*Portland Harbour, Spring Point Ledge Light—Sectors Altered.*

THE United States Government has given notice, that on or about 1st September, 1900, the sectors of Spring Point Ledge Light (flashing every five seconds) would be altered to show as follows:—white from the bearing of N. 87° E., through east and south, to N. 60° W.; red from N. 60° W. to N. 17° W., white from N. 17° W. to N. 10° W., red from N. 10° W., through north, to N. 87° E., but in other respects the light would remain as before.

Approximate position, lat. 43° 39' N., long. 70° 13' W.

*Frenchman Bay Entrance—Whistle Buoy Established.*

THE United States Government has given notice, that on 31st July, 1900, a whistle buoy, painted red, and marked "E.R." in black, would be moored in a depth of 15 fathoms at the entrance to Frenchman Bay, with Egg Rock Lighthouse bearing N. 28° E., distant 1 mile, and Thrumbeap N. 27° W.

Approximate position, lat. 44° 20' N., long. 68° 9' W.

This buoy will be kept in position from the beginning of May to the end of October annually.

*Inishowen East Lighthouse—Intended Fog Signal.*  
THE Commissioners of Irish Lights have given notice, that on or about 1st October, 1900, a fog siren will be established at Inishowen East Lighthouse.

Inishowen fog siren will give, during thick or foggy weather, two blasts, a high and low note alternately, every minute, thus:—High blast, two seconds; silent interval, three seconds; low blast, two seconds; silent interval, fifty-three seconds.

Approximate position, lat. 55° 14' N., long. 6° 56' W.
