#### By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levées are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others mu t send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levée, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly coritten on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levée, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Police Courts in the Metropolis," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to alter the number of the Police Courts, and to order such changes to be made of the places in which they should be holden within the Metropolitan Police District as should be found expedient, and every such Court should henceforth be holden in the place in or to which it should be so ordered to be established or removed; and whereas also, by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for better defining the powers of Justices within the Metropolitan Police District," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to constitute within the Metropolitan Police District as many Police Court Divisions as to Her Majesty should seem fit, and to define the extent thereof. and from time to time to alter the number and extent of such Police Court Divisions, and to assign a Division to each of the Police Courts already established, and to establish a Police Court for each of the other Divisions.

And whereas by divers Orders in Council made under the said Acts, so many Police Court Divisions as to Her Majesty from time to time has seemed fit have been constituted within the Metropolitan Police District, and the extent thereof defined respectively, and such Divisions have been severally assigned to each of the Police Courts continued or established under the said

And whereas it has been found that the business at certain of the Police Courts is at the present time greater than can be conveniently performed thereat, and it is expedient that the extent of some of the said Divisions so assigned as aforesaid should be altered and their respective boundaries should be defined anew:—

Bow Street Police Court.

Her Majesty is pleased therefore, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London, at the Temple Stairs, on the River Thames, in a line running along the said boundary as far as Holbornhill; thence across Holborn to Gray's-inn-road; thence along the centre of Gray's-inn-road to Guilford-street; thence along the centre of Guilford-street to Russell-square; thence along the east side of Russell-square to Woburn-place; thence along the centre of Woburn-place to the Euston-road; thence westward along the centre thereof to Tottenham Court-road; thence southward along the centre thereof, and of High-street, Great and Little Saint Andrew Streets, and Saint Martin's-lane, to Trafalgar-square; thence westward, including the said square, to Pall-mall, and along the centre thereof, and of Cleveland-row, to the boundary of the Green Park; thence along the boundary thereof, and of Saint James's Park (including Buckingham Palace and grounds), to Storey's Gate; thence along the centre of Great George-street and Bridge-street to the River Thames, on the north side of Westminster Bridge; and thence along the said river to the Temple Stairs aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Bow-street Police Court.

CLERKENWELL POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the point in Holborn where the boundary of the city of London coincides with the boundary of the Division assigned to the Bow-street Police Court by this Order, along the last-mentioned boundary to Seymour-street; thence along the centres of Seymour-street, High-street Camden Town, Camden-road, Brecknock-road, and Dartmouth Park Hill to the boundary of the county of London at Highgate Hill; thence southward along the centres of Highgate Hill, Bedford-place, Holloway-road, Saint Paul's-road, Canonburyroad, New North-road, and Shepperton-road to the Regent's Canal at Rosemary Branch Bridge; thence along the centre of the said canal to Danbury-street Bridge; thence along the centres of Sudeley-street, and Nelson-terrace to the Cityroad, and across the City-road to Sidney-street; thence along the centre of Sidney-street to Goswell-road; thence southward along the centre of Goswell-road to the boundary of the city of London at Fann-street; and thence westward along the said boundary to the boundary of the Bow-street District in Holborn aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Clerkenwell Police Court.

WORSHIP STREET POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid to order, and it is hereby ordered along Chester-road to Swain's-lane; thence along

accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London at Fann-street aforesaid, and thence eastward along the said boundary to Whitechapel High-street; thence in a line running eastward along the centres of Whitechapel High-street, Whitechapel-road and Mile End road to Globe-road; thence along the centre of Globe-road to the southern side of the Great Eastern Railway; thence eastward along the same to the point where it crosses the boundary of the county of London; thence northward along the said boundary to the River Lea; thence down the said river to the mouth of the Hackney Cut; thence along the centre of the Hackney Cut to the Hertford Union Canal; thence along the centre of the said canal to Cadogan-terrace, Victoria Park; thence along the centre of Cadogan-terrace to Victoria Park-road; thence westward along the centres of Victoria Park-road, and Mare-street to the Regent's Canal at Cambridge Heath Bridge; thence westward along the centre of the said canal to Rosemary Branch Bridge; and thence along the boundary of the district assigned to the Clerkenwell Police Court by this Order to the boundary of the city of London at Fann-street aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Worship-street Police Court.

NORTH LONDON POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from Rosemary Branch Bridge north-westward, along the eastern boundary of the Division assigned to the Clerkenwell Police Court by this Order to the boundary of the county of London at Highgate Hill; thence eastward along the last-mentioned boundary to Crouch End; thence in a straight line to the point where Saint Ann's-road crosses Green Lanes; thence by Saint Ann's-road to the western end of Bayley's-lane; thence eastward along the boundary of the county of London, and by the said boundary to the point below the southern extremity of the East London Waterworks Reservoir, where it meets the boundary of the Division assigned to the Worshipstreet Police Court by this Order; and thence northward and westward along the last-mentioned boundary to Rosemary Branch Bridge aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the North London Police Court.

MARYLEBONE POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the whole parish of Paddington, and the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the south end of Edgware-road opposite the Marble Arch, in a line running eastward along the boundary of the district assigned to the Marlborough-street Police Court, as far as Tottenham Court-road; thence along the centre of Euston-road to the corner of Seymour-street; thence northward along the western boundary of the district assigned to the Clerkenwell Police Court by this Order to Chester-road in Dartmouth Park Hill; thence along Chester-road to Swain's-lane; thence along

Swain's-lane to Highgate-road; thence along Highgate-road to the Tottenham and Hampstead Junction Railway Station in Highgate-road; thence along the south side of the said railway to its junction with the Hampstead Junction Railway at Gospel Oak Station; thence along the south side of the said last-mentioned railway to the Hampstead Heath Station; thence by Pond-street to Saint Stephen's Church Hampstead Green; thence in a straight line to the intersection of Finchley-road with West End-lane and Milllane; thence along Mill-lane to its intersection with Edgware-road at Shootup Hill; thence along Edgware-road to the Brondesbury Station of the Hampstead and North Western Junction Railway; thence along the southern side of that railway to Salisbury-road; thence along Salisbury-road to the Queen's Park Station of the North Western Railway; thence along Kilburn-lane and Ladbroke-grove to the Uxbridge-road; and thence eastward along the Uxbridge-road to the said parish of Paddington, shall from and after the second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Marylebone Police Court

WEST LONDON POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Hammersmith and Fulham, within the county of London, the parishes of Acton and Chiswick, within the county of Middlesex, and so much of the parish of Kensington as is included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the point where the Fulham-road touches the south-west corner of the West London and Westminster Cemetery, along the line dividing the parishes of Fulham and Hammersmith from the parish of Kensington, to the north-western corner of the Kensal Green Cemetery; thence eastward along the Harrow-road to Carlton-road; thence by Carlton-road, Admiral-road, and Ladbroke-grove, to the Uxbridge-road; thence eastward along the Uxbridge-road to Kensington Gardens; thence southward along the boundary of the district assigned to the Marlborough-street Police Court to Queen's - gate; thence along Queen's - gate, Onslow - gardens, and Selwood terrace to the Fulham-road; thence along the Fulham-road to the south-west corner of the West London and Westminster Cemetery aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the West London Police Court.

#### WESTMINSTER POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say) from the River Thames on the south side of Westminster Bridge in a line running westward along the boundary of the District assigned to Bow-street Police Court by this Order, as far as Hyde Park Corner; thence along the centres of Knightsbridge-road, Kensington-road, and Kensington Gore to Queen's-gate; thence southward along Queen's-gate, Onslow gardens, and Selwood-terrace to Fulham-road; thence along the boundary of the parish of Chelsea to the River Thames; and thence along the River Thames to the point at which the parishes of Lambeth and Battersea meet on the right bank of the river; thence along the line dividing the parish of Lambeth from the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered

parishes of Battersea and Clapham to the Claphamroad; thence eastward along Clapham-road, Kennington Park-road, Kennington-road and Westminster Bridge-road to the south side of Westminster Bridge aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Westminster Police Court.

South-Western Police Court.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Putney, Wandsworth, Battersea, Clapham, Tooting Graveney (sometimes called Tooting), the hamlet of Roehampton, the parish of Streatham (except so much thereof as lies immediately to the north of a line drawn along the centres of Streatham-place, Christchurch-road, and Thurlow Park-road, from the parish boundary of Clapham to the parish boundary of Camberwell); and also so much of the parish of Lambeth as lies to the south of the said line, all being within the Metropolitan Police District, shall from and after the second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the South-Western Police Court.

#### LAMBETH POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the point where the Clapham-road crosses the eastern boundary of the parish of Clapham, along the line dividing Clapham and Lambeth parishes and Clapham and Streatham parishes, to Streatham-place; thence eastward along the centres of Streatham-place, Christchurch-road, and Thurlow Park-road, to the western boundary of the parish of Camberwell; thence southward along the line dividing Lambeth and Camberwell parishes, to the point where such parishes cease to join each other; thence northward along the eastern boundary of the parish of Camberwell, to the Old Kent-road; thence along the centres of the Old Kent-road, New Kent-road, Saint George's road, Westminster Bridge-road, Kennington - road, Kennington Park - road, and Clapham-road, to the boundary of the parish of Clapham aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Lambeth Police Court.

#### SOUTHWARK POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the River Thames at Westminster Bridge, along the centres of Westminster Bridge-road, Saint. George's-road, New Kent-road, and Old Kent-road, to the line which divides the parishes of Camberwell and Saint Paul Deptford; thence northward along the said line to the boundary of the parish of Rotherhithe; thence along the said boundary to the River Thames; thence along the said river to Westminster Bridge aforesaid, shall, from and after the second day of July one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Southwark Police Court.

#### GREENWICH POLICE COURT.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, with the

accordingly, that the parishes of Greenwich, Saint Nicholas Deptford, Saint Paul Deptford, Lewisham and Lee, and the hamlet of Hatcham, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District, shall, from and after the second day of July one thousand nine hundred, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Greenwich Police Court.

All Orders hereinbefore referred to as made under the said Acts, so far as they relate to the constitution and extent of the several Police Court Divisions affected by this Order, are hereby revoked as from the said second day of July, one thousand nine hundred, on which day this Order shall come into force. The Divisions assigned to the Courts called the Thames Police Court, Marlborough-street Police Court, and Woolwich Police Court, respectively, are not altered or affected by this Order.

HEREAS by the six hundred and fifteenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is enacted that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, make rules as to the signals to be used or displayed where the services of a pilot are required on any vessel, such signals being referred to in that Act as pilot signals:

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, Her Majesty approved as pilot signals the signals specified in the Schedule

annexed to such Order in Council:

And whereas by section seven hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is enacted that where Her Majesty has power under that Act to make an Order in Council, Her Majesty may, from time to time by Order in Council, revoke any Order so made:

And whereas it is necessary or expedient to substitute for the existing pilot signals the signals specified in the Schedule annexed hereto:

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been

complied with:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve as pilot signals the signals specified in the Schedule annexed hereto, and doth order that such signals shall be used on and after the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and one, as from which the hereinbefore recited Order of the twelfth December, one thousand eight hundred and ninetyfour, shall be and is hereby revoked.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

Signals for a Pilot.

The following signals, when used or displayed together or separately, shall be deemed to be signals for a pilot:—

In the Doytime.—

(1.) To be hoisted at the fore, the Union Jack having round it a white border, one-tifth of the breadth of the flag;

(2.) The International Code Pilotage Signal indicated by P.T.;

(3.) The International Code Flag S., with or without the Code Pennant over it;

(4.) The distant signal consisting of a cone point upwards, having above it two balls or shapes resembling balls. At Night .-

(1.) The pyrotechnic light commonly known as a blue light every fifteen minutes;

(2.) A bright white light, flashed or shown at short or frequent intervals just above the bulwarks for about a minute at a time.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, " chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches " to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may in "some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Arch-"bishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of "any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district within the diocese of such Arch-" bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the " case may be, may be advantageously separated " from any parish or mother church, and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be "united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that "any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate " parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme "in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his "consideration) describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be "effected, and how the changes consequent on " such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and " other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties "interested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or "their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, " by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall "be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make "an Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend John James Stewart Lord Bishop of Worcester hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the third day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"I, John James Stewart, Bishop of Worcester, beg leave to represent to your Grace that in the report of the Commissioners appointed by me to inquire into the needs and resources of the church in the city of Birmingham within my diocese it is recommended, among other things, that a portion of the parish of Saint Martin Birmingham, called the Barwick-street District, which lies detached from the main portion of the parish and contains a population of seven hundred or thereabouts should be divided between the parishes of Saint Philip and Saint Paul, to which it adjoins, by transferring a portion of the said district lying between certain streets called Colmore-row, Great Charles-street, Newhall-street, and Snow-hill to the said parish of Saint Philip and the remaining portion thereof to the new parish of Saint Paul and that the rector of Saint Philip should be relieved of the annual charge of fifteen pounds for fees and pew rents now payable to the rector of Saint Martin, in consideration of the rector of Saint Martin being relieved of the charge of the said district.

"That the population of the said parishes of Saint Martin, Saint Philip, and Saint Paul amounts to six thousand two hundred, one thousand six hundred, and ten thousand respectively.

"That it appears to me that the said district may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament called the Pluralities Acts be advantageously separated from the said parish of Saint Martin and a portion thereof be annexed to the parish of Saint Philip and the remainder to the new parish of Saint Paul as recommended by the said Commissioners.

"That pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the Act first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration may be made with justice to all parties interested and I submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices of the said parishes to the intent that your Grace may if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the district firstly hereinafter described being part of the parish of Saint Martin in the city of Birmingham and diocese of Worcester from the said parish of Saint Martin and to annex it to the parish of Saint Philip in the same city and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes.

same city and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes.
"That the rector of Saint Philip shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said

district.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said district in the church of the said parish of Saint Philip and that the fees for all such offices shall belong to the rector of Saint Philip.

"The district thus proposed to be added to the parish of Saint Philip is all that part of the parish of Saint Martin Birmingham extending from the street called Colmore-row to the centre of Great Charles-street, and delineated in the accompanying

map or plan.

"That in consideration of the rector of Saint Martin being relieved of the charge of the said district the rector of Saint Philip shall be relieved of the annual charge of fifteen pounds for fees and pew rents now payable to the rector of Saint Martin and that all liability for the payment thereof shall henceforth cease and determine.

"It is also proposed to separate the district secondly herein described being part of the parish of Saint Martin aforesaid from the said parish and to annex it to the new parish of Saint Paul in the said city of Birmingham and diocese of Worcester for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the vicar of Saint Paul shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said

listrict.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said district in the church of the said new parish of Saint Paul and that the fees for all such offices shall belong to the vicar of the said new parish.

"The district thus proposed to be added to the new parish of Saint Paul is all that part of the parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, extending from the centre of Great Charles-street to the north side of the canal and delineated in the accompanying map or plan.

"CONSENTS.

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"We the undersigned being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the rectory of Saint Martin, to the rectory of Saint Philip, and to the perpetual curacy or vicarage of Saint Paul, in the city of Birmingham and diocese of Worcester, in case the same were now vacant and we the undersigned being the rectors of the said parishes of Saint Martin and Saint Philip, and the vicar of the said new parish of Saint Paul do hereby respectively testify to your Grace our consent to the foregoing scheme.

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect."

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

G. Statute XXIV. Tenures and Privileges, Section 4.

The Head Master shall have the power for any grave misconduct which may not in his Judgment require expulsion to deprive a Scholar for any time not exceeding one school time of the whole or part of the advantages of his Scholarship. The Head Master shall have the same power in the case of a Scholar whose payments are in arrear. Any Scholar so deprived shall have the right of appeal to the Governing Body.

RAILWAY AND CANAL TRAFFIC ACT, 1888.

In the Matter of the Railway and Canal Traffic Act, 1888, and in the Matter of an Application by the County Council of Gloucestershire for a Warrant, authorizing the Abandonment of the Thames and Severn Canal.

Warrant of Abandonment. WHEREAS by section 45, sub-section (1), of the Railway and Canal Traffic Act, 1898, it is enacted (inter alia) that where on the application of any Local Authority it appears to the Board of Trade that any canal or part of a canal thereinafter referred to as a derelict canal has, by reason of the default of the proprietors thereof, become unfit for navigation, the Board of Trade may, by warrant signed by their Secretary, authorize the abandonment by the existing proprietors of such derelict canal; and by subsection 3 of the same section it is enacted that in the case of a derelict canal the warrant may be granted on the condition that the canal or any part thereof, with all or any of the powers relating thereto, be transferred to any person, body of persons, or Local Authority, and where any such condition is imposed, the Board of Trade may, if they think fit, frame and embody in a Provisional Order a scheme for the management of the canal or any part thereof.

And whereas by an Act passed in the 23rd year of the reign of King George III, cap. 38, the Company of Proprietors of the Thames and Severn Canal Navigation, hereinafter called "the Company," were incorporated and authorized to make and maintain a navigable canal from the River Thames or Isis, at or near Leachlade, to join the Stroudwater Canal at Wallbridge, near the town of Stroud, in the county of Gloucester, with a collateral cut from the said canal at or near Siddington, to or near the town of Cirencester, in the same county:

And whereas the powers of the Company were enlarged and amended by six subsequent Acts, viz.:—31 Geo. III, c. XVII; 36 Geo. III, c. XXXIV; 49 Geo. III, c. CXII; 53 Geo. III, c. CLXXXI; 42 and 43 Vic., c. LXXI; 57 and 58 Vic., c. CC; and the Company completed and opened for traffic the said canal and cut (hereinafter referred to as "the Canal"):

And whereas by the Thames and Severn Canal Trust Act, 1895, the Canal and Undertaking of the Company were transferred to and vested in the Thames and Severn Canal Trust thereby incorporated, and the Company was dissolved, and the said Canal Trust are now the Proprietors of the Canal.

And whereas the said Canal Trust have expended large sums of money with the object of putting the canal into a proper state of repair, but such expenditure has proved to be insufficient and their powers of raising money are exhausted:

And whereas an application has been made to the Board of Trade by the County Council of Gloucestershire (a local authority within the meaning of the said section), for a warrant authorizing the abandonment by the existing proprietors of the canal, and for a Provisional Order transferring the canal with all the powers relating thereto to the County Council of Gloucestershire, and constituting a scheme for the management and maintenance of the canal.

And whereas such public and other notices of the application have been given as were required by the Beard of Trade.

And whereas the Board of Trade are satisfied that, by reason of the default of the proprietors of the canal, the canal has become unfit for navigation, and is a derelict canal.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon the Board of Trade by section 45 of the Railway and Canal Traffic Act, 1888, and of all other powers in that behalf enabling them, the Board of Trade do hereby authorize the abandonment of the canal as a derelict canal by the Thames and Severn Canal Trust, the existing proprietors thereof, upon condition that the canal with all the powers relating thereto be transferred to the County Council of Gloucestershire.

### ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

Foreign Animals Wharves Order of 1900.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the

Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

### Restriction on Access to Foreign Animals Wharves.

1.—(1.) Any person desiring to enter a Foreign' Animals Wharf may be required by any officer authorized in writing in that behalf by the market authority to state the nature of the business necessitating such entry, and if he declines to make such statement, or if the officer requiring such statement is not satisfied as to the correctness of the same, or that the business necessitates his entry, the officer so authorized may prohibit his entry into the Wharf.

(2.) If any person, whose entry into a Foreign Animals Wharf is so prohibited, enters or attempts to enter into such Wharf he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

#### Interpretation.

2. "Foreign Animals Wharf" in this Order means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals subject to slaughter at the port of landing:

"Market authority" means the persons authorized by Statute to construct or regulate the Wharf.

#### Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the Foreign Animals Wharves Order of 1900.
