WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-

five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July in the year one thousand nine hundred in the words following; that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John Whorlton situate within the limits of the parish of Newburn in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Newburn, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Saviour Sugley in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish respectively.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Newburn and of the new parish of the Holy Saviour Sugley aforesaid should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John Whorlton situate as aforesaid.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edgar Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See, of the vicarage of the said new parish of the Holy Saviour Sugley and with the consent of Thomas Spencer of Ryton in the county of Durham Esquire as the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Newburn (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Newburn and of the said new parish of the Holy Saviour Sugley which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the

boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John Whorlton situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Whorlton.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John Whorlton comprising:—

"All those two contiguous portions of the parish of Newburn and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Saviour Sugley, both in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle which taken together are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the parish of Heddon-on-the-Wall in the said county and diocese from the parish of Newburn aforesaid at a point in the middle of Dewley Burn, distant three chains or thereabouts to the east of the point where the said burn is crossed by the footpath leading from the house called Heddon Birks to the house called Black Row, and extending thence, that is, from the said parish boundary first generally eastward then southward and then south-westward along the middle of the said burn for a distance of one mile and twenty chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the place where the road leading from Dewley towards St. John's Church Whorlton, leaves the south-eastern side of the said burn, and extending thence first southward to and then eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of sixty-four chains or thereabouts (thereby passing the houses called Cutend and Fell House respectively) to the point near the last-named house where the said road is joined by the road leading to Wallbottle and extending thence first southward then westward and then again southward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of sixty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction, at or near to the site of the Roman Wall, with the high road leading from Carlisle to Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and extending thence due eastward and in a direct line for a distance of one mile and thirty-four chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the disused Wallbottle Quarry, and the boundary which divides the said parish of Newburn from the new parish of the Holy Saviour Sugley aforesaid) to a point in the middle of the footpath which leads from the house called Red Cow to the house called Hotch Pudding and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath which leads to the cottages called Slatyford, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named footpath for a distance of sixty chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Saviour Sugley from the new parish of Saint Nicholas Gosforth in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction near Black House with the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Nicholas Gosforth from the parish of Newburn aforesaid and extending thence generally northward along the last-mentioned boundary to the point where it crosses

the middle of the high road leading from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to Ponteland which point is situate nearly opposite to the south lodge of Woolsington Park, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned high road for a distance of one mile and seven chains or thereabouts to the point just beyond the west lodge of Woolsington Park aforesaid where the middle of the said high road is intersected by the boundary which divides the parish of Ponteland, in the county and diocese aforesaid from the parish of Newburn aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward and then generally westward and south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary, to the point at the south-western corner of the plantation on the western side of Callerton Common where the said boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Newburn from the parish of Heddon-on-the-Wall aforesaid and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned boundary to the firstly hereinbefore-mentioned point where such boundary strikes the middle of Dewley Burn at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty chapter eighty-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Mary Southampton in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester between that benefice and a certain other benefice namely the benefice (being a district) of Saint Barnabas Southampton in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"Whereas the whole advowsons of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton and of the said benefice of Saint Barnabas Southampton are vested in the Right Reverend Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and in his successors Bishops of the same diocese.

"And whereas the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester has represented to us and we are of opinion that it is desirable that

additional provision should be made for the cure of souls attached to the said benefice of Saint Barnabas Southampton by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton is now full of a Clerk and the Rector or Incumbent thereof the Reverend William Durst Clerk in Holy Orders an Honorary Canon of the Cathedral Church of Winchester is willing that the said apportionment shall be made accordingly and has executed this scheme in token of such his willingness.

"And whereas after allowing for the transfer of certain portions of the endowments of the said rectory of Saint Mary Southampton which were sanctioned and authorized to be made under the provisions of an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the eighth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six and published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of the same month and of another Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven and published in the London Gazette on the second day of March in the same year and of another Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the ninth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight and published in the London Gazette on the twelfth day of the same month we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners hold in trust for the same benefice of Saint Mary Southampton and as part of the endowments thereof a sum of ten thousand and thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence sterling being a portion of the proceeds of the sale of certain portions of the rectorial estates which formerly belonged to the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Archbishop of Canterbury the Archbishop of the Province within which the said diocese of Winchester and each of the aforesaid benefices are situate (in testimony whereof the said Frederick Archbishop of Canterbury has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal seal) and with the consent of the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester acting as such Bishop and also as patron in right of his See of each of the aforesaid benefices (in testimony whereof the said Randall Thomas Bishop of Winchester has signed this scheme and sealed it with his Episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said William Durst as the rector or incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton (in testimony whereof he the said William Durst has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette a sum of five hundred pounds sterling out of the said sum of ten thousand and thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence sterling which at present forms part of the endowments of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton shall be transferred from the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton to the said benefice of Saint Barnabas Southampton, such sum of five hundred pounds to be held and applied by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England for the benefit of the minister for the

time being of the said district of Saint Barnabas Southampton and when such district shall have become a new parish then for the benefit of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of such new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the parish of Lewisham partly out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill and partly out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint George Perry Hill all in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Lewisham and of the said new parishes of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill and of Saint George Perry Hill which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas we are satisfied that the hereinbefore mentioned parish and both of the hereinbefore mentioned new parishes are cures wherein or in part whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof.

"And whereas by an indenture dated the twelfth day of July in the year one thousand nine hundred and made or expressed to be made under the provisions of the New Parishes Acts 1843, 1844 and 1856 or some or one of them between

the Reverend Samuel Bickersteth vicar of the vicarage and parish church of Lewisham aforesaid of the first part the Right Honourable William Heneage Earl of Dartmouth the patron of the said vicarage of Lewisham of the second part the Right Reverend Father in God Edward Stuart Lord Bishop of Rochester of the third part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fourth part (which said indenture is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice) the said Samuel Bickersteth in exercise of all powers him enabling in that behalf and with the consent of the said William Heneage Earl of Dartmouth as such patron as aforesaid and of the said Edward Stuart Lord Bishop of Rochester as the ordinary of the vicarage of Lewisham aforesaid did grant and confirm unto the minister (so soon as a minister shall have been licensed) of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted (intended as is mentioned in the said indenture to be named 'The District of Saint Hilda Crofton Park') and to his successors and when such district shall have become a new parish then to the vicar or incumbent of such new parish and to his successors a clear yearly rent-charge of one hundred and fifty pounds payable half yearly on the fifth day of April and the fifth day of October in every year free of all deductions (except on account of the tax on income or property if any) and to be for ever issuing from and charged upon a certain sum (in the said indenture more particularly described) of seven thousand eight hundred and twenty-six pounds sixteen shillings and seven pence standing in the books of the Governors of the County of Queen Anne to the credit of the said vicarage of Lewisham.

"And whereas the said rent charge or sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum has been so granted and confirmed as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Stuart Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Lewisham and of the said new parishes of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill and of Saint George Perry Hill which are described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Hilda Crofton Park.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and of the nomination of the minister thereto and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the

London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Samuel Bickersteth as such vicar of Lewisham aforesaid and his successors vicars for the time being of the vicarage of Lewisham aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Hilda Crofton Park comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Lewisham in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester which is bounded upon the south partly by the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint George Perry Hill and partly by the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the north-west partly by the new parish of Saint Augustine Honor Oak Park Forest Hill and partly by the new parish of Saint Catherine Hatcham both situate partly in the said county of Kent and partly in the county of Surrey, and wholly in the said diocese of Rochester and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Catherine Hatcham from the parish of Lewisham aforesaid, at the centre of the bridge which carries Dalrymple-road over the main line of the London Brighton and South Coast Railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the Nunhead and Shortlands line of the London Chatham and Dover Railway) to the junction of the said road with Beecroft-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of ten and a quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Brockley-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-six yards or thereabouts to the point directly opposite to the north-western end of the wall forming the south-western boundary of the Deptford Cemetery and extending thence south-eastward to and along the said wall for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to its south-eastern end upon the north-western side of Brockley-lane, and extending thence first south-eastward to and then south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such lane over the last-mentioned line of railway and extending thence first south-eastward and then southward along the middle of the said last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Lewisham from the new parish of Saint George Perry Hill aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill which is bounded upon the north-east and upon the north-west by the above-described portion of the parish of Lewisham aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Lewisham from the new parish of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill aforesaid, in the middle of the eastern end of the bridge which carries the road called Honor

Oak Park over the said main line of the London Brighton and South Coast Railway and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of eighteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Brockley-road aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of two and three-quarters chains or thereabouts to its junction with an intended new road to be called Crofton Park-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said intended new road for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the old footpath leading from Brockley-road aforesaid to Blythe Hill upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill from the parish of Lewisham aforesaid.

"III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint George Perry Hill which is bounded upon the north-east and upon the north-west by the above described portion of the parish of Lewisham aforesaid, and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundaries of the said parish of Lewisham the said new parish of Saint Saviour Brockley Hill and the said new parish of Saint George Perry Hill all meet at the junction of the said old footpath with the road called Codrington Hill and with the old footpath leading to Brockley-lane aforesaid and extending thence north eastward and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts to the point where the footpath leading from Brockley-lane aforesaid towards Catford Bridge enters the Ladywell Recreation Ground upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George Perry Hill from the parish of Lewisham aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the three cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Hope under Dinmore aforesaid by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Bodenham which is hereinafter recommended and proposed."

"And whereas the said benefice of Bodenham is now full and the vicar or incumbent thereof the Reverend Henry Douglas Noel Paterson, Clerk in Holy Orders is willing that the said apportionment shall be made accordingly and has executed this scheme in token of such his willingness."

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of the said diocese of Hereford as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said John Hungerford Arkwright as the patron of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid and with the consent of the said Henry Douglas Noel Paterson as vicar or incumbent of the said benefice of Bodenham as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said John Hungerford Arkwright and Henry Douglas Noel Paterson have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order all the glebe lands and other endowments which belong or which may thereafter belong to the said benefice of Bodenham shall be charged and be for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Hope under Dinmore with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, a clear annual sum or yearly charge of fifty pounds, the same annual sum or yearly charge of fifty pounds to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the same benefice of Hope under Dinmore and the same annual sum or yearly charge of fifty pounds to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the

benefice of Bodenham or his representatives on the one hand and his successors in the same incumbency on the other hand; and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half yearly payments on the second day of February and the second day of August in every year.

"Provided always that if at any time the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Bodenham shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any Statute in that behalf enabling him grant convey and annex to the said benefice of Hope under Dinmore any part or parts of the vicarial endowments belonging to the said benefice of Bodenham which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Hereford for the time being and of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England be a just and fair equivalent or not less than an equivalent for the said yearly charge of fifty pounds hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid then the same annual sum or yearly charge of fifty pounds shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and determine and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

Majesty in Council bearing date the twelfth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and published in the London Gazette upon the fifteenth day of the same month certain contiguous portions of the parish or parochial chapelry of Ystradyfodwg and of the parish or parochial chapelry of Llanwonno both in the said county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity situate at Tylorstown within the limits of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Ystradyfodwg and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale.'

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Ann Ynys-hir shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Ann Ynys-hir which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dis severed from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint Ann Ynys-hir in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff and to be annexed to the new parish of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale in the same county and diocese being t—

WESLEYAN CHAPEL (SUNFIELD).—Forthwith and entirely in the Wesleyan Chapel (Sunfield), in the parish of Farsley, in the county of York ; and also in the chapelyard, except as follows :—

(b.) In earthen graves now existing burials may be allowed, at their decease, of the relations of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

WEEDON BECK, NORTHAMPTONSHIRE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Congregational Chapel, Weedon Beck, in the county of Northampton ; and also in the chapelyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In wholly walled graves now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In earthen graves now existing burials may be allowed, at their decease, of the widows and widowers of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

SCOTTOW, NORFOLK.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Scottow, in the county of Norfolk ; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In vaults and wholly walled graves now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In earthen graves now existing burials may be allowed, at their decease, of the relations of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

(c.) In reserved grave spaces which have never before been buried in, and which when opened are free from water, burials may be allowed, at their decease, of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

PELYNT, CORNWALL.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Pelynt, in the county

of Cornwall; and also in the old part of the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In wholly walled graves now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In reserved grave spaces on the north side of the church burials may be allowed, at their decease, of the widows and widowers of persons already interred in the old part of the churchyard, and also of other parishioners who had attained the age of sixty years on the twenty-second of June last provided that no grave less than five feet in depth is made.

And whereas application for the appointment of the Commissioner aforesaid was duly made by the Corporation on the seventh day of August 1900.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department did on the fourteenth day of August, 1900 duly appoint Chester Jones Esquire, Barrister at Law, to be such Commissioner for the purposes of the said Act.

Now I the said Chester Jones do hereby in pursuance of the said appointment make the following Scheme for determining the Boundaries and Names of the said several Wards and I determine that the Boundaries and names of the said several Wards shall be as follows:—

"Number 1 or Rougemont Ward.

"I determine that Number 5 or Trinity Ward shall consist of so much of the Parish of Exeter as is bounded by a line commencing in the centre of South-street where a line drawn along the centre of Coombe-street cuts South-street thence in a south-easterly direction along the centre of South-street Holloway-street and Topsham-road to the point in Topsham-road opposite Matford-lane where the boundary of the Parish of Exeter joins the Topsham-road thence in a south-easterly, southerly and north-westerly direction along the said boundary to the point where the said boundary is cut by the southern boundary of Saint Paul's Ward in the centre of Exe Bridge thence in an easterly direction along the boundary of Saint Paul's Ward to the point in the centre of New Bridge-street where the boundary of Saint Paul's Ward is cut by the boundary of Saint John's Ward thence in a south-easterly, north-easterly, south-easterly and north-easterly direction following the boundary of Saint John's Ward to the point of commencement of this Ward and I determine that the name of this Ward is Trinity Ward.

"I determine that number 12 or Saint Thomas's Ward shall consist of so much of the parish of Saint Thomas as is bounded by a line commencing at a point in the centre of Cowick-street where a line drawn along the centre of Buller-road cuts the said street thence proceeding in a north-westerly direction along the centre of Buller-road to a point in the centre of the said road opposite the centre of Cleveland-street thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of Cleveland-street to a point in the centre of Albion-street opposite Cleveland-street thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of Albion-street to the footway leading into Okehampton-road thence along the centre of the said footway to a point in the centre of

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officer and Non-Commissioned Officer, whose claims have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, for their conspicuous bravery in South Africa, 1900, as stated against their names:—

Regiment.	Name.	Act of Courage for which recommended.
Gordon Highlanders	Captain William Engleson Gordon	<p>On the 11th July, 1900, during the action near Leehoe-hoek (or Doornbosch Fontein), near Krugersdorp, a party of men, accompanied by Captains Younger* and Allan, having succeeded in dragging an artillery waggon under cover when its horses were unable to do so by reason of the heavy and accurate fire of the enemy, Captain Gordon called for volunteers to go out with him to try to bring in one of the guns.</p> <p>He went out alone to the nearest gun under a heavy fire, and with the greatest coolness fastened a drag-rope to the gun and then beckoned to the men, who immediately doubled out to join him in accordance with his previous instructions.</p> <p>While moving the gun, Captain Younger and three men were hit. Seeing that further attempts would only result in further casualties, Captain Gordon ordered the remainder of the party under cover of the kopje again, and, having seen the wounded safely away, himself retired. Captain Gordon's conduct, under a particularly heavy and most accurate fire at only 850 yards range, was most admirable, and his manner of handling his men most masterly; his devotion on every occasion that his Battalion has been under fire has been remarkable.</p>
2nd Battalion the King's Own (Yorkshire Light Infantry)	Private C. Ward ...	<p>On the 26th June, 1900, at Lindley, a picquet of the Yorkshire Light Infantry was surrounded on three sides by about 400 Boers, at close quarters. The two Officers were wounded and all but six of their men were killed or wounded. Private Ward then volunteered to take a message asking for reinforcements to the Signalling Station about 150 yards in the rear of the post. His offer was at first refused owing to the practical certainty of his being shot; but, on his insisting, he was allowed to go. He got across untouched through a storm of shots from each flank, and, having delivered his message, he voluntarily returned from a place of absolute safety, and recrossed the fire-swept ground to assure his Commanding Officer that the message had been sent.</p> <p>On this occasion he was severely wounded. But for this gallant action the post would certainly have been captured.</p>
Highland Light Infantry	Corporal J. Shaul ...	<p>On the 11th December, 1899, during the Battle of Magersfontein, Corporal Shaul was observed (not only by the Officers of his own Battalion but by several Officers of other regiments) to perform several specific acts of bravery. Corporal Shaul was in charge of stretcher-bearers; but at one period of the battle he was seen encouraging men to advance across the open.</p> <p>He was most conspicuous during the day in dressing men's wounds, and in one case he came, under a heavy fire, to a man who was lying wounded in the back, and, with the utmost coolness and deliberation, sat down beside the wounded man and proceeded to dress his wound. Having done this, he got up and went quietly to another part of the field. This act of gallantry was performed under a continuous and heavy fire as coolly and quietly as if there had been no enemy near.</p>

I. Ne seront pas reçus dans les ports du Maroc à l'exception de Tanger les bâtiments ayant à leur bord des passagers musulmans qui ne pourront pas ou bien prouver par certificats de l'autorité compétente et à la satisfaction du Conseil Sanitaire qu'ils viennent de faire un séjour de deux mois dans un pays non infecté ou qu'ils ont été soumis à une quarantaine ainsi qu'à la désinfection de leurs personnes et de leurs bagages dans un port ou lazaret européen.

II. Les passagers pèlerins ayant rempli ces conditions ne seront reçus au Maroc qu'au port de Tanger et après que leurs bagages auront été désinfectés par les moyens limités dont dispose le Conseil.

III. Si un bâtiment arrive à Tanger ayant à son bord des passagers musulmans qui ne sont pas munis de certificats en règle, il ne sera admis en rade qu'après une inspection médicale à la suite de laquelle le Président statuera sur le traitement qui lui sera accordé.

Pour les arabes qui se rendront de Tanger à Gibraltar, Algeciras et Cadix, le Délégué Sanitaire à Tanger délivrera, ainsi qu'il est établi à l'Art. IV du Règlement du 17 Septembre 1896, un billet personnel et valable seulement pour le voyage d'aller et retour; ce billet devra être rendu au Délégué Sanitaire à Tanger par l'arabe à son retour.

No person shall leave such vessels while undergoing quarantine, or have any communication with the shore, or with any vessel or vessels which may have been granted free pratique, nor may any person, except the visiting officer, go on board such vessels while undergoing quarantine, under a penalty of £100 or three months' imprisonment.

(Translation.)

In consequence of Glasgow having been proclaimed as visited by the plague, all vessels which have come from Glasgow, or which have stopped there on their passage, must in Netherlands India, remain without communication with the shore or with other vessels, until ten days have passed from the date of leaving Glasgow, or if the plague has appeared on board, until ten days after the last case of illness had terminated.

Further, in Netherlands India is temporarily forbidden the importation of carpets and second-hand embroideries, unless these are conveyed as luggage or in consequence of change of residence; of rage, unworked wool, hair, second-hand bags, brushes and human hair, untanned hides (including those that are salted or prepared with arsenicum), animal refuse, horses' manes and hoofs of horses and cattle which come from Glasgow or have been transhipped there.

PRIVATE LEGISLATION PROCEDURE (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1899.

THE attention of intending promoters of Scottish schemes requiring parliamentary sanction is requested to the following statement of the procedure contemplated by the Scottish Office in connection with the administration of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act, 1899.

The procedure so far as statutory is laid down in the Act itself and in the General Orders which have been made under the Act and laid before Parliament. These Orders have been published as Parliamentary Papers (House of Commons Papers 1900 No. 195 and No. 356), and will shortly be issued in a convenient form as one of the series of Statutory Rules and Orders with an Index: they may be purchased from the usual agents for Government publications. A printed synopsis of the normal action required under the General Orders to be taken in connection with an application for a Provisional Order has been prepared and may be obtained by writing to the Under Secretary, Scottish Office, Whitehall.

Forms for use in proving compliance with General Orders before Examiners are in course

of preparation, and will be ready before the date when it will first be competent to apply to the Secretary for Scotland for a Provisional Order under the Act, viz., the 17th of December. They will be placed on sale through the usual channels.

It is in contemplation to issue a periodical sheet from the Scottish Office containing a record of action taken under the Act, notices of future action, &c., which will be put on sale and posted to subscribers in the same manner as the minutes of the two Houses of Parliament. The first issue will be made after the 17th of December, and will contain inter alia a list of the applications for Provisional Orders received under the Act on that date. Applications may be made by intending subscribers, addressed to the Scottish Office, Whitehall.

The special attention of promoters is requested to General Order No. 148 prescribing the Table of Fees chargeable at the various stages of the procedure. The method of payment is not yet finally settled, but it is in contemplation that the fees shall be paid at, and not after, the stage at which they respectively become due, and any delay in payment will entail delay in the progress of the proposed Order.

Having regard to the policy of the Act, the manner and the place in which the preliminary negotiations between the Parliamentary authorities, the Scottish Office, and intending promoters, should be carried on, after the draft Order has been deposited, have been the subject of careful consideration. It is not desired to unduly fetter the discretion of promoters; but it is thought that it will be for the general convenience that promoters should be able without coming to London to have meetings and consultations with officers competent to advise them as to the preliminary views of the Parliamentary authorities and the Secretary for Scotland upon the draft Orders submitted; and two Advocates selected from the Scottish Bar will be appointed by the Secretary for Scotland to act as Counsel under the Act, with the intention that interviews with them shall, so far as practicable and convenient, come in place of the preliminary interviews with the Lord Chairman of Committees and his Counsel, which constitute a recognized stage in the progress of a Private Bill. These gentlemen will have office accommodation in the Secretary for Scotland's Office in Parliament-square, Edinburgh, and one or other of them will act as Clerk to Commissioners appointed to hold any local inquiry under the Act.

It is hoped that promoters will prepare their draft Orders as carefully as if they were Private Bills, and with due regard to precedent and to the practice of Parliament and the General Orders under the Act.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 27TH SEPTEMBER 1900.)

WILTSHIRE AND SOMERSETSHIRE (FOOT-AND- MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1900 (No. 3).

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Movement out of into or within Scheduled District.

1.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved out of the District described in the First Schedule to this Order (hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District).

(2.) No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved into the Scheduled District, or along over or across a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District, except as expressly authorized by this Order.

Movement into out of or within Infected Place or Area.

2. Nothing in this Order shall authorize the movement of any animal into, or out of, or along over or across a highway or thoroughfare within, a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Area, or the movement of any animal in such Place or Area.

Movement of Swine into Scheduled District with Licence for Slaughter at a Bacon Factory.

3. Subject to Article 2 of this Order swine may be moved from any place outside the Scheduled District to a bacon factory in such District, if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of the place in which such bacon factory is situate, and subject to the following conditions, namely :

- (i.) The Licence shall be obtained before the swine are moved into the Scheduled District ;
- (ii.) The swine shall be moved by railway, and without being untrucked within the Scheduled District, to such railway station as is specified in the Licence ;
- (iii.) The swine shall be moved from such railway station, by the nearest available route, and without unnecessary delay, to the bacon factory specified in the Licence, in a van or float and not otherwise ; and
- (iv.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom it is granted, the number of swine that may be moved thereunder, and the name or description of the railway station in the Scheduled District and of the bacon factory to which the animals are to be moved.

Movement of Animals into the City of Bath with Licence for Slaughter.

4. Subject to Article 2 of this Order an animal may be moved by railway from any place outside the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within the city of Bath, if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that city, subject to the same conditions as are prescribed by the preceding Article in relation to swine

moved to a bacon factory, except that cattle need not be moved from the railway station in a van or float.

Movement within Scheduled District with Licence, except as to certain Petty Sessional Divisions or Parts thereof.

5.—(1.) Subject to Article 2 of this Order and to the proviso hereinafter contained, an animal may, if accompanied by a Licence under this Article, be moved by the nearest available route from any premises in the Scheduled District to any other premises within such District.

(2.) A Licence for movement under this Article may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved, but only on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or of his agent authorized in writing for this purpose to the effect :

- (i.) that the animal to be moved has been on the premises from which it is to be moved for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the granting of the Licence, and that no other cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have been brought on to those premises within such period ;
- (ii.) that the animal is not affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease ; and
- (iii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board ;

and every such Declaration shall be annexed to the Licence granted thereon.

(3.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals to be moved, and the name or description of the place or premises from which and the place or premises to which the animals are to be moved.

(4.) Provided always that no Licence shall be granted for movement from or to premises in the Petty Sessional Division and part of a Petty Sessional Division described in the Second Schedule to this Order.

Movement within Scheduled District of Animals across a highway between different parts of a Farm in the same occupation without Licence.

6. Subject to Article 2 of this Order, an animal may be moved by the nearest available route along or across a highway or thoroughfare in the Scheduled District from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm being in the same occupation, provided that the animal to be moved is not affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and that the movement of such animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of a Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Movement of Animals by Railway through Scheduled District.

7. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of an animal out of or into the Scheduled District where it is moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked or rebooked within such District.

Saving for Regulations of Local Authority.

8. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals,

but nothing in any such Regulation shall permit the movement of animals in contravention of any Order of the Board.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

(3.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

10. The provisions of this Order, except where it is otherwise provided, shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

11.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Licence thereunder, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person, moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows

a head of cattle, or a sheep, or goat, or pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

12. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture: “Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine:

“Bacon factory” means premises in which the business of a curer of bacon is carried on:

“Slaughter-house” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Revocation of Orders.

13. The Orders described in the Third Schedule to this Order are hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the Orders hereby revoked, or affect any licence or authority granted, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued thereunder before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under the Orders hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Commencement.

14. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred.

Short Title.

15. This Order may be cited as the WILTSHIRE AND SOMERSETSHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1900 (No. 3).
