A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation of the seventeenth day of September, one thousand nine hundred, dissolving the late Parliament, We did require Writs to be issued by Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and Our Chancellor of Ireland, respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons who are to serve in the new Parliament to be duly returned to, and give their attendance in. Our said Parliament, on the first day of November next. We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be prorogued from the said first day of November next, to which it now stands summoned, to Monday, the tenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred, and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said first day of November next.

Given at Our Court at *Balmoral*, this eighteenth day of *October*, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred, and in the sixty-fourth year of Our reign.

GOD save the QUEEN.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York be prorogued from the day to which the same now stand prorogued to Tuesday, the eleventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain is to cause Writs to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Convocations accordingly.

THE following Statute made by the University of Cambridge has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877" :—

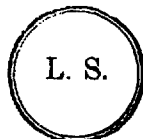
STATUTE to alter the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877" 40 and 41 Vict. cap. 48 in relation to the University of Cambridge and now submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

We the Chancellor Masters and Scholars of the University of Cambridge in pursuance of the powers given to us by the 53rd section of the said Act do hereby alter the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said University in manner following :—

By adding to Section I of Statute B Chapter VIII "For University Lecturers" the following paragraph :—

If in any case in which it has been decided by a Grace of the Senate that a Lecturer in a specified subject shall be appointed the General Board of Studies and the Special Board with which the Lecturer is to be connected do not agree in any appointment within four weeks after the General Board have communicated an appointment to the Special Board, days of any vacation not being reckoned, the appointment shall be made on that occasion by the Council of the Senate, unless the Grace establishing the Lecturership be rescinded by a Grace offered on the recommendation of the Council of the Senate notwithstanding the provision of Section 4.
