by Major A. W. Robin, on one of these occasions.

On 18th December I took them out with a battery of Horse Artillery to reconnoitre round the enemy's left flank, and determined to dislodge him from a farm called Jassfontein lying on his left rear. The guns shelled the farm, and the New Zealand Mounted Rifles then gained possession of it. But the enemy very suddenly brought up strong reinforcements and pressed on us with his Artillery. Our Artillery had been left some way behind to avoid this latter fire, and I had to send back some distance for its support, during which time we were exposed to a heavy musketry fire from the surrounding hills. The conduct of the New Zealanders was admirable in thus maintaining a difficult position till the Artillery caused the enemy to retire.

About the 27th December the enemy began to show signs of yielding to this continual pressure on his flanks and rear, and on the 29th finally evacuated his position and fell back on Colesberg. As these movements were chiefly carried out in the night, and the enemy has great mobility, it was impossible to harass or intercept his retreat.

At daybreak on the morning of the 30th December, I left Arundel with a small force of Cavalry and Artillery to reconnoitre towards Colesberg. We found the enemy in possession of that place.

The town is situated on very low ground, it is surrounded completely by a mass of high, steep kopjes, which are so placed as to flank one another. The place is, therefore, a natural fortress of great strength.

These hills form a kind of "square," and at each corner there are outlying kopjes within rifle range of the main position. About 2,000 yards west of the centre of the western face is a hill called "Kols Kop," of great height, commanding the whole country for many miles round. It stands quite isolated in the centre of a large plain.

In order to make the enemy show his hand, I brought the guns into action opposite the southern face of the position. This drew the fire of the Boer Artillery, and showed them to be holding the south-western corner. I therefore occupied a group of hills about 2,000 yards south-west of this corner, and there established an Artillery position, supported by some Cavalry and Mounted Infantry. This is one of the positions we still hold and is known as "Porter's Hill."

I then returned to Rensburg Siding and chose a position, with that point as a centre. This position I occupied and partly entrenched during the day, and then I moved my headquarters, leaving a detachment to hold Arundel. At dawn on Sunday, 30th December, I made a close personal reconnaissance of the western face of the Colesberg position. From what I observed and reports I received, it appeared to me that a night attack based on Maiders Farm (about 5 miles W.S.W. of Colesberg) would probably give us possession of two of the outlying hills on this western face, and pivoting on these would enable us to push mounted troops along the flanks of the position, and perhaps seize points which would compel the enemy to evacuate the town

and its immediate neighbourhood. During the day I sent on a squadron of the 10th Hussars to seize and hold Maiders Farm.

A column\* was formed at dusk under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel R. B. W. Fisher, 10th Hussars. They reached Maiders Farm about 9 P.M., and were joined there by myself and staff.

Orders were issued that the column was to be formed at 1.30 A.M. on the road leading across the plain towards Colesberg; that the Berkshire Regiment and Mounted Infantry were to head this column, followed by the guns and Cavalry. The attack and seizure of the hill (the position of which he knew well) was entrusted to Major F. W. N. McCracken, Berkshire Regiment. It was arranged that on arriving close to the hill the four companies were to be formed for attack and were to rush it. The Mounted Infantry were to support them closely. The Cavalry and Artillery were to remain close at hand in their order of march under cover of Coles Kop.

I was myself in command of the column and accompanied Major F. W. N. McCracken.

The attack was carried out in every detail as ordered. The four companies of the Berkshire Regiment rushed the hill most gallantly, driving off a strong picquet of the enemy, who retired in great disorder and with loud shouts. They were completely surprised. The hill to the east of this, immediately overlooking Colesberg town, was strongly occupied by the enemy, and a hot fire was for some minutes poured on the column in the darkness.

The Berkshire Regiment commenced their assault at 3.45 A.M., and the dawn of day found our troops in possession of this important outwork of Colesberg. At the first appearance of light I despatched the Cavalry under Lieutenant-Colonel Fisher to the north-west corner, with orders to seize and hold the hills there with a squadron and work round the northern face of the square. This was well done, and Colonel Fisher's patrols reached the positions on the Colesberg wagon road, the southernmost of which (known as Grassey Hill) was that which the Suffolk Regiment attacked on the night of the 5th-6th. With the idea of driving the enemy away from before the hills we had seized, and, if possible, from the western face of the position, and distracting his attention from the Cavalry on the left, I massed all the ten guns opposite that face, and, so soon as it was light enough to see, opened a heavy fire. This was replied to with great vigour by the enemy's artillery and quick-firing guns, and our Artillery were for some time exposed to a most galling fire, fortunately with but comparatively few casualties.

I cannot speak too highly of the gallantry displayed by the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and men of the Royal Horse Artillery, or of the coolness, intrepidity, and efficiency with which they stood to and worked their guns. Eventually they succeeded in silencing the enemy's artillery. Over night, I had ordered Colonel Porter, 6th Dragoon Guards, to move out from Rensburg with the force named† to Porter's Hill, which was held by one squadron of the Carabiniers and one Company New Zealand Mounted Infantry. His orders were to ascertain the state of our operations at daybreak and to co-operate.

This he did throughout the day with great

effect at Porter's Hill, and along the southern face of the position. The New Zealand Mounted Rifles made a most gallant attempt to effect a footing in the south-western corner, but were obliged to retire before greatly superior numbers.

In the afternoon an attempt made by at least 1,000 Boers (reported to have been personally commanded by General Schumann) to break out and get round my right flank was frustrated by the Carabiniers and a detachment of Major Rimington's Scouts, which I had posted at Jasfontein Farm to watch my right flank (about 6 miles east of the Rensburg position).

Owing to a misconception of my order and instructions, I regret that the Cavalry on my left did not quite fulfil the task allotted to them. Throughout the day I sent constant messages to the Brigadier to push forward to the Colesberg road and occupy the position indicated above. Had he found himself able to do this, I have no hesitation in saying that we could have occupied the town on that day. As it was, the enemy was allowed to push too forward on that flank and to occupy positions from which we have since been unable to move him.

On the following day (2nd) Major-General J. P. Brabazon, C.B., came out from Rensburg and took command of the troops on the left flank of our position, and I ordered up four companies of the Suffolk Regiment, under Lieutenant-Colonel A. J. Watson, to occupy the hills on the north-western corner, releasing the 10th Hussars from that duty.

The 2nd and 3rd were spent in strengthening our positions and arranging the units and commands.

On the early morning of the 4th, about 1,000 of the enemy, under command of General Schumann, made a determined attempt to turn my left flank, which, had the attack succeeded, would have rendered our position on the western face of the Colesberg position untenable.

At dawn the enemy was found to have established himself in strength at some hills running about east and west at right angles to the left rear of our position. The Cavalry on the left should not have allowed him to do this unseen, but in turning him out they rendered signal service. The 10th Hussars, with two guns which I sent to them, threatened to take them in reverse and they were heavily fired upon by the remaining four guns of "O" Battery in front. This caused several hundred to abandon the position and the plain was covered with flying horsemen. The 10th Hussars on one flank, and a squadron of the Inniskillings on the other, dashed after them. The 10th Hussars were checked by some of the Boers taking up a strong position in some rocks to cover the retreat of the others. In a most gallant style Colonel Fisher dismounted his men and led them on foot against this position, which they carried with great boldness and intrepidity.

In this daring operation, I regret to say, Major Harvey was killed and Major Alexander severely wounded.

The 6th Dragoons, led by Captain E. A. Herbert, showed no less dash, pursuing the enemy, mounted, and inflicting some loss with their lances.

Some 200 of the enemy had, however, still clung to the hills, and after shelling them for some considerable time, both in front and flank, I decided to clear the position with the Mounted Infantry. Advancing under cover of the fire of the Artillery Captain De Lisle moved his men with great skill to a position where he could move against the enemy's right flank. Here he dismounted and advanced to attack, choosing the ground with

admirable care. At this threat at least 100 more of the Boers took to flight in many small parties, the remainder endeavoured to check the Mounted Infantry advance. When one half the position was made good, a final exodus was made by the enemy and 21 last remaining Boers surrendered. The Mounted Infantry suffered no casualties. This operation was most skilfully and boldly carried out by Captain De Lisle. It has been conclusively ascertained that on this day the enemy lost upwards of 90 killed and wounded, our casualties being 6 killed and 15 wounded.

On the 5th, the enemy's position was shelled by our Artillery and a position known as Grassey Hill was carefully reconnoitred with a view to gaining possession of it the next day. Its possession would give the town of Colesberg into our hands.

I regret to say that during this reconnaissance my Aide-de-Camp, Lieutenant Sir John Milbanke, Bart., 11th Hussars, was severely wounded.

I had frequently discussed the possibility of capturing Grassey Hill with the late Colonel Watson, and with him had several times carefully reconnoitred it. He was always very confident that when his other four companies joined him he could carry out this operation with his own regiment which occupied the part of our position opposite the north-west corner of the Colesberg position, and was therefore within 1,000 yards of Grassey Hill. His four companies had joined him on the previous day.

On the evening of the 5th, in reply to a message I got from Colonel Watson, I told him I would give him a free hand to rush this position at night if he saw a favourable chance, but that he was to inform me and all troops in his neighbourhood of his intention to do so.

I heard no more, but left Rensburg at 2 A.M. and reached the Colesberg position shortly before dawn. At dawn we heard sharp musketry fire in the direction of Grassey Hill.

I directed Colonel Eustace to get his guns into position to assist the attack which I thought Colonel Watson must be making. The Artillery got into action at once against the Grassey Hill defences, but in a few minutes I received news that nearly 300 men of the Suffolk Regiment had returned to camp (having received an order from "someone" to retire), which belonged to a force of four companies which Colonel Watson had led against Grassey Hill at 12.30 on the previous night. It was further reported to me by Major Cubitt, the second in command, who had remained in camp, that about 120 Officers and men were killed, wounded, and prisoners in the enemy's hands.

It subsequently transpired that (so far as it was possible to glean any reliable account) Colonel Watson made complete and adequate arrangements to insure success, which he would, so far as I have been able to prove, have attained, although with some loss, had the majority of his men not been seized with panic and retired.

Colonel Watson was a most gallant and capable Officer, and I deeply deplore his loss.

It appears that the Officers all behaved with the utmost bravery, and that a gallant stand was made by the men who remained with them.

It had been my intention for some days to recommence operations against the enemy's left flank, but the necessity for rest to horses and men was imperative. I left here early on Sunday morning (7th instant), with a squadron of the Royal Horse Guards, under Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel Fenwick, to reconnoitre a position with

available water facilities, some ten miles to the north-east.

On examining the hills running out from the eastern face of the enemy's position, they appeared to me to offer great advantages for holding as a pivot round which to reach the enemy's rear—cut him off—and take his western defences in reverse.

Hoping to find water amongst these hills, I posted the squadron in a good defensive position, with orders to retire on any sign of attack. My reconnaissance showed that there was none near, and that therefore the hills could not be held as a permanent post. But I found an excellent position about two miles further east, at a farm called Slingersfontein. The enemy had endeavoured to prevent an approach to his position by long-range rifle fire, but I saw that there was nothing there to prevent the squadron (which was some way south of us) holding on.

Shortly afterwards the fire of artillery was opened, and the squadron was seen to be retreating. This was accomplished with but very slight loss, and I regret to say Captain Ricardo and four troopers were taken prisoners by the enemy. This officer's horse had been shot, and he was taken by one of his men, and together they fell into the enemy's hands. The squadron also inflicted some loss upon the enemy.

The reconnaissance was of value, inasmuch as it enabled me to find a good position on that flank.

#### *Occupation of Slingersfontein, 9th January.*

I have throughout these operations endeavoured to preserve the horses as much as possible, and I considered that rest till the 9th was of paramount importance. On that day I moved out with the force named in the margin,\* under command of Colonel Porter, 6th Dragoon Guards, and occupied the position at Slingersfontein. When the force was established there, their equipment was sent to them. I left Colonel Porter with orders to reconnoitre well to the north and east.

After inspecting the camps and positions on our left, I went in the evening to bivouac at Slingersfontein, to carry on operations on the 11th.

#### *Action of Slingersfontein, 11th January, 1900.*

On the previous day, Colonel Porter had reported that the enemy had apparently received stray reinforcements from the direction of Norval's Pont, and that he (enemy) had occupied the northern end of Slingers Ridge, and a hill running east of it (thus covering the railway). Colonel Porter had moved out his force, and prevented a movement further south.

I moved out from Slingersfontein at 5 A.M., on the 11th instant, with Colonel Porter's force. The object was to thoroughly reconnoitre the enemy's disposition and strength, whilst Major Hunter-Weston, Royal Engineers, with a detachment of Cavalry was to endeavour to reach the railway by passing round our right flank, and destroy the telegraph wire.

The guns were brought into action in a good position. The Carabiniers and New Zealand Mounted Rifles occupied the enemy in front, whilst the Household Cavalry gained a good position on his left flank.

The enemy was for a time driven back, and I hoped to turn him out, but very strong reinforcements began to reach him from Norval's Pont, and as it was not my object to become seriously engaged on the offensive, I ordered a retirement,

which was well carried out by Colonel Porter, whom I left in charge of the operations (my presence being required at head-quarters) after I had ascertained the enemy's numbers and dispositions.

Major Hunter-Weston found himself unable to penetrate to the railway, which lies in very difficult country, and is strongly guarded throughout.

The arrival of these strong reinforcements (said to come from Kimberley and Ladysmith) has for the time barred my path round the enemy's rear, but he is kept closely hemmed in to the railway, and his defensive line is of enormous extent.

In the early part of this despatch I described the hill opposite the western face of the enemy's position, known as "Coles-Kop." The altitude of this is 800 feet above the level of the plain, and its sides are very steep, in places almost perpendicular.

Major Butcher, Commanding 4th Field Battery, has, with great energy and trouble, succeeded in placing two field guns on this hill. These guns have done us most signal service. Their fire dominates the whole of the enemy's position. It has caused him to clear away all his tents and laagers in open ground, and to take shelter in rocky valleys, which causes him great inconvenience, and serious loss.

The ammunition is taken up by means of a wire lift, constructed and designed by the Royal Engineers.

In order to further alarm the enemy as to his communications, I despatched a flying column (as in margin\*), under Major Allenby, 6th Dragoons, on Sunday, 14th instant, to make their way round enemy's right flank, and endeavour to penetrate to Colesberg Road Bridge, which they were to shell. This duty was carried out very well. The Colesberg Road Bridge was shelled by our Artillery. The force was obliged to return, owing to the enemy's attitude, after 20 shells had been fired. An attempt was made to cut them off when retreating, but was easily frustrated. Five Boer prisoners were captured. Captain De Lisle, Mounted Infantry, acted as Staff Officer to the column.

On the 15th instant, an attack was made by the enemy on my advanced post at Slinger's Farm. This is a high and rather steep hill, surrounded by a good deal of "dead" ground. The fire was held by one company, Yorkshire Regiment, and one company, New Zealand Mounted Rifles, and was in charge of Captain Orr, Yorkshire Regiment. For some time during the morning of the 15th, the enemy engaged in heavy and continuous firing at long ranges from the whole of his position opposite this post. At about 10 A.M. a movement was developed, which appeared to indicate an attack on the east side of the hill, where there was some cover, and the ground favoured it. Whilst this threat was in progress the firing from the enemy's main position was continued with great vigour. When the attention of our troops was chiefly engaged in watching for this attack on the east it was suddenly reported that a large body of the enemy had established themselves at the foot of the western slope, which was very steep, and were creeping up the hill, taking all advantage of cover from rocks, &c. When the Boers found that their real attack was thus apparent, they opened a hot fire from their position on the western slope. Captain

Orr at once fell badly wounded, and the Sergeant-Major was killed. The enemy came on briskly, and the moment was critical. Captain Madocks, Royal Artillery (attached to New Zealand Mounted Rifles), saw the critical situation of the Yorkshires, and that they were practically without a leader; with the greatest promptitude he took a few of his men to the west side of the hill, and rallied the troops holding it. He caused them to line their intrenchments and stem the enemy's advance, which had now become very bold, several of our men having fallen from their fire. Captain Madocks then jumped up, gave the order to fix bayonets, and charge down the hill, upon which the leading Boers immediately turned and ran down the hill, followed by many others, who had been under cover of rocks, &c., unseen. Our troops poured many well-directed volleys on the retreating enemy, who left 21 men dead at the foot of one hill, and it is estimated that their loss in wounded could not be less than 50.

The greatest credit is due to Captain Madocks and his New Zealanders for their prompt action.

On the 18th instant, Major-General Clements, D.S.O., having arrived with two regiments of the 12th Brigade (the Royal Irish and the Worcestershire), I placed him in command of all the troops at and east of Slinger's Farm. Two battalions were posted at that place, and occupy a good commanding position, which has been well fortified and entrenched.

General Clements has also, at Slinger's, one company New Zealand Mounted Rifles; one squadron and four guns; Colonel Porter, 6th Dragoon Guards, with four squadrons, two guns, and one company of Infantry is posted at a farm called Potfontein, some eight miles east, and a little south, of Slinger's.

Major Rimington, with his Corps of Guides, has been moved from Jansfontein to a position about five miles north of Colonel Porter, called Kleinfontein. He has with him, besides his Guides, one squadron of Cavalry, and one company New Zealand Mounted Rifles. He is in command of this post, whence he is able to watch and patrol the whole valley running north-east to a point about six miles south-east of Norval's Pont. He has been able in the last two days to keep a post at Rhenoster Farm, which is in close proximity to the enemy's troops guarding the railway line. Shots are exchanged every day, but the enemy remains strictly on the defensive.

Two howitzers having arrived from De Aar, I directed them against the enemy's western positions, on the 19th and 20th, with considerable effect. Their fire was very accurate, and the shells excellently placed. This could be well seen from the top of Kols Kop, whence the battery was directed by wire.

#### *Reconnaissance in Force of Rietfontein Plessis Pass (25th January).*

Reports received from patrols and other sources seemed to indicate that the pass known as "Rietfontein Plessis," through the range of hills running east and west, about six miles north of Colesberg, was either very weakly held or entirely abandoned by the enemy. In order to verify this information, and (if I could do so without such serious fighting as was contrary to the instructions of the Field-Marshal) seize the position, I ordered an advance to be made on the morning of the 25th instant. On the evening of the 24th the Mounted Infantry, under Captain De Lisle, occupied and held Bastard's Nek (another pass about five miles west of Rietfontein).

On the morning of the 25th, the force named

in the margin\* concentrated at Bastard's Nek under my command. The Cavalry was under General Brabazon; the Infantry under Colonel Stevenson, Essex Regiment.

To distract the enemy's attention, it was ordered that demonstrations were to be made all along our position.

My intention was to bring a cross fire of Artillery to bear upon the enemy's position, under cover of which the Infantry were to advance along the ridges to draw him out and make him show his strength, without committing themselves to a serious attack.

The Cavalry and Mounted Infantry were to push on towards the north, turn the position, and seize (with Mounted Infantry) a position to the east of that occupied by the enemy.

The Cavalry were also charged with the task of warding off any attack from the direction of Colesberg-road Bridge.

The Cavalry, Royal Horse Artillery, and Mounted Infantry moved out as ordered. The Artillery got into action in a good position, and with the field battery, which was posted at the northern foot of the main range, brought an effective cross fire to bear on a kopje where several groups of men and horses had been observed. This drew artillery fire from two of the enemy's guns, and it was found that the position was strongly occupied.

The Cavalry and Mounted Infantry attempted the turning movement as directed, but were checked by a movement of the enemy from the north, and another by a detachment sent from the Rietfontein position to oppose them. This latter movement by the enemy was greatly assisted by a deep gorge or ravine running north and south through the range in which the enemy's position lies. The interference from both points was overcome and driven back, but too late in the day to make the turning movement effective.

The Infantry had gradually advanced along the ridges and drawn out considerable numbers of the enemy, but the positions gained by Colonel Stevenson were so good as to give some promise of a success in a general attack. As, however, this must have entailed considerable loss, unassisted by the turning movement of the Cavalry and Mounted Infantry, I considered I was not justified by the instructions I had received from the Commander-in-Chief in embarking on such an enterprise. At 4 P.M. I ordered a general retirement, which was thoroughly well carried out.

The reconnaissance was of considerable value, inasmuch as it enabled me to gain a thorough insight into the nature of the positions occupied by the enemy, not only at this particular point, but those between the range and Colesberg (viz., "200 yards Hill" and "Grassey Hill"), the rear faces of which were plainly visible from the advanced positions held by our Infantry. I am sure the knowledge thus gained would have proved most useful had the general plan of campaign permitted of my continuing these offensive operations in this district.

The demonstration made by Major-General Clements on the right of our position was vigorous and effective. Having brought Colonel Porter's troops up into line with Major Rimington, he was able to shell the enemy out of a strong position called "Uleintoren Hill," driving him back close on the railway. The casualties incurred were

comparatively slight, and were forwarded to you in detail by telegraph.

In accordance with the instructions received at Cape Town from the Commander-in-Chief, I am now making the arrangements ordered.

I cannot close this despatch without recording my earnest appreciation of the discipline, courage, and endurance displayed by Officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the force under my command throughout the operations in this district. These have been almost continuous throughout a period of nearly three months; during this time the troops have suffered exposure, severe fatigue, and privation, and have been in constant contact with an enemy whose adroit skill in war demands the most untiring vigilance. The troops have met these demands upon them with a gallantry and zeal which I cannot too highly acknowledge.

In conclusion, I have the honour to bring to the notice of the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief the names of the following Officers:—

Major-General J. P. Brabazon, C.B., and Major-General R. A. P. Clements, D.S.O., commanding on the right and left flanks respectively, have rendered me much assistance, and I am anxious to acknowledge their valuable services.

Colonel T. C. Porter, 6th Dragoon Guards, has frequently been employed as a Brigadier and in command of advanced posts. He has always carried out the task allotted to him with much skill, zeal, and indefatigable energy.

Major G. Carter, 1st Life Guards, Major F. S. Garratt, 6th Dragoon Guards, and Major E. H. H. Allenby, 6th Dragoons, have all at various times shown considerable skill and resolution as Squadron Commanders in the field and have done valuable service.

Major M. F. Rimington (6th Dragoons), employed in command of a Corps of Guides, has rendered me much assistance since he has been attached to this command.

Major Sir J. H. Jervis-White-Jervis, Bart., Royal Horse Artillery, and Major B. Burton, Royal Horse Artillery, deserve the highest credit for the manner in which they have worked their batteries throughout these operations. In face, very often, of a most galling fire from the enemy's well-concealed and protected artillery positions, these Officers have uniformly maintained an excellent practice with most telling effect on the enemy.

Major A. E. A. Butcher, who joined with his battery of Field Artillery soon after the bombardment of Colesberg was commenced, with great energy and perseverance succeeded in placing two field guns on the top of a steep hill called Coles Kop, 800 feet high, and from this commanding position has inflicted great damage and loss on the enemy.

Lieutenants E. F. Talbot-Ponsonby, J. W. F. Lamont, J. B. Aldridge, and W. G. Thompson, Royal Horse Artillery (wounded and a prisoner), deserve mention for signal services they have performed with their guns.

Brevet Major A. G. Hunter-Weston, Royal Engineers, has commanded the field equipment, Royal Engineers, attached to the Cavalry Division, and has acted as Commander Royal Engineer to this force. I am much indebted to him for many services performed, not the least of which has consisted in his maintaining a perfect system of telegraphic and telephonic communication throughout the force on a front of 38 miles, close to positions occupied by the enemy, and including the look-out post on Coles Kop. In these duties he has received able assistance from Captain C. O. C. Bowen, Royal Engineers; Lieutenant C.

To Major F. W. N. McCracken and the four companies of the Berkshire Regiment serving with this force is the successful attack on Colesberg on 1st January principally due. I cannot speak too highly of this Officer's coolness, courage, and intrepidity, or of the gallantry and discipline displayed by his Officers and men in making the night assault which he led so well.

What, in my opinion, is worthy of even greater praise is the conduct of this gallant regiment displayed in the tenacity with which they have held the position ever since, and the skill with which they have intrenched themselves against a constant fire from artillery and musketry, which, during the first few days, caused them considerable loss. They have now established such an excellent system of defence that the enemy's fire, although nearly unceasing, is practically harmless.

In connection with this work, I have also to bring forward the names of Lieutenant A. G. E. Bingley, Acting Adjutant, Berkshire Regiment, and Captain Sir T. E. S. Pasley, Bart., Berkshire Regiment.

Colonel T. E. Stephenson, Essex Regiment, has, on several occasions, rendered me valuable assistance. His leading of the Infantry Brigade during the reconnaissance in force on the 25th January was excellent.

Captain H. De B. De Lisle, D.S.O., Durham Light Infantry, has done excellent service in temporary command of the Mounted Infantry. His action in the engagement of 4th January, and the reconnaissance of the 25th, having been of special value.

Captain A. H. S. Hart, East Surrey Regiment, and Lieutenant C. Saunders, Dorsetshire Regiment (both attached to Mounted Infantry), on two occasions made valuable reconnaissance sketches of important parts of the enemy's position with very indifferent cover in a nullah (down which they had crept), from a galling fire.

Captain H. L. Ruck-Keene, Oxfordshire Light Infantry, Lieutenant the Honourable C. R. Clegg-Hill, Royal Welsh Fusiliers, and Lieutenant L. K. Smith, Royal Scots, have done specially good service with the Mounted Infantry.

Lieutenant-Colonel H. Bowles, Yorkshire Regiment, has done very good service at critical times in command of his battalion. Captain M. H. Orr, of the same regiment, was dangerously wounded during the attack on New Zealand Hill, which post he commanded with great credit.

Major A. W. Robin, commanding New Zealand Mounted Infantry, deserves special mention for the frequent occasions upon which he and his men have performed signal service during these operations.

I have already mentioned one of these affairs on the 15th January (the attack on New Zealand Hill); and with it the name of Captain W. R. N. Madocks, whose services on that occasion are well worthy of recognition.

Lieutenant C. Champion-de-Crespigny, 2nd Life Guards, when in command of a patrol on 19th January, showed great gallantry, and an excellent example to his men, in bringing wounded men out of action.

With regard to my Staff, Major D. Haig, 7th Hussars, Acting Assistant Adjutant-General and Cavalry Staff Officer, has shown throughout the same zeal, untiring energy, and consummate ability as have characterized his conduct and bearing since the very commencement of the campaign (in Natal), during the whole of which time he has acted in this capacity. I have had occasion

to speak of him in a similar sense in former despatches.

Captain J. Vaughan, 7th Hussars, my senior Aide-de-Camp, has acted for the past two months as Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, and has done excellent service in that capacity.

Major G. O. Welch and Captain T. D. Foster, Army Service Corps, Deputy-Assistant Adjutants-General, have shown untiring zeal and energy in supervising the transport and supply services, which, in a force operating as this has been, on a very wide front, and often many miles from a railway, has been an arduous and difficult task.

I am much indebted to Major the Honourable H. A. Lawrence, 17th Lancers, for the great assistance he has rendered me in having established such an excellent system of intelligence. His good work has been attended with the best results.

Lieutenant-Colonel F. J. W. Eustace, Royal Horse Artillery, Officer Commanding Royal Artillery, Cavalry Division, has displayed conspicuous skill and sound judgment in his handling of the Artillery, which has played so important a part throughout these operations. He has been of the greatest help to me and indefatigable when the most severe strain was thrown on him and his command. He has received much help from his Adjutant, Captain A. D'A. King, Royal Horse Artillery, who is deserving of great commendation.

Captain P. A. Kenna, V.C., 21st Lancers, Provost-Marshal, has performed his duties with zeal and energy: he has on more than one occasion shown an excellent example of bravery by going personally to the assistance of wounded men.

Major H. G. Hathaway, Royal Army Medical Corps, has been attached to my Staff since my arrival at Naauwpoort. He has been unremitting in his attention to the sick and wounded. He has on several occasions and at critical times carried messages to commanders of units in the field, and his services have been most useful.

Lieutenant S. L. Barry, 10th Hussars, Divisional Signalling Officer, has performed excellent service.

Lieutenant Sir John Milbanke, Bart., 10th Royal Hussars, and Captain J. F. Laycock, Nottinghamshire Yeomanry Cavalry, my Aides-de-Camp, have displayed the same marked zeal, energy, and conspicuous courage, as I have commented upon in former despatches.

The Wild Birds Protection (County of Essex) Order, 1900.

Dated 3rd May, 1900.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1896, and upon application by the County Council of the Administrative County of Essex, I hereby make the following Order:—

##### Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (County of Essex) Order, 1900."

##### BIRDS.

##### Close Time varied.

II. The time during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited within the county of Essex shall be varied so as to be from the 15th day of March to the 15th day of August in each year, both days inclusive.

##### Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The provisions of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within so much of the County of Essex as is within the Metropolitan Police District to the following Wild Birds in the same manner as if those Birds were included in the Schedule to the Act:—

Wryneck (Cuckoo's Mate or Snake Bird), Swallow, Martins (*Hirundo urbica*, *Hirundo riparia*), Swift, Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant), Kestrel, Merlin, Hobby, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Osprey, Magpie, Shrikes (*Lanius colluria*, *Lanius minor*, *Lanius excubitor*).

##### The Kingfisher protected during the whole of the Year.

IV. During the period from the 16th day of August in any year, to the 14th day of March following, both days inclusive, the killing or taking of the Kingfisher is prohibited throughout the County of Essex.

##### Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

V. During the period from the 16th day of August in any year to the 14th day of March following, both days inclusive, the killing or taking of the following kinds of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Essex:—

Nightingale, Goldfinch, Lark, Nightjar, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, Kingfisher, Cuckoo, Barn Owl, Tawny Owl, Long Eared Owl, Short Eared Owl, Kestrel, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Merlin, Hobby, Osprey, Wryneck (Cuckoo's Mate or Snake Bird), Swallow, Sand Martin, House Martin, Swift, Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant), Shrikes, Magpie, Wheatear, Stonechat, Whinchat, Red Start, Fly Catchers, Sedge Warbler, Reed Warbler, Black Cap, Garden Warbler, Wood Warbler, Willow Warbler, Chiff Chaff, White Throat, Lesser White Throat, Long Tailed Tit, Nuthatch, Wren, Golden Crested Wren, Pied Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Grey Wagtail, Hawfinch, Linnet, Common Bunting, Snow Bunting, Landrail or Corncrake, Coot, Chatfinch, Tree Creeper.

##### Certain Districts exempted from the operation of the foregoing Clause.

VI. I hereby exempt from the portion of this Order numbered V, the whole County of Essex, except the portion lying within the Metropolitan Police District, and except the parishes of Epping, Epping Upland, Theydon Bois, Theydon Garnon, and Lambourne.

##### All Birds protected on Sundays in certain Parishes.

VII. During the period from the 16th day of

August in any year to the 14th day of March following, both days inclusive, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited in the parishes comprised in the Lexden and Winstree, Maldon, Orsett, Rochford, Romford, and Tendring Poor Law Unions of the County of Essex, namely:—

**NORFOLK AND SUFFOLK MOVEMENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1900.**

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

**Alteration of Boundaries of Scheduled District.**

1. The provisions of an Order dated the 24th day of April last, prohibiting the movement of cattle, sheep, goats or swine into, or out of, or along a highway or thoroughfare within, a District therein mentioned shall, after the commencement of this Order, apply only to the District described in the Schedule to this Order, and shall be subject to the following Article of this Order.

**Movement within Scheduled District.**

2.—(1) An animal may be moved from any premises in the said District to any other premises within such District provided that the animal is accompanied by a Movement Licence as required by this Article.

(2.) The Licence shall only be granted on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or of his agent authorized in writing for this purpose to the effect:

(i.) that the animal to be moved has been on the premises from which it is to be moved for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the granting of the Licence, and that no other cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have been brought on to those premises within such period; and

(ii.) that the animal is not affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; and

(iii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture given under any Order of the Board; and every such Declaration shall be annexed to the Licence granted thereon.

(3.) No Licence shall be granted for movement from or to premises in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place.

(4.) The Licence may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved.

(5.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals to be moved, and the name or description of the place or premises from which and the place or premises to which the animals are to be moved.

(6.) Every animal shall be moved by the nearest available route and be accompanied by the Licence.

**Saving for Orders and Regulations.**

3. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any Order of the Board relating to any Disease other than Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals, but nothing in any such Regulation shall permit the movement of animals in contravention of this Order.

**Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.**

4.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board of Agriculture or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

**Offences.**

5.—(1.) If any head of cattle, sheep, goat or pig is moved into or out of the said District, or is moved along a highway or thoroughfare within such District otherwise than in accordance with the provisions of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing,

directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the said Act.

(3.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows a head of cattle, sheep, goat or pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the said Act.

#### Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the seventh day of May, one thousand nine hundred.

7. This Order may be cited as the NORFOLK AND SUFFOLK MOVEMENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1900.
