NOTE.—The above named Mary Wrigley (otherwise Mary Roberts) was the youngest daughter of Mary Wrigley the only sister of George Dodson, the testator in the said action, and was born at Dod Lee Longwood, near Huddersfield, on the 23rd November, 1826. She is believed to have left the neighbourhood of Huddersfield some time before 1867, and to have married one Austin J. Roberts, of Liverpool, and lived with him in the United States of America.
