A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by Our Order in Council of this day's date We were graciously pleased to annul, from and after the thirty-first day of October next, Our Royal Proclamation of the third day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, regulating, according to the scheme set forth therein or recognized thereby, the distribution of the net proceeds of prizes captured from the enemy, of captures and seizures under the several Acts of Parliament passed relating to the revenues of Customs, and to trade and navigation, for the abolition of the slave trade, for the capture and destruction of pirates and piratical vessels, and of the rewards conferred for the same, as also of the awards for all salvage granted to the crews of Our ships and vessels of war, when not otherwise specially apportioned by the terms of the respective awards and allowances, and in consequence of certain alterations in the apportionment and classification of the shares being desirable, it is expedient that provision should be made for the future distribution of such net proceeds and salvage not otherwise specially apportioned, and all other moneys whatsoever granted to be shared among the officers and crews of Our ships and vessels in the manner of prize money.

We do, therefore, now make known to all Our loving Subjects, and to all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, that Our Royal will and pleasure is, and We do hereby direct, that ships or vessels being in sight of a prize, as also of the captor, under circumstances to cause intimidation to the prize and encouragement to the captor, shall be alone entitled to share as joint captors, and that the distribution of all such net proceeds of prizes, rewards, allowances, salvage awards, and of all bounties and grants whatsoever distributable to Our Royal Navy in the manner of prize money, shall be made as follows; viz. :—

That the Flag Officer or Officers shall have one thirtieth part of the whole net proceeds arising from prizes captured from the enemy, and from all other captures and seizures, &c., as aforesaid, made by any of the ships or vessels under his or their command, and of the rewards conferred for the same, according to the following conditions and modifications, save and except as hereinafter provided and directed; that is to say,—

When there is but one Flag Officer he

shall have the entire one thirtieth part; when two Flag Officers shall be sharing together, the chief shall have two thirds, and the other Flag Officer shall have the remaining one third of the one thirtieth part; and when there shall be more than two Flag Officers, the chief shall have one half of the said one thirtieth part, and the remaining half shall be equally divided among the junior Flag Officers; Commodores of the first class and Captains of the Fleet to share as Flag Officers: Provided always, that no Flag Officer, unless actually on board any of Our ships or vessels of war, and at the actual taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any ship or ships of war, privateer or privateers belonging to the enemy, shall share in the distribution of any head money or bounty money granted as a reward for the taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any such ship or vessel of the enemy.

That no Flag Officer, unless actually present at the capture or destruction of any pirates or piratical ship, vessel, or boat shall share in any distribution of the proceeds or bounty in respect of such pirates, or of the crews of such piratical ship, vessel, or boat.

That no Flag Officer shall share in any remuneration or reward conferred or awarded to the crew of any of Our ships or vessels as salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the ship or vessel to which the award shall be made, or have personally aided and assisted in the transaction at the time the service was rendered.

That no Flag Officer commanding in any port in the United Kingdom shall share in the proceeds of any prize captured from the enemy, or in other captures, seizures, rewards, or any distributive proceeds as aforesaid, made by any ships or vessels which shall sail from or leave such port by Order of the Lord High Admiral, or of Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

That when ships or vessels under the command of several Flag Officers belonging to separate stations, shall be joint captors, &c., each Flag Officer shall receive a proportion of the one thirtieth part according to the number of officers and men present under the command of each such Flag Officer; and when ships or vessels under orders from the Lord High Admiral or from Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral,

are joint captors, &c., with other ships or vessels under a flag or flags, the like regulations as to the apportionment of the flag share to the Flag Officer or Officers are to be observed.

With reference to Flag Officers it is to be noted,—

That when an inferior Flag Officer is sent to reinforce a superior officer on any station, the superior Flag Officer shall not share in any prize taken by the inferior Flag Officer before he has arrived within the limits of that station, unless the inferior officer shall have received some order directly from, and shall be acting in execution of some order issued by, such superior Flag Officer.

No chief Flag Officer quitting any station, except upon some definite urgent service, and with the intention of returning to the station as soon as such service is performed, shall share in any prize taken by Our ships or vessels left behind after he has passed the limits of the station, or after he has surrendered the command to another Flag Officer appointed by the Admiralty to command in chief upon such station.

An inferior Flag Officer quitting any station (except when detached by orders from his Commander-in-Chief upon a special service, accompanied with orders to return to such station as soon as the service has been performed), shall have no share in prizes taken by the ships and vessels remaining on the station after he has passed the limits thereof.

In like manner Flag Officers remaining on such station shall not share in the prizes taken by such inferior officer, or by ships or vessels under his immediate command, after he has quitted the limits of the station, except he has been detached as aforesaid.

A Commander-in-Chief or other Flag Officer belonging to any station shall not share in any prize or prizes taken out of the limits of that station by any ship or vessel under the command of a Flag Officer of any other station, or under orders from Our Commissioners of the Admiralty, unless such Commander-in-Chief or Flag Officer is expressly authorized by Our said Commissioners to take the command of that station in which the prize or prizes is or are taken, and shall actually have taken upon him such command.

Every commodore having a captain under him shall be esteemed a Flag Officer with respect to the thirtieth part of prizes taken, whether he be Commanding-in-Chief or serving under Command.

Any officer on board any of Our ships of war at the time of capturing any prize or prizes who shall have more commissions than one shall be entitled only to share in such prize or prizes according to the share allotted to him by the above-mentioned distribution in respect to his superior commission or office.

And with reference to these Regulations it is to be noted, that a captain, commander, or other commanding officer of a ship or vessel shall be deemed to be under the command of a flag when he shall actually have received some order from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by, a Flag Officer, whether he be or be not within the limits of the station of such Flag Officer; and in the event of his being directed to join a Flag Officer on any station, he shall be deemed to be under the command of such Flag Officer from the time when he arrives within the limits of the station, which circumstance is always to be carefully noted in the log book; and it shall be considered that he continues under the Flag Officer of such station until he shall have received some order directly from or be acting in the execution of

some order issued by some other Flag Officer duly authorized, or by the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

Every commodore of the second class shall share as captain.

And We hereby direct, that the captain appointed as chief of the staff, captain, commander, lieutenant commanding, staff commander commanding, or any other officer duly commanding any ship or vessel of war, singly making a capture or seizure, or otherwise entitled to the distributive benefit arising from any proceeds, reward, grant, bounty, salvage, or other award as aforesaid, that is to say, the officer actually in command at the time shall have one tenth of the remainder, or if there is no Flag Officer to share, one tenth of the entire net proceeds, except that if the single capturing ship be a classed ship having a commander under the captain the commander shall take a portion of the one tenth part according to the proportion hereinafter set forth; and if more than one commanding officer of the same rank of command shall be entitled to share as joint captors, &c., the one tenth shall be equally divided between them; but when captains, commanders, lieutenants, and staff commanders commanding, respectively, Our ships and vessels of war, and commanders under captains in rated ships, shall share together in whatever variety of combination, the one tenth shall be so divided into parts for a graduated apportionment as to provide for each captain receiving six parts; each commander commanding, or commander under the captain in a rated ship, three parts; and each lieutenant commanding, or staff commander commanding, or other officer actually commanding a vessel of war, two parts; which We hereby direct shall be the proportion in which they shall respectively share; colonel of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces serving as marines, doing duty with a battalion or force employed on shore for naval operations to share as captains; lieutenant-colonel of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces serving as marines employed on shore for naval operations, if in actual command of a battalion or force to share as captains, if second in command to share as commanders; major of marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces serving as marines employed on shore for naval operations, if in actual command of a battalion or force, to share as commanders. And We further direct, that after provision shall thus have been made for the flag share (if any), and for the portion of the commanding officer or officers and others as above specified, the remainder of the net proceeds shall be distributed in eleven classes, so that each officer, man, and boy composing the rest of the complements of Our ships and vessels of war, and actually on board or absent on duty in a prize (who it is Our will and pleasure shall be the only absentees entitled to share) at the time of any such capture, seizure, &c., as aforesaid, and every person present and assisting shall receive shares or a share according to his class as set forth in the following scale:—

First Class: Staff-Captain, Deputy Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets when borne on ship's books, Secretary to Admiral of the Fleet or to Commander-in-Chief, Paymaster-in-Chief in the event of such an officer being employed afloat, Chief Inspector of Machinery and Inspector of Machinery when borne on ship's books, other than harbour ship, forty-five shares each.

Second Class: Senior Lieutenant of a classed

ship not bearing a Commander under the Captain, Staff-Commander, Major of Marines (artillery or light infantry) or of land forces, doing duty as marines if the Senior Military Officer of a Fleet or Squadron, Chaplain over fifteen years' seniority, Fleet Surgeon, Secretary to an Admiral or Commodore of the First Class not Commanding-in-Chief or to a Captain of the Fleet, Fleet Paymaster, Fleet Engineer, Naval Instructor over fifteen years' seniority, forty shares each.

Third Class: Lieutenant over eight years' seniority, major of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, whether having higher brevet rank or not, quartermaster of marines with honorary rank of major, chaplain over eight and under fifteen years' seniority, staff surgeon, staff paymaster, paymaster, chief engineer, naval instructor, over eight and under fifteen years' seniority, thirty-five shares each.

Fourth Class: Lieutenant under eight years' seniority, captain of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, whether having higher brevet rank or not, quartermaster of marines with honorary rank of captain, chaplain under eight years' seniority, surgeon, secretary to commodore, second class, assistant paymaster over twelve years' seniority, assistant paymaster over six years' seniority, engineer over six years' seniority, engineer under six years' seniority, naval instructor under eight years' seniority; also lieutenant of the Royal Naval Reserve (when embarked for service afloat), chief officer of a cruiser in the coastguard, chief officer of a coastguard station, who has been in command of a cruiser (when embarked for service afloat), senior engineer of the Royal Naval Reserve (when embarked for service afloat), engineer of the Royal Naval Reserve (when embarked for service afloat), thirty shares each.

Fifth Class: Sub-Lieutenant, lieutenant of marines, quartermaster of marines, with honorary rank of lieutenant (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, assistant paymaster under six years' seniority, assistant engineer, chief gunner, chief boatswain, chief carpenter, gunner, boatswain, carpenter, head schoolmaster, artificer engineer; also sub-lieutenant of the Royal Naval Reserve (when embarked for service), assistant engineer of the Royal Naval Reserve (when embarked for service), senior mate of a cruiser in the Coast Guard, chief officer of a Coast Guard station who has never commanded a cruiser (when embarked for service), twenty shares each.

Sixth Class: Midshipman, clerk, pilot, chief petty officer (seaman class), chief yeoman of signals, warrant officer of marines (if embarked) (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, staff-sergeants and colour-sergeants of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, master-at-arms, naval schoolmaster, chief writer (old system), chief writer (new system), chief engine room artificer (old system), chief engine room artificer, first and second classes (new system), chief carpenter's mate (new system), chief carpenter's mate (old system), chief armourer, engine room artificer (old system), engine room artificer, first, second, third, and fourth classes (new system), ship's steward, ship's steward for

general mess, instructor in cookery, chief cook, ship's cook for general mess, chief bandmaster, chief sick berth steward, chief stoker, draughtsman, admiral's or commodore's steward or cook, general messman, captain's and cabin steward, captain's and cabin cook, and all other chief petty officers, also midshipmen of Royal Naval Reserve (when embarked for service), second mate of a cruiser in the Coast Guard Service, chief boatman of the coast guard in charge (when embarked for service), twelve shares each.

Seventh Class: Naval cadet, assistant clerk, first class petty officer (seaman class), yeoman of signals, sailmaker, ropemaker, sergeant of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, ship's corporal first class, ship's corporal second class, carpenter's mate (new system), carpenter's mate (old system), caulker, blacksmith, armourer, plumber, painter first class, cooper, leading stoker first class, sick berth steward, ship's cook, bandmaster, head krooman in classed ships, tindal or head man of seedies in classed ships, domestic first class, of five years' service, and all other first class petty officers, also chief boatman of the coast guard (when embarked for service), ten shares each.

Eighth Class: Second class petty officer (seaman class), second yeoman of signals, sailmaker's mate, leading shipwright, leading seaman, corporal of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, bombardier of marine artillery, second cooper, armourer's mate, blacksmith's mate, painter second class, plumber's mate, leading signalman, leading carpenter's crew, shipwright (new system), leading stoker second class, second sick berth steward, second ship's cook, band corporal, musician, second writer, head krooman (in other than classed ships), tindal or head man of seedies (in other than classed ships), ship's steward's assistant after three years' service as such, domestic first class, under five years' service, and domestic second class of three years' service as such, and all other second class petty officers, also commissioned boatman and divisional carpenter of the coast guard (when embarked for service), seven shares each.

Ninth Class: Yeoman of store room, second captain of the hold, sailmaker's crew, able seaman, qualified signalman, ordinary seaman, signalman, gunner of marine artillery, private of marines, drummer and bugler of marines (artillery or light infantry), or of land forces doing duty as marines, shipwright (old system), stoker and coal trimmer, blacksmith's crew, armourer's crew, plumber's crew, cooper's crew, third writer, lithographer, stoker second class, carpenter's crew, domestic second class, under three years' service as such, and domestic third class, over eighteen years of age, bandsman, ship's steward's assistant with less than three years' service as such, sick berth attendant after three years' service if qualified for promotion, tailor, shoemaker, butcher, second head krooman, second tindal, or second head man of seedies, also boatman of the coast guard (when embarked for service), and dock and victualling yard apprentices (if embarked for service), four shares each.

Tenth Class: Baker, sick berth attendant (under three years' service or if not qualified for promotion), assistant baker, cook's mate,

second cook's mate, assistant butcher, krooman, seedic, supernumeraries, except as hereinafter provided, and persons borne merely as passengers and not declining to render assistance on any occasion of capture, seizure, &c., two shares each.

Eleventh Class : Signal boy, boy first class, boy second class, ship's steward's boy, band boy, boy writer, domestic third class, under 18 years of age, one share each.

And with respect to supernumeraries, We do hereby direct :—

1st. That all supernumeraries holding ranks in the Service above the ranks or ratings specified in the sixth class of this Our Proclamation who have been ordered to do duty in any of Our ships and vessels by the Lord High Admiral, by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, by the senior officer of the fleet or squadron, or if none senior then by the Captain or Commanding Officer of the capturing ship or vessel, if not by special authority employed in higher capacities, shall share according to the ranks which they respectively hold in the Service ; but in all cases, to qualify them for so sharing, and not merely as supernumeraries in the tenth class, due notation of their being thus respectively ordered to do duty must be made on the victualling lists and prize lists.

2nd. That all supernumeraries holding ratings in the Service below the denominations of those specified in the fifth class of this Our Proclamation, and who at full victuals are engaged in the ordinary duties of the ship, shall always share according to the ratings which they bear in the Service.

3rd. That no interpreter, unless holding some rank or rating in the Service, shall share in any proceeds, bounties, or awards as aforesaid, except by the special permission of the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral for the time being.

And in order that Our Royal intentions herein may be duly carried into effect, We further direct that when any capture or seizure is made, or service performed for which a distributable grant or reward is to be made, or is expected to be conferred or awarded to any of Our ships or vessels of war, the captain or commanding officer shall transmit or cause to be transmitted, as soon as may be, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, a true and perfect list of all the officers, seamen, marines, soldiers, and others who were actually on board on the occasion, with a notation thereon, stating whether any other of Our ships or vessels was in sight at the time of the capture, accompanied by a separate list containing the names of those belonging to the crew who were absent on duty or otherwise at the time, specifying the cause of such absence, each list to contain the quality of the service of each person, with their several ratings, to be subscribed by the captain or commanding officer, and three or more of the chief officers on board.

And when the list of those actually on board, with the separate list of persons absent, though belonging to the ship or vessel, shall have been verified on examination with the ship's books lodged as official records, the Accountant General of Our Navy shall grant a certificate that such lists are correct or have been corrected, as occasion may require, in order that distribution of the respective prize or other proceeds payable as prize or salvage money may be duly made in the Department of the Accountant General of Our Navy.

And in the distribution of such prize, or other proceeds payable as prize and salvage money, we hereby direct that all officers, seamen, marines, soldiers and others, holding acting appointments superior to their substantive ranks or ratings, and who are in receipt of the pay of such acting appointment, shall share in the classes to which the ranks and ratings in which they are acting, may belong ; and further, that all persons temporarily employed in Our Navy shall share in the classes to which the ranks and ratings to which they are temporarily appointed may belong.

And in the event of difficulty arising with respect to any of the Regulations hereby ordered, or if any case should occur not herein provided for, or not sufficiently provided for, we are pleased hereby to authorize the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral for the time being, to issue such directions thereupon as may appear just and expedient ; which directions shall have the same force and effect as if specially provided for in this Our Royal Proclamation : Provided always, that the distribution hereinbefore ordered shall take effect only with respect to the proceeds of captures, seizures, and services as aforesaid, which shall be made and performed on and after the first day of November, one thousand nine hundred ; and that the proceeds arising from all captures, seizures, and services aforesaid, made or performed prior to that date, shall be distributed in accordance with any Proclamation or Proclamations now in force, or in force at the time of such captures, seizures, or services respectively and applicable thereto, which We are pleased hereby to direct accordingly.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, by an Order dated the nineteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, and by the other Orders and Proclamations specified in the Schedule to this Proclamation, ordered the establishment of a branch of Our Royal Mint at or near Sydney in New South Wales, and made regulations respecting the same, and regulated the currency of the gold coins coined thereat ;

And whereas in pursuance of "The Coinage Act, 1870," as amended by "The Coinage Act, 1891," We by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, by an Order dated the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and a Proclamation therein referred to, applied certain provisions of the said Act to Our Colony of New South Wales ;

And whereas it appears to Us desirable to make further provision respecting the said branch Mint ;

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act and the last-mentioned Order and Proclamation, and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby by and with the advice of Our Privy Council proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows :—

1. A branch of Our Mint shall continue to be established at or near Sydney in Our Colony of New South Wales on its present site, or on such other site as the Governor of the Colony in Council may approve.

2. Gold coins may be coined at the Sydney branch Mint so established, and shall be of the same denominations, designs, weights, and fineness, and subject to the allowance of the same remedy as gold coins coined at Our Mint in England.

3. The Master of Our Mint shall prepare and transmit such dies as may be required for the gold coins to be coined at the Sydney branch Mint.

4. The gold coins coined in pursuance of this Proclamation at the Sydney branch Mint shall be deemed to have been issued from Our Mint, and shall be current and a legal tender in like manner and to the like extent as if they had been coined and issued in England.

5.—(i.) If any person brings to the Sydney branch Mint any gold bullion, the Deputy Master of that branch shall assay coin and deliver out the same to such person upon payment for every ounce troy of gold of standard fineness of a charge of one penny; Provided that—

(a.) where the gold bullion so brought is such that it cannot be brought to the standard fineness of the coin to be coined thereout without refining the whole or some portion of it the Deputy Master shall demand for assaying and refining the same such additional charge as the Governor of New South Wales in Council may from time to time fix, and until such charge is paid to him may refuse to receive, assay, or coin such bullion; and

(b.) where the bullion brought to the branch Mint for coinage is finer than the standard fineness of the coin to be coined thereout, there shall be delivered to the person bringing the same such additional amount of coin as is proportionate to such superior fineness;

(c.) no undue preference shall be shown to any person as respects the bullion brought to the branch Mint, and every person shall have priority according to the time at which he brought it;

(d.) the Governor of New South Wales in Council may make regulations for carrying into effect the provisions of this Article with respect to gold bullion, and the bringing, coining, and delivery out thereof and in particular for regulating the time and conditions at and under which it is to be so brought, assayed, coined, and delivered out, and the minimum amount which may be so brought.

(ii.) The charges under this Article for coining, assaying, and refining shall be collected by the Deputy Master in accordance with the said regulations, either as a payment in advance, or as a deduction from the coin delivered out, or otherwise, and shall be accounted for and paid over in such manner as the Governor of New South Wales in Council directs to the Colonial Treasurer of New South Wales to be by him paid into the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony.

6. Subject to the provisions of this Proclamation, the branch Mint at Sydney shall, for the purposes of coinage of gold coins be deemed to be part of Our Mint, and accordingly

(a.) the Deputy Master shall comply with all directions he may receive from the Master of Our Mint, whether as regards the returns to be made, or the delivery of coin for public

use, or the transmission of specimen coins to England or otherwise; and

(b.) the said specimen coins shall be subject to the Trial of the Pyx under section twelve of "The Coinage Act, 1870," so, however, that they shall be examined separately from the coins coined in England or at any branch Mint other than the one regulated by this Proclamation; and

(c.) the Deputy Master and other officers and persons for the purpose of carrying on the business of the branch Mint may be appointed, promoted, suspended, and removed, and their duties assigned and salaries awarded under section fifteen of "The Coinage Act, 1870."

7. The Governor of New South Wales in Council shall cause the store of gold bullion and coin at the branch Mint at Sydney to be inspected half-yearly, and cause the persons inspecting the same to report thereon to the Deputy Master of the branch Mint, stating the exact amount of bullion and coin inspected by them; and such reports shall be transmitted by the Deputy Master to the Master of Our Mint in London.

8. The Master of Our Mint shall in the execution of this Proclamation act in accordance with any regulations made or directions given by the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury.

9. The Deputy Master, officers, and servants of the branch Mint, holding office at the date of this Proclamation, shall be deemed to have been duly appointed and shall continue in office as if they had been appointed in accordance with this Proclamation, and they shall be in no worse position as respects their salaries and superannuation allowances than they would have been if this Proclamation had not been made.

10. In this Proclamation,—

The expression "Mint" means Our Royal Mint in England;

The expression "Governor" includes the officer for the time being administering the Government of the Colony;

The expression "Deputy Master of the branch Mint" includes any person who lawfully exercises at such branch Mint the authority of Deputy Master.

11. Our Order in Council of the nineteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, and the other Orders in Council and Proclamations specified in the Schedule to this Proclamation shall cease to have any effect; Provided that nothing in this Proclamation shall affect anything already legally done or suffered before the date of this Proclamation, and all coins coined at the branch Mint at Sydney before the date of this Proclamation, which are current and a legal tender in any part of Our dominions at the date of this Proclamation, shall continue to be so current and a legal tender.

12. This Proclamation may be cited as the Sydney Mint Proclamation, 1900.

13. This Proclamation shall come into force on the first day of December nineteen hundred unless it is sooner promulgated, and in that case on such promulgation.

Given at Our Court at *Balmoral*, this seventeenth day of *September*, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred, and in the sixty-fourth year of Our reign.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We, by the Order in Council and Proclamation specified in the Schedule to this Proclamation ordered the establishment of a branch of Our Royal Mint at or near Melbourne, in Victoria, and made regulations respecting the same, and regulated the currency of the gold coins coined thereat :

And whereas in pursuance of the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891, We by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, by an Order dated the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and a Proclamation therein referred to, applied certain provisions of the said Act to Our Colony of Victoria ;

And whereas it appears to Us desirable to make further provision respecting the said branch Mint ;

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act and the last-mentioned Order and Proclamation, and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby by and with the advice of Our Privy Council proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows :—

1. A branch of Our Mint shall continue to be established at or near Melbourne in Our Colony of Victoria on its present site, or on such other site as the Governor of the Colony in Council may approve.

2. Gold coins may be coined at the Melbourne branch Mint so established, and shall be of the same denominations, designs, weights, and fineness, and subject to the allowance of the same remedy as gold coins coined at Our Mint in England.

3. The Master of Our Mint shall prepare and transmit such dies as may be required for the gold coins to be coined at the Melbourne Branch Mint.

4. The gold coins coined in pursuance of this Proclamation at the Melbourne Branch Mint shall be deemed to have been issued from Our Mint, and shall be current and a legal tender in like manner and to the like extent as if they had been coined and issued in England.

5.—(i) If any person brings to the Melbourne branch Mint any gold bullion, the Deputy Master of that branch shall assay coin and deliver out the same to such person upon payment for every ounce troy of gold of standard fineness of a charge of one penny : Provided that—

(a) where the gold bullion so brought is such that it cannot be brought to the standard fineness of the coin to be coined thereout without refining the whole or some portion of it the Deputy Master shall demand for assaying and refining the same such additional charge as the Governor of Victoria in Council may from time to time fix, and until such charge is paid to him may refuse to receive, assay, or coin such bullion ; and

(b) where the bullion brought to the branch Mint for coinage is finer than the standard fineness of the coin to be coined thereout, there shall be delivered to the person bringing the same such additional amount of coin as is proportionate to such superior fineness ;

(c) no undue preference shall be shown to any person as respects the bullion brought to the branch Mint, and every person shall have priority according to the time at which he brought it ;

(d) the Governor of Victoria in Council may make regulations for carrying into effect the provisions of this Article with respect to gold bullion, and the bringing, coining, and delivery out thereof, and in particular for regulating the time and conditions at and under which it is to be so brought, assayed, coined, and delivered out, and the minimum amount which may be so brought.

(ii) The charges under this Article for coining, assaying, and refining shall be collected by the Deputy Master in accordance with the said regulations, either as a payment in advance, or as a deduction from the coin delivered out, or otherwise, and shall be accounted for and paid over in such manner as the Governor of Victoria in Council directs to the Colonial Treasurer of Victoria to be by him paid into the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony.

6. Subject to the provisions of this Proclamation, the branch Mint at Melbourne shall, for the

purposes of coinage of gold coins, be deemed to be part of Our Mint, and accordingly

- (a.) the Deputy Master shall comply with all directions he may receive from the Master of Our Mint, whether as regards the returns to be made, or the delivery of coin for public use, or the transmission of specimen coins to England or otherwise; and
- (b.) the said specimen coins shall be subject to the Trial of the Pyx under section twelve of the Coinage Act, 1870, so, however, that they shall be examined separately from the coins coined in England or at any branch Mint other than the one regulated by this Proclamation; and
- (c.) the Deputy Master and other officers and persons for the purpose of carrying on the business of the branch Mint may be appointed, promoted, suspended, and removed, and their duties assigned and salaries awarded under section fifteen of the Coinage Act, 1870.

7. The Governor of Victoria in Council shall cause the store of gold bullion and coin at the branch Mint at Melbourne to be inspected half-yearly, and cause the persons inspecting the same to report thereon to the Deputy Master of the branch Mint, stating the exact amount of bullion and coin inspected by them; and such reports shall be transmitted by the Deputy Master to the Master of Our Mint in London.

8. The Master of Our Mint shall in the execution of this Proclamation act in accordance with any regulations made or directions given by the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury.

9. The Deputy Master, officers, and servants of the branch Mint, holding office at the date of this Proclamation, shall be deemed to have been appointed and shall continue in office as if they had been appointed in accordance with this Proclamation, and they shall be in no worse position as respects their salaries and superannuation allowances than they would have been if this Proclamation had not been made.

10. In this Proclamation,—

The expression "Mint" means Our Royal Mint in England;

The expression "Governor" includes the officer for the time being administering the Government of the Colony;

The expression "Deputy Master of the branch Mint" includes any person who lawfully exercises at such branch Mint the authority of Deputy Master.

11. The Order in Council and Proclamation specified in the Schedule to this Proclamation shall cease to have any effect; Provided that nothing in this Proclamation shall affect anything already legally done or suffered before the date of this Proclamation, and all coins coined at the branch Mint at Melbourne before the date of this Proclamation, which are current and a legal tender in any part of Our dominions at the date of this Proclamation, shall continue to be so current and a legal tender.

12. This Proclamation may be cited as the Melbourne Mint Proclamation, 1900.

13. This Proclamation shall come into force on the first day of December nineteen hundred unless it is sooner promulgated, and in that case on such promulgation.

Given at Our Court at *Balmoral*, this seventeenth day of *September*, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred, and in the sixty-fourth year of Our reign.

WHEREAS by the five hundred and eighty-second and five hundred and eighty-third sections of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by Bye-law made under Part X. of that Act, do all or any of the things specified in section 582; but that a Bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is submitted to Her Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Gloucester Pilotage Board being a pilotage authority within the meaning of the said Act, have made and submitted for the confirmation of Her Majesty certain new Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, in substitution for the Bye-laws hitherto in force:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed new Bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

And whereas the immediate operation of this Order is urgent:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and doth by this Order confirm the said Bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and to direct that the same shall come into force from the date of the publication of this Order in the London Gazette, and be *Provisional Rules* within the meaning of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893."

SCHEDULE.

Bye-laws for the Regulation of Pilots and Pilotage at the Port of Gloucester.

1. Subject to the provisions contained in the 24th section of "The Bristol Channel Pilotage

Act, 1861," no person shall be eligible, or shall be appointed to act as a pilot unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship for five years to a pilot of the district, and been at least one year in the coasting or over sea trade in square rigged sailing vessels or shall have been engaged as master in the coasting trade in the waters of the district for not less than five years; and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-three years or more than forty-five years of age.

2. Every candidate for apprenticeship before he can be considered eligible for the pilot service, shall produce satisfactory testimonials as to character, and a surgeon's certificate that he is of sound health; he shall prove to the satisfaction of the Board that he is not less than fourteen or more than eighteen years of age, and that he has passed Standard 6 required for the full time employment under "The Elementary Education Act." Having complied with these requirements, he may, after a month's probation, if approved by the Board, be apprenticed to a pilot for five years, and the indenture of apprenticeship, which shall be in a form approved by the Board, shall be signed by the pilot, the apprentice, and his guardian, and then be registered and kept at the pilotage office.

3. The pilot to whom any apprentice is serving shall endorse on the back of every indenture a statement of time lost by the apprentice, and of pecuniary losses which have been incurred by the pilot by reason of the negligence or want of attention of the apprentice, and such statement shall be signed by the pilot and apprentice on the respective dates when such losses shall be charged against the apprentice.

4. At the expiration of the five years' apprenticeship, the pilot and apprentice shall appear before the Board with the indenture, and the Board shall thereupon decide as to the amount of time and money (if any) to be made good by the apprentice before the indenture shall be given to him, and such decision shall be finally binding on all parties. Whenever an apprentice shall for the first time appear before the Examining Committee for examination for a licence to act as pilot, his indenture of apprenticeship and all papers which the Committee shall think necessary, shall be submitted to their inspection.

5. The Board shall have full power to enquire into the conduct of pilots towards their apprentices and *vice versa*, and to investigate all complaints made by pilots against their apprentices, and also by apprentices against pilots whether they may be the masters to such apprentices or not, and also into the general conduct of apprentices and pilots, and the Board shall have full power to make such orders, and to inflict fines and penalties in reference thereto. Also to withhold or cancel any licence or indenture.

6. The Board shall have full power to limit the number of pilots, and when a vacancy occurs in the number of pilots the first apprentice on the rota who is eligible for examination shall receive due notice to attend the Committee for examination. If such apprentice shall fail without reasonable cause to attend or shall fail in such examination he shall lose his first turn, and so on in rotation until all the apprentices so eligible have been dealt with, but should any apprentice fail in his examination he shall be allowed to take his turn when the next vacancy occurs until he has had three chances,

and after that the matter shall be left with the Board.

The clerk shall keep a list of all apprentices showing their respective service in the boats, with the names of the pilots to whom they are apprenticed together with a full record of their service with a note when each apprentice is out of his time, where he has subsequently been engaged and whether eligible for examination as pilot.

7. No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot in the district unless he shall have passed a creditable examination on the following subjects, viz.:

He must be able:—

- (1.) To read and write.
- (2.) To produce a Board of Trade Certificate as to colour-blindness.
- (3.) To give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the Channel.
- (4.) The rise, velocity and set of the tides.
- (5.) The depth and character of the soundings.
- (6.) The best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide.
- (7.) The sand banks, rocks, shoals and other dangers.
- (8.) The land marks, buoys, lights, their different bearings and distances.
- (9.) The appearance of the different headlands.
- (10.) The management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor—unmoor—to get under weigh and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

8. As well as the general power conferred upon the Commissioners to grant or suspend licenses the Pilotage Board shall also have power to grant the following licences to pilots:—

From the date of appointment and for 2½ years	{ A licence to pilot vessels not exceeding 300 tons register. A licence to pilot vessels not exceeding 500 tons register. A licence to pilot vessels not exceeding 1,000 tons register.
After 2½ years and up to 5 years	
After 5 years and up to 7 years	
After 7 years	{ A full licence.

The Board shall have full power to withhold or suspend any such licence if they should be of opinion that any pilot is not fully entitled to receive the same.

9. No junior pilot shall take charge of a ship going to sea above the tonnage for which he is licensed unless a senior pilot cannot be obtained, notwithstanding that such junior pilot may have brought the ship into port, and no pilot shall take charge of any ship above the tonnage for which he is licensed unless a senior pilot cannot be obtained, and if no senior pilot can be obtained and a junior pilot has taken charge of any such vessel he may be superseded by a senior pilot between Kingroad and Lundy unless the master of such vessel shall desire to retain his services. But no junior pilot is on any account to take charge of vessels above 500 tons between Kingroad and Sharpness and *vice versa*, if the services of a senior pilot can be obtained.

10. The pilots must keep log-sheets showing how, when, and where employed, and copies of the same shall be made out by the respective pilots, and handed in once a month to the pilot-master not later than the 12th day in the succeeding month.

11. The Board may require each pilot to provide himself with a good and efficient boat, which shall be approved and registered by the Board; and such boat shall be kept in good repair and fully equipped to the satisfaction of the Board and subject to periodical examinations by the Board. The Board may permit more than one pilot, but not more than three, to sail in the same boat upon such terms as the Board may order. But such permission may at any time be withdrawn at the discretion of the Board. No pilot shall be entitled to pursue his avocation as a pilot without the sanction of the Board first obtained unless he complies with the provisions of this Bye-law, and any pilot acting in contravention hereof shall be subject to his licence being suspended or revoked and to a penalty not exceeding £5 at the discretion of the Board.

There shall be one indentured apprentice to each boat.

12. Every licensed pilot who may be engaged, employed or signalled by any vessel or the master thereof to pilot vessels to or from the Port of Gloucester shall be paid the pilotage rates according to the registered tonnage of the vessel and to the schedule hereto.

13. In lieu of the rates charged in the Schedule to the said Bye-laws, and referred to in Bye-law No. 12, the following reduced rates shall be paid from Kingroad to Sharpness or Lydney for all vessels coming light to Sharpness or Lydney *bonâ fide* for coal, and for all such vessels laden with coal from Sharpness or Lydney to Kingroad, subject to a reduction of one-fifth in the case of vessels towed or propelled by steam.

14. All vessels piloted to Chepstow or to Lydney shall pay the same pilotage rates as to Sharpness and vice versa.

Vessels piloted from Sharpness to Lydney or from Lydney to Sharpness, and then to Kingroad, shall pay the same rates as between Sharpness and Kingroad.

Vessels piloted to or from any place in the River Severn above Sharpness shall pay one-fourth more than the rates between Sharpness and Kingroad.

15. Vessels piloted from Sharpness to Lydney or vice versa and then to Kingroad, shall pay the same rates as between Sharpness and Kingroad, and the proportion of such pilotage shall be one-third as between Sharpness and Lydney, and two-thirds as between Lydney and Kingroad.

16. All vessels bound to Lydney or Sharpness or to any place in the River Severn above

Sharpness requiring and having the service of a pilot shall also employ on board as assistants to the pilots from Kingroad, the following number of men, at the under-mentioned charge; except in the case of vessels going to Northwick to lighten when the charge shall be 7s. 6d. per man as between Kingroad and Northwick and 7s. 6d. per man as between Northwick and Sharpness.

For Sailing Vessels.

300 tons and under 500 tons	1 man at 7s. 6d. for the first tide and 2s. 6d. for every other tide the vessel moves.
500 tons and under 800 tons	2 ditto ditto.
800 tons and upwards	3 ditto ditto.

Steam Vessels.

The third man to be employed only under exceptional circumstances.

17. For the purposes of the schedule the pilotage rates are assessed for steam vessels and sailing vessels towed by steam power between Kingroad and Sharpness, and vice versa; but if any of the vessels are not towed or propelled by steam then the pilotage rate between Kingroad and Sharpness, and vice versa, shall be one-fourth more.

18. Pilots taken on board of any vessel inward bound to the westward of Ilfracombe shall be paid the same pilotage rates as from Lundy Island; if between the Nash Point and Ilfracombe, the same rates as from the Nash Point; if between the Nash Point and the Holmes the same rates as from the Nash Point; and if between the Holmes and Kingroad, the same rates as from the Holmes.

19. Pilots discharged from any vessel on the outward voyage between any of the stages mentioned in the above scale of rates, shall be paid the same pilotage rates as if they had been taken to the next stage beyond the place where they were discharged.

20. Any pilot who may be required to remain on board any vessel for the convenience of the master, owner, or agent of the vessel after he shall have discharged the duties for which he was engaged, shall be paid 10s. a day for every day or part of a day he may be employed; and any pilot who shall be required to move any vessel in a dock, roadstead, harbour or river, or be employed to pilot any vessel for adjusting compasses or any other purpose, for every tide or part of a tide so employed, shall be paid for such vessel as under, and the same shall be added to the pilotage rates and be recoverable as such under the powers contained in sec. 591 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894.

21. Any pilot who shall be detained in any roadstead by want of water, stress of weather, accident, or at the request of the master, owner, or agents of any vessel either homeward bound or outward bound shall be paid 10s. a day or part of a day for each day's or part of a day's detention in addition to the pilotage rates. And in case any vessel shall be compelled to bear up from stress of weather or accident, the pilot in charge shall be entitled to and shall be

paid one-third of the pilotage charge in addition according to the distance such vessel may have reached before she shall have put back.

22. Every master, owner or agent of any vessel employing a pilot shall in addition to the foregoing charges pay a clerk or collector's fees as follows:—

23. The pilotage rates shall be collected by a person duly appointed by the Board, who shall, after a poundage of 1s. in the £ has been deducted therefrom, pay the same to the pilots entitled to receive them; and if any pilot shall receive any pilotage money he shall within 24 hours after his return from a cruise duly report himself to the Board's agent at Sharpness, and shall account for such monies to the said Agent and the pilots shall make a monthly return to the agent of the Board of the pilotage monies earned by them respectively, whether in respect of vessels bound to Sharpness or any other port not later than the 12th of the following month, the agent paying in such monies so received to the treasurer of the Board and making a return to the Board not later than the 20th of such following month. Such returns of pilots shall contain the name and tonnage of the vessels piloted, where belonging, where from, and whither bound, the cargo and the distance piloted, and the Board shall retain such poundage.

And if any pilot shall receive any pilotage monies without duly accounting for the same or paying the poundage thereon he shall be liable to be dealt with summarily, and his licence forfeited in the discretion of the Board. The pilots shall also state in such returns all cases where vessels bound to or from Gloucester have been piloted over any, and what portion, of the district by a pilot not licensed for the port, and also a list of all vessels piloted by them to or from other ports, and pay the poundage thereon to the agent of the Board. Pilots making a false return shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding £5 for the first offence, and the suspension or loss of his licence for any subsequent offence or such other punishment as the Pilotage Board may think necessary.

24. Each pilot's boat shall be painted black or tarred on the outside, shall have the number of the pilot's licence painted in white on each bow, and the name of the pilot or pilots as well as her own name and the name of the port to which she belongs, painted on her stern in white letters at least one inch broad and three inches long, and shall also have the letters G.S. marked in black paint, of not less than three feet in length on her mainsail, and shall by day carry at her masthead a flag of not less than four feet by three feet of two colours, the upper horizontal half white and the lower part red; and at night each pilot's boat shall carry a white light only at the masthead, and shall exhibit a flare up light or flare up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed 15 minutes, and such lights as are prescribed by the Board of Trade regulations for the prevention of collisions at sea applicable to pilot boats.

Every pilot shall, immediately on boarding any vessel and taking charge thereof, cause to be hoisted a similar flag to the one described, in some conspicuous place, and keep the same

flying during the time he so remains in charge. In case of default in any of the above requirements the pilot to be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every breach thereof.

25. Whenever any qualified pilot is carried off in a boat or ship not in the pilotage service he shall exhibit a flag of the above description, in order to show that such boat or ship has a qualified pilot on board, and if he fails to do so without any reasonable excuse he shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

26. Any pilot who shall refuse or neglect or wilfully delays to proceed to sea when ordered by the pilot-master or other person duly appointed by the Board unless prevented by illness or unavoidable circumstances or who shall be guilty of drunkenness or of insolent and unwarrantable conduct towards the pilot-master or his agent or the Board or any master owner or agent of any vessel for which he may be engaged, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds or the loss of his licence.

27. Any pilot who may absent himself from duty without the written consent of the Board or the pilot-master or Board's agent, or go overland to take charge of any vessel or seek employment otherwise than in his own boat without such written consent as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for the first offence and for the second or any subsequent offence to a like penalty or the suspension or revocation of his licence at the discretion of the Board and no pilot shall be absent from duty more than seven days at a time under a like penalty, unless from unavoidable circumstances to the satisfaction of the Board.

28. Any pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound (except to a port to which he is not licensed) shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the dock, basin or harbour of the port; but if in charge of a vessel bound to a port to which he is not licensed, he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is securely anchored in the nearest roadstead to the port to which she is bound, and if outward bound to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or the loss of his licence.

29. Every master, owner or agent of a vessel navigating within the limits of this pilotage district who shall knowingly employ or continue to employ an unqualified pilot after a qualified pilot has offered to take charge of the vessel or has made a signal for that purpose shall for every case incur a penalty of double the amount of the pilotage demandable for the piloting of the vessel to her port of destination or the limits of the pilotage district (see Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, section 598, part 1; which should be adopted in lieu of this Bye-law).

30. If any vessel whilst in charge of a pilot does or receives damage the pilot shall immediately report the same to the Board's agent at Sharpness who shall at once report the same to the Clerk of the Board who shall submit the same to the Board at their next or any special meeting that may be called. The circumstances of the accident shall be investigated by the Board if deemed necessary, and the Board may fine the pilot or suspend or revoke his licence or deal with the same in such a way as they may deem best.

31. The pilots shall make a survey of the

River Severn between Kingroad and Sharpness at low water, once a month at least, and shall report from time to time to the Board any changes which may have taken place in the navigable Channel.

32. Every pilot shall strictly conform to the directions of the harbour or dock master touching the bringing into port or going out of port, the mooring or unmooring, placing or removing any ship or vessel which such pilot may have under his charge.

Any pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding £10 or to the suspension or revoking of his licence or to such other punishment as the Board may think fit.

33. Any pilot taking charge of a vessel not bound to the port to which he is licensed shall be paid the rates and be governed by the laws established at the port to which the vessel is bound.

34. The fee on granting a licence shall be £2 2s. 0d. for a Gloucester pilot and £1 1s. 0d. for a Lydney pilot, and the licences of pilots shall be renewed at the discretion of the Board annually in the first or second week in January in each year on a fee for a Gloucester licence of £1 1s. 0d. and for a Lydney licence of 10s. 6d.

35. In cases of dispute between masters of vessels and pilots, the decision of the Board shall be final.

36 and 37. Each pilot shall be furnished with, and keep in his possession, a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations, and he shall produce the same to the master of any vessel or other person employing him when required to do so, under a penalty, in case of default, of not exceeding £5.

38. The pilot who shall first speak to the westward whether within the limits of his licence or not from his own boat, and shall give his name or number or the number of his boat to any vessel then bound to any port in the Bristol Channel and ultimately bound to the port of Gloucester, shall be entitled to such vessel (whether the captain or master may be on board or not) but such pilot must be ready to take charge of such vessel in time to bring her to dock or he will forfeit his claim, and the next pilot who has spoken her shall be entitled to her inwards as well as outwards.

39. Any pilot speaking to a vessel in manner set out in the last Bye-law, bound to any roadstead for orders shall follow her up, and remain in attendance until such vessel receives her orders, otherwise he forfeits his claim to such vessel.

40. The pilot who shall first speak from his own boat, and shall give his name or number, or the number on his boat to any vessel to the westward, whether within the limits of his licence or not, bound to the Port of Gloucester and such vessel will not stop to take him on board, he shall be entitled to pilot that vessel provided he arrives at Kingroad in time to take her to dock, notwithstanding the master may have taken another pilot on board; but in all cases he shall be entitled to pilot her outwards, provided he reports his claim to the Board's agent at Sharpness from Portishead or at Sharpness.

41. Should he so speak a vessel so far away that it would be impossible for him to be up with his boat at Kingroad in time to dock her, he shall be at liberty to follow the vessel up in any manner he chooses, and immediately upon arriving at Sharpness if he shall report himself

to the agent for the Board he shall be entitled to her outwards.

42. If such pilot is so following a vessel in accordance with the previous Bye-laws, and should board any other vessel for the purpose of piloting her, he shall not be entitled to the vessel he has first spoken; but if such second named vessel should have signalled for a pilot, and he has by virtue of such signal taken charge of her, he shall give her up to the first pilot that speaks him, and in such a case he shall be entitled to the first vessel he spoke to upon complying (as to reporting himself) with Bye-law 40.

43. The pilot who brings a vessel into dock shall as a rule be entitled to take her out, but in all cases where pilots have more outward bound vessels than they can attend to they shall have the privilege of arranging with pilots for taking the same out, unless such pilots or his or their partners, is or are to the westward seeking.

Should the pilot who has brought a vessel into Kingroad be absent to the westward seeking when such vessel is ordered to dock, the pilot who docks her shall be entitled to her in and out.

44. Pilot boats leaving Sharpness to go seeking shall not under any circumstances be towed further than Kingroad, and shall not be towed past another pilot boat going seeking. No pilot shall have his boat towed by a vessel further than the distance for which he shall have been engaged to pilot such vessel, nor shall he join his boat outside the limits of his licence for the purpose of going seeking.

45. If any master or agent of any vessel outward bound from Sharpness should decline to take out the pilot who brought the vessel in and shall make an application to the Board's agent for another pilot he shall give such agent the vessel's draft and registered tonnage with such other information as may be required, and upon payment of the pilotage fees, the Board's agent shall appoint a pilot, preference being given to the partners of such pilot ready to take charge.

46. Any pilot missing his boat when down Channel may get back the best way he can, but he shall not speak any vessel to be employed as a pilot, and he shall not board any vessel for the purpose of piloting her unless such vessel has hoisted the signal flag for a pilot within the limits of his licence.

47. Any pilot who may be found guilty by the Board of having taken charge of any vessel in violation of any of the Bye-laws of the Board shall forfeit his claim to any pilotage claimed by him for such vessel, and the same shall be dealt with by the Board in such manner as they may deem best.

48. All fines inflicted by the Board (after all expenses connected with any enquiry in respect of the same by the Board have been paid thereout) shall be applied to the Pilotage Fund, or to such other purpose as the Board in their absolute discretion shall determine.

49. All disputed claims between pilots shall be settled by the Board, whose decision shall be final.

50. Although a scheme of pension has been generally adopted, yet the Board shall have full power to alter, amend, or vary the same, and deal generally with all applications made by pilots for pensions.

51. The preceding Bye-laws shall commence and take effect from the date of the publication

in the London Gazette of the Order of Her Majesty in Council confirming the same from which date all Bye-laws previously made by the Gloucester Pilotage Board for the government of pilots in the Gloucester Pilotage District, shall be repealed and cease to be in force.

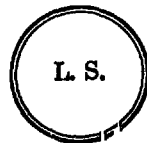

WILTSHIRE AND SOMERSETSHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1900 (No. 2).

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Modification of former Order.

1. The Wiltshire and Somersetshire (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1900 is hereby modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement into, out of, or within Infected Place or Area.

2. Nothing in this Order shall authorize the movement of any animal into or out of or along over or across a highway or thoroughfare within a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Area, or the movement of any animal in such Place or Area.

Movement of Swine into Scheduled District for Slaughter at a Bacon Factory.

3. Subject to Article 2 of this Order swine may be moved from any place outside the Scheduled District to a bacon factory in such district, if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of the place in which such bacon factory is situate, and subject to the following conditions, namely :—

- (i.) The Licence shall be obtained before the swine are moved into the Scheduled District ;
- (ii.) The swine shall be moved by railway, and without being untrucked within the District, to such railway station as is specified in the Licence ;
- (iii.) The swine shall be moved from such railway station, by the nearest available

route, and without unnecessary delay, to the bacon factory specified in the Licence, in a van or float and not otherwise; and

- (iv.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom it is granted, the number of swine that may be moved thereunder, and the name or description of the railway station in the Scheduled District and of the bacon factory to which the animals are to be moved.

Movement of Animals into the City of Bath for Slaughter.

4. Subject to Article 2 of this Order an animal may be moved by railway from any place outside the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within the city of Bath, if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that city, subject to the same conditions as are prescribed by the preceding Article in relation to swine moved to a bacon factory, except that cattle need not be moved from the railway station in a van or float.

Movement within Scheduled District of Animals across a highway between different parts of a Farm in the same occupation without Licence. 1

5. Subject to Article 2 of this Order an animal may be moved by the nearest available route along or across a highway or thoroughfare in the Scheduled District from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm being in the same occupation, provided that the animal to be moved is not affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and that the movement of such animal is not prohibited by notice of an Inspector of a Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Saving for Regulations of Local Authority.

6. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals, but nothing in any such Regulation shall permit the movement of animals in contravention of any Order of the Board.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

7.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

(3.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Interpretation.

8. In this Order —

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture;
 “Bacon factory” means premises in which the business of a curer of bacon is carried on;
 “Slaughter-house” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered:

No. 27231.

C

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

9. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-fourth day of September, one thousand nine hundred.

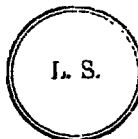

Woods Harbour—Light Established.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has given notice, that on 1st September, 1900, a light would be established on Big Ledge, Woods Harbour.

Woods Harbour Light is a dioptric red fixed light of the 7th order, elevated 27 feet above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 8 miles.

The lighthouse is a square wooden building with sloping sides, 28 feet high, painted white, with red lantern; it stands on a concrete pier on the highest part of the ledge, which is covered at high water.

Tramways Act, 1870 (33 and 34 Victoria, cap. 78).

Tramway Bye-Laws and Regulations.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Carlisle, acting by the Council as the Local Authority under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, and the Carlisle Tramways Order, 1898, confirmed by the Tramways Orders Confirmation (No. 3) Act, 1898, have resolved that the following Bye-laws and Regulations be made by them with respect to the said tramways, pursuant to and under the powers and provisions of the said Act and Orders:—

1. For the purpose of these Bye-laws and Regulations the term "car" shall mean any carriage using any tramway laid down within the city of Carlisle, and the terms "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the driver and conductor or other person having charge of a car, and the term "person" shall include any body of persons, whether corporate or unincorporate.

2. The driver of every car shall cause the same to be driven at a speed of not less than four miles an hour on the average, and not exceeding eight miles an hour.

3. The driver of every car shall so drive the same that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than 100 yards.

4. Subject to the requirements of Bye-laws Nos. 3 and 5, every driver or conductor of a car shall stop the same, except on a gradient steeper than 1 in 25, for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers in the course of its journey, when required so to do by any passenger desiring to leave the car, or by any person desirous of travelling by the car, for whom there is room, and to whose admission no valid objection can be made.

5. Except at a passing place or a terminus no car shall be stopped at the intersection or junction of two or more streets or roads.

6. Every driver of a car, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road without there being sufficient free space for

the car to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable despatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the car.

7. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

8. No person shall smoke in the inside or on the conductor's platform of any tramway carriage.

9. No driver or conductor shall, by loitering or stopping, needlessly or otherwise impede the ordinary traffic of the street in which any tramway is laid. If at any time a block occurs in the ordinary traffic in any street, any tram car in such street shall either stop running or move in such direction as may be necessary to relieve such block in the traffic.

10. Every driver, conductor, or other person offending against any of these bye-laws and regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, and not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues.

11. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of December, 1900.
